Merkel needs \$ for activity center roof

It looks as though the Community Action Program is ready to pay for one half of the roof repairs to Merkel's Youth Activity Center, if Merkel is willing to come up with approximately \$700 for the same cause.

That fund has already been started locally and Merkel people need to start sending those donations in care of the Youth Activity Fund at the Farmers and Merchants National Bank.

The money is needed to do approximately \$1400 worth of roof repairs to the youth activity center. The center provides summer time activities for local youngsters and the activities are supervised. In other words, it is the only summer activity facility exclusively for local youth.

The Community Action Program purchased the Youth Activity building in 1973 for \$2400.

Jerry Perez, director of planning and evaluation for the Community Action Program, told the Mail that he did not see any problem getting the CAP board of directors to approve funding for one half of the roof repairs. Mr. Perez also said that it would be a lot easier to push for the \$700 from the federal government if the city had already come up with it's share or had a good start on it. He also said that the board will make a decision on their half of the funding at it's next meeting on June 28th.

The Community Action program is funded by the Community Services Administration in the Housing and Urban Development program. The \$700 would be available from the feds within 30 days after June 28th according to Mr. Perez, which means the roof repairs could be made in early August.

Local citizens are being asked to send checks to the Youth Activity Fund at the F & M Bank. If you are making a cash donation, please be sure to include a note saying who made the donation.

79 wheat crop could be largest

About 24-27 bushels to the acre and somewhere over \$3.05 per bushel and under \$3.24 was the best estimates for the 1979 wheat crop the Mail could find this week and if the weather held Wednesday, the combines should be rolling.

Walter Whisenhunt, manager of the Merkel Henderson Grain Elevator told the Mail Monday that Henderson had contracted for 5,000 acres of wheat and that he agreed with a 24 bushel per acre estimate.

Whisenhunt also said that the rain we have had in the past couple of months hasn't done any harm to the wheat, it has only helped to make it ripen. He said the only thing he was worried about was high wind or hail.

Jack South of the South elevators here said this year's yield will be the best on a wheat crop ever for the Merkel area, although the acreage is down some. South elevators had contracted for 20,000 acres of wheat this season and has already harvested a field five miles north of Merkel and a field south of Trent. Jackie Reynolds, farming a plot north of Merkel was one of the fields already harvested and his crop hit 42 bushels per acre.

South has already collected 5,800 bushels that weighed 63 pounds per bushel. South said that any more rain in the area will do nothing but hurt the yield. South said that most of the wheat had stopped growing and the weeds have started. He also said more rain could lighten the crop and also bleach the wheat. He also said that rain on the taller, heavier headed wheat would beat the tops down.

South said his best estimate of wheat per acre would be somewhere over 30 bushels per acre.

County Extension agent Joe Wilson told the Mail that last year's harvest was about 10,000 acres in Taylor County and that most of those fields only

managed 10-12 bushels per acre. This year he estimates that there are 60,000 Taylor County wheat acres and that the overall average for the county should be close to 25 bushels per acre. He said that Taylor County usually averages about 18 bushels to the acre.

Wilson also told the Mail that more rain would hurt the wheat because most of it is ripe and that we should be right in the middle of the harvest about now.

Congressional comment...

Every political movement since the beginning of time has had the seeds of its own destruction located within - often from the onset. During the sixties and early seventies we became acquainted with such movements as the New Frontier, Great Society, and the social-welfare state. In this period our Country seemed to have unlimited resources. We could conduct a war on poverty at home and a fighting war in Vietnam half way around the world. The government began a policy of intense regulation of the economy and spent billions trying to cure such problems as structural unemployment and poverty. The phenomenon of government expansion was world wide as we began to see the nationalization of many important industries in Western Europe and around the globe.

The idealism of the sixties finally collapsed when it was discovered that government programs did not cure poverty or promote efficiency in the marketplace. Massive amounts of foreign aid did very little to enhance world prosperity and military intervention overseas often did not stabilize pro-Western regimes or make friends for the United States.

Now we are in the process of examining our past errors. The issues people seem most concerned about are too much government spending and regulation, inflation, and our eroding national defense. These concerns are not confined to America but are worldwide. A Conservative government recently won in Great Britain with a pledge to reduce inflation and government spending but at the same time to maintain a strong national defense. A similar situation happened in Canada with the election of the Progressive-Conservative party. The Prime Minister - elect, Joe Clark, ran on a platform of reducing inflation from 9.8 percent to 5 percent, using incentives to increase the economic growth rate, and to use financial incentives, not government regulations, to encourage production and conservation of energy.

Certainly I am pleased that the world is beginning to move ever so slowly toward a more laissez-faire economic system based upon limited government intervention. There are many problems that the government cannot solve and must be lived with. Hopefully we are finally entering a time of reevaluating our own limitations and a realization that most problems are the responsibility of each individual to solve and not for a paternalistic bureaucracy located in a national capital.



There have been many people that have had much influence on our lives along the way that we would like to thank tonight - our teachers who were so patient and sincere to make us realize the importance of learning and to prepare us for the adult world we are about to join; our friends who had the confidence in us; and our parents who were always there with the love and understanding in each and everything we tried to do along the way.

We appreciate all the ideas that each one of you has instilled into our lives, and we hope that as we leave this part of our lives and go our separate ways to different vocations we will carry these things in our hearts and minds and live up to the hopes and expectations you have for us - and we have for ourselves.

This is a time of decision making for each of us. We are concerned with the matter of our future livelihood, future employment, or occupation, career or higher education. We ask ourselves, "What will I do with my life?" Of course, no one can answer this question for us - this question we must answer for ourselves. We know that we are not alone in answering it because we have a multitude of friends, parents, teachers, and ministers whom we can call on for advice and counsel. They cannot give us the answers, but perhaps the guidelines to finding our answers.


