New Process Cuts Steel Costs



Production costs of basic minerals and metals are being attacked by Polaris International Metals Inc., Tucson, Arizona with results that will have effects throughout the

Engineer-scientist Edward Van Dornick (left) has patented a process which cuts costs drastically for conversion of iron ore to steel; and the process has been turned over to Polaris for implementation.

Polaris president James N. Concannon has spearheaded organization of a management team comprised of leading authorities in the metals industry, including Martin Wener, a director who has served with the Department of the

Steel production cost will be cut by 50 percent and plant construction outlay reduced from \$54 million to \$10 million. The one-hearth process will produce iron and steel in 48 to 60 minutes, depending on the grade of steel desired, compared to the 18 hours presently required.

In the laboratory, steel has been made from ore with as little as 11 percent iron. This opens new vistas for countries with iron ore in insufficient concentration for existing methods, that require at least 25 percent iron content. A pilot plant that will produce one ton per day is plan-




