Council approves gas service rate hike, agreement for radios

The Merkel City Council acted Friday to approve Lone Star Gas service rate hikes that will add an estimated \$3,228 to annual revenues of Lone Star

LSG District Manager Martha Harmon told the council that they had not asked for a gas rate hike in two years and that LSG was feeling the same pressures of inflation as everyone else.

She said the rate hikes would help defray the costs of labor, accounting and that the charges would only apply to persons that request service help from the company. She said that was the most fair type of rate increase because it would only be paid for by the people that use the service.

She said if the service charge was denied then service costs would have to be figured into the basic gas rates and that would drive the cost of gas up. She said the changes were the same that the company had requested, and received in Trent,

Buffalo Gap and Lawn. Service charges in effect under the new contract are: A reconnection charge of \$20, up from the old rate of \$5; appliance service set at \$18 per hour, the dd rate was \$13.50; air conditioning service charge of \$20 per hour, up from \$17.50; a returned check charge of \$5, up from 0 and a disconnect and

reconnect yard lines for repair of \$40, up from 0. She said the rate that would apply most here in the

2-a-days begin

Football practice got underway this week for ninth through twelth graders at Merkel High on Monday under the watchful eye of Byron Shelley, who has been temporarily named atheletic director and head football coach.

Shelley replaces David Reves who had been hired by the board of trustees on July 31st, pending his release from a contract with the Hawley ISD. Hawley ISD board then refused to release Reves and Shelley was temporarily hired until board members can hold a vote on Aug. 21 to confirm his appointment as head football coach and atheletic

Coach Shelley told the Mail in a Tuesday interview that around 30 prospective football players showed up for 7 a.m. Monday meeting for the official start of the 1979 season. The Badgers have their first scrimmage on Aug. 24 in Dublin. The freshmen scrimmage will get underway at 6 p.m. with the varsity scrimmage following. Coach Shelley wanted to remind all ninth graders that they are eligible to try out for the varsity team and that they should report at 7 a.m. tomorrow if they would like a shot at making the team.

Shelley had been head football coach at Itasca High School and said that his goal was a district championship in each sport for Merkel High and to establish a good, all around atheletic program here.

Merkel football fans will get a look at a new offensive set as Shelley plans to install the Houston Veer offensive set that calls for misdirection and option type of attack. Shelley said that this offensive set requires the quarterback to be the best athelete on the field and said that he and assistants Doug Guynes and Gary Bartee would be looking at three candidates for the job at quarterback.

Defensively, the Badgers will line up in a split 6 format. Coach Shelley said the Badgers would be learning an all new offensive and defensive allignments but he said there are other schools in the


