Canning Fruits With Corn Syrup Or Honey

Fruits will have a better flavor texture and color when canned in syrup, but they keep as well without sugar as with it. The final product will be slightly different when using corn syrup. The liquid in the jars will be slightly stickier. Corn syrup is especially good for canning pineapple and peaches.

Syrups Made With Honey And Sugar

Thin syrup use 1/2 rup sugar and 1/2 cup honey 2/2 cups water, Medium syrup use 1 cup sugar and 1 cup honey to 4 cups



In our country today there are nearly 18 million older Americans. There has been a definite increase here due to the added years on our life expectancy, and it is predicted that by 1970 this figure will reach 20 million, rising to 32 million by the year 2000.

Today we have gained more insight into the problems of these people due to thorough studies began shortly after World War II.

The first thing that stood out was the inadequate income that most aged people had to live on, but this was only the first. To most older citizens, to obtain a certain degree of independence is almost as valuable as life itself. To accompany the problem of inadequate income was the problem of health, medical care cost, and hospital cost; employment and its limitations; and inadequacy of housing for older people.

Behind our older citizens are the same thoughts, ideas, wants and desires, and needs that they experienced earlier in their younger years. They need some fulfillmnt of these needs and to a large extent this is the responsibility of the community working in hand with states and federal authorities. Senior citizens have a place in our community. They are representative of our democracy and freedom, we have advanced through their knowledge and wisdom. They have been through the trials and tribulations of our community, they have met both triumph and defeat. This is our older citizen.



People Pallets-Or How to Jump Out Of An Airplane Without a Parachute

side of the extraction path. Energy absorption is provided by vaned rotors turning between two vaned stators in the sunken water-filled housing. The rotor extends through the top of the housing and has a drum linked to it. The drum is wound with a heavy nylon strap, the free end of which is connected to the cable which in turn is engaged by the hook. Rubber discs hold the cable a few inches off the ground to insure engagement with the extraction hook.

2 Years Needed In Grade

Washington (AFNS) - The Air Force announced this week that senior non-commissioned officers, warrant officers and certain commissioned officers will be required to remain on active duty at least two years in their new grades before becoming eligible for voluntary retirement.

A Department of Defense directive signed in April bars approval of voluntary retirement applications submitted by personnel who are promoted on or after July 1 to active duty pay grades of E-7, E-8, E-9, W-3, W-4, O-5 and O-6 until the applicant has served on active duty a minimum of

two years in such grade. Exceptions may be authorized where substantial personal hardships or the best interests of the Air Force are involved.

Exceptions for the purpose of effective management of the officer force may also be authorized for officers to retire, who have served on active duty at least one year in their new grade, the Air Force

Details of the new criteria will be contained in a change to AFM 35-7 which will be published shortly.

Applications have been mailed to all gins in the Abilene and Munday areas so ginners can apply for the service. "Deadline for applying is July 1, 1963. Ginners must apply for the

service and pay the 8 cents per bale fee charged for the service. All cotton is eligible for the "mike" service, but it must be on an all-or-none basis from any one gin as the local office cannot separate those who do not desire it.

Last year, 52 gins in this area applied for this service which came into effect after the harvest began.


