## Badgers host Haskell Friday

The Merkel Badgers will play host to Haskell at Badger Stadium Friday night in a controlled scrimmage. The Badger Freshman, Junior Varsity and Varsity teams will be in action.

Merkel opened their season last Friday in Cisco in a controlled scrimmage and Badger head coach Eddie Lang said his varsity found out they needed to work on pass defense, but then again, they had some pretty good instructors as Cisco returns an all-state quarterback and wide receiver. The first varsity team was defeated 3 touchdowns to one and Lang said the Badgers had a couple of good drives killed, one with a fumble on the Cisco 15 and another by a pass interception at the Cisco 20. The second unit was downed by Cisco 2 touchdowns to none.

Badger coach Eddie Lang told the Mail Tuesday he got what he wanted in scrimmages this year. The coach said the Badgers had two easy scrimmages and then ran into Menard in the first game and got a rough lesson in football. Lang scheduled two tough opponents for scrimmages this year hoping to get the Badgers ready.

Lang said he was pleased with the Badgers performance against Cisco and learned they needed to work on pass defense, especially protection against the long pass. He said he was pretty happy with the way the defense played.

The Badgers are installing a new defense this year, running a split 6 but will also use special defenses as situations call for them. The Badgers will again be run-

ning out of the pro set offensively.

Lang said one thing they are working on very hard this year is attitude. He said "Merkel has had the talent to be winners during the past few seasons but a bad attitude has held them back. We don't want anyone out here that does not have a good attitude and we have run a few off that did not have a good attitude."

Lang added the Badgers have been spending most of their time on pass defense and pursuit as well as the offensive passing game. He said he wanted the Badgers to pass a lot more this year than in the past.

Lang said he had not made a definite starting lineup yet, that still some of the players were competing for the starting jobs. The offensive line will include Greg Arwine, Daerald Muniz, Tim Brady, Scott Adair, Jay Gibson, David Benson and Kevin O'Neal would be a defensive lineman. Offensive ends will be Lorne Sloan, Keith Beddingfield, DeWayne Brown, Gary Forehand and maybe Jimmy Don Rogers.

Rogers is competing for the quarterback job with John Womack. Running backs will include Russell Lucas, Mark Turner, John Warkala, Roy Johnson, Jimmy Mendez.

Linebackers will be selected from Scott Adair, Gary Forehand, John Warkala, Tim Brady and Roy Johnson.

The Badger Freshman will scrimmage at 5 p.m. here Friday, followed by the J. V. at 6 and the Varsity between 7 and 7:30.

## City accepts bids for 4 refurbished houses...more

The Merkel City Council accepted bids on the first of approximately 50 homes that will be refurbished under the current Community Development Block Grant at their regular session Monday night at City Hall.

Virgil Hunt Construction's bid of \$18,550 was the low of two bids. The other bid was submitted by Home Insulation of Abilene. Hunt is a local builder. That money will go for the refurbishment of four homes on the North side. The owners of those homes had earlier applied for the grant. The city is also now seeking bids for the refurbishment of four more local homes.

The money, \$250,000 in all will fund the fixing up of 50 homes during a two year period. The four bids accepted Monday night represent the first of those 50 homes. The city currently has 38 applications for homes that need work and more information on how to apply is available at City Hall.

The funds are government grants and do not have to be repaid by the homeowner. Homeowners do have to meet certain criteria before the

grant will be approved.

In other action, council heard a Heritage Hall report from City Manager J. A. Sadler. He said the meals each Tuesday and Thursday are going very well with about 90 meals being served at each session. He also reported that he picked up 900 pounds of government surplus cheese that will be sold for 50 cents for a five pound block to each senior citizen registered in the nutritional program.

Sadler also told council that he, Ray King and Donnie Cloyd of the city staff will help Colorado City install their new water chlorination station. In return, Colorado City workers will come here to install four new pumps at the city water treatment facility.

The council also accepted the paving of the Western Heights Addition West of Avendale Street here.

What that means is the council has inspected the road building and says it does comply with city standards and maintenance of that road will be taken over by the city.

**MORE INDIAN DISTURBANCES**

A friend just from the up-country informs us that the Indians are troublesome again.

A few renegades from many tribes in this neighborhood have had a horse stealing frolic. The scoundrels killed two men in the outskirts of Austin and attacked a teamster between Austin and Bastrop-wagon found in the prairie and driver and horse missing; they also stole 40 horses belonging to the town. Bursleson was on their trail with 160 men two days after the affair and ere this has probably paid them handsomely for their territory. In this instance the positioning the seat of government in Austin has probably saved the lives of 20 families or more.

**HOW TO COOK CUCUMBERS**

We have a recipe to cook cucumbers somewhat after this fashion.

Take the cucumbers, after cutting off the rind, cut them into slices then cut up a few onions with them, pepper and salt them to your liking, and add vinegar to them, and then, open your window and throw them away.

This is the usual way for preparing them for the table, and doubtless the recipe is so worded as to impress the idea of their unhealthiness. But is cooked as below stated, we conceive them not only to be wholesome, but among the most palatable vegetable dishes with which the table can be garnished. Our method is this:

Pare off the rind, then cut the cucumber into slices lengthwise, dust either side of these slices with corn meal or wheat flour, pepper and salt them to please your taste, this done, fry them

The proper name for the people of Texas seems to be a matter of doubt or contrariety: some calling them Texians, while others speak or write Texans, Texonians, Texasians, Texicans. We believe that, both by the Mexican and American residents of the country, the name commonly used is Texians; the Mexicans giving it the guttural sound of the Spanish language, as indicated sometimes by x and sometimes by j, Tghians. The sound is not used in the present mode of speaking the English language, although the Irish use it in the word lough, and Scotch in loch, a lake. The nearest approximation is in such words as Chris.

Texians is, therefore, the correct name of the people of Texas; and besides being short, it is perfectly analogous to the usual mode of forming the proper name of nations by the termination in n; as Greece, Grecians; Persia, Persian. It may also be considered the euphonious abbreviation of Texasian. But Texonian and Texasite are absurd epithets. -New Orleans Bee

## Cotton farmers asked for inputs for 82 Upland Programs

Cotton farmers have a chance to guide their own destiny by offering suggestions for the 1982 Upland Cotton Programs.

Farmer input is needed by Sept. 14 so that the U. S. Department of Agriculture can announce program plans for the coming year around Nov. 1.

"A number of major decisions will be made regarding next year's cotton program, so comments from farmers are vital," said Dr. Carl Anderson, economist in cotton marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. "A major issue is acreage set aside" he added.

Farmer input is needed on the following: mandatory or voluntary acreage reductions, paid land diversions, base loan rate for strict low middling, 1-1 16th inch cotton with a 3.5 to 4.9 mike, 1983 target price and the loan rate for seed cotton. Comments should be mailed to Director, Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, Room 3741-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013.

Anderson noted that the financial implications of a set-aside program are far reaching. "Producing less may well mean that farmers will make more money," he said. "Base cotton acreage would have to be reduced on the range of 25 per cent or more to be effective in reducing surplus cotton."

The cotton market is currently in the doldrums and may remain so another year or so he added. Demand is weak because of the nation's high unemployment and the current deep recession which is straining consumer budgets for needs other than clothing. Mill usage in the U. S. has dropped to the lowest levels since the 1930 depression.

High interest rates have also been the enemy of cotton farmers. They make it expensive for the cotton trade to hold large inventories of raw cotton or manufactured textile goods, so such inventories have been reduced. Consequently, farmers or the government end up holding cotton, which then hangs over the market and holds the price down.

Cotton farmers are also having to put up with an undependable export market and a growing level of imported manufactured textile goods, said the economist.

Exports have suffered because foreign governments are lemprenental in deciding on cotton production and use. Furthermore, the strong U. S. dollar has pushed up the American price in terms of most foreign currencies, so overseas buyers are reluctant to purchase U. S. cotton. At the same time, the strong American dollar has made foreign textiles a good buy to us so that imports are cutting deeply into domestic mill usage, Anderson noted.

"Faced with huge cotton stocks and other circumstances that have weakened demand, cotton farmers need to be wary of the devastating financial effects of a large 1983 cotton crop," Anderson said. "Without a sizeable cutback in the base acreage for 1983, any price improvement this season could result in a big increase in cotton acreage and production next year which would almost certainly push prices well below production costs."

Adverse weather has severely reduced cotton acreage this year so that the crop could be below use levels. Anderson pointed out that could reduce carryover stocks and cause the USDA to decide against an acreage set-aside, which would be a mistake in his opinion.

## Details on Trent reduced lunch prices

Dear Parent or Guardian:  
The Trent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75 cents and breakfast for 50 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown are eligible for either free or reduced price meals priced at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be used by the school. If information is missing, your child will be denied the meal benefits. Call your school if you need help with the form.

**COMPLETE APPLICATION:** For an application to be complete, you must provide: the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or state that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by

more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

**FOSTER CHILDREN:** In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for free or reduced price benefits for them, please tell the school.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who get meal benefits are treated the same way as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application, or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling Roy Neff, P.O. Box 105 Trent or call 862-6125.

Handling the ups and downs of everyday living seems to be easier for some families than others, says Dorothy Taylor, family life education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Service, Texas A & M University System.

What make one family more capable or successful than others?

Taylor says that research studies in the past 10 years have identified several common traits among successful families.

"Members are united; they are all working toward the same goals. The value their family ties and spend more time working and playing together, getting to know each other better," Taylor says.

Additionally, she says, within strong and successful families, there is a respect of individual differences, autonomy, seperateness and independence.

"Individuals are encouraged to develop personal competencies and skills through independent pursuits, rather than the family doing everything together and stifling creativity. In united families, there is a feeling of both togetherness and seperateness," Taylor says.

values that are known to their children. "These values become part of the family's way of life as they are examined."

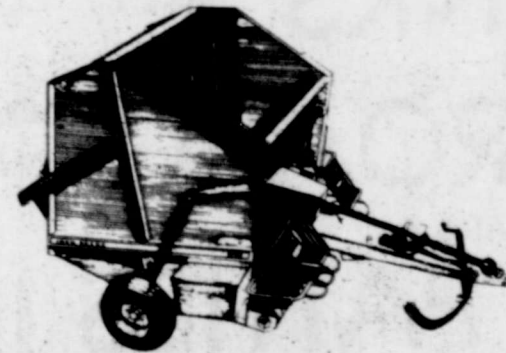
