

After an exhaustive study of merit plans in Carada, California (8 other states have similar systems) and from 43 foreign countries, the framework of the Texas plan was formed. A continuing study was made by the actuarial staff of the Board and Texas Department of Public Safety as they delved into the facts and figures of 40,365 drivers' records. With the statistical information compiled from this source they arrived at various percentages of credits, surcharges and time-coverages in the new plan.
