

The nights are cool and the days are a little warm, enough to still wear an old straw hat in the afetrnoon or an old gry bon-

This is some of the things that has been going on on our farm this week: Cotton harvesting, hay baling, grain sowing, cattle work, sheep work, or just about anything else you could think of on the farm. I love it! I was raised on the farm, married as a farmer, later entered ranching business with my wife's father, the late Sam Butman Sr., and later went into my own private farming and ranching setup of the Tom Russoms' and we love it!



During recent years many of the people have moved from the country to the cities and towns, and the wild animals, especially the coyotes and wildcats, have increased in numbers.

Unless the predatory animals are kept under control, it is impossible to raise sheep, goats, turkeys and chickens, and the coyotes sometimes even attack young calves. Coyotes and foxes also carry rabies, and are a menace to young humans, especially young children, as well as to livestock.

Our Jones County trapper has kept these animals under control for the past few years, and it would be a disaster to the farmers and ranchers of Jones County to discontinue his services.







- baking powder 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown
- 2 eggs
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans 11/3 cups (about) flaked coconut

Sift flour with baking powder, soda, and cinnamon. Cream butter, gradually add sugars, and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well; then add flour mixture. Add milk and blend well. Add pecans and coconut. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 3750 for 10 to 12 minutes, or ustil lightly browned. Makes



Harvesting Wheat Is Tough Business

DANVILLE, Kan.—One look at Dave Olderbak and you can tell that custom wheat harvesting is a rugged business.

It's one that takes this 40
Then it's south again, back into Nebraska for the maize and corn harvest. The job usually runs until Thanksgiving.

year-old strawboss, his family and his crew on a trek from the Texas-Oklahoma border across the Great Plains up into North

What does it take to succeed in this grueling business? "A loud voice and a sharp pencil," the wind-burned Olderbak says. He should know. He and his partner, Bill Beatty, have been in the business for 10 years now. They've come a long way, graduating from a two combine operation and sleeping in empty

barns and graineries, to eight combines, a crew of 21, and trailers to sleep in.

Work revolves around eight big Allis-Chalmers combines and the endless wheat fields they march through following the ripening grain northward. The gang isn't together in one place more than a week or 10

days at a time. The crew packs up regularly and moves 50 to 100 miles with each jump. They finish the wheat harvest on the Olderbak and Beatty farms near Lawton, Beatty crew will harvest more than 15,000 acres of wheat in

five states—Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota. That's almost 25 square miles of the "amber waves of grain"-enough to make 45 million loaves of bread. But there's a new wrinkle this year. Dave's family joined

the crew in May. Verna Older-bak, short, dark with a deep voice, volunteered for the cooking.
"She can have that job as long as she wants it," Dave


