Staunch Merkel booster, Miss Collins, dies

One of Merkel's most ardent supporters has died. Funeral services for Christine Collins, 75, were Friday at the Grace Presbyterian Church.

She died Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. at her home following a lengthy illness.

Dr. B. P. Smith of Fort Worth and the Rev. Jack McClendon, pastor officiated. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery, directed



Doctor Rongers' Column By EDWARD

HEAT INJURIES During this time of the ear when you are exposed to high temperatures and high humidity, you are subject to heat cramps, heat exhaustion body cooling. and heat stroke. These three types of heat injuries can be disabling, but heat stroke, also known as sunstroke, can

promptly and properly. Heat cramps are due primarily to lack of salt in the body due to insufficient salt intake and excessive loss of salt through sweating. Dehydration due to excessive sweating may also play a part



in producing heat cramps. The symptoms of heat cramps of the muscles, usually the stomach or abdominal muscles and the calf muscle of the lower leg. The skin is pale, cool, and wet with sweat, although the body temperature is normal.

Heat cramps are relieved by replacing the salt lost from the body, usually by way of a salt solution. This salt solution can be prepared by dissolving two 10-grain salt tablets in one quart of water or by dissolving one-fourth teaspoonful of table salt in one quart of water. This salt solution should be taken by mouth as freely as the patient

will take it. Wilson's Heat exhaustion results from circulatory failure brought on by excessive loss of water and salt from the body. The victim suffers from headache, mental confusion. vertigo (dizziness), drowsiness, extreme weakness, and possibly fainting. The skin is pale, cool, and wet with sweat. The body temperature may be subnormal or slightly elevated, the pulse may be weak and rapid, and the blood pres-

sure will be lowered. Heat exhaustion is treated by getting the patient's circulation back to normal and by replacing the salt and water that has been lost. The patient should be taken to a cool place and while lying down with the head level, raise or elevate the feet and then rub



Heat stroke or sunstroke is the most serious type of heat injury and has a high death rate. Heat stroke results from inadequate heat loss from the body with overheating and damage to the heat regulating center in the brain.

The symptoms of an impending heat stroke would be headache, dizziness, mental confusion, and the most outstanding symptom as compared to the other heat injuries is the slight or complete absence of sweating. Usually, heat stroke starts with sudden collapse and loss of consciousness leading to coma. The patient's skin is red (flushed), hot and dry. Again, there is an absence of sweating and the body

temperature is very high, The most important aspect in the treatment of heat stroke is to lower the patient's body termperatue as rapidly as possible to avoid possible brain damage. The longer the high temperature continues, the greater is the threat to life. The following measures should be taken immediately:

(1) Remove the patient's clothes. Immerse the patient in cold water, in ice water if available. If water is in short supply, then sprinkle the patient thoroughly, and then fan the patient to quicken cooling evaporation.

(2) Rub the patient's arms, legs, and trunk to increase circulation to the skin.

(3) If cyanosis (blueness of the skin) is present, artificial respiration may be needed.


(4) Remove the patient to a hospital as soon as possible in a vehicle with the windows down. The passage of air currents through open doors and windows will aid cooling. Continue measures to cool the patient until the hospital is reached.



It showed current tax collected at \$473,870.53 and delinquent tax collected (some from as far back as 1939) as \$10,439.47 for a total of \$484,310.

Mona Faye Bartlett shows \$452,627.47 in the local maintenance fund and \$21,243.06 in interest and sinking fund deposited in the evening in the First Baptist Farmers and Merchants Church. Dear Editor

I've been hearing some disturbing news about the closing of the Red Cross due to lack of funds if the United Fund drops them. I believe the United Fund is very wrong in this decision and here's a few reasons why:

I grew up in a poor family and I can remember back in the droughts when there was neither food nor much money. My father plowed gardens for a living and during a drought there wasn't much being planted so we didn't have much. If it hadn't been for the Red Cross I guess we would have starved. But our Red Cross came to the rescue and bought us a weekly bill

of groceries. Then back in the 50's when the tornado hit Merkel it tore up and blew away our home. It wasn't a fancy home but it was all we had. Having no insurance nor money to build another, the Red Cross once again came to our rescue. They built us a 4 room house with a bath (first one I'd ever known). This wasn't a fancy home either but was nice and comfortable (my

father still lives there). And I can remember when I was in school, the schools taught us how good the Red Cross was. We helped pack packages for the Red Cross to send overseas to refugees and G. I.'s from home. I can remember my brother writing home from the Korean War and telling ways the Red Cross was helping out.

Then there was the time when my brother wasin Seoul Korea fighting 5 miles from the front line. We quit getting our allotment check from the service. When we tried checking it out the army said

he had been discharged. We knew he hadn't as we were getting mail from him, Someone told us to go to the Red Cross, so we did, and they got busy and got it straightened out and helped us get our back checks.

I can also remember a man named Johnny Cox and a woman named Mrs. Mc-Farland who spent many and many an hour working with the Red Cross and these were good people and I don't believe they would have wasted their time on it if it hadn't been a good organization.

Then now, my 4 children have gone thru many years of free swimining lessons with the help of the Red Cross and thanks to their program they are all good swimmers. This program has probably saved many a child's life and I for one would sure hate to see it end. I have a new baby I'd like to grow up to go thru this program.

I'm not rich enough to give what I feel I owe the Red Cross but maybe thru this letter can help everyone, especially the members of the United Fund to see how important our Red Cross is. I'm sure there are others who know ways they have helped. Please let the United Fund know so we can maybe change their minds about dropping the Red Cross. If the people of the big country set back and don't do anything to help they're making a big mistake which someday will live to regret. So please everyone help our Red Cross.
