YOUTH RALLY TONIGHT IN ABILENE

Several thousand young people from the West Central Texas area are expected to take a stand against drug abuse May 14 as a giant youth rally is held in Rose Park Stadium in Abilene.

The rally will be sponsored by the Abilene Association for Mental Health as part of Mental Health Week and will feature as its speaker Dr. Hardin Jones of the University of California at Berkeley, a nationally recognized drug expert. Young people from the entire area around Abilene are invited to attend the 7:30 event.

Involved in the planning are student leaders from Abilene's junior high and senior high schools, Abilene Christian College, Hardin Simmons University and McMurry College.

The rally has been named "Mary Jane's Cop Out," by its young planners. Site of the rally is the football stadium in Oscar

local sports figures. Planners in Dallas are hoping for more than 50,000 young people at the rally.

Dr. Jones has been on the faculty at Berkeley since 1946 and earlier received his BA, MA and Ph.D. degrees there. He served as professor of medical physics and physiology and is assistant director of the Drug Laboratory.

Dr. Jones has said that the drug craze among young people is suspected of causing an excess of 20,000 deaths during the past five years and of inducing mental disturbances at the level of about one million cases treated per year above the usual level. The trend of involvement with drugs using drug arrests as an index, is increasing at the rate of 7 per cent per month, Jones says. Casualties from drug abuse are estimated to be far greater than from the war in Vietnam.

Dr. Jones says that unless something is done to thwart the rapidly increasing use of drugs that 50 per cent of the young people in the United States may be so crippled or destroyed by drug abuse within the next several years that they may not be able to function as effective members of society.

Dr. Jones will answer questions from the audience at the conclusion of his talk, planners of the youth rally have said.

Entertainment will be "The Trilogy," an Abilene singing group.

Troy Sampley, Mental Health Week chairman, urged parents to attend the rally.

"Certainly 'Mary Jane's Cop Out' is being planned by area young people, but we urge parents to attend this rally," Sampley said. "Better communication between parents and their children will help to stamp out this drug craze."

'DRUG ABUSE' TOPIC FOR MERKEL LIONS

Members and guests of the Merkel Lions Club will hear District Attorney Ed Paynter speak on Drug Abuse at their Tuesday's noon luncheon.

Paynter is a strong contender of "the law enforcement role to punish offenders and set an example others would not want to follow." However, he is even a stronger contender of "preventing our young people from making the wrong choice than to have to punish them."

Appearing as a panel member on the recent Abilene PTA program on drugs, Paynter said, "Drug indictment now number about 40 per cent of the grand jury's indictments, and there are today 500 known users and 75 pushers in Taylor County."

He told of the seriousness of a felony conviction, including loss of voting rights, and the chance to work in many professions.

Damage Placed Over \$150,000

Merkel's hail storm last Friday night did an estimated damage of over \$150,000 to buildings and automobiles.

Merkel insurance men Cyrus Pee and Herace Boney estimated the loss at over \$150,000. Mack Seymore could not be contacted by noon Wednesday. However, Billy Bob Tombs, speaking for Seymore, said that the "loss was high."

Pee said that a definite estimate could not be given at this time since adjusters have files and are presently looking over the damage.

Boney said the damage to buildings, roofs and windows was the greatest, with damage to automobiles very high. Fifty stained glass windows were broken out by hail at the First Baptist Church and Pee said that a large number of windows at the First Methodist Church were also out.

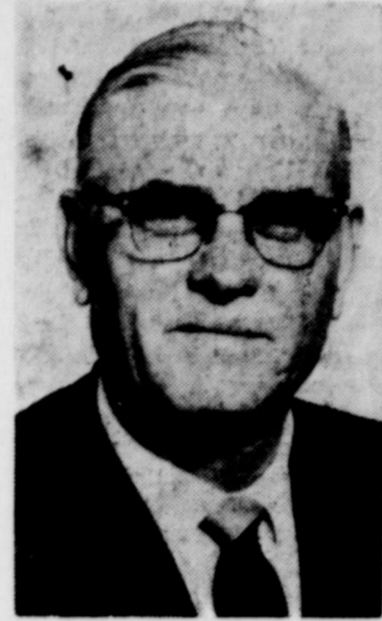

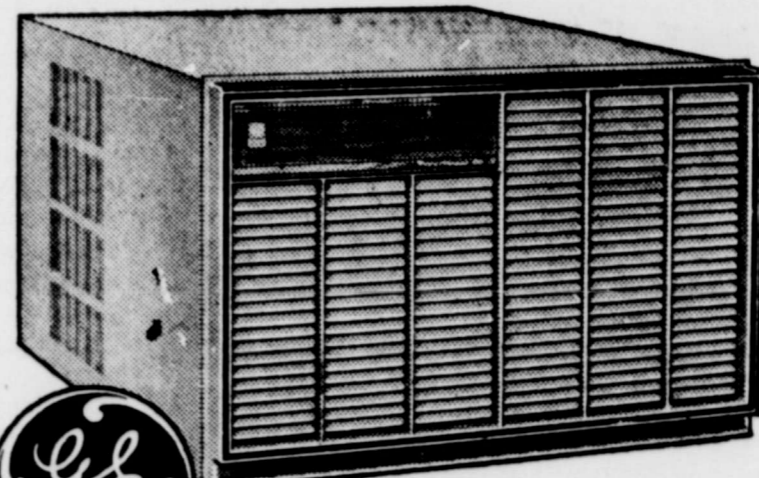
