Safety Stressed By Musick As Texas enters the final quarter of 1958, increasing at our own traffic safety pressure is being applied by safety organizations in urging consistent traffic safety habits on the part of the general pub-

"The keystone in any safety program is the responsibility of the individual," J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, said in his Austin office Wednesday.

"Each man is his 'brother's keeper.' This Christian principle goes hand in hand with the natural instinct for selfpreservation," Musick said. "If the carelessness of an individual provokes an accident -- to himself or another -- he is

The advice of those housewives is to be sure and "taste first, cook later." Be sure to sample your dressing and remember that the flavorings will be mellowed to some ex-

tent by the baking. They will blend together and actually be better when cooked than they are in the "raw" form. By using the breads, you get the bulk; and the broth instead of plain water, you get another flavor; that of the meat.

Advice of most Bovina culinary artists is to be sure and save some of the broth and add it to the broth taken from the boiling of the giblets. These, together with the minced giblets, flour and seasonings, and a little cream or milk, makes a delicious gravy that will carry the flavor through the rest of the meal. A hard boiled egg chopped into the gravy just before it is "taken up" adds color as well as another special flavor to the combination.

Another suggestion that came in when the request for hints for the Thanksgiving feast was given was a tip on green beans. If you are going to prepare canned green beans, drain off the juice in a glass and heat the beans thoroughly in a small amount of drippings from the roasted fowl. Stir gently a few times as they come to the boiling point and be sure not to overcook.


Pumpkin pie is a favorite for the season and, if you make your own, here's another suggestion. Most recipes call for about two eggs per pie, but for that old fashioned made-like-mother flavor, put about six eggs into each one. Have used as high as that in a pie and the flavor just gets richer and creamier.

Mix well and it's a good idea to heat the mixture thoroughly before placing in the pie shell to bake, thus the filling will be done by the time the crust is brown. To get that "golden brown' topping on your pies, incidentally, allow to bake until just turning and then brush on a small amount of cream or just plain milk. The moisture keeps the crust soft, even while it is browning and the crust will be far more uniformly brown.

Top the meal off with fruit juice drinks, as they are lighter than either tea or coffee and will go well with the already "heavy" menu.

And above all, relax and enjoy the meal. If it is going to be too taxing, just don't invite that many people; or better still, meet them at the door with aprons so they can help. The dishes, in the mind of almost every homemaker, should be done by the men, but then that is a little too much to ask, is it not?

Here's for a thankful, "tablefull" Thanksgiving to all.

He owns the hatcheries which produce the baby chicks, or contracts for their production. These are supplied the producer on credit. The dealer may sell the finished birds to a processing firm, or contract for their slaughter and preparation for market; then sell them direct to a retailer.



State laws regulating traffic on highways read as follows: The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children . . . The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is a part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the road-
