

An apparent heart attack claimed the life of one of Merkel's most prominent citizens. Booth Warren, longtime President of the Farmers and Merchants National Bank and chairman of the board died about 9:30 a.m. Friday in the alley back of the West Texas Utility Building. Mr. Warren was 76.

Services were held Saturday at 3 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery under the direction of Starbuck Funeral Home. The Rev. Kenneth Jones, pastor, officiated.

Mr. Warren was born December 19, 1897 in Merkel. He never left his native town. He attended Merkel public schools. After graduation from Merkel High School he attended old Cooper school for boys before enrolling in Simmons College (now Hardin - Simmons).

He left college in 1917 to work for his father as a bookkeeper in his father's bank. His father, J. T. Warren, along with other Merkelites, and early day Abilene bankers and merchants Henry James and Ed S. Huges, founded the bank on December 1, 1904. Booth never held another job. He came up through the ranks, holding every position in the bank until he assumed the presidency upon the death of his father in 1940. He served as president of the bank for 34 years.
