George Bush scored an outstanding victory over Jack Cox Saturday in the Republican U. S. Senate primary.

The victory sent Bush into the November general election against Democratic Senator Ralph Yar-

In the first primary Cox received enough votes to force last Saturday's second primary. but trailed even then by a 3-2 mar-

Republican held primaries in

only 202 of the state's 254 coun-

In Taylor County's second Republican primaries Cox led a

413 victory over Bush's 304. Cox won all but two of the eight voting boxes the GOP operated in the county. Bush led in the totals reported at Bonham School and at Lawn.

Republicans pulled only 718 of the 30,000 or so qualified voters in the county to their polls, approximately half the number of voters in the first primary.

## SCIENTIST GAP SEEN CLOSING

Ever since Sputnik a cloud of concern has persisted in the U.S. that our nation is faced with a serious shortage of scientists and engineers. But recently a number of authorities have become aware that the "scientist gap" between Russia and the United States is not as wide, or as serious, as first feared.

Some, including Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg of the Atomic Enery Commission, now state that the anticipated scientist shortage has been "exaggerated." Figures from the latest major study undertaken by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, major source of givernment information in this field, support this view.

The Bureau's study of projected demands for technical manpower indicates an increase in requirements for scientists and engineers through the present decade of nearly 800,000. That would be an incras of 69 per cent over the number in 1960. The projected net supply of new persons entering science and engineering will number about 764,000 over the 1960-70 period. These figures are based on careful estimates by government officials and the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Develop-

Certainly, these figures reflect a shortage of technical manpower, but a shortage that does not appear to be critical, by any means.

Since Sputnik sent a shock wave through our scientific and industrial community, industry and private and public education have concentrated more and more on steps to encourage talented youngsters to enter the fields of science and engineering. According to a survey conducted by Science Service, a non - profit agency devoted to the advancement of science, more youngsters today are becoming interested in science at earlier ages than heretofore, and they are bing influenced, increasingly, by sources outside the home and school.

In a significant corollary, more industrial firms are offering incentives to youngsters in science and engineering. Many companies sponsor regional school science

Others offer scholarships to various universities. One company sponsors an annual "Science Talent Search" that enables outstanding students to further their technical education at accredited universities.
