

Teachers report first for threeday Inservice beginning Monday, Aug. 17, at the Tuscola High School.

"The Inservice program is for all teachers in Taylor County, except the Abilene School System, said superintendent Mack Fisher. 'Specialists in the various fields of education will meet with teachers, directing and instructing in methods of teaching more effectively."

On Thursday and Friday, Aug. 20-21, teachers will report at their espective schools and work on courses of study, lesson plans and programs for the year.

Teachers workday and student registration will be held on Monday and Tuesday, Aug. 24-25, with classwork to begin Wednesday,

Students will have their first holiday of the school year, with observation of Labor Day, Sept. 7. said Fisher.

Fisher said Wednesday morning that the faculty was "complete as of this date, with the exception of only two more vacancies to be filled




