

Dillman to pre-register Pre-K & K

Dillman Elementary will pre-register students who are eligible for kindergarten or prekindergarten for the 1999-2000 school year Friday, April 30 in the Dillman Gym from 8-3 p.m.

To be eligible for kindergarten, children must be five years old by Sept. 1, 1999. To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, children must be four years old by Sept. 1, 1999 and must also meet one of the following requirements: (1) have limited knowledge of and comprehension of the English language, or (2) are from a family who is eligible to receive free or reduced price lunches. Pre-kindergarten students who are already attending school do not need to register for kindergarten.

Pre-kindergarten classes will operate on a half-day basis only, with classes from 8 to 11 a.m. or from 12:10 to 3:10 p.m. Kindergarten will operate on a full-day basis.

Current kindergarten classes continue as usual Friday, April 30.

Parents are asked to bring the child's birth certificate, immunization records, and the child's social security number when enrolling. All children who enroll for kindergarten or pre-kindergarten April 30 will be screened for speech and language that day. Parents are urged to bring their children with them.

Shrimp farmer seeks to control water quality

FLOUR BLUFF --- With up to 68,000 residents in each of the six "homes" he's built in Flour Bluff, Texas A&M University researcher Tzachi Samocha would like for the homes to be clean and environmentally sound. Even if the residents are mere crustaceans.

The homes are mariculture ponds, the residents are shrimp bound to be either live bait or human food, and the research is critical. Water quality and concerns for shrimp health make a "biosecure" system of shrimp farming a major issue in an industry with enormous potential in Texas.

"Harvest of seafood from the oceans is already at the maximum sustainable level, and any increase in supply will have to come from aquaculture," said Samocha, an associate professor with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.



USDA predicts 17% drop in farm income

American farmers who grow the country's leading crops will suffer a 17 percent drop in their income this year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's chief economist projected Monday.

"The problem is in row-crop agriculture," said USDA chief economist Keith Collins.

Net income to producers of farm-program crops rice, wheat, feed grains, soybeans and cotton is expected to drop to \$16 billion this year, from an all- time high of \$28 billion just three years ago, Collins said. It would be the lowest since 1991. The projection includes government farm-program payments, but not disaster payments now being meted out. Low commodity prices have prompted several proposals in Washington to restore a farm income "safety net" that many believe was lost with the 1996 farm bill.

"These are times of uncertainty and anxiety

in agriculture," Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said during a morning address to agricultural journalists.

The new farm bill removed subsidies that moved up or down with changes in market prices, replacing them with flat payments scheduled to expire by 2002.

The measure assumed a continuation of





"We're trying to both isolate our ponds from the surrounding environment and protect the environment at the same time."

The ultimate goal of his team's biosecurity program is to recircu-. late all the water used in the Flour Bluff mariculture facilities, neither adding outside water nor discharging water as a matter of standard practice. Such programs could help the Texas shrimp-farming industry grow even further; although it already produces some 70 percent of U.S. farmed shrimp, sales were only about \$30 million in 1998.

The Flour Bluff facilities have all that is needed to grow shrimp in stages from eggs to larvae, postlarvae and full-grown shrimp. That includes everything from indoor tanks (for larvae culture) to greenhouse-enclosed "raceways" (for postlarval shrimp) and openair ponds where large numbers of final growth.

After initial chlorination of water in the raceways and ponds, only a small amount of fresh water is added to compensate for evaporation or seepage, Samocha noted. Rain can also fall into the ponds, although it is not a frequent South Texas occurrence.

Keeping a tight rein on water keeps out diseases that have harmed native Gulf stocks in the past and can devastate farmed stocks, as happened in 1995 when Taura Syndrome Virus hit Texas shrimp farms.

It also keeps biological byproducts like nitrogen or phosphorous from unconsumed feed and feces out of local water systems, Samocha said.

There are several keys to keeping the system clean and inhabitable for shrimp. One is paddlewheel-like aerators that help maintain adequate dissolved oxygen level in thewater. Another is



robust export markets and relatively strong prices boosted by world demand. But prices sunk after the Asian economic crisis and abundant crop production.

Relying exclusively on international trade was not realistic, Glickman said.

So far, proposals range from a reform of crop insurance to boosting support in marketing loan programs to putting more of a floor under prices. As it is, the government will give a record \$15.3 billion to producers this fiscal year, through a combination of farm-program and disaster payments.

Collins projected only marginal increases in commodity prices. Corn should rise to an average of \$2.05 a bushel this year, from 1998's possible," Combest said Monday. six-year low of \$2.00 a bushel. Wheat prices are projected to average about \$2.95 a bushel, up from last year's \$2.70, which was the lowest since 1990.

The modest rise in wheat prices would result from the lowest planted acreage in 26 years in this country, and a little less production worldwide.

"Wheat income has been very bad," Collins said, with more farmers shifting into other crops.

Steer prices are expected to move up slightly to 64.50 cents a pound, from 61 cents last year. He doesn't expect any significant improvement in the cattle market until 2001.

Exports are projected to begin a gradual increase, Collins said, although growth in foreign economies this year will remain at about one-third the rate of three years ago. Russia's economy is expected to decline an additional 15

percent this year.

He said farms with a debt-to-asset ratio of more than 40 percent are most vulnerable to current low-price conditions. Coming into 1998, that represented about 8.5 percent of all farms.

Still, that compared with about 23 percent during the height of the 1980s farm crisis, he "We want to work with Congress on long- said. Total farm debt this year is projected at \$170 billion, down slightly from last year, and \$194 billion in 1984.

> On Capitol Hill, House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest, R- Texas, is pushing crop insurance legislation he says would alleviate the need for disaster assistance. He envisions a program costing no more than \$6 billion a year compared with the \$130 billion farm-program cost over the past 10 years.

But Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., said he believes that crop insurance reform should be augmented by greater support of marketing loan programs.

That would more closely resemble price supports scrapped by the new farm law, which was dubbed the Freedom To Farm Act.

"My view is that the Freedom to Farm Act has been a real failure," Daschle said of the legislation that also allowed farmers to plant whatever crops they choose for the market.

"You have to come to the conclusion that we're in the depths of a very deep recession," he said

Both Combest and Daschle expressed concern over concentration of cattle markets in the hands of a few big processors. Combest predicted that by the end of the year, packers will be required to report the prices that they pay for cattle to avoid possible price manipulation.





We're All Trying To Make Sense Out of the Senseless

The shots fired in Columbine High School in Littleton, Colorado, this week were shots heard not just in Colorado or our nation but around the world as everyone who hears about the tragedy tries to make some sense out of it. And there is none to be made

Such violence seems to defy reason-which should not surprise us since violence is, by its very



nature, not usually a rational thing.

But I've wondered, too. What would cause two teenage boys to go on such a terribly premeditated killing frenzy?

Were you to answer, "Hatred," you'd be right, I'm sure.

That's clear already. They hated minorities. They hated athletes. They hated And they adored Adolf Hitler, this century's premier purveyor of hate.

Hatred in its ugliest, most disgusting, least rational form was at the bottom of their crime. But I still wonder why.

This sort of thing defies simple answers, and probably a jillion and one factors all play a part. But I wonder . .

Nothing even begins to excuse what those pathetic human beings did, and they are ultimately

responsible for what they did no matter why they did it.

But in a society where kids are taught all of their lives by movies, music, and media that your life only matters if you're rich or beautiful or athletic or smart, it's a pretty short step to "If my life has no value, then neither does yours." Life becomes very cheap. If a child grows up knowing he's created in the image of God and that alone is enough to make his life precious-no matter what our society thinks-he'll usually

grow up valuing the lives of others as well as his own. A society too sick and squeamish to tell the truth about why life is valuable, why life matters, pays a very high price for its twisted and povertystricken values.

That price is paid in real blood and real tears.

It's a tough and twisted world we live in. And, I repeat, people are responsible for their own decisions. Even if we knew a thousand "why's" for what these teens turned murderers did, "what" they did would still be just as wrong.

But I wish, before they wrapped themselves in hate and hid the violence of their dark souls in trenchcoats, someone had been able to show them how warmly and securely they could have felt themselves wrapped in the love of God.

You don't have to be smart or pretty or rich or intelligent to earn God's love. It's a gift. It can't be earned, but it's already richly given.

I hope you and yours know that.






