## Army destroys abandoned dynamite Monday

Terkel Police and Fire personnel, as well as a
couple of Army folks, got a chance to see if they
had steady hands under pressure when a case of
dynamite was found Sunday by some local
youngsters.
The youths found the dynamite at $6: 15$ p.m.
Sunday on South is Street, directly across the
railroad tracks from the Little Mexico Gift Shop.
Merkel Police Chief Leroy Austermann respond-
ed to the call and with the help of Merkel
Volunteer Fire Department personnel, moved the
dynamite to the city dump. Two Army explosives specialist, Sgt. Sickie W
Jordon and Specialist 5 Kenneth Brooks, attached to the 47th Ordinance Detached from Fort Hood were flown to Dyes AFB, and escorted here. paned by Merkel Police and Fire personnel paned by Merkel Police and Fire personnel
searched the area again Monday morning and found more dynamite, and transported it to the dump

explosives, the ordinance team detonated the
dynamite in the city dump Monday The ynamite was destroyed without injury.
Sergeant Jordan said although he had no way to determine the age of the dynamite, still posed
a threat of explosion. Jordan said that dynamite that is left exposed for a long period of time can become unstable and pose a threat
Both Jordan and Brooks said that people should report all explosives to local authorities for disposal.

The Array will come free of charge to elect
any explosive devise, including war tokens fo danger poss ibilities.

## Stenholm blames low farm prices

Congressman elect Charles Stenholm told approximately 335 West Texas government and business leaders attending the annual meeting of getting farm prices is his number one concern for West Texas.
Stenholm said if the "low farm prices paid to the local farmer were increased, or paid a fair
price that West Texas would have an additional $\$ 300,000$ circulating this Christmas and if agricultural imports were increased, more jobs would be create

Stenholm also told the audience, made up of mostly local government officials and admistraharing funds to decrease their dependence on the Federal Government. Stenholm said that he and his staff is doing everything in their power to gain a seat on the Agricultural Committee in the House. Stenholm
said that committee seat was one of the main reasons he wanted to run for the House and he
felt his agricultural expertise would be beneficial to the committee and West Texas Stenholm also said that if the farm price
problem was solved, West Texas would be strong economic area once again.
The congressman said he does not see a thing wrong with exporting food to the Soviet Union away, especially to communist countries. He also said that he will "drop a bill into the hopper his first day in office that will call for balancing the federal budget." Stenholm also said he feels that government in pending is largely
responsible for the current inflation rate. He also said that some federal agencies, such as EPA OSHA, and the Department of Energy could Sunset Legislation, that would require all federal agencies to justify their existance periodically. Stenholm said that he will attend the Freshmen

TFB says no to cheep food policy

Texas Farm Bureau President Carrol Chaloupprogram could lead to a "cheap food" policy by goverrment that would benefit neither farmers nor consumers. 45 annual meeting of the Addressing the 45th annual meeting of the
Texas Farm Bureau at the Dallas Hilton, Chaloupka warned producers about piling up surpluses in government held reserves. op must avoid giving political planners the Chaloupka said
Chaloupka referred to the large increase in private storage built by producers, and urged farmers to keep control of their grain.
The leader of the state's largest farm organization said the only way producers will get
fair prices is to balance supply with demand. He
referred to the recent experience in the cattle industry. cattle industry has gone through a devasting four years, but it did reduce cattle
numbers by 15 percent, and today cattle prices numbers by 15 percent, and today cattle prices
are very good," he said.

Chaloupka pointed to other problems that must be solved if farmers and ranchers are to obtain a include, he said, expanding exports, controlling inflation, lessening government regulations, restraining the "monopoly power" of labor
unions, and "sensible" water and energy policies unions, and "sensible" water and energy policies.
The state farm leader stressed the importance of farm exports to agriculture. He said one-fourth of farmers' income results from foreign sales,
and that the production of one acre in three of and that the product

He said many people in agriculture still do no realize how much farmers depend upon exports. "If we didn't have this outlet," he said, "our prices for export commodities-assuming curren production. And, a lot of us would be out of business."

Most productive ground water source in the ounty, the report states, is the alluvium aquifer hich cons ists mainly of sand and gravel rrigation wells are reported supplied by the alluvium aquifer, most of them along Jim Ned Creek in the county's southeast quarter, from orthwest of Tuscola to east of Lawn. contairs about 4,400 acre-feet of water in storage the report concludes, and probably could support a small increase in irrigation development. The
alluvium aquifer also furnishes water used for public supply at Tuscola, Buffalo Gap, and
