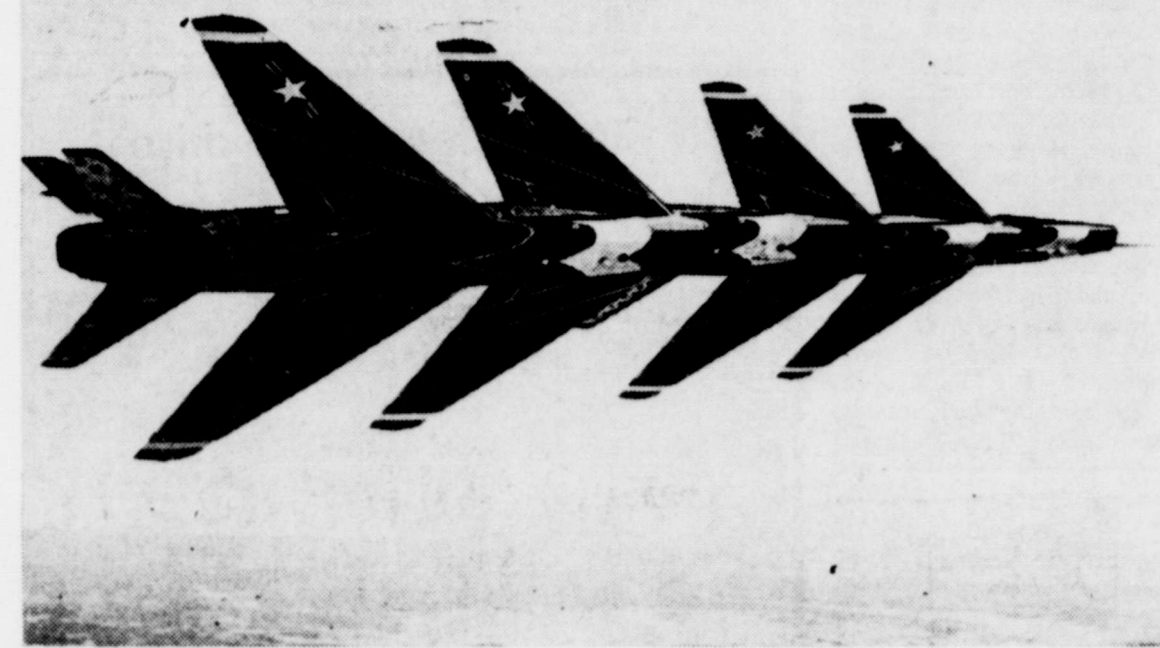

The Thunderbirds Air Force's Famous Flying Team Will Perform At Dyess On Nov. 30

The Air Force's world-famous precision flying team, the Thunderbirds, will perform at Dyess AFB Nov. 30.

The announcement was made Thursday, Oct. 10, by Col. Harold A. Radetsky, 96th Strategic Aerospace Wing commander. The Thunderbirds will be a feature attraction of activities

held Nov. 30, by Dyess AFB and Abilene in connection with the arrival of the first B-52 Stratofortress bomber at this Strategic Air Command base.

The city will hold its observance in the morning with a parade through the downtown business district, which will include military bands and equipment. At 1 p.m. that afternoon the SAC base will be opened to the public. The

Thunderbirds will be making an afternoon appearance as part of the base activities.

Their 1963 show at Dyess will involve solo vertical climbing rolls and 4 - plane low altitude head-on runs at 650 miles-per-hour in F-100 Super Sabre craft. Formation flights are usually made with the plane "wings", a broomstick apart. There are 19 examples of precision flying in the Thunderbird sequence of them compare with the spectacular "bomb-burst", highlight of the show, in the requirement for piloting skill.

Plans For Safety Program Made By Local C of C

Leonard to Speak 'For Safety Sake'

Plans for Merkel's child safety program were started last Friday morning when Bill Leonard, vice president of the Texas Safety Association and Eddie Robinson, manager of Oak Farm Dairies, Abilene, met in the chamber of commerce office with five city officials.

The purpose of the meeting was to present eight safety signs to Merkel and to make further plans concerning the safety programs.

The highlight of the meeting was "The importance of protection of children in traffic," Leonard stated. "We do hope that these eight Safety Cautions signs will alert the citizens of Merkel to drive more safely and help protect the most precious possession of our city... 'our children'."

He mentioned that the daily statistics of traffic deaths and injuries keep climbing each day all over the nation; 3,400 persons are injured every 24 hours and 170 persons are killed during the same period of time.

The safety program is built around safety cautions, falling, lifting, eye care, fire prevention and traffic.

Tentative plans have been made to continue the safety program with the appearance of Leonard at the Merkel school assembly program, and Lions Club meeting on November 19.

Leonard is an entertainer as well as lecturer. The safety program will not be a lecture. The program will not be a lecture of "Dos and Don'ts" but will be presented in the form of entertainment as well as knowledgeable facts, Leonard stated.

MERKEL WHIPS WYLIE IN 48-12 VICTORY

The Merkel Badgers' 48 to 12 defeat of Wylie has kicked them into "the team to beat" spot in 6-A football.

Coach Bob Byerly said the game this Friday with Coahoma "could be one of the toughest games we will have."

Byerly told members of the Badger Booster Club Monday night that when a team gets "set" for another and everything they do is right that it makes it awful hard to predict and that teams will start from now on out to get "set" for Merkel.

Besides the victory over Wylie Merkel is undefeated in conference play, having defeated Baird 6 to 0, Rotan 20 to 6 and Aspermont 13 to 0.

Merkel was tied by Stanton and lost to powerhouse Albany.

Coach Byerly said the game with Wylie was one of the best showing Merkel has made. Play in the second half looked very good.

The Badgers opened up more for this game and scored in the first few minutes of the game with a 24-yard pass from Jack Mansfield to Jack Reynolds. C. B. Brown kicked the extra point.

This sequence was repeated with only 30 seconds left in the quarter to put another seven points on the board for Merkel.

Weldon Tittle scored in the second quarter with a plunge for two yards. And again with only thirty seconds left to play, Tittle intercepted a pass and scampered 55 yards for a touchdown.

Reynolds scored in the third quarter with a 26 yard run and Robert Shouse kicked for the extra point.

Wylie made its second score in the fourth period.

Merkel scored twice more in the fourth quarter with Richard Walker going in for two yards to cross the goal line.

Gaston Thomas went over for the Badgers after Wylie fumbled on the five yard line with only three minutes left in the game.

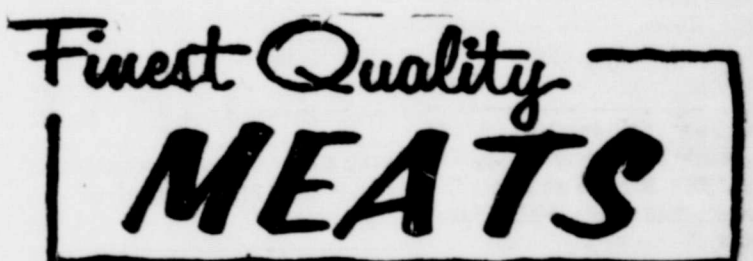

Gala Blueberry Pie

- 1 package (3 oz.) black raspberry or black cherry flavor gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 cup cold water
- 1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring
- 1 pint fresh cultivated blueberries
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
- Vanilla ice cream or Sweetened whipped cream

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add cold water and almond extract. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in blueberries. Spoon into pie shell. Chill until firm. Serve with a scoop of vanilla ice cream, or whipped cream.

HOME DEMONSTRATION NOTES

DON'T BURN THOSE LEAVES!

Don't burn those autumn leaves! They're just the thing for a compost pile. Every year about this time I have a lot of requests as to how to make compost beds.

Soil specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture say that many homeowners throw away valuable materials that could be saved for use in improving their soil. Leaves, grass clippings, old tomato plants, bean vines, even weeds can be turned into fertilizer for next summer's gardens.

Such materials, after they have wintered in compost, make excellent organic matter. Compost, spread around trees and shrubs and worked into the soil in flower and vegetable gardens, makes the earth rich and porous. It loosens the ground so that roots can develop naturally, and air,

moisture, and plant food can penetrate easily.

Here's how you go about making a compost pile.

Select a spot at the back of your lot, yet within reach of your garden hose. (That's because the pile should be kept moist.) Use ordinary wire fencing or boards to enclose an area 3 to 8 feet high and 3 to 5 feet square.

Dump leaves, lawn clippings and garden trash into the bin in layers 6 to 12 inches thick. To each layer add some commercial fertilizer (whatever you use on your lawn) and 1/2 layer of soil. Moisten the leaves as they are added.

Keep building up the pile as you accumulate material. Top with 1 to 2 inches of garden soil.

Remember to keep the compost pile damp. If the pile is kept reasonably moist and has a cap of garden soil, it should have no odor. And, by May or June, last year's left-overs will be ready to perform springtime magic in your garden.

As sweet potatoes are in abundance now, you might like to try this recipe for something a little different.

SWEET POTATO PUFFS

- 3 medium sized sweet potatoes
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 4 pineapple slices
 - 4 marshmallows
- Boil potatoes until tender, about 20 minutes. Pare and mash potatoes. Add salt and butter or margarine. Beat hard and then cool until mixture can be han-

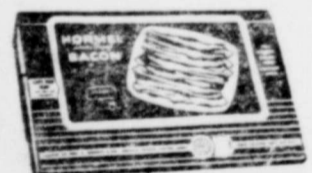

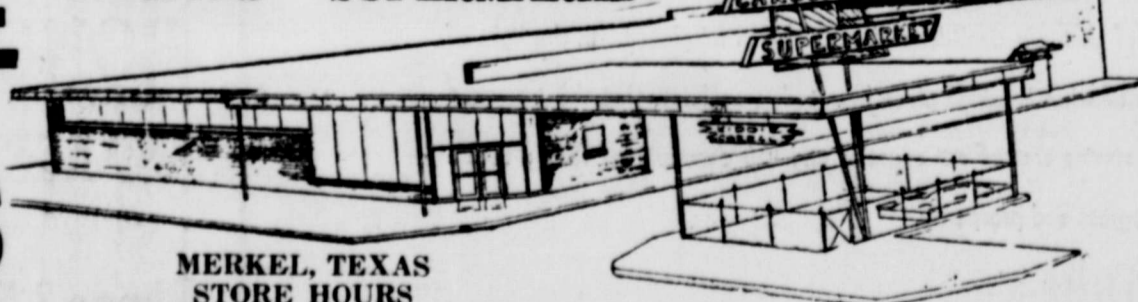
