What kind of Panhandle Fall is this that doesn't have a freeze until mid-November or later? The Blade's First Freeze of the Fall contest, which is presently in its first year, is probably entitled to the credit, or the blame, for this late freeze business. This is the first year for the contest and the first year ever, according to old timers, that the freeze has been this late in coming.

Because of his position, Weatherman Willie Williams, the contest judge, has been very non-committal about when he thought the freeze would be. But, we believe that even Willie thought it would be before now!

Cotton harvest is being delayed here for want of a freeze, of all things.

Ordinarily, cotton farmers and ginners are wanting the freeze to hold off instead of hurry up. This is certainly an unusual year in that respect. As far as we know, the cotton crop hasn't suffered any damage by the lateness of the freeze and certainly it has had ample time to mature and make all the cotton it will. There will probably be a trailer-jam at the gins, however, when harvest gets started in full swing. Almost all the cotton in the area will be ready for stripping the same day. Cotton trailers will, no doubt, be at a premium.

One farmer has even been heard to remark, "If it doesn't freeze pretty soon our maize is going to head out again (after being harvested), knock us out of the program, and we'll have to give the government back our lay-out checks."

The situation is not apt to reach that peak of seriousness, though.

Probably no where could you go and find bigger-hearted fellows than Wendol Christian and Gene Ezell. Their generosity is beyond reproach.

For instance, they came to us a week or so ago with a proposition that was out of this world, we thought. They offered to make a deal whereby if we would make the bus trip to Arkansas-Texas Tech football game at Fayetteville with them, and other Red Raider fans, at regular rates, they would make a similar trip with us in a few years when the Fightin' Texas Aggies regain a prominent spot in the football world, if we'd pay their way on the latter trip.

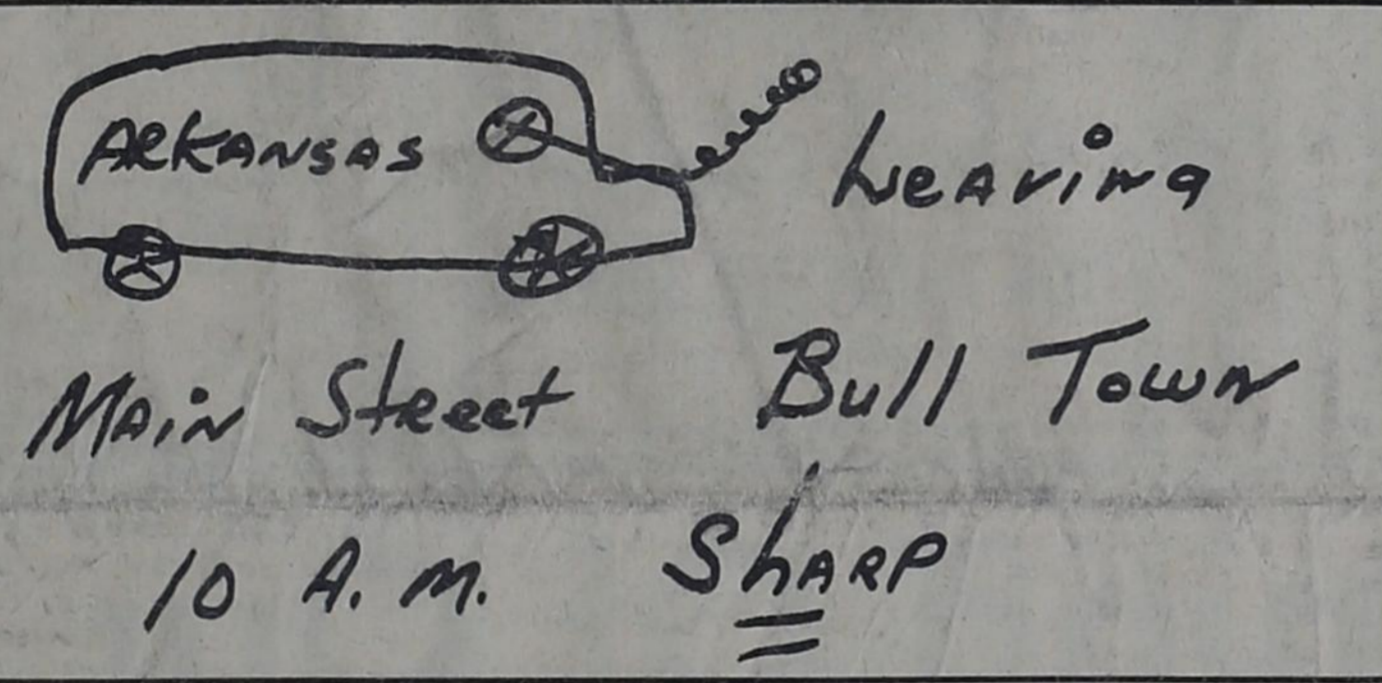

40 Red Raider Fans Leaving Friday at 10

A busload -- approximately 40 -- Texas Tech football fans will leave here Friday morning at 10 for the Red Raider-University of Arkansas Razorback Southwest Conference championship game in Fayetteville Saturday.

The chartered bus will pick up its passengers on Bovina's

Main Street and depart from there.

Friday night will be spent by the group in Tulsa, Okla. with the trip from there to the game being made Saturday morning. Saturday afternoon after the game, the bus will return to Tulsa for the night. The trip from Tulsa to Bovina will be made Sunday.

The bus will be a New Mexico Transportation Co. vehicle, chartered through the company's agent here, Paul Jones Texaco.

group in Tulsa for the trip to the game.

For Water Storage, More Paving --

Council Considering City Bond Elections

Bovina's city councilmen are considering a bond election to provide for construction of additional water storage and a paving program.

Members of the council have been consulting with Ralph Douglas, city engineer, for the past several weeks about the need for additional water storage for the town and more paving.

The bond election for the water system additions is expected to be called sometime after the first of the year, probably in the amount of \$60,000. This would provide for additional

storage of 300,000 gallons of water with 100,000 gallons of that in an overhead tank. This would make the city's total storage in excess of 400,000. Tax bonds, possibly in the amount of \$25,000 will be voted on at the same time.

Bob Estes, president of First State Bank, who is a bondsman, is handling the details of the bonds for the city. He says that after preliminary examination, he finds the city is in good financial shape and that water and sewer revenues have been more than ample to care for its own department as well as some of the general obligation tax needs.

Voters may vote for or against either the water improvements or the paving program, Mayor Boyd Gilreath explains. There will be no connection between the two. One may pass or fail without the other.

Additional information about the proposed city improvements is expected to be announced soon -- possibly as early as next week -- as plans are completed.

City taxes are expected to be effected only slightly, if any, by passage of the bond election, Gilreath says.

Meet Vega There Friday

The "big game" of the year for the Bovina Mustangs is Friday night. It will be against the Longhorns of Vega there. Kickoff time is 7:30.

If the Mustangs win, and they aren't favored to, they will have a share in the district championship. If they lose, Vega will be the district champion and Bovina will conclude its final year as a Class B team down among the also-rans.

If the Mustangs upset the Longhorns, who have an 8-1 record for the season and are 5-0 in District 1-B play, two possibilities could result, depending on the outcome of the Nazareth-Happy game which will be played at Happy at the same time.

If Nazareth wins over Happy, Bovina, Vega and Nazareth will be co-champions with each having one district loss. The district representative would be decided by toss of a coin. If Happy wins over Nazareth, the Swifts will be out of the picture since they have been defeated by Vega, and Bovina and Vega will be co-champs. Bovina, however, would earn the right to represent the district in post-season play by having defeated the team with which it was tied.

At any rate, the Mustangs must win the Vega game or they are out of the running and may turn all their attention to other sports. Football season will be concluded for them, if they lose the regularly scheduled finale.

The Longhorns, in addition to having the favorite's role, will be seeking revenge for last year's game which the Mustangs won by a 26-0 count to take the championship. That game also decided the championship and Vega, needless to say, wasn't pleased with the outcome.

The Longhorns' only loss this year was to Groom, 14-8. Since that time, Groom has come on to win its district and is considered one of the top Class B Panhandle teams.

Vega has been almost untried in district competition. They have bowled over Texline, Hart, Happy, Nazareth and Lazbuddie. Happy was whitewashed by Vega by a 40-0 count. Bovina was proud of a 21-6 verdict over the Cowboys, Nazareth, the team which defeated Bovina, 13-8, was racked up by Vega, 40-13. Vega bounced Lazbuddie easily last week, 40-7. The previous week, the Mustangs defeated Lazbuddie, 32-6.

Mustang Coach Roy Stone admits that his team will be the underdog in the game. He comments, however, that "We're capable of winning if we play our best game of the year. They'll be high for us after the way we beat them last year," the coach predicts.

Vega has a "powerful offense," according to Stone. "They have consistently been able to make long runs for scores during their past four or five ballgames. They have good speed and a good passing attack."

Coach Stone says his team will have to stop Vega's belly plays and off-tackle plays to "stay in the game and we'll have to stop them from breaking loose on those long runs."

Vega will have a weight advantage of about 12 to 15 pounds per man.

They have a team loaded with experience with 13 seniors and 13 juniors on the squad.

The Bovina team sat out an open date last week and is considered to be in good shape physically for this all-important tilt.

The third 1-B game Friday night will be between Lazbuddie and Texline on the North Plains in a battle of teams which are out of contention for the district championship. Hart, winless for the season, concluded its campaign last week.

The Mustangs will take a season mark of 5-4 into the tilt with them. They are 4-1 in district competition. Wins have been over Meadow, 8-6; Texline, 47-14; Happy 21-6; Hart, 35-0; and Lazbuddie, 32-6. The losses were to Farwell, 0-6; Springlake, 0-25; Amherst, 8-12, and Nazareth, 8-13.

A large crowd of Mustang fans is expected to make the trip to the Oldham County seat to see their team in its uphill fight for a piece of the district championship.

This will be the last year for the Mustangs to compete in District 1-B. By interscholastic League ruling, they have been elevated to Class 3-A for the 1966 season.

At County Gins --

Farmers Vote Tuesday On Cotton Referendum

(EDITOR'S NOTE -- The following information concerning the cotton referendum on which

cotton farmers will vote Tuesday, November 23, on two questions relating to the 1966 program for cotton.

First, a referendum must be held to determine if producers approve quotas for the 1966 crop of cotton.

Secondly, a referendum must be held to determine if producers approve the sale or lease of upland cotton allotments for transfer to farms outside the county. This referendum will be held in conjunction with the upland cotton marketing quota referendum. An affirmative vote by a two-thirds majority of those voting in a county will authorize transfers to any other county in the State for a period of three years.

If the affirmative vote is less than a two-thirds majority, transfer of allotment by sale or lease will be limited to the county in which the transferring farm is located.

For the past 12 years cotton growers have voted overwhelmingly in favor of marketing quotas for cotton. For example: in 1965 96.2 per cent of the growers voting favored quotas.

Askman, Taylor Tie For First

Bill Askman of Clovis and Margaret Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Taylor tied for first place in this week's Bovina Business Football Contest. They split first and second place prize money to collect \$4 each. They were both off the tiebreaker score by two points, and named eight of 10 winners.

Flossie Rhinehart took third place honors, also naming eight winners and missing the tiebreaker by three points.

Askman was a money-winner three weeks ago in the series of contests which is climaxed by an expense-paid trip for two to the Cotton Bowl January 1, 1966. This is the first time this year for either Miss Taylor or Mrs. Rhinehart to win any money.

Other contestants naming eight winners correctly were Emmett Tabor, Mrs. Buck Ellison and Albert Johnson of Farwell.

Interest remains high with 104 entrants in this, the 11th week of the 13 week contest. This week there were six naming eight winners, 25 naming seven, 38 naming six, 26 naming five, six naming four and three naming three.

Ronnie George of Friona still leads the pack by a slim one-point margin with 85 points for an average of .773, with two weeks remaining in the contest, including this week.

Close on his heels are Allen Cumpton, Coach Roy Stone and Emmett Tabor, each with 84 points. Other leaders include Jewell Tabor with 83; Wilson DiCuffa and Mack Ragsdale with 82; Gary Carson, Genevive Ezell, Eldon Smith and Ed Hutto with 80; Albert Johnson, Kathryn Johnston, Jack McCracken, Joe Tarter and John Wilson with 79; Tom Bonds, Dixie Carson, Gene Ezell, Flossie Rhinehart and Ione Taylor with 78; Barbara Griffith, Paul

It is felt by some of the better informed people in the cotton business that the referendum on cotton marketing quotas could be a rather close contest this time. The reason behind their thinking is this - there is an area in the cotton producing section of the country where growers are willing to produce cotton for the world market. They believe they can do so profitably. These people (we have the rumor) will turn out to vote against marketing quotas and the program in general. Also, there are growers in

other parts of the country who wish to have the opportunity to grow cotton for a "free" market and these people will vote "no" in the referendum next Tuesday. As it takes a 2/3 majority vote to put the marketing quotas into effect, 34 voters out of each 100 voting "no" could defeat the application of marketing quotas. We think that having an honest and contested difference of opinion between cotton growers is a good thing. However, we feel that every cotton grower should be familiar with the question being voted upon. In other words, he (or she) should have the facts, they are as follows:

IF QUOTAS ARE APPROVED
 Marketing Quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect.

Excess cotton on a farm where the farm allotment is exceeded will be subject to a marketing quota penalty.

The "Domestic" Cotton Program will be available to growers who desire to participate. Under this, diversion payments, price support and price support payments, payments will be available to cooperators. The transfer of allotments by lease and sale will be possible.

IF QUOTAS ARE NOT APPROVED

No marketing quotas and no marketing quota penalties will apply to the 1966 crop of upland cotton. A person could grow all the cotton he wanted to and sell it on the market with no penalty.

Allotments would be in effect and a grower who stayed within his allotment would be eligible for price support on his cotton at 50% of parity. This is currently 21 cents for middling 1-1/2 inch cotton.

THE VOTE IS NOT ON ALLOTMENTS

No matter how the vote turns out, cotton allotments will remain in effect (as mentioned heretofore) as a means of determining price support eligibility.

ELIGIBILITY TO VOTE
 You are eligible to vote in

the referendum if you are engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1965. This includes the wives of all eligible voters in Texas.

All eligible persons are urged to vote in this referendum next Tuesday, November 23, 1965. We have always had a good turnout for commodity referendums in this county - let's make this one the biggest ever.

Ballots may be cast by eligible voters in polling places in the following locations: ASCS Office - Farwell, Lariat Gin, Country Club Gin, Lawlis Gin, S.I.E. Gin, Bovina Gin, North Lazbuddie Gin, West Hub Gin, Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply, McBride Gin, Friona Farmers Coop Gin, Clay's Corner Gin, Chester Gin, and Fleming & Son Gin.

On the radio broadcast team are Jessie Stone, Steve Pierson and Bobby Redden.

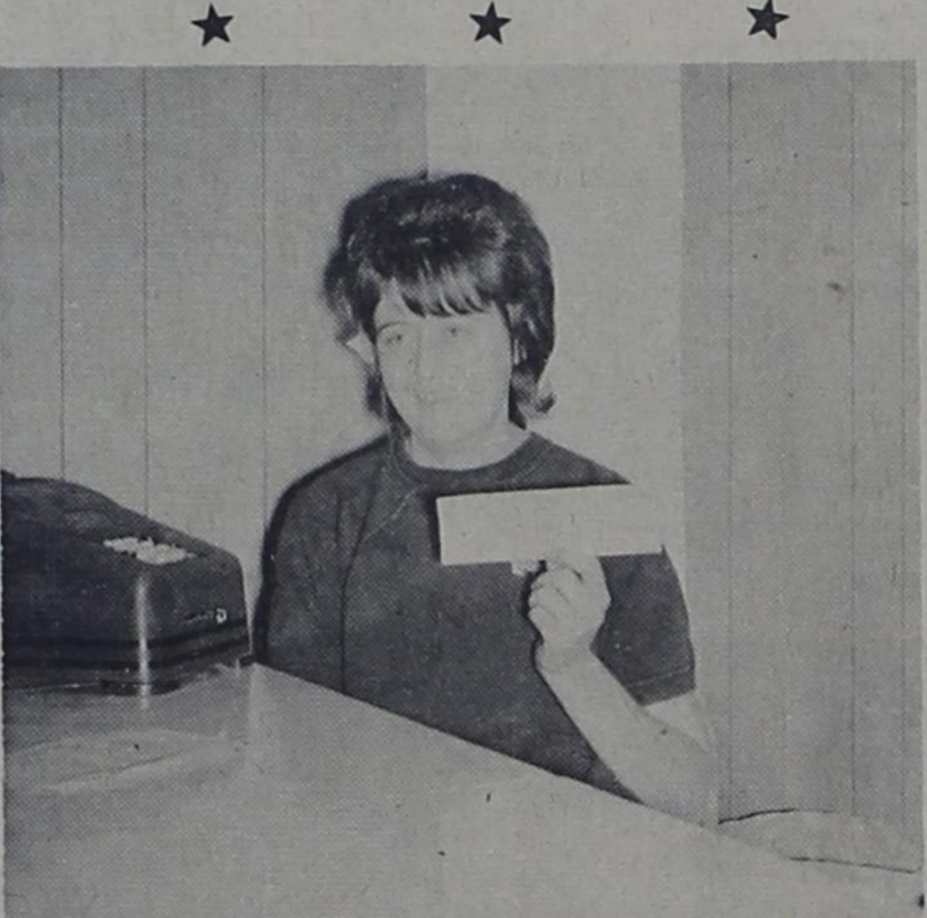

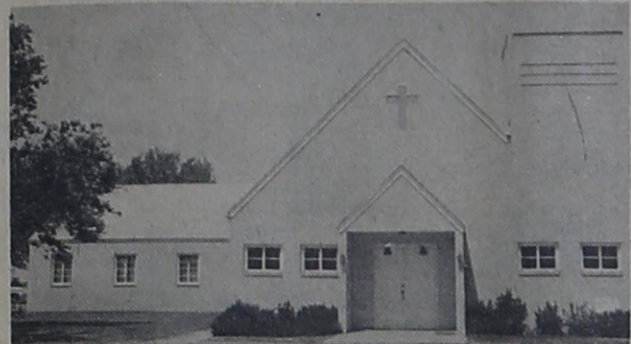

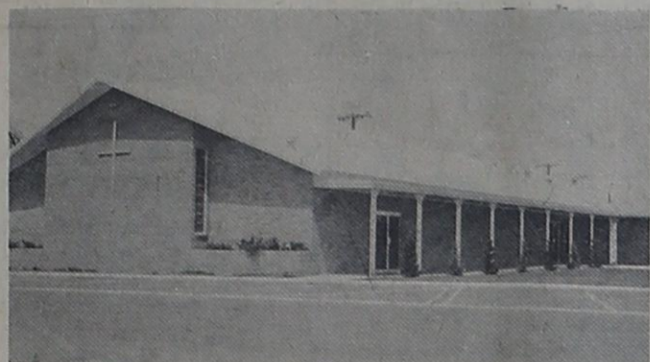

With What We Have

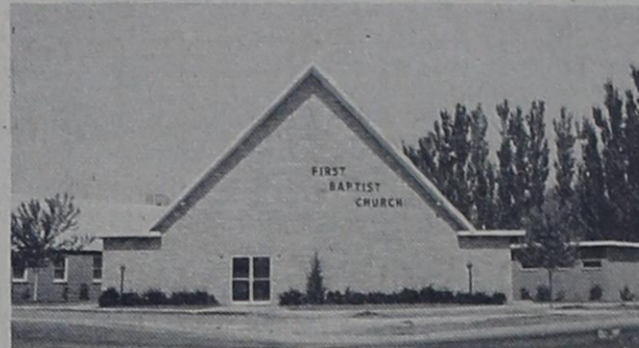

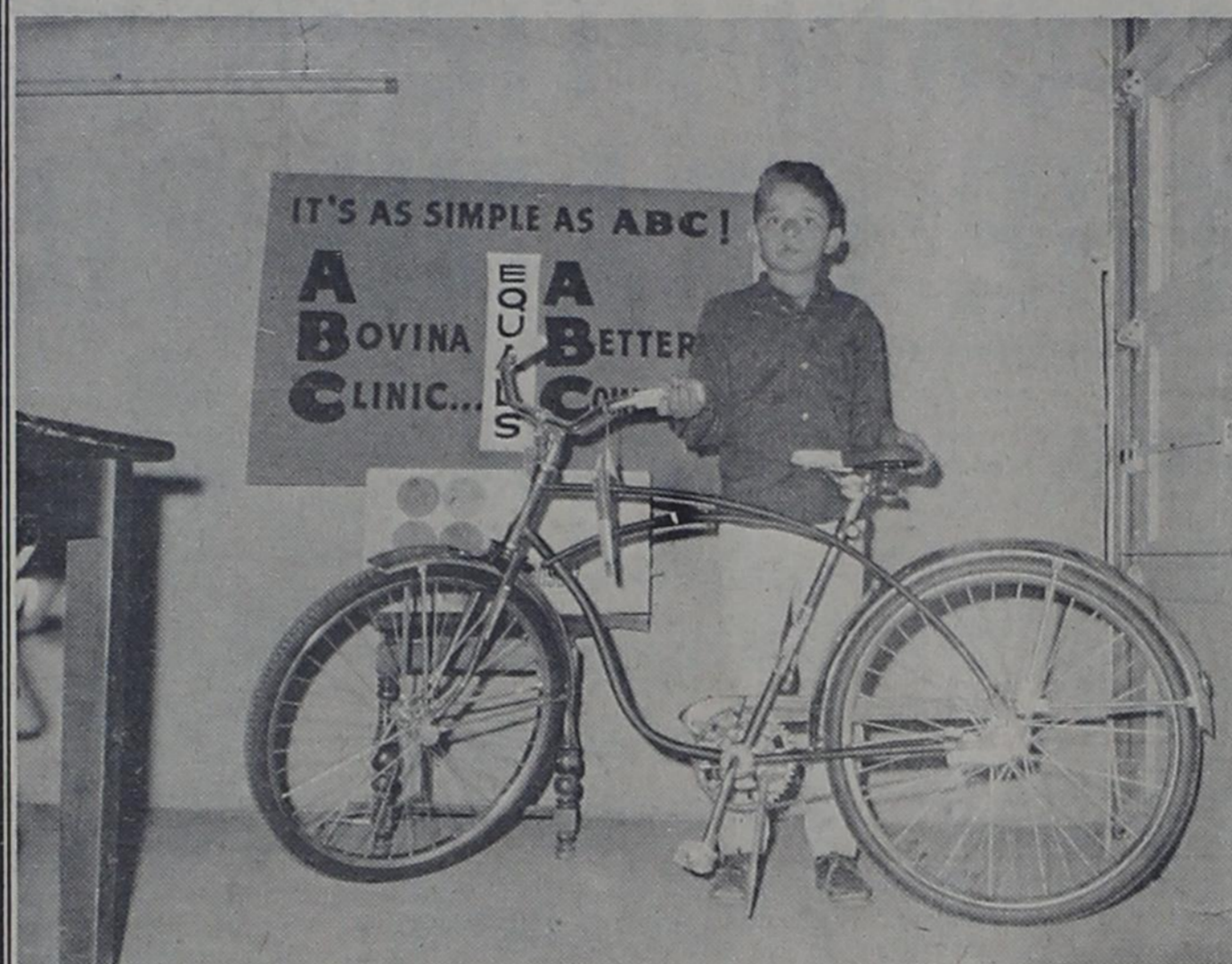
