Storytelling Workshop Slated For Sept. 11-12

A Storytelling Workshop will be held at the Abilene Public Library September 11 and 12, according to Miss Thelma Andrews, librarian.

Miss Laurie Dudley, coordinator of children's services of the Dallas Public Library, will present the workshop.

"This is an opportunity for people from your community who are volunteers to join in promoting a story telling program in your library," said Miss Andrews. "We have purposely made this a two-day workshop hoping that some of you will be able to participate both days, but the program is also being planned so that, if you can attend only one day, it will be profitable to you."

Miss Andrews said that the workshop would be good for many organizations in the community—church groups, kindergarten teachers and elementary school teachers.

There is no charge for the workshop, but persons desiring to attend the luncheon, the cost will be \$2.

School Enrollment Has Slight Increase

Merkel Public Schools began classes Wednesday morning with approximately 712 students enrolled in high school, elementary and primary.

"We are a little above last year's enrollment at this time," said high school principal, Edwin Read, "and with registration continuing this week, we will most likely have a few more enrolled." Enrollment Wednesday morning totaled 222 students.

Largest increase in high school enrollment came in the junior class, with senior enrollment ranking second.

High school enrollment broken down by classes are freshman class 70; sophomore class 42; junior class 64, and senior class 46.

Read explained that transfers had accounted for much of the increase in enrollment.

"We have had several families to move away," said Read, "but then our transfers from Tye and the few from Trent, have made up the loss."

Primary and elementary grades show an "approximate increase of ninety students over last year's enrollment, according to principal, Leon Walker.

Broken down, Primary School enrollment is approximately 240 and Elementary School 250.

"We have had several students to enroll Wednesday morning," said Walker, "and our count could very easily be more. Then, too, we have some cards yet to be processed and perhaps will have some late enrollment."

Paul Mac Woodfin, new head coach of the Badger team, was very optimistic concerning the forty boys who had "turned out for practice."

"As long as our boys keep giving the effort they've been giving and showing desire, we feel like the Merkel-Badgers are going to be very representative," said Woodfin. "We feel like it will be a team the town can take pride in."

Woodfin said Wednesday morning that people are "welcome to come to our practices which begin every day at 4 o'clock."

The Badgers are scheduled to scrimmage the Wylie team.

The Badgers' first game will be Sept. 11 at Clyde, with the

first home game with Winters on Sept. 18.

Glenn Reed, band instructor, was very optimistic concerning band activities for this year.

"We have a good enrollment in our band, high school, elementary and fifth grade," said Reed.

"There's an exceptionally high enrollment in our eighth grade."

School Superintendent Mack Fisher, reminded parents that there will be a school holiday on Monday, Sept. 7 in observance of Labor Day. Regular classes will resume on Tuesday, Sept. 8.

Hewitt urged that all 69 - 70 Booster Club members make plans to attend this meeting.

"We need all our regular members and others who are interested in our school athletic activities to attend this meeting," said Hewitt.

Also on the agenda will be the election of officers for the new

year. Outgoing officers besides Hewitt are Vince Barnett, vice president, and Billy Patton, secretary - treasurer.

"Officers will be nominated and elected from the floor at the Monday evening meeting," said Hewitt.

New coaches to be introduced are Paul Mac Woodfin, head coach, John Warden, high school assistant coach, and David Burson and David Woodard, both for the elementary school.

WEST TEXAS FAIR MEANS MANY THINGS

As the opening of the 66th Annual West Texas Fair draws closer, excitement and anticipation mounts — around the Big Country.

What do you visualize when you think of the Fair?

Carnival rides, candy apples, exhibits, hot dogs?

What of the first fairs?

What were they like?

The first fair held in Taylor County was an exhibit of farm products in 1884 held in Abilene. There were no livestock shows, no carnival rides or cotton candy. It did have its special feature, though. The curiosity of the 1884 event was a cotton stalk with six bolls on it.

A second fair was not held until 1888, when the District Fair was in Abilene. It was a three-day event, held in the County Court House, the old Court House on Oak Street and various neighborhood halls around the Exposition Hall. Not only were agriculture and livestock on view but

area residents could examine various items of art.

The fair took on a new look in 1897 when it moved to the outside edge of Abilene. Exhibits were housed in two tents, thirteen frame buildings, stalls for livestock and a grandstand and race-track.

Each year the fair association has scheduled special events. There have ranged from live turkey and pigeon shoots to nightly entertainment by well-known stars and a grand ball at the Abilene Opera House in 1897.

And so the history of the first fairs in Taylor County.

Throughout the years the fairs have continued to grow and improve, and to become more widely known.

Its new home, the Taylor County Agricultural and Livestock Center, consists of a Women's building, General Exhibit Buildings, quarters for poultry and small

The three young people are presently available for lectures to any local area civic or club group.

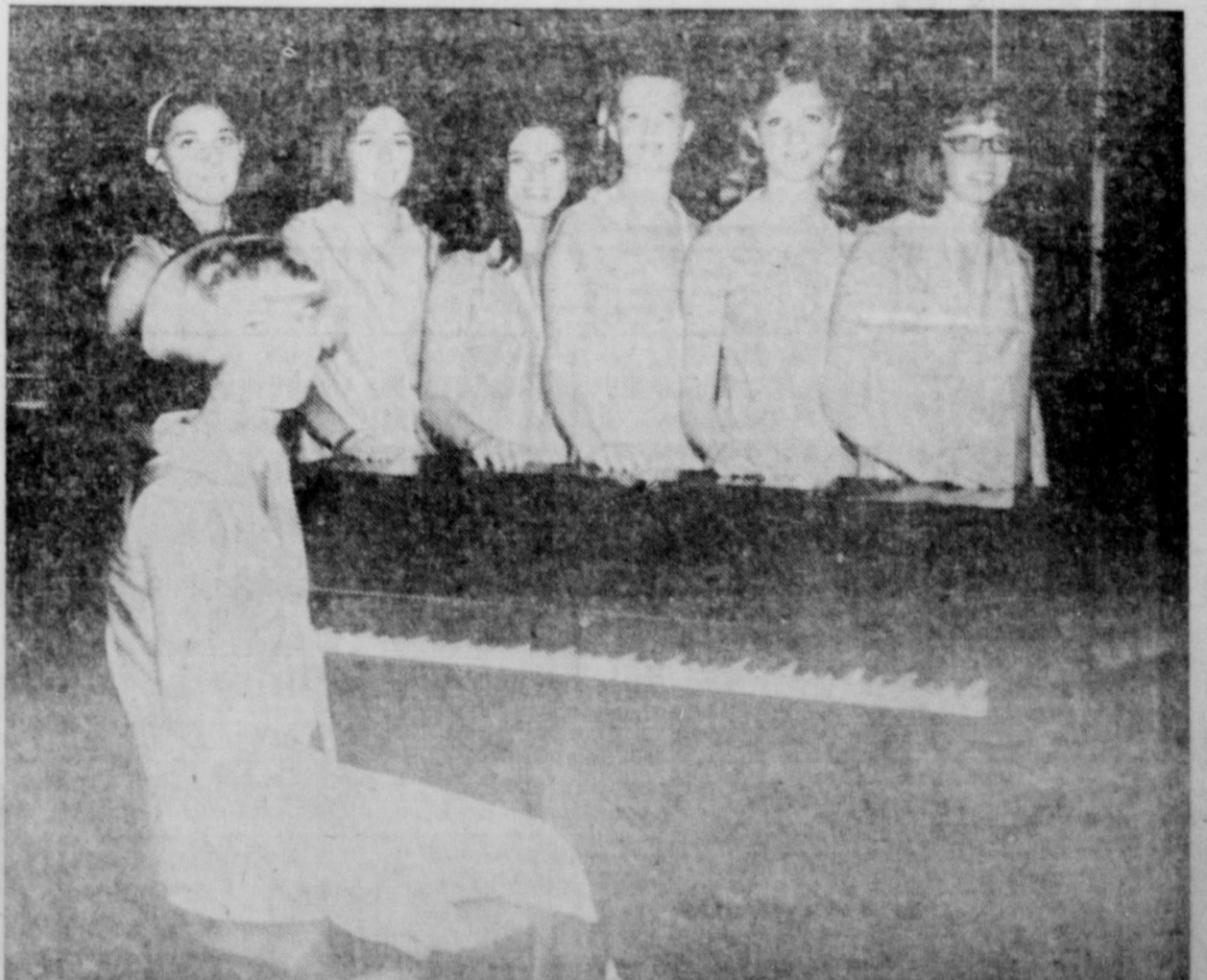

Serve economical Autumn Harvest lamb neck slices in a stew that's spiked with pimiento-stuffed olives for color and flavor... a good supper choice for Spanish Green Olive Week, September 3-12.

SPANISH LAMB STEW
(Makes 6-8 servings)

- 1/2 cup each: wine vinegar, water
- 3 pounds lamb neck slices
- 1/2 pound chorizo (garlic flavored sausage) sliced
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 bay leaf, crumbled
- 2 cups hot water
- 12 small white onions
- 6 carrots, cut in strips
- 1 cup small pimiento-stuffed olives

Combine vinegar, water and lamb; marinate 1 to 3 hours. Drain. Fry sausage in Dutch oven or heavy pot 5 minutes; remove and drain on paper towels. Dredge lamb in flour. Add oil to drippings in Dutch oven; add lamb and garlic and brown lamb well. Drain lamb; discard fat and garlic. Combine lamb with sliced onion, seasonings and water. Simmer covered, 1 hour. Mix in sausage and remaining ingredients. Cook 30 minutes, or until lamb and vegetables are tender. Remove meat and vegetables to serving dish. Skim excess fat from gravy, then boil 1 to 2 minutes to thicken. Pour gravy over lamb; serve with rice, if desired.

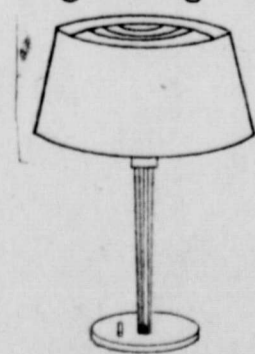

White House Staff Scores Tops in Reading Dynamics



The White House recently had a graduation ceremony for staff members, including top presidential aides, who submitted themselves to a rigorous eight-week course in rapid reading techniques.

Their purpose: to get out from under the pile of government paper and to put more stretch in their already demanding, 12-hour a day, six-day a week schedule.

The classes were conducted at the White House under the direction of Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics. The company operates over 150 institutes in the United States and abroad and has taught rapid reading techniques to more than 450,000 persons in the last ten years.

On hand for the graduation ceremonies was Evelyn Wood, (above) the former Utah school teacher, who developed the techniques that have enabled students to increase reading skills by an average factor of 4.7 times. White House staff members who were enrolled in the class included: Ron Ziegler, press secretary; Patrick Buchanan, special assistant to the President; Dwight Chapin, staff assistant; Kenneth Cole, Jr., deputy assistant for domestic affairs, and Leonard Garment, special consultant to the President.

This is the second time that Reading Dynamics has been taught at the White House. In 1962 President John F. Kennedy, who was a naturally fast reader, invited Mrs. Wood to the White House to teach reading improvement to members of his staff.

Not all, thank goodness, but too many, feel they must go to the larger cities to get what they want and they do. The pay cash for many items they buy, and the, when the cash runs out they come home and find that many of these items were right here in Merkel waiting for them on

the shelves and counters all the time.

Merkel merchants appreciate the many fine people in the area who take shopping at home seriously and these very same merchants strive to keep merchandise and atmosphere up to standard.

Here's an idea. Many of our good people do trade at home — they buy say "charge it" for 60-90 days or six months or even a year. — Some never pay and usually these are the very people who complain that the "home merchants don't have a selection." How can they — when they are supporting so many of these 60-

60 days, six months and year" charge it people?

Here's another idea — if many people received their pay checks like they pay their bills — how long could they survive?

Many merchants receive letters that read like this: "Nine per cent or even 12 per cent interest will be added to your account after 30 days" — or perhaps it reads like this — "Your account is frozen until it is paid in full." We build go on and on with this "unhappy" letter bit from big dealers but they would all mean the same.

Merchants in Merkel to my knowledge, have never sent their customers and friends a letter like the above. They just couldn't do that!

But, let me tell you Merchants often have to fill out a financial statement before they receive credit from large manufacturers. And you don't see many of these manufacturers going "up" of business" because their "friends" did not pay their bills. I say "friends," because if they had not been a friend they would not have received credit in the first place. Few strangers receive credit without filling out a financial statement and signing a contract.

Think it over . . .

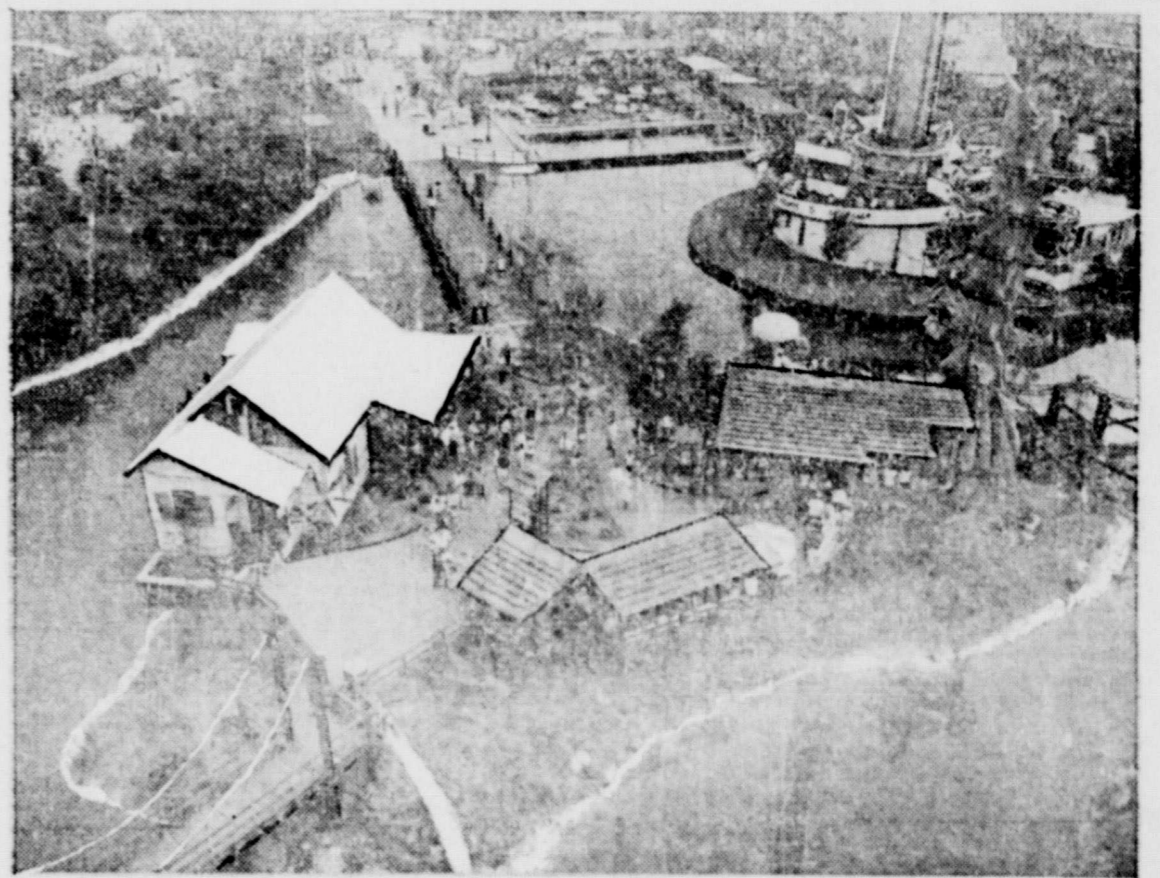

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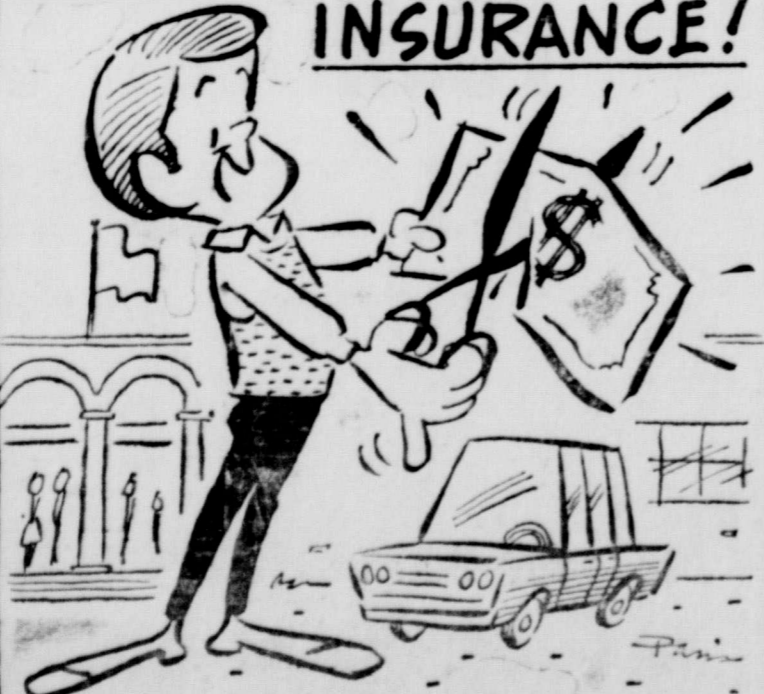

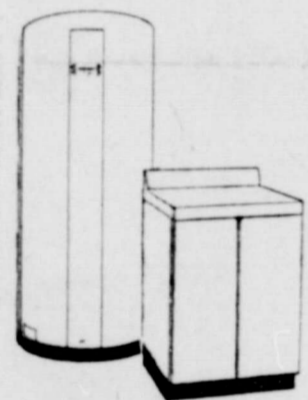
