Former Merkelite Gets Fellowship Valued at \$6,000

PLAINVIEW — Billy Ray Nail, former teacher and coach at Merkel, has been given a Texas Baptist Fellowship valued at \$6,000. Nail, son of Mrs. L. W. Moore, Rt. 2, Roby, is instructor in mathematics at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, and member to benefit from the proceeds of the sixth Wayland faculty gram for Texas Baptist college faculty.

The fellowship becomes effective with the 1963 summer school session when Nail will start his doctorate work at the University of Illinois, Urbana, from which he holds the MA degree. He will return to Wayland for the 1963-64 session and then in the summer of 1964 will go to Illinois, remaining the next 17 months, with the expectation of completing requirements for the Ph.D. with a major in mathematics.

Nail joined the Wayland faculty in the fall of 1962 and serves on the faculty athletic committee. From January of 1957 to June of 1961 he taught and coached at Merkel. Prior to that Nail was deputy sheriff and head jailer at Abilene.

He earned his undergraduate degree at Hardin - Simmons University, Abilene, in 1956. While there he was Axy Border Conference tackle in 1952 and 1953. At the University of Illinois he was selected for a National Science Foundation fellowship and also did graduate studies at Howard Payne College under an NSF fellowship.

The Texas Baptist Faculty Fellowship plan was established in 1961 by the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Last year Wayland had the second largest group participating in the program which is a convention effort to improve the quality of instruction in Texas Baptist colleges.

A hospital is more than a building — more than a bed. It is trained people — year out-



Family Services Heads Into Ninth Year as Helper of SAC Dependents

Dyess Family Services marks the ninth anniversary of its Strategic Air Command counterpart with an awards ceremony at 2 p.m. Apr. 23 in the base chapel annex.

Volunteer workers will receive pins, hour guards and letters of appreciation.

Family Services began with establishment of Dyess as an air base and was then known as "dependents' assistance." At first it was confined to women whose husbands were absent for long periods of time. Since then it has expanded to make all dependents' stays at Dyess more comfortable.

Dyess Family Services volunteers carry on the activi-

ties of a number of committees. Volunteers are made up of the wives of Dyess personnel.

Within the office itself, located in the wing personnel building, the Office Committee and the Housing Committee work daily, manning two desks. The members of the office committee maintain a current file of brochures on other Air Force bases, both continental and abroad. They also act as an information center, answer correspondence, perform secretarial duties and are custodians of the loan locker, which contains items for the use of personnel whose household goods have not yet arrived or have been shipped to other bases pending their departure.

The Housing Committee maintains a listing of off-base housing for rent, sale or lease which is available to all personnel.

Others Work Outside

Other committees work primarily outside the center. The Welcoming Committee welcomes newcomers to Dyess and informs them of the facilities available to them through Family Services. Newcomers receive maps, brochures and other informative items which help them in orienting themselves on the base and in the area. The Emergency and Casualty Committee avails its services to those who call the center for emergency aid. When a call for help is received, a volunteer is dispatched to see that the emergency situation is relieved as soon as possible.

The Family Services Center is the core of the activities of Family Services at Dyess. As it has in past years, the program continues to offer its

services to any military personnel and their dependents who need it. At Dyess, the people of any organization in any of the services are able to do their jobs knowing the Dyess Family Services is always available.

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



Law Day Pays Tribute To Legacy of Freedom

Congress and the President of the United States have proclaimed May 1 "Law Day."

In a democracy, law is the machinery through which the rights and interests of the citizens are fostered and protected. Therefore it is the responsibility of every citizen, especially the citizen-serviceman, to accept the responsibility of making laws work. This means a willing adherence to the law and an awareness of the freedom under these laws he experiences in everyday life.

Historian Will Durant wrote, "Man became free when he recognized that he was subject to the law." It is this freedom to which we are dedicated.

Our nation and the Soviet Union are engaged in what amounts to a competition between democracy and communism. The United States, as leading exponent of democracy, must be in the vanguard in demonstrating the true value of the democratic way of life. The rule of law, under freedom, and the responsibility of all citizens to conform, is a vital factor in the struggle to remain free.

That the serviceman should have a greater responsibility than the average citizen may sound unfair, but he does. Not only are his actions as a citizen subject to close scrutiny, but also any flagrant disregard for the accepted standards of fairness by him reflects adversely on his government.

No citizen—least of all the citizen-serviceman—is relegated to the sidelines in the fight to preserve law and order as our way of life. Each day we can strengthen our system in some way: By respecting and obeying all laws; by aiding public officials in the prevention of crime; by bearing witness against crime. Law Day, U.S.A., is not an experiment. For law is the root of our very existence. (AFPS)

"Doctors Want to Be Free"

Writing in the Saturday Evening Post, President George M. Fister of the American Medical Association presents the case against federalized medicine — and it is a powerful case indeed.

Dr. Fister's primary concern — like that of the vast majority of medical people — is the welfare of the patient. In his words: "Doctors want to be free to give their patients the best medical care they are capable of giving — It would not be the medical profession that will deprive the people of high-quality medical care and the fruits of progress in medical science. That will come when government begins meddling and interfering with medical freedom.

"If the victories and achievements of American medicine over the last 25 years or 30 years had been compressed into a single year, they would have electrified the world. Death is cheated regularly in hospital operating rooms by surgical procedures developed by American physicians that could not have been performed 20 or 30 years ago, even if physicians of that era had dared to try. This country has marked up more important drug discoveries in the last two decades than the rest of the world together. It is engaged in more extensive and more varied medical research by far than any other nation..."

So this great story goes. And there can be not doubt that federalization of medicine would tear and soil the pages. Federalization means control by a bureaucracy, and all bureaucracies have one thing in common — an insatiable urge for more power, self perpetuation and domination of the things and persons they regulate. In the case of medicine, this would be a tragedy not only for the living, but for generations yet to be born.



Safety Should Be A Job for Everyone

In 1962 every 5½ minutes an American died as a result of an accident. Motor vehicle accidents were the leading cause of death with an alarming increase of 8 per cent over the previous year. In addition to the deaths, vehicle caused some 9.7 million disabling injuries, of which 350,000 resulted in some degree of permanent impairment, ranging from blindness to complete crippling.

Driving in a rural or urban area determines the type of situation one may encounter. Nearly three-fourths of the nation's vehicle deaths occur in rural areas. The victims are usually occupants of the vehicle. In urban areas nearly one-half of the traffic victims are pedestrians.

Contrary to popular belief, the slow poke on the highway is just as dangerous if not more so, as the speeder. The slow poke is the one who drives 35 MPH in a 60 MPH zone, refuses to pass slower moving vehicles

and is generally over cautious.

This causes the faster driver to become irritated and take unnecessary chances which could cause an accident. Other circumstances may contribute to an accident. Improper driving is involved in nearly every accident. Driving too fast for conditions of heavy traffic, and bad weather is a prime factor in many accidents. Failure to yield the right of way is another factor which can contribute to an accident. These things, along with drinking while driving, contribute to nearly three-fourths of all fatal accidents and to one-half of injury accidents.

1 in 3 for Accident

What are a driver's chances of having an accident in one year's time? The average person drives 12,000 miles each year and has one chance in three of having some kind of an accident. He has one chance in four that damage will be limited to property; a chance in thirty-five there will be at least one injury

and one chance in 1,300 for a fatality.

What can be done to prevent accidents, save lives? First, plan every trip so you won't over tax yourself or your car. Take time to stop, rest and have a snack. Second, get plenty of sleep the night before the trip. You will be more alert, more relaxed and more comfortable. Remember that most accidents occur within 25 miles of your home, therefore start your trip with caution as the watchword.

Most accidents can be prevented if the job of driving is taken as serious business. Safety is your responsibility.

AF Announces Doctor Draft

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force announced this week that it will request some 300 physicians be called to active military duty under Selective Service for July and August of this year.

The call is necessitated by the fact that insufficient numbers of 1962 medical school graduates volunteered for active duty immediately following internship.

Those to be called will enter active duty as general duty medical officers, the Air Force said.

The last Selective Service call for physicians took place in the fall of 1961 and the winter of 1961-62 in connection with the military buildup occasioned by the Berlin crisis.

Air Force Surgeon General Maj. Gen. Oliver K. Niess said that the need for specialists in the medical services will be filled by volunteers who have been deferred for specialty training under the Berry Plan.


EWQ Eased For Hikes Cycle

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Some airmen hoping to move up to MSGT, TSgt., SSgt., and AIC in the June cycle will find their chance improved under a new promotion criteria change soon to be sent to the field.

The change will lift exceptionally well qualified (EWQ) limitations in all career field subdivisions for the next cycle.

This means improved promotion possibilities in the fields where overmanning previously has restricted promotion chances.

In the past, commands have been limited to promoting a small percentage of EWQ airmen within the total promotion quota.

Pay Hike Bill Hits Snag, Original Proposal Cut

Economy-minded members of the House Armed Services Committee succeeded in lopping some \$30 a month across the board off the proposed Uniformed Services Pay Act of 1963 with the result that the new bill follows the lower basic pay scales originally recommended by the Department of Defense.

The action in cutting the proposed pay raises for military personnel came this week when the committee, headed by Rep. L. Mendel Rivers of South Carolina, amended H.R. 4095 and introduced a new bill, H.R. 5555. The new bill was later referred to the full committee for further debate.

Air Force leaders said they will continue to press for a more liberal pay increase to bring the pay of military personnel more in line with that of civilians in comparable positions.

They said that military people should always be compensated at a level which implicitly recognizes the military profession as a dignified, respected and honorable one.

Compare to Industry
One way to achieve this is to continue to recommend pay comparability at all grades and that this pay be in balance with that of industry as well as that of Civil Service, the Air Force spokesman said.

Under the new version of the pay act, a newly commissioned second lieutenant would be paid at the rate of \$222.30 a month, the same as the present rate.

A first lieutenant with two years service would be paid \$345 a month, an increase of

\$54 over the present base pay. The pay for a captain with more than four years service would be \$490, a hike of \$75 above his base pay today.

Majors with more than 12 years of service would receive \$635 per month, compared with the present \$550 or an increase of \$85 per month.

The pay for lieutenant colonels with more than 16 years service would be \$760, an increase of \$80 above that now received, and that of colonels with 20 years service would be \$945 or an \$85 increase over his present pay.

The pay rates for the respective grades under the former version of the pay bill would have been \$375; \$520; \$665; \$790 and \$975.

Enlisted Remains Same
The pay increases for enlisted personnel remains the same as in the original House Bill except for a minute cut in the basic pay rate for persons just entering the service.

The basic allowance for subsistence for officers remains at the same \$51 monthly rate proposed in the former bill, and that of enlisted personnel serving where rations in kind are not available at \$97.50 a month. For enlisted personnel on leave or for those with permission to mess separately, the rate would be \$37.50 a month. For those assigned to duty under emergency conditions where no government messing facilities are available, the rate will not exceed \$129.30 a month.

The new bill will become effective on Oct. 1, 1963 or on the first day of the first month after enactment, whichever is later.

The latter clause also coincides with the Department of Defense version of the bill.

Mandatory Blues Date Is Waived

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Air Force announced this week that it is waiving the mandatory date for possession of the tropical worsted, 10½-ounce, light-weight, blue, shade 1084 service uniform in some instances.

Regulations set up earlier made it mandatory that all male airmen have the uniform by May 1.

Since, Hq. USAF has authorized commanders to waive the effective date for first-term airmen who have in their possession two serviceable blue uniforms and who are in one of the following categories:

- Have a term-of-service expiration date of July 1, 1965 or earlier.
- Are assigned to duty outside the continental United States where the lightweight blue uniform is not worn due to climatic conditions.
- Are assigned where civilian

clothing is the required duty dress.

Waivers granted under the second and third categories above are not valid after airmen are no longer assigned to exempted areas.

A change to AFM 35-10, including this letter change, will be published prior to July 1.

LEMON ICEBOX CAKE

Sunny as a Spring day!



1 pkg. lemon pudding and pie filling
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 cups water
 1 egg
 3/4 cup PET Evaporated Milk
 7-oz. angel cake (6 cups)

Mix well in a 2-qt. saucepan the pudding and pie filling, sugar, 1/2 cup water and the egg. Stir in gradually the remaining 1 1/2 cups water. Cook and stir until mixture comes to a full, all-over boil and is thick, about 5 minutes. Take from heat. Cover and cool. Chill milk in ice tray until almost frozen around the edges. With fingers, tear angel cake into inch pieces. Put the ice-cold milk in a cold quart bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater or electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Then fold into cooled pudding. Fold cake into pudding mixture. Put into 8-inch square pan. Chill until firm, about 3 hours. Cut into squares to serve.
