Proceeds from the talent show will be used to pay for the piano and bass fiddle purchased for the band and also other club projects.



## AIR FORCE MEDAL PRESENTED TO FORMER MERKEL RESIDENT

(Special to The Merkel Mail) STEWART AFB. N.Y. - Col. William K. Bonneaux, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Karl Boneaux of Merkel, was recently presentel the Air Force Commendation Medal in a formal ceremony at Stewart AFB. The colonel received the award for "outstanding achievement as Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, Headquarters 26th Air Division.'

Lt. Gen. Herbert B. Thatcher, commander of the Air Defense Command, Headquartered in Colorado Springs, Colo., made the presentation to Col. Bonneaux during an awards ceremony which included a flyover of 25th Air Division aircraft and a "Pass in Review" by some 1,000 Stewart airmen. Coi. Bonneaux has been stationed at Stewart since Sept., 1963. His first assignment at the base was a deputy commander of Stewart. When the 26th Air Division - responsible for defense of the northeastern United States moved to Stewart in July 1964. the colonel took over as head of personnel, his present assignment.

He started his Air Force career in January, 1942, after graduating from Hardin-Simmons University of Texas. He completed basic flying training before his assignment to the China Burma-India Theater of Operations in early 1944. He served with the Chinese - American Composite Fighter Wing, an element of the 14th Air Force.

While there he flew 100 combat missions in P-40 and F-51 air craft and is credited with downing four enemy aircraft. He returned to the United States in Sept., 1945, and after several tours of duty entered the Univer sity of Texas where he received a Masters' Degree in Business Ad ministration.

Among the Colonel's decorations are the Distinguished Flying Cross; the Air Medal; the Sol dier's Medal; American Campaign Medal: American Defense Ser vice Medal; World War II Victory Medal: National Defense Service Medal; Air Force Longevity Award with four bronze Oak Lea

Clusters and the Asiatic - Pacific Campaign Medal. His foreign decorations include the Niochi - Chin Medal, Paoting - Chin Medal and the Yun-Hui-Chin Medal.

Col. Bonneaux and his wife, Helen, have been very active in the military community of Stewart ever since their arrival. The colonel, a former Life Scout, is active in scouting and is also president of the Officers' Open Mess Board of Directors. Mrs. Bonneaux is active in the Teen Club and Family Services Program at the base. She is also a member of the Officers' Wives Club.







Using blender or electric mixer, combine all ingredients and blend until smooth. (Or, mash banana with fork and shake or beat with remaining ingredients.) Top with nutmeg. Makes two 8-oz. servings.

Apricot Purce: Simmer 1 12-oz. package dried apricots in 1½ cups water in covered saucepan until tender, about 20 minutes. Stir in ½ cup sugar. Blend or beat in electric blender or mixer (or force through sieve). Makes about 2 cups puree. Store in refrigerator.
