



received a total of \$7,219,500 in social security benefits in 1965, R. R. Tuley Jr., social security district manager in Abilene revealed today, an increase of \$1,-040,964 and 648 people over 1964.

A large part of the increase in payments resulted from changes made by the Social Security Amendments of 1965, Tuley said. Those changes which are in addition to the new program of health insurance for the aged, included a 7 per cent increase in monthly benefits retroactive to January 1965; benefits for widows as early as 60; benefits for full - time students between 18 and 22; benefits for some people over 72 who hadn't worked long renough to get social security before; and the payment of disability insurance benefits to workers who are unable to work will not result in destitution because of a disability that lasts 12 months or more.

All in all, the 1965 figures for Taylor County include 4531 retired workers, 684 disabled workers and their families, and 2619 wives and children or retired or deceased workers. 




