Texas Tech football fans, and this area is running over with 'em, are a hardy lot. They'll go to almost any and all hardships to see their Red Raiders in action. Cases in point are Saturday night's down-pour of rain and threats of tornadoes in Lubbock and at least two games during the '64 season which were played in too-much-for-comfort rain and/or hail.

Like 30 or 40 other thousand nitwits, we watched two of those games last season in weather which caused all spectators to be wet as drowned rats. Evidently, though, we wised up some during the off-season and we were home in the easy chair during last week's game when tornadoes were reportedly flitting around Lubbock and the football stadium like flies in the Fall.

As a rule, we have a tendency to think that arbitrary decisions we make are wrong. Not so in regard to not attending that football game, though. As we heard the game and the scary weather reports via radio we figured that not going to Tech's opening 1965 football game was our wisest decision of the year.

Understand, we're not classified as a Tech football fan, else we might have been among the drenched thousands Saturday night. But we are a fan of the Southwest Conference and Tech is by far the closest member school even if it does schedule its home games in the loudest possible weather. Gene Ezell, a fine Red Raider fan, says that those he saw at the game Saturday night were prepared for the weather and when the first drops of moisture started falling, they came out with their raincoats and other stay-dry devices and continued to watch the game just as if they'd fully expected the rain. (And why shouldn't they expect it after last season's wet experiences?)

The game, as you know, was called early in the last quarter because of tornado warnings. This was the first time in the area for a game to be called because of weather. There were few complaints, we understand, from fans who had paid from \$5 up to see the game because they got 25 per cent less than their money's worth.

Most Bovina fans we talked with who were there said they stayed until the game was called, however. Their reasoning seemed to be that they'd rather be in the stadium than in dangerous traffic made worse by tornado-frightened motorists. That was good thinking. Monday, we talked by phone with a Lubbock resident who admitted, "I've never been so disgusted with one mudhole (Jones Stadium) in all my life." He was at Saturday night's game and, no doubt, attended those frog floaters during the '64 season as well.

There was one great consolation to the downpour and the tornado threats, though. They were even more interesting, at least from a conversation standpoint, than was the fact that the Red Raiders won the game easily from the Kansas Jayhawkers. Thus, non-Tech fans were saved from having to hear about what a fine football team they'll have this season. That's worth something!

Tech fans will, however, make up for lost conversation time next week if their favorite team defeats the Texas Longhorns Saturday night in Austin. We'd like to see that happen, though, and will be more than glad to listen to our Tech-fan friends if it does. Wouldn't it be wonderful for the Red Raiders to win from the TU Longhorns this week and then lose to the Texas Aggies at Lubbock the following week? We just can't imagine a better combination of college football verdicts!

First 'Away' Game --

Ponies Play 'Dogs At Amherst Friday

After the first two games of the '65 season in their home corral, the Bovina Mustangs go out of town this week for the first time.

They'll meet the Amherst Bulldogs there Friday night at 8.

The Mustang Coach Roy Stone, who always thinks his team has a chance to win, says, "We could win this one if our blocking gets straightened out."

Coach Stone blames faulty blocking for the Ponies lack of offensive punch in the first two games this year. In all probability, Bovina will be without Lane Gober, a start-

ing offensive end. He received a sprained ankle in the tilt here last week and is expected to miss this week's game. Kenneth Webb, who has played center, will probably replace Gober at end with Billy Marshall, who missed the first game, taking over in the middle of the offensive line.

Other than Gober's injury, the Mustangs came out of the Springlake-Earth tilt in good condition.

The Bulldogs, whose 2-0 season record is opposite of that of the Mustangs, will be favored because of their performances this year. Their opposi-

tion hasn't been as rough as that of the Mustangs, however. Bovina and Amherst will be evenly matched in the weight department, according to scouting reports on the 'Dogs. "They (Amherst) will be real tough," Coach Stone says. "They have a lot of experience, some speed and are a well-balanced Class B ballclub. They have a back named Hedges who is fast and good."

Patrolman Says --

'People Here Complaining About Law Enforcement'

People in this community continue to complain about the enforcement here of traffic laws, according to Carl Davis, one of two highway patrolmen assigned to Farmer County, and Mrs. Lucille Killough, justice of the peace here.

"I understand there is a petition being circulated here to have highway patrolmen removed from the county," Patrolman Davis told The Blade this week.

He said there seems to be two main complaints:

1. Highway patrolmen are working Bovina instead of the highways.
2. People are complaining about traffic law being enforced, especially the law which says that grain truck drivers must have commercial operators license.

In regard to the complaint about highway patrolmen working inside the city limits of Bovina, Davis explained that

under state law, patrolmen are required to work wrecks in towns of less than 2500 population.

"We're concerned over the attitude of people here about law enforcement," agreed Pa-

trolman Davis and Judge Killough.

There are more complaints in Bovina than in Friona or Farwell, Davis pointed out. He said he believed that people here are misinformed about traffic law enforcement.

Mrs. Killough pointed out that no one who has appeared in her court during the 13 months she has been in office have plead not guilty to the charges against them.

Patrolman Davis said he had been informed that a petition to have highway patrolmen removed from the county was being circulated. He said he didn't know who was circulating the petition or to whom it would be submitted.

"If the people don't like their laws, they should appeal to the state legislature," he explained. "We (the highway patrolmen) don't have anything to do with making the laws; we just enforce them."

Mail School Tax Notices

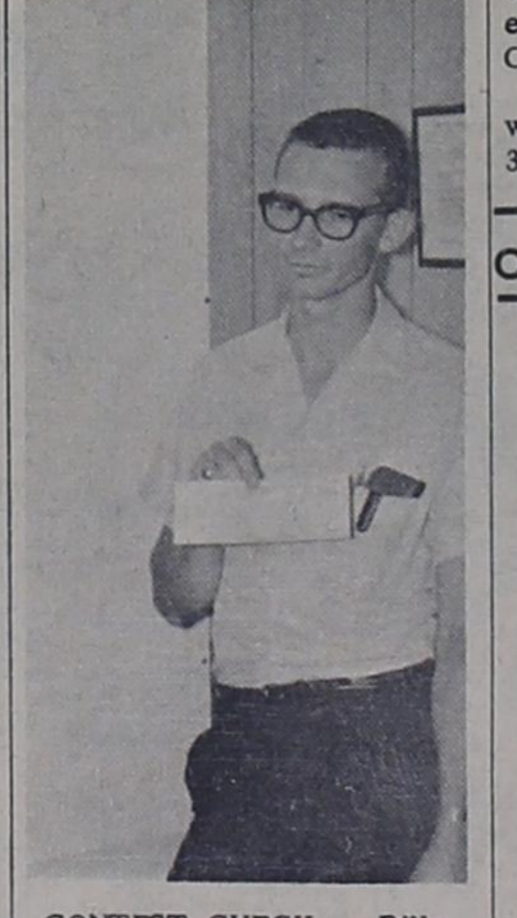
Bovina Independent School District tax notices for 1965 were mailed last week. This is the second consecutive year for the notices to be mailed in mid-September instead of the ordinary October 1.

The taxes are payable now, explains Superintendent Otis Spears. They are due December 31 and may be paid without penalty until January 31 of next year.

Total tax for the school district this year is approximately \$179,000, Spears says. This is a slight increase, resulting from natural growth, over the approximate \$177,000 of last year.

Total taxes for '63 were \$141,000. The jump between '63 and '64 was brought about by an increase in the tax rate from \$1.05 per \$100 valuation to \$1.47.

The tax rate is the same this year as it was last year.

Rain Slows Harvesting

A total of 1.1 inches of rain fell here Friday and Sunday night.

The moisture brought a halt to milo harvesting operations which were just getting underway in the area.

About half an inch fell during the day Friday. That moisture was accompanied by cold temperatures which sent mercury in thermometers down near the 40 degree mark.

Approximately .6 of an inch of rain fell Sunday night. Spotted hail was reported to have fallen during that rain. There was little hail damage, however, considering the area as a whole.

Warmer temperatures and drying sunshine were in effect Monday and many combines returned to their harvesting chores. Harvest was expected to be going "full speed ahead" by mid-week, barring additional moisture.

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On Muddy Field Here Friday--

Springlake-Earth Bops Bovina Team 27-0

Bovina's Mustangs scrapped hard Friday night, but took a 27-0 licking from the state-ranked Class A Springlake-Earth Wolverines.

The powerful visitors struck for a pair of early touchdowns and then added one in each of the final two periods for the decision.

The game, played in a heavy fog and wet, cold weather, was marred throughout by penalties. Springlake-Earth was penalized 135 yards and had two players ejected from the game.

Though the Mustang defense was tough, for the most part, the offense was never able to get going. This was the second consecutive game for the Ponies to be whitewashed. They lost to Farwell, also a Class A outfit, 6-0, in their opener the week before.

The Wolverines lead by a 13-0 count Friday night before the first half of the initial period was over. They received the opening kickoff and scored without losing possession of the ball.

The first TD came on the game's tenth play. It was an eight yard pass from Quarterback Doug Messer to End Floyd

Henderson. Jerry Sanders, who aided the Wolverines' cause with his brilliant placekicking and punting throughout the game, kicked the PAT to make the score 7-0.

The host team fumbled on the first play following the kickoff, giving S-E the ball on the Bovina 15. Four plays later, the Wolverines had the second score. It was also on a pass play. This time, Messer threw to Halfback Floyd Bennett from two yards out. Sanders kick was no good and the score was 13-0 with 6:37 still remaining to be played in the opening stanza.

Springlake's third TD was also of the "gift" variety. A Mustang fumble gave the green-and-white the football on the Bovina 17. Four plays later, Bennett took the six-pointer across from four yards out. When a running attempt for the extra points was halted, the score was 19-0.

Lacking punch, the Mustang

offense managed to net only 49 yards, all of those on the ground. The hard-charging S-E forward wall eliminated the possibilities of a successful air attack by the Ponies.

The final touchdown for the winners was set up midway through the fourth period when the Mustangs gambled and lost on fourth down and gave up the ball on their own 27. Sanders, a regular halfback who switched to quarterback when Messer was injured, blasted over from one yard out five plays later. Sanders then circled left end for the dual extra points to complete the scoring at 27-0.

Leading the Mustangs defensively were Roman Ramirez, Don McKinney and Eddi Corn. Lane Gober, junior letterman end, suffered a sprained ankle during the game and will likely miss this week's tilt with Amherst.

A farm tour was conducted by the Farmers Home Administration in the Lazbuddie Community recently. Stops were made at the K. J. Gallman, Andrew Fuqua, and Lynn Cox farms.

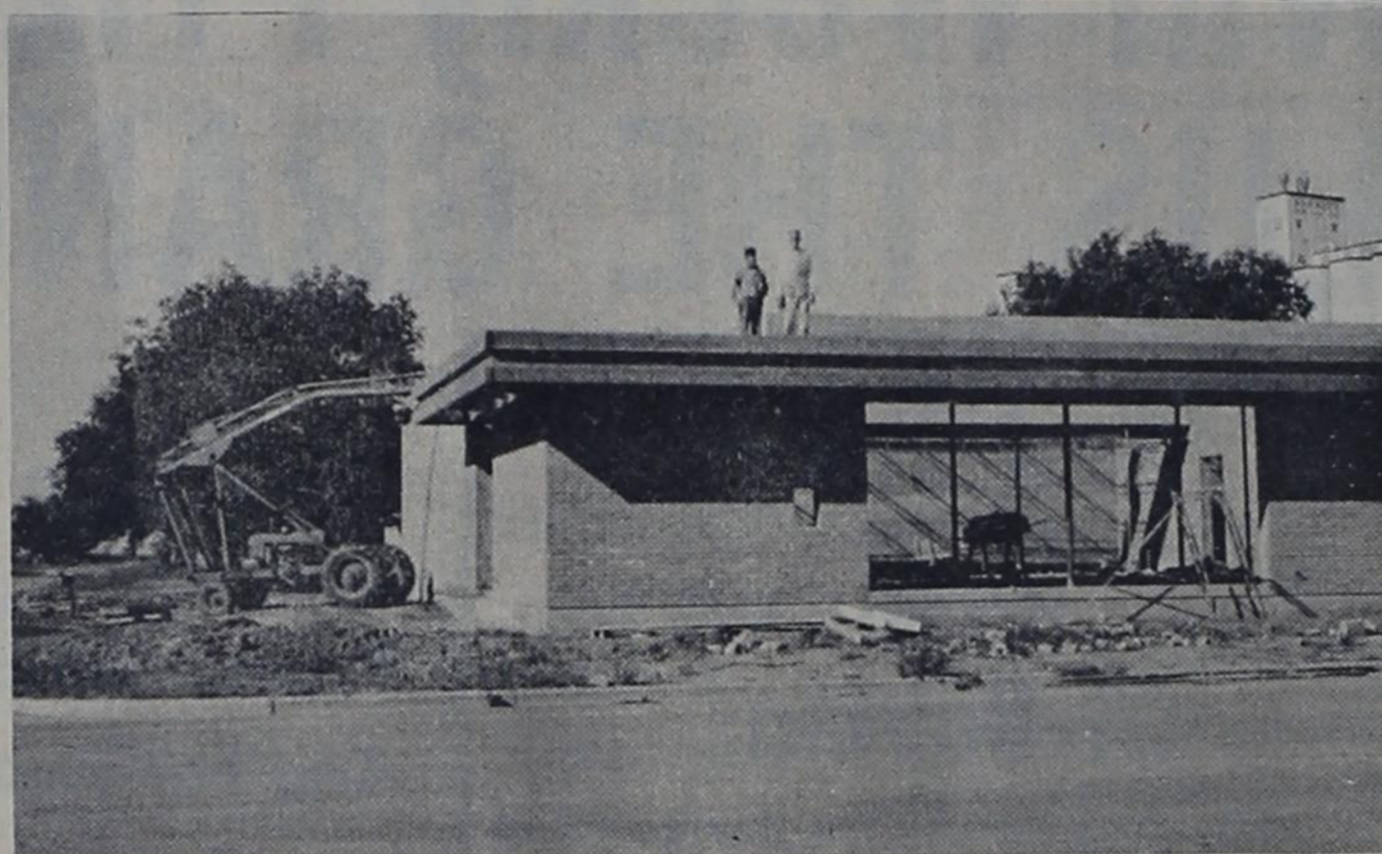
The group inspected the new house of K. J. Gallman which was built with an FHA loan. It was pointed out to the group that FHA loans can also be made on small tracts and in towns of less than 5500 population. In addition to the Rural Housing Loan there are loans for Labor Housing and Senior Citizen Rental Housing.

The last two stops were at the farms of Andrew Fuqua and Lynn Cox who have operating loans with the Farmers Home Administration. The group inspected the crops and looked at some of the practices that they were carrying out. The group was informed that a man with initiative and proper management can succeed. The group was told that 57% of the operating loan borrowers in Parmer County were under 35 years of age. The operating borrowers of Parmer County have a gross income of about \$1.5 million. Considering the normal turnover of money, this should contribute about \$6 million to the economy in Parmer County.

County Has 17 Accidents

Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 rural traffic accidents in Parmer County during the month of August, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for 13 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$15,-110.00.

The rural traffic accident summary in Parmer County for the first eight months of 1965 shows a total of 87 crashes resulting in two persons killed, 47 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$54,-471.00.

September 1, 1965, marked the beginning of the new motor vehicle inspection period for all Texas motorists. "With the hard summer driving coming to an end, fall is an excellent time to have vehicles safety checked for the winter months ahead," the Sergeant said.

The Patrol Supervisor called attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program, vehicles having a de-

fect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13% to 3%. "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident," he pointed out.
