Recently we drove to the Feed Yards for an interview with R. L. and the entire office staff a very warm reception we received and plenty of coffee to drink while we talked and toured the

Even though Bland was quite busy, he took time off to answer questions and tell us the history of his plant.

Bland, no stranger in and around Merkel, came from a pioneer family. His parents were the Fate Blands, both raised in this area.

While discussing with Bland about the cattle feeding business, we asked if he didn't think it was a pretty "long step up the stairway" into the business.

Bland answered, "This is something that I have loved and wanted to do, so I got right into the business.'

Bland told us he depends very much on Wayne Mills, cattle superintendent, and Wayne Jackson, mill superintendent - his two "right hand men."

Filing deadline for the May 27 election is May 6.





Tex Feed Yard history: The yard began operation in August, 1967, and as Bland said,

"we're still under construction." "The main reason I came back to this area was because of the availability of cattle market. said Bland. "We have an advantage over the Plains area in selling these cattle - freight advan-

tage to the larger cities. He also pointed out that there's lots of mile.

"Dry land mile has higher protein and higher fat level than irrigated milo," he said. "We've got the cattle, we've got the grain, and we now have the cattle market.

Approximately 23 million pounds of mile was bought last year from local farmers, and Cal - Tex expects to buy "about 50 million pounds this year.

'We plan to by at least 90 per cent of the milo raised here," Bland said. "We use 8 million pounds of milo per month. Our needs for the next 12 months should be somewhere around 90 million pounds.

Cal - Tex employs around 70 persons and "all from this area." There are eight families living on the yards and the payroll is \$30.000 per month.

Bland pointed out that the firm is "still under construction." They have around 25 - 27 thousand head on feed right now, making an average of 6,000 head in and out per month, and 75 - 85 thousand head per year.

At the present time construction is underway for the enlarging of office space.

Cal - Tex is certainly an asset to our area as we can tell from area employees, purchase of milo and many other factors.

This week, I personally salute Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Bland and the entire staff at Cal - Tex a great asset to our area.


Let me deal with the subject of MORAL-ITY as it seems to be the topic of discussion. Morality implies at least two very basic things:
