Home Accidents Also Kill, Maim

Three decades ago there was hardly a Texas County that did not annually report numerouse cases of smallpox, diphtheria, typhoid fever and scarlet fever. Today we rarely hear of thee diseases.

Records show that good medical and public health programs, in the intervening years, have saved the lives of tens of thousands of Texas mothers and infants. But other records ask: "Have we really saved them? What about the annual home accident toll?"

Is it more terrible to die from diphtheria than from burns? During 1960, the most recent year for which complete figures have been released, only 20 Texans died from the former while death came to 465 from the latter.

Is it more terrible to die from smallpox than from poisoning? Not a single person died from smallpox in 1960, but the year's toll from accidental poisonings

Is it more terrible to live with a leg crippled from Poliomyelitis than with a leg, back or hip severely injured by an unnecessary home fall? During 1960, there were 382 deaths from falls in Texas homes.

Is it more terrible to die from typhoid fever than from an accidental gunshot wound? Typhoid, once a dread killer, took the lives of only four Texans in 1960. Accidental gunshot wounds inflicted in Texas homes took 102 lives.

Is it more terrible to die from scarlet fever than from suffocation? Scarlet fever killed 14, while 92, mostly children under four years of age, died from suffocation in the home.

These diseases are not as troublesome as they once were because over the years a lot o monefy and a liot of effort have gone into prevention and cure. The problem of the tremendous home accident toll, on the other hand, has received far too little attention, although today it is a bigger problem, a greater menace to life and limb, than any of these and many other diseases. There were 1,279 home accident deaths in 1960. Home accident injury cases totaled 193,079, of which 5,116 were of a permanent nature. The combined death toll from diphtheria, smallpox, poliomyelitis, tyhpoid fever and scarlet fever totaled 52.

The home accident problem will not be easily solved. There is no penicillin or Salk vaccine to use on this killer. There is no pill to be taken, no shot that can be given, such as are used in the control of communicable diseases. The solution to the problem lies with the individual and can be stated in a single sentence: use common sense and seek out and eliminate home hazards.

Gross income in 1945 was \$25 7 billion and production expenses were \$12.9 billion. Net income equaled \$12.8 billion. By 1960, gross income was up to \$37.9 hillion but expenses had jumped to \$26.3 billion, leaving a net of only \$11.6 billion.

Farmers have sought to improve their situation, says Bates, by shifting the inputs or "mix" of production resources. They have substituted machinery for labor. In 1940, U.S. farmers spent \$1.75 on machinery and buildings for each doller spent on hired help. By 1960, they were spending \$2.77 on these items for each dellar speat for hir-

Another effort to boost efficiency is reflected in the amounts spent for fertilizer and lime. By 1960, U. S. farmers were spending 4.8 times more for these items than was spent in 1940. This means a great increase in quantity since prices for fertilizer and lime have increased only 50 percent.

Athough comparable figures are not avalable on farmer expenditur es for pesticides and herbicides, the trend has been sharply upward. says the specialist. These inputs have tended to keep down the cost of food to consumers, he adds.

The question is often raised, points out Bates, why do farm units continue to increase in size? A major factor behind the pressure

X-RAYS AND YOU-2 **New Diagnostic Method Combats** Heart Disease

Every step forward in the fight | which, when the blood supply is heart disease offers additional hope to thousands of Americans. Heart disease, and spe-cifically the dreaded heart attack, is a major killer among our most productive people during their most productive time of life.

Such a step forward was reported recently by Dr. John A. Evans, of the New York-Cornell Medical Center, a leading radiol ogist and specialist in the uses of x-ray. The new technique Dr. Evans discussed involves x-ray visualization inside the heart itself and of the vessels around the heart. This visualization or view of the heart provides crucially important information to the doc--information that can be used to forewarn of an attack or information that can be used for pos-

sible surgical repair.
"This technique has been proved now clinically feasible," Dr. Evans reported. This means it will be used more and more among patients who have, or are suspected of having, heart disease.

way of explanation, the radiologist pointed out that the coronary arteries are the canals which carry blood from the heart. These canals can become hardened or grow narrower, diminishing the heart's ability to pump blood through the arteries. Or an actual clot can occur in the canals cut off, means a heart attack and possible death.

This is the second in a series of reports on recent advances in the diagnostic and therapeutic use of medical x-rays. Today's report discusses a new technique for diagnosing heart ailments. Subsequent articles will deal with advances in cancer treatment and the use of television techniques in fluoroscopic examination.

The new method used to visualize the heart involves the use of a hollow tube, called a catheter, inserted through the blood vessels into one side of the heart. Opaque liquid is injected into the tube. This liquid is dense enough to "stop" an x-ray beam so that when x-ray films are taken, the vessels and structures of the heart filled with the fluid are outlined on film. The radiologist interprets these films and reports the vitally important information to surgeons who can begin surgical

Dr. Evans and his surgical colleagues believe this new advance indicates that we may be able to eventually control heart attacks.
