The former name of the church feast of All Saints Day, which is observed on November 1, was "Hallowmas." For young people a time for gaiety and pranks, a night to play at being witches, ghosts, and fairies. The name means "Holy Eve", a time originally set apart to honor the memory of all saints ... "All Saints - the unknown good that rest In God's still memory folded deep. The bravely dumb who did their deed, And scorned to blot it with a name; Men of the plain heroic breed, That loved Heaven's silence more than fame."

There is less of historical and educational interest in connection with this holiday than with most of the special days that are observed in schools, but children find a peculiar fascination in its weird legends and in its timehonored symbols.
