Merkel Without Gas Thursday

Merkelites were shocked Thursday when gas service stopped at approximately 11 a.m.

Because Merkel is supplied by two lines, one from Abilene and the other from Sweetwater, an unusual problem arose. The problem was—the line out of Abilene was down due to repairs when the Sweetwater line ruptured. When this happened, all

gas to Merkel was cut off. Castille Hardware, the local office for Lone Star Gas representative Bill Harris, was swamped with calls.

Immediately after finding out that no one in town had gas, Bill Harris called the Lone Star office in Abilene. Pat Castille said, "It was amazing how fast things started popping

around here. In an hour the extra crews were over here to start the procedure for restoring service." Two member crews came from Abilene, Sweetwater and Stamford.

The first thing the crews had to do was turn off all meters before the line could be repressurized. By 4 p.m., with hard and steady work, the men had

all meters turned off. Pat Castille said, "it was one of the most coordinated groups I've ever seen. They knew exactly what to do and how to do it quickly."

A Lone Star representative said that a plan for this type of situation had been worked out previously in case of tornadoes and other types of disasters.

Most Merkel residents had their gas service restored by late Thursday evening. The out of town crew checked out of the local office Friday afternoon at 5:30. Almost all residents and business had service by this time—however, Bill Harris worked Saturday to finish up on residents who had not been at home the previous day.

Goals development selected as key school district target for Trent

The establishment of a set of educational goals for the Trent Public Schools has been designed by the Board of Education as a major target for the Board and school staff during the Spring semester.

A District Goals Development Committee will begin work early in the year to draft a listing of preliminary educational goals. These goals will be presented to the patrons of the district and to senior students at Trent High

School for evaluation in terms of their relative importance and the perception of how well the present programs of the school district are meeting the needs indicated. Following this period of community evaluation, a final draft of "Goals for Public Education in Trent will be presented to the Board of Education for review and formal adoption. These goals will then form the basis for an in depth examination of the school program to determine how well students are prog-

ressing toward the goals and which areas of the program may require attention. This program of self-evaluation will be conducted by the school staff during the 1977-78 school year. Results of this two phased program of community and staff assessment will be incorporated into a district Master Plan which will serve as a focal point for planning over a five-year period.

This program of goals development, evaluation,

and plan-making will be undertaken in accordance with standards adopted by the State Commission on School Accreditation in 1974, which called for a greater and more intensive development of educationally accountable programs based upon responsible local control.

Roy Neff will chair the Goals Development Committee of the Trent Public Schools which includes among its members: Bruce Thomas, Betty Kindard, Vera Sharp, Betty Freeman, Rosemary Bland, Kenny Nance and Glynn Dunn.

School Board Election Deadline March 2nd

March 2nd is the last day to file as a candidate for a place on the Merkel School Board. It is also the last day to register and be qualified to vote in the school election. Anyone desiring to become a candidate must be a qualified voter, have lived in the state for at least 1 year and have lived in the Merkel Independent School District for at least 6 months. There are 3 vacancies to be filled this year. One 2 year term and two 3 year terms. Places up for election are presently held by Jacky Reynolds, Dink Whisenhunt and Leroy Teaff. To date Barbara Fowler, Leroy Teaff and Dink Whisenhunt have filed for a place on the ballot. The election will be held Saturday, April 2, 1977. Poling places are set for the Merkel High School gym and the Tye Elementary Cafeteria.

Sick Pay exclusion changed

The tax benefit allowing an individual to exclude a certain amount of sick pay from tax each year has been virtually eliminated and replaced with a much narrower provision. The \$5,200 maximum exclusion is reduced once income reaches \$15,000 and phases out when income reaches \$20,200.

The new change in the law, retroactive to January 1, 1976, does away with the up to \$100 a week sick pay which, under certain conditions, an employee could exclude from taxation. Taxpayers can find additional information in Publication 522, "Tax Information on Disability Payments" and by checking the instructions in their tax packages.

Now, an exclusion is only allowed for persons under age 65 who retire with a permanent disability, such an individual can exclude from taxation up to \$5,200 a year of disability income.

Womack Dies






IRS will compute tax

Taxpayers can elect to have the Internal Revenue Service compute their income tax on either the short Form 1040A or long Form 1040 if they have an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 or less. Persons filing Form 1040 must also take the standard deduction to qualify for the computation.

Another requirement, according to the IRS, is that the taxpayer's income must be solely from wages, salary, tips, dividends, interest, pensions and annuities.

To take advantage of IRS computing the tax, the

taxpayer need only compute certain portions of his or her tax return, attach all W-2 forms, sign the return, and mail it by April 15 to the address listed in the tax instruction booklet.

The tax will be determined from the proper tax table and the taxpayer will either receive a refund for any overpayment or be notified of the amount of any tax due.

Exact details of which portions of the return must be completed in order to have IRS compute the tax appear in the tax package instructions mailed earlier to each taxpayer.

Obtain Proof of Crop Ownership With Grain Warehouse Receipt

AUSTIN—All Texas grain farmers are urged to obtain official grain warehouse receipts for their stored crop, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

"Farmers who receive nothing more than weight tickets as proof of deposit of their grain should exchange them for official receipts as soon as possible to ensure maximum protection under the law," White said.

In the event of a grain warehouse failure, a weight ticket holder could easily be inviting lengthy legal

haggling before taking possession of his grain, since scale tickets in themselves do not necessarily constitute legal proof of ownership.

On the other hand, White stated, warehouse receipts, obtained upon request from any grain warehouse, provide clearcut proof of ownership as legal negotiable instruments.

According to the Texas Department of Agriculture officials, warehouse receipts would have priority in any case of forced closure or bankruptcy.

Community Service grant

WASHINGTON, D. C. Congressman Omar Burleson announces the approval of a \$37,298 Community Service Administration grant to the Aspermont Small Business Development Center, Incorporated. The grant is effective March 1, 1977, and will run for twelve months.

The areas served are communities within 17 counties including Knox, Haskell, Jones, Fisher, Kent, Stonewall, Taylor, Nolan, Floyd, Crosby, Garza and Scurry.

The funds will be used for a program that will assist in establishing or expanding business and services operated by local individuals and groups; encouraging the location of outside industry for the communities; and promoting tourism projects and the development of natural resources.

Garden Potential Great in 77

Home vegetable gardens could pay off handsomely in 1977 due to current vegetable market conditions, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Weather calamities in Florida and California and less than ideal conditions in South Texas will cause a sharp increase in the price of both fresh and processed fruits and vegetables this spring," points out Sam Cotner. "This means that home gardeners may be able to realize a substantial savings this year by growing many of their own groceries."

So Cotner encourages homeowners and others interested in starting a vegetable garden to start planning now.

"The key to a productive garden is to start planning early," he emphasizes.

"This means deciding on what to plant, getting the proper variety of seeds or

plants, and preparing the soil. Determining what type of fertilizer to use and how much is also important."

Determining this information early will be a big help at planting time, notes Cotner. The Extension Service has numerous publications available on various phases of gardening that will provide answers to many questions. Copies can be obtained from any county Extension office. County agents can also advise gardeners on the proper varieties of crops for that particular area; proper varieties are a critical factor for a successful garden.

As far as proper fertilization is concerned, it's wise to have the soil tested to determine exactly the amount and type of fertilizer needed, notes the horticulturist. Information on soil testing is also available from any county Extension office.

"Arm yourself with information and do some reading so that you'll be all geared up when planting time rolls around," emphasizes Cotner. "It can get you on the path to a successful and profitable garden in 1977."

Charitable Contributions must be substantiated

All charitable contributions of property must be substantiated to be claiming a deduction, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Any deduction claimed for property donated to an organization must be verified through a statement to the IRS listing the dates and amounts of each contribution, the type of property donated, and the method of determining the property's value.

If used furniture, clothing or other property, for example, is donated, it may be claimed as a deductible contribution to the extent of its fair market value. Fair market value is the price at which the property

would change hands between a willing buyer and seller.

For each piece of property valued over \$200, the original cost or other basis in the property, fair market value, appreciation, conditions of the gift and a copy of the gift's appraisal must also be included in the tax return. This required information must accompany the tax return, according to the IRS.

Two free IRS pamphlets, Publication 561, "Valuation of Donated Property," and Publication 526, "Income Tax Deduction for Contributions," discuss contributions and can be obtained from most IRS offices.

A-Additional educational benefits are payable for a child over age 18 while a veteran is in training half time or better, and the child remains in school and unmarried until age 23.

Q-My husband is a World War II veteran who added the total disability income rider to his National service Life Insurance policy. He has been totally disabled for about five years and has since received \$100 each month. How will that affect the face value of his basic policy?

A-It will have no effect. Benefits received under the disability rider will not decrease the face value of the NSLI policy.

Loan Sharking to be legalized?

"Finance companies are trying to pass a bill that will legalize loan sharking in Texas and clog the courts," said Senator Bill Patman of Ganado recently. "Loan company lobbyists have publicly called for raises in present interest rate limits to enable them to charge Texas borrowers as much as 25 percent more than the extra-high rates they are already gouging them with, the charges on a 37-month loan of \$1,000 would increase from \$339.17 to \$425.50 under the loan company proposal."

"Only \$165.87 can be charged for the same loan under the constitutional 10 percent limit, but in 1967 the Legislature authorized the \$339.17 finance companies now charge. Under the 1960 amendment to the Texas constitution, the limit of 10 percent only applies where the Legislature does not legalize higher rates. The Legislature is now unlimited by the constitution as to the interest rates it may authorize."

"Without new legislation, the loan sharking penalty for deliberately charging such outrageous interest (\$425.50) would be \$851.00, plus reasonable attorneys' fees fixed by the court. The loan company bill will not only

permit the lenders to escape the penalty of \$851.00 and the attorneys' fees but will enable the finance companies to go to Texas courts to enforce such unconscionable contracts," said Senator Patman. "Our already overcrowded court dockets will swell from lawsuits brought by loan companies to enforce the higher rates. The administration of justice will suffer throughout Texas."

"It is particularly inappropriate for loan companies to be seeking higher rates at this time. Their own borrowing costs have been sharply reduced in recent months, the prime rate has gone down from 12 percent in July of 1974 to 6.78 percent in October

1976 (latest month for which figures are available)—a decline of 43.5 percent. Yet these powerful special interests have served notice they intend to pressure legislators for a sharp increase in interest rates imposed upon Texas families," Senator Patman said.

"The battle against high interest rates will be more severe this coming Session than any in recent years. Unless people throughout our state get in touch with their legislators and other public officials, the loan industry will prevail. I urge the people of Texas to react strongly and contact immediately their senators and representatives, asking their opposition to the loan company bill."
