Public concern is based on statistics showing that between the population has tripled, but the 1955-56 school year and graduation of the 1958-59 class, more than one - third of Texas high school students dropped out. In 1955 a total of 118,272 stu-

dents enrolled in the ninth grade in Texas public schools. When that class graduated in 1959, only 71.855 still were there. About 39 per cent had dropped out.
