Most people today have checking accounts. As negotiable instruments, checks allow you to transfer money easily.

Two main ways to pegoliate checks: by delivery or by endorsement and, now and then, by assigning them

For checks made out to "cash" or "bearer," delivery alone negoiates them. It's not a good idea to make out checks this way. Any holder can cash the check without endorsement-a flief, a finder or some other unauthorized person. A merchant cashing it may still have you sign the check for identification.

You negotiate checks made out to named payees by endorsement. There are several kinds:

Rock 'n' Reap, Amenomists Conclude After 42-last Study

Farmers who apply rock phosphate phate to increase crop yields are helping to build the soll's supply of phosphorous as well. periment Station, Stillwate

On a plot where 500 to 1,000 pounds of rock phosphate per acre was applied every four years, crop yields were as much as 30 per cent higher than fields on which no phosphorous fertilizer was applied. And the amount of available phosphorous in the top six-inch layer higher than the unfertilized area.

The fertilizer test program covered a 42-year-span. A third test plot on superphosphates showed an increase over the unfertilized plot, but results fell short of the rock phosphate area. Superphosphate was applied at the rate of 125 to 150 pounds per acre per year.

Crop yields of sorghum flax, for example, totaled 5,697 pounds per acre on the unfer-tilized plot; 6,843 on the super-

A-Proceeds of GI insurance policies are exempt by law from any claims of private creditors, they may not be seized nor attached to pay your husband's debts

Q-Does the Veterans Administration administer the unemployment pay program?

A-No, unemployment benefits are administered by the U.S. Department of Labor through their offices in each of the 50 states. In addition, state offices of the U.S. Employment Service offer job finding assistance including counseling and placement where employment is available.

March of Dimes Helps Dry Youngster's Tears of Pain

Anthony Ryan wasn't normally a crybaby. But at 10 months he began crying almost incessantly, and at times even screamed.

His loving parents in Philadelphia were nearly out of their minds. With four other small children, the household was pandemonium. No one ap-peared to know precisely what was causing the infant's dreadful paroxysms of pain.

Eight months and countless tears later, the cause of Anthony's agony was at last diagnosed as rheumatoid arthritis, seemingly afflicting every area of his tiny body.

It's 11 years now since Anthony was stricken. He will limp the rest of his life; he cannot play baseball today with the other boys in the block, and he is still in a great deal of pain. As a matter of fact, until just a short time ago he couldn't even turn his head.





Cole's bill sets a 10 per cent ceiling on interest to be charged

on loans. A lender would be able to charge more than 10 per cent on loans under \$1,500 only if he got state license, paying \$200 for investigation and \$200 a year license fee. To get the license, he'd have to hold \$15,000 in liquid assets for each loan office, and post \$20,000 surety bond, plus \$5-000 for each branch plus the \$200 annual fee for each office.

Cole's bill calls for creation of Consumer Finance Commission which would examine each lender's books annually, at the ex-

Interest charges would be limited to: 10 per cent per annum on the amount of cash advance; plus a "service and availability charge" of 3-4th of one per cent per month for each \$1 of the first \$400 of the loan on loans over

On loans under \$100, the charge would be \$1 for each \$5 borrowed, with at least 15 days to be allowed to repay each \$5 of the loan. If excessive charges are made, the lender would have no right to collect principal or charges, and would be fined from \$100 to \$1,000, and confinement to the


