Registration For 5 And 6 Year Olds

40,000 Head on Feed at Cal-Tex

By LaVonne Bunch Years ago, Vester Parish of Wingate gave R. L. Bland a behemoth buffalo, which delights Cal-Tex visitors, especially those from the eastern states. Few days pass without tourists driving along the iron fences, watching cattle feed in a completely remote fashion from the by gone days of wide open ranges and tall grasses.

Actually, Cal-Tex is a cattle hotel where 40,000 "guests" pay with their lives. Approximately six thousand head are turned to southern markets each month.

A gigantic feed mill dominates the site; here ingenious hands prepare fare using crops purchased from local farmers. The vast operation has about 70 employees; area economy is boosted by two million dollars, annually. Mr. R. L. Bland is the determining factor in the overall success of Cal-Tex.

He says, "I have some good reliable men in management. The complexity of a feed lot requires flexible working condigood vets." Cal-Tex retains four licensed veterinarians. Wayne Mills is general manager, assist ed by Don Odom, and Jess Slaughter. Don Dudley is in charge of incoming cattle, Doyle Cannon supervises the trucking and Jim Jay is comptroller.

Mr. Bland's family live at Cal-Tex, as do many of the employees. Only one son, Steve, remains at home where he is recuperating with a broken leg from a bronc ride. John and Rex are on the Rodeo circuit in Montana; the Bland's daughters, Diltzie Edmondson and Becky Odom are with their husbands, associated with Big Three Pork Producers.

When asked about the beef shortage over the counter, Mr. Bland replied, "There is a profound beef shortage from the producers. The cost of feed is unreal and most operations are at a standstill at present."



the legislature November 1. The legislature will meet as a Constitutional Convention in January, 1974, to act on that report. The revised document will be submitted to the people for their approval in an election. The process actually started

in the general election last November, when voters approved Amendment Four, which authorized revision of the 97-year-old Constitution and provided a procedure for doing so.

The 1972 amendment was the first time since 1876 that Texas voters have agreed to look hard at the framework of their state's government. The last, and only other, call to a Constitutional Convenion was overwhelmingly rejected by the voters in 1919.





As for grains on hand, only stocks of oats are above levels of a year ago. Texas' stocks as of July 1 for the four feed grains - corn, oats, barley and sorghum - are estimated at 95,000,000 bushels, down 50,000,000 bushels from a year

Grain sorghum was responsible for most of the decrease. Stocks of wheat, rye and soybeans are also below a year

Old crop carryover of wheat is estimated at 20,200,000 bushels compared to 42,100,000 bushels a year ago.

Sorghum stocks stored in all positions are estimated at 79,000,000 bushels compared

Corn stocks are about the same as a year ago. Old crop oat stocks are 700,000 bushels higher than a year ago. Soybean stocks are estimated at 2,700,000 bushels compared to 3,600,000 bushels a year ago.

Nationwide, stocks of all grains are estimated 67,900,000 tons, which is 17 per cent less than a year ago. April-June grain disappearance totaled a record high of 51,300,00 tons, 14 per cent more than the same quarter in 1972.

All of the above figures relate to grains produced in 1972 and earlier. The 1973 crops are not a part of this report.

EGG production in Texas during June is four per cent below a year ago and five per cent below last month. Texas' layers totaled 11,160,000 during June, which is seven per cent below a year ago and two per cent under May's total.

The number of layers throughout the nation totaled 285,000,000; this is five per cent below last year and two per cent under last month.

LAMB crop in Texas (lambs born during the period Oct. 1, 1972 through June 30, 1973) is estimated at 1,964,000 head; this is down 15 per cent from the 2,302,00 head last year.

Nationwide, the 1973 lamb crop is estimated at 11,400,000 head. This is down nine per cent from the 1972 crop of 12,500,000

The January 1, 1973 number of breeding ewes one year old and older totaled 12,100,000. This is a decrease of six per cent from a year earlier while ewe lambs under one year were down four

SHEEP and lambs on feed in Texas as of July 1 is up 13 per cent from a year ago. This, however, is 28 per cent below March. Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concentrates or on pastures and expected within the next three months to go on mar-

Marketings of feed sheep during March through June at 229,00 head were 3,000 head below the same period a year ago.

Since last March 29th, beef prices have been subject to rigid ceilings, and the Administration has prolonged those curbs until September 12th. Ceilings have been lifted on other food products in order to permit a dollar-for-dollar pass through, reflecting increased costs of raw agricultural products. But not on beef

It is nice to be able to plan for the future, but not when those plans include continued heavy financial loss, drastic curtailments of production, eventual closing of operations, and the resultant firing of employees.

News reports already are warming of black market dealings and under-the-counter transactions in beef. Without question shortages will result in the supermarkets. We will be facing these shortages not only in the immediate weeks ahead, but barring a relaxation of the controls on beef, such as has been granted for other agricultural and meat products, anyone planning a barbecue in September of October might be well advised to purchase the meat before too many days have passed. It simply will not be available in the fall.

Few question the fact that the retail price of beef would increase as a direct result of the removal of controls. But, perhaps far better to confront slight increases in cost today when supplies can be obtained at the supermarket than to confront even greater increases, compounded by shortages in supply, several weeks from now when controls are lifted.

Would it not be more desirable to pay a few cents per pound more now, and be able to purchase and consume the meat, than to be willing to pay even higher prices in September and find the product unavailable at the matket?

On June 29th, I introduced legislation to remove price controls from meat, poultry and dairy products, and on feed grain ingredients. I am pleased that the has followed my proposal as re-trict. Perhaps it was intended that the September 12th date for the removal of controls on beef would inspire those in the industry to tighten their belts and hold on for the relief in sight. Unfortunately, inspiration alone will not keep a processing plant in operation when losses exceed profits to such tremendous extents as have been experienced.

And, unfortunately, inspiration alone will not provide a filling meal to those American families who in the early fall seek beef for their tables.

When the month of August rolls around, thousands of Texas mothers suddenly realize that only a few more weeks remain until school begins.

Parents with youngsters beginning school for the first time this September, look forward to September, look forward to school with a little more excitement, and many mothers whose first-born are going off to school may be a bit bewildered by it

In addition to the million-andone chores that must be performed in getting the youngster ready for school - new shoes, clothes, health examination most school districts require proof of age for beginning students. A certified copy of a birth certificate is usually requested, reports the Texas State Department of Health.

This fall there will be 221,100 new first graders in the schools throughout Texas, with the total public school enrollment expected to reach 2,805,300. Continued growth of the school population is expected for the next two to three years, according to the Texas Education Agency. In addition, there will be 78,700 children enrolled in public school

Burleson **Points Out Users Fee**

WASHINGTON, D. C. - Congressman Omar Burleson calls attention to the fact that the President has just signed a bill clarifying the collection of user fees by he Army Corps of Engineers at lakes and reservoirs.

Last February the Corpes of Engineer's announced its intention to charge fees at undeveloped projects within its control which had not previously been designated as fee areas. User fees may not be charged for access to or use of any campground which does not include the following: showers, flush restrooms, paved or dustproofed access, visitor protection controls, picnic tables and fireplaces, designated tnt or trailer spaces, refuse containers and sanitary disposal stations, and portabl water.

User fees will be permitted at highly developed facilities which require the continuous presence of personnel for maintenance and supervision.

Accent On Health

Anticipating the rush of birth certificate requests, the Records and Statistics Sections of he Texas Sate Department of Health has been prepared for it. Requests already are pouring in.

It takes a sizeable staff just to open the thousands of letters received daily, let alone search out a requested certificate, remove it from the thik volume, make a certified copy, mail it out and then return the original certificate ot its proper place.

Years of experience have eliminated nearly every bottlneck. Txh operation is smooth and fast. Usually the copy is mailed within 3 or 4 days after the request is received.

One bottleneck still remaining, however, is the individual who makes the last-minute request. Parents are requested to stop now and write for a certified copy of the birth certificate, or contact either the city registrar where he child was born or the county clerk in the county of

In most cases it is an easy matter to make a trip to your county courthouse or registrar and personally request a certified copy of a birth certificate. The county clerk's office has birth records on file, as well as countless other documents.

If you write the Texas State Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics, the address is 410 East Fifth Street, Austin, Tex., 78701. Be sure to include the child's name, his place of birth, the date of birth, and names of the parents-including the mother's maiden name. The State Health Department fee for a certified copy of the birth certificate is \$2.

Filing of birth certificates s just one function of the Records. and Statistics Section of the State Health Departmen. Records also are kept of deaths, diseases and other public health information

There are more than 13 million birth certificates on file in the state office, and the tabulation of birth certificates is a never-ending process. Last year, for example, there were just under 222,000 live births recorded in Texas.

Largest number of live births for Texas is one year was recorded in 1957. That year 249,567 babies were born alive in Texas, and their births are recorded in the Records and Statistics Sec-

Just maintaining records of

current births and deaths is a mammoth task. In order to do this, the statewide system includes 1.000 local registration officials who collect these records. All of these must be carefully indexed to expedite the searches that must be made each year to process applications for birth verifications and

This sounds complicated, and it is. But to a person who needs a birth certificate for a passport or to prove the age of a child entering school, it is a vital

Not only are these records helpful to you and necessary for legal proof in many instances, but they furnish - as a group information of great value to the state. To best use this wealth of statistics, data is transferred from records to magnetic tapes and a computer converts these into tabulations. From these charts and reports come information enabling staff statisticians to read and interpret the very pulse of the state's healh.

The more common open market system sometimes results in higher marketing costs per head and more stress caused by transfers - resulting in weight loss and some cases of sicknes and death, the Texas A&M University System researchers said.

The integrated system, in which the whole process from weaning age calf to slaughtering is pre-arranged, lowers marketing costs and cuts down on the transfers and resulting losses. The idea is to plan and organize for minimizing stress and time in the market channel.

The potential advantage of the integrated system, Farris and Williams found, came to \$9 to \$11 per head in savings during 1966-70. About half of that was saved marketing costs.
