3 MERKEL BOYS TO ATTEND AUSTIN YOUTH CONFERENCE

Three local teenagers, sponsored by the Merkel Optimist Club, will attend the Attorney General's Youth Conference to be held in Austin July 10 - 12. Local youth attending the conference will be Ricky McMurray of Trent and John Hardesty Jr. and Robert Shouse of Merkel.

While attending the conference the boys will be participating in discussions and activities designed to assist the young people of our state in becoming better leaders in our community and better law abiding citizens, stated Bill Wood, Optimist Club member. This is the second annual conference on youth and children. Leaders from selected communities are asked to come to Austin to discuss with the Attorney General and other law enforcing agencies the problems of increasing juvenile crime and delinquency, he said. Speakers at the Conference will include the Attorney General, Robert Kennedy, J. Edgar Hoover, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and John Connally, Texas Governor. An invitation has been extended to President Lyndon B. Johnson, but it is not known if

he will be able to attend. The purpose of the conference is to find out from the youth their ideas on how to combat the problem of delinquency and to try to curb everything from crime to high school drop outs. When the three return from the Austin Conference they will be available to discuss the results of the conference with all clubs and organizations in the Merkel and Trent area, Wood stated.

STALLION DIES WITH RABIES

Poco Cris, cutting horse stallion owned by Ralph Russell and David Gamble, died June 11 with what was diagnosed as rabies by Dr. John Beall of Abilene.

Following the death of the stallion an autopsy was performed and the brain was sent to the state laboratory in Austin.

Two reports from Austin stated that the cause of death was not rabies. On June 30 the county health unit was informed by letter that a third test had proven that the stallion was rabid.

Russell, Gamble and a third party, Carl Smith, were the only persons exposed to possible infection. Rabies shots were started immediately on receiving word that the horse was rabid.

A total of 17 rabies shots will have to be administered. The first four shots were administered every eight hours subsiding to one shot a day. The injections will continue through Tuesday, July 14.

The stallion was purchased from Albert Criswell as a colt and had won many ribbons in the past three years at cutting and halter shows.

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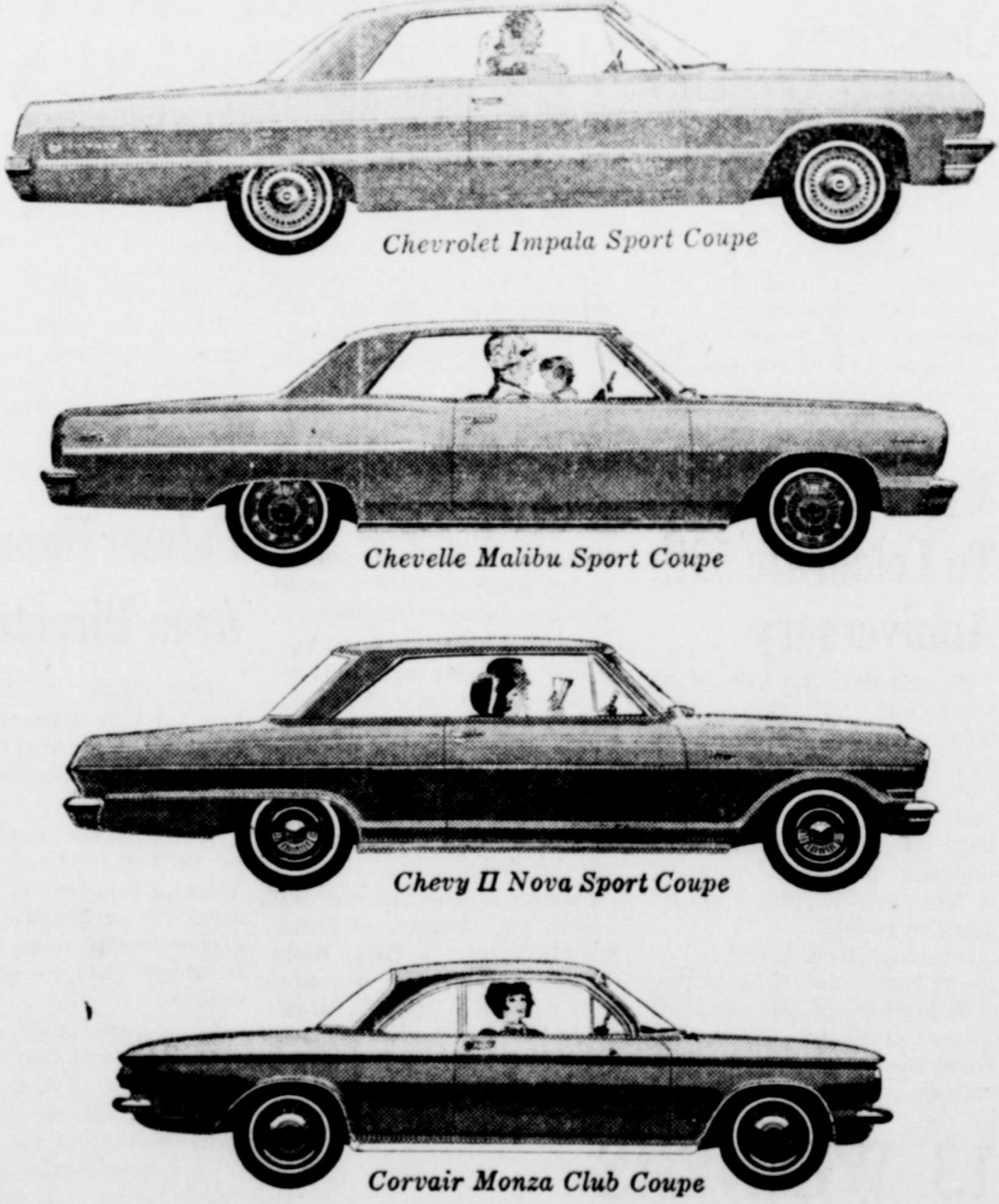

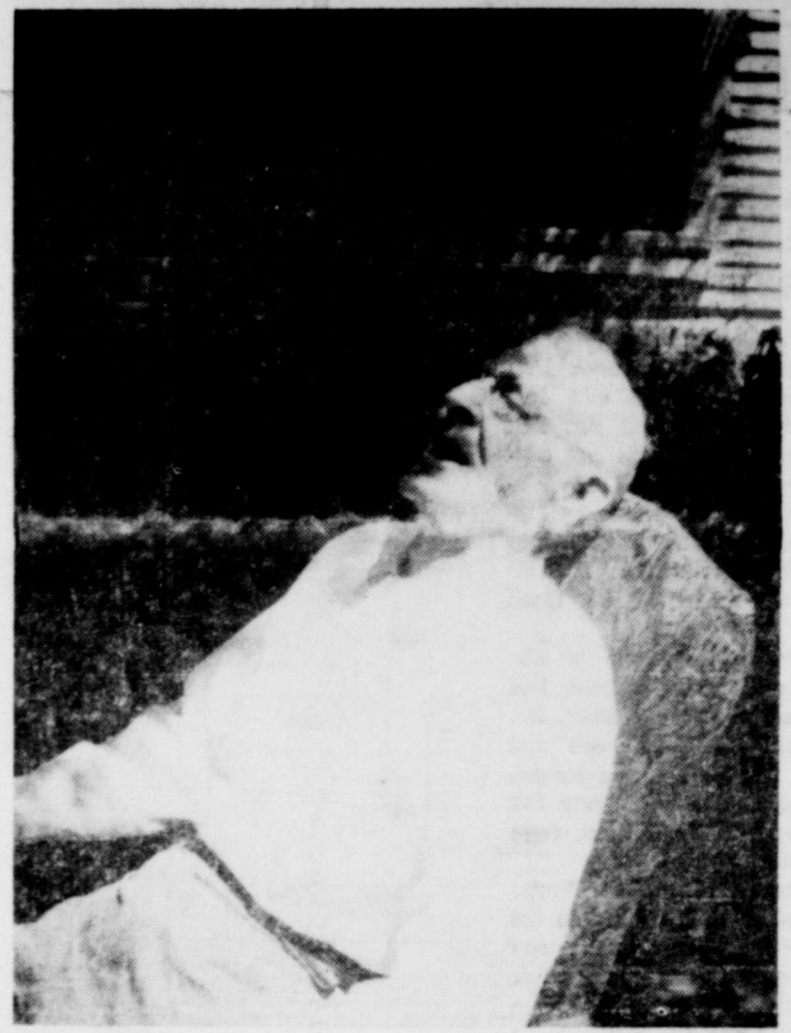

July-Iced-Tea-Menu-Of-The-Month



The Iced-Tea-Menu-of-the-Month is designed for a family of 6 and provides 374 calories per person at a cost of approximately 33 cents each. In line with the July trend of picnic meals at home, on the terrace or in the back yard, the iced-tea-menu for this month recommends using convenient paper plates for the following menu: Barbecued Frankfurters, Kraut and Pea Slimmer, Potato Chips, Strawberry-Apricot Surprise and iced tea with a slice of orange.

Iced tea, sweetened with a non-caloric sweetener, leads as the most popular low-calorie summer beverage. The following tells its own story.

To make about 10 servings of iced tea, pre-measure 5 tablespoons loose tea (or 15 tea bags). Bring 2 quarts fresh water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan. Remove from heat. Immediately add tea. Brew, uncovered, five minutes. Stir and strain. Serve in ice-filled glasses.

Menu-of-the-Month Recipes

Barbecued Frankfurters: Dissolve 1 tablespoon rich prepared mustard in 1/4 cup cold water in a saucepan. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 non-caloric sweetening tablets, 1/4 teaspoon chili powder, 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt, 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1/4 cup water. Stir thoroughly. Blend in 1/2 cup catsup. Cook over low heat till thoroughly heated and blended. Serve over 6 grilled hickory-smoked, all-beef frankfurters which come packed in brine in a glass jar. Serve with crisp potato chips.

Kraut and Pea Slimmer: To make low-calorie salad dressing, drain juice from 1 #2 can sauerkraut. Heat 1/2 cup kraut juice to boiling. In the meantime, combine 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch with 1/4 cup cold water. Blend. Add to sauerkraut juice. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add one tablespoon oil, 1 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar, 1 tablespoon rich prepared mustard, 3 tablespoons chili sauce, 1/4 cup ground cloves, 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt. Beat till ingredients are well-blended. Cut sauerkraut in short lengths. Combine with 1 #303 can peas (drained), 1 cup diced cucumber, 1 medium size diced tomato and 1/2 cup chopped water cress. Add salad dressing. Toss lightly.

Strawberry-Apricot Surprise: Dissolve 1 package strawberry flavored gelatin in one cup of hot water. Drain one can (8 oz.) dietetic apricots, measure syrup from canned fruit adding enough cold water to make one cup. Stir into gelatin. Chill until slightly thickened. Arrange apricot halves in an 8-inch mold. Add gelatin. Chill until firm.

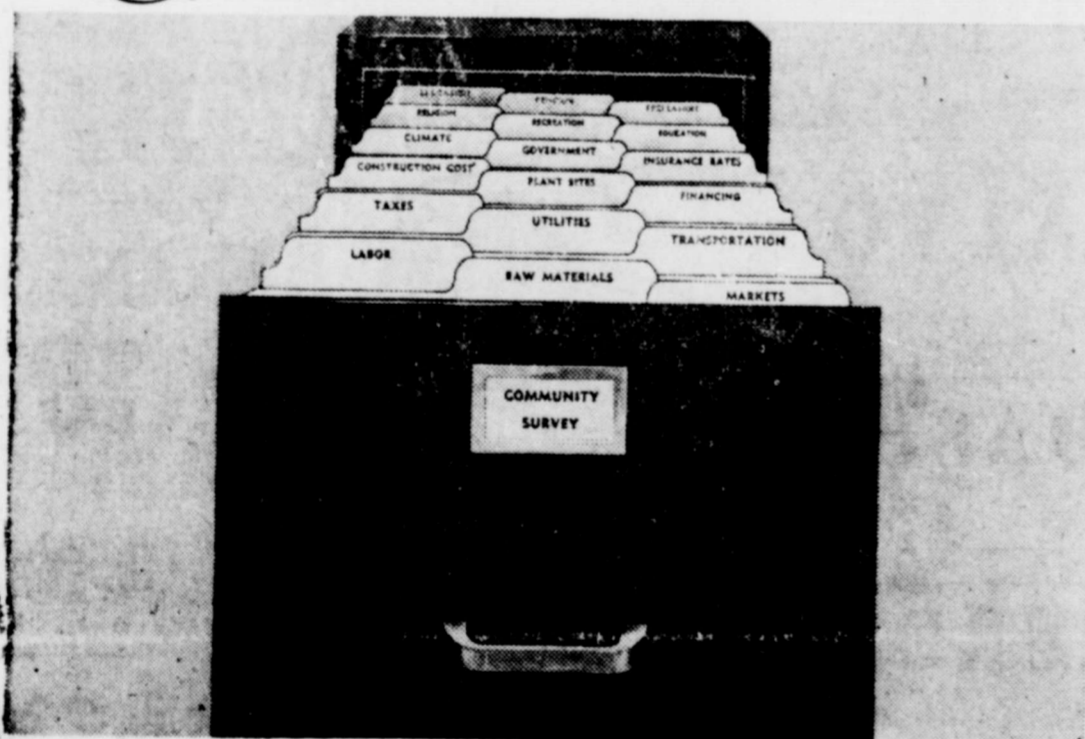

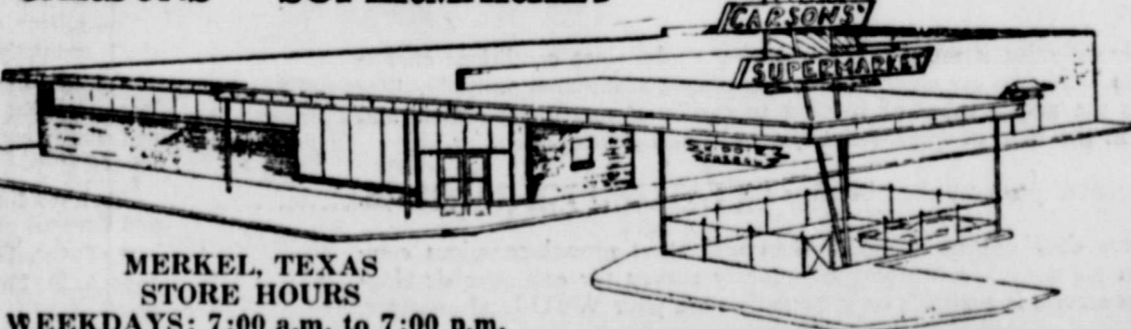
