

BILLY PITT KILLED IN COPTER CRASH

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday at Merkel Church of Christ for Billy Dale Pitt, 29, Merkel pilot who died Sunday afternoon at Snyder when a gyrocopter crashed north of the airport runway there.

Officiating was Paul Rogers of Sweetwater, Church of Christ minister. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery and directed by Starbuck Funeral Home.

Mr. Pitt, a Merkel television repairman, had flown the small, single place helicopter aircraft about 200 feet and was an estimated 100 yards high when it crashed. The craft was owned by Blackie Myers of Snyder.

Civil Aeronautics investigators from Lubbock and Fort Worth began their investigation of the crash Monday.

Born October 15, 1933, in Brownsville, Mr. Pitt served in the Korean War from 1951-53, and married Janell Seymore of Merkel in 1956.

Surviving are the wife; one daughter, Sherry Gay of the home; two brothers, Woody of Borger and Marvin of Odessa; one sister, Mrs. Johnnie Johnson of Amarillo; his father, Elwood Pitt of Lubbock; his mother, Mrs. Vada Pitt of Amarillo.

KWFA RADIO SET FOR OPENING SOON

Radio Station KWFA, under construction since March, will soon make its debut to listeners in the area.

Keith Hodo, owner-manager of the station announced today that broadcasting will begin in the near future.

KWFA will operate with a power of 250 watts on 1500 kilocycles as authorized by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington, D.C. Application has already been made for power raise to 1000 watts or 1 kilowatt, Hodo said that this would be approved in the near future.

Construction of the station itself began early in March. All of the authorizations from the FCC have been completed and program testing has been in progress after midnight for the past week.

Mr. Hodo also stated that the grand opening for the station will be announced in the Merkel Mail next week.

KWFA will staff nine employees. Besides Hodo, the staff will include Larry Nolan, commercial manager; Marv Johnson, program director; Ron Mac, station director; Glenn Weekly, sales-

units drafted by the Texas Education Agency.

Dr. Thatcher Gary, representing the state agency, met with principals Edwin Read, Leon Walker and the local superintendent, to present plans for the program.

The state will furnish units to be included in the school's curriculum and the Merkel teachers will correlate the activities and give their reactions and recommendations relating to the proposed units. Special emphasis will be given in the science and in the social studies departments.

The Merkel teachers appreciate the honor given them by the state department and will stress and evaluate the materials being studied for possible inclusion in conservation bulletins and textbooks, said Fisher.

Vancil led the group in a game of matching up states and their capitals.

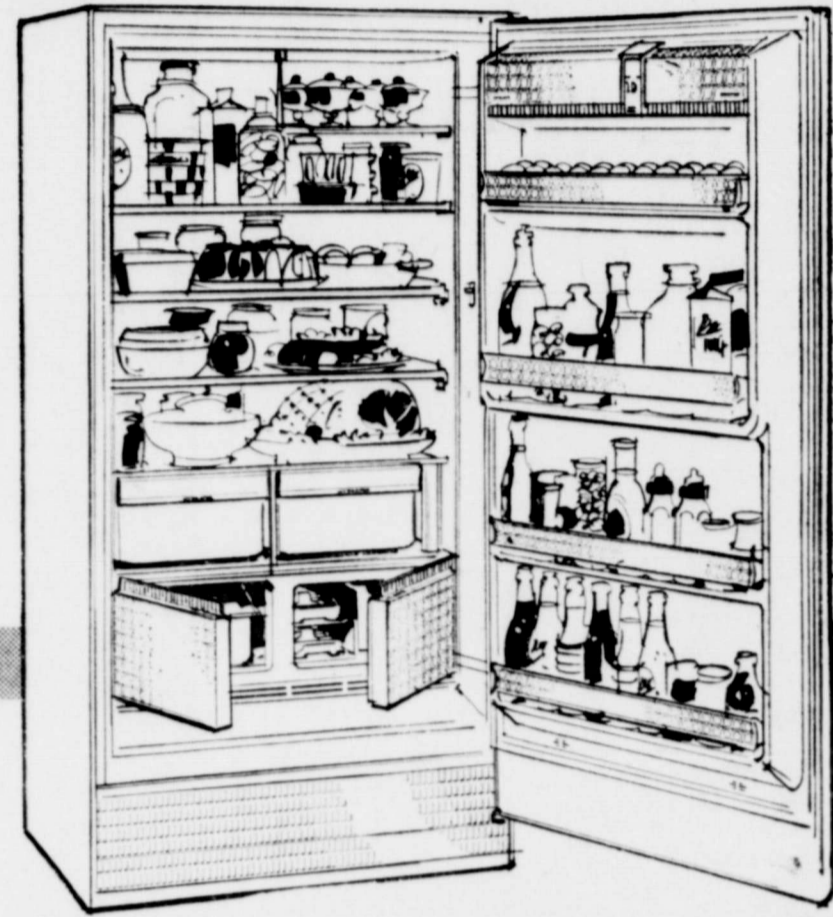

FISH FILLETS MAKE A DILLY OF A DINNER



Besides their growth-promoting, health-protecting benefits, seafoods offer extra dividends of flavor, color and texture variety. The many varieties of fish lend themselves to a thousand methods of preparation and service — hot or cold, rich or low-fat, traditional as clam chowder, exotic as sole amandine.

Experimenting with spices and herbs is an easy way to give your favorite seafood a new aspect by transforming it into a gourmet dish. Dill, often overlooked in fish cookery, adds an appetizing fragrance to baked or broiled fish. In this recipe for dill-flavored fish fillets, fresh or frozen chopped dill is best if available. If not, common substitutes are dill salt, dill seed, powdered dill, or caraway seeds.

To complete a well-balanced gourmet menu, you might add boiled new potatoes with onion rings, cucumber slices in tomato or pepper cups, cheese biscuits, and pineapple upside-down cake.

FISH FILLETS WITH DILL BUTTER

2 pounds fresh or frozen fish fillets (flounder, sole, cod, haddock, ocean perch or other white-meat fish)
Salt and pepper
½ cup butter or margarine
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
½ teaspoon dill salt (or 1 teaspoon chopped fresh or frozen dill or a sprinkling of dill seed)

If fish is frozen, let thaw on refrigerator shelf or at room temperature for 30 minutes. Cut into serving-size pieces. Sprinkle both sides with salt and pepper. Melt half the butter and let remaining butter soften at room temperature. Preheat broiler. Place fillets on preheated greased broiler pan or on aluminum foil about 2 inches from source of heat. Brush with melted butter once or twice during the cooking process, but do not turn. Broil 5 to 8 minutes, or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Blend the parsley and dill salt or chopped dill into the softened butter and spread over the cooked fish. Serve immediately with lemon wedges. Makes 6 servings.

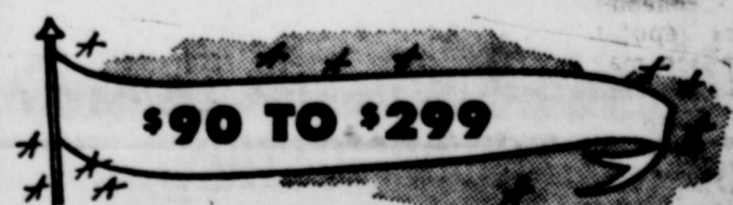

Most of us have grown used to the custom made suit, shirt, hairdo and house, but it remained for a New England builder to add a very new touch to tailoring a product for particular tastes.

Not only is the builder offering homes in attractive wooded areas — his firm is also creating lakes to complete a perfect suburban setting. Stamford, Connecticut's Harry Bennett and Associates are currently putting lakes where ponds used to be to set off a new housing development in the Nutmeg State.

According to Harry Bennett, firm president, "making lakes by enlarging existing ponds does a double job for us. Not only do we enhance the value of surrounding property, we also get gravel for use as fill and top quality humus for enriching top soil."

Bennett's group is building a new community — Lake Wood Park — in Stamford. With 20 homes already completed and plans for 65 additional units on the drawing boards, it appears the builder's idea of lake front living has found favor.

Unlike most planned communities, Lake Wood Park doesn't boast "model homes".

Each house, ranging in price from forty to fifty thousand dollars, is an individual product.

Lake Wood Park has drawn most of its residents from city environs, and most of them are transferees from areas throughout the country who now have business connections in and around New York City. Apparently catering to his customers' every whim, Bennett takes the trouble to

stock his lakes with large and small mouth bass. Also available to the new homeowners is ice for skating during the winter months and a perfect setting for picnics from June to September. Concerned with the business of home building for the past 12 years, Mr. Bennett can count the lake-front concept as only one of several innovations.

Bennett also pioneered the Colonial split level home and the side to side split level structure in the Stamford area. In all, he estimates he's built almost 250 homes since entering the field.

Admitting the lake front idea is catching on, Mr. Bennett has set this writer to thinking. I wonder what we could do with the stream in my back yard?

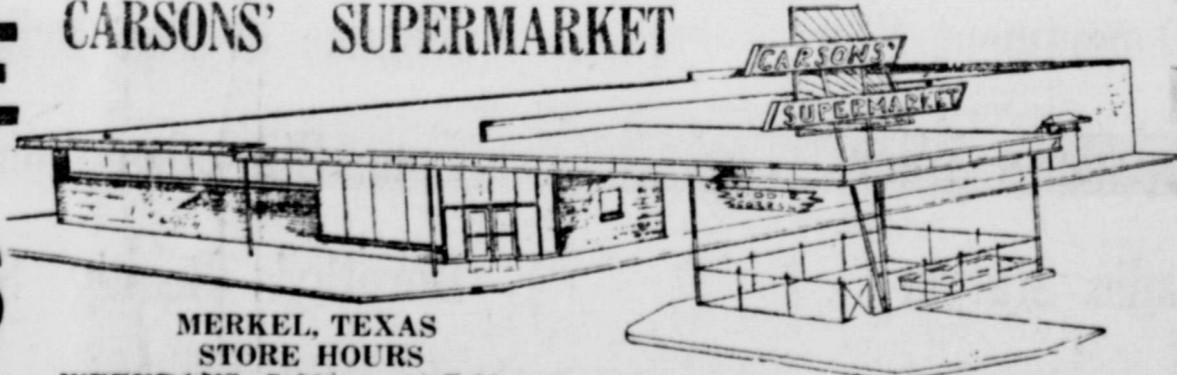
