City manager Barrett informed the board of the resignation of Billy Smith, Assistant Water Utility Director and the current efforts being undertaken to fill that position.

A HUNDRED-YEAR-OLD country home in a small exclusive area of rural New York, about an hour from the city will cost a couple of million. You may have wondered how the Clintons managed to finance their recent purchase in order to establish residence for Mrs. Clinton's up-coming run for the Senate.

Improve Record to 2-1

Mustang fans will remember a former Hart running back named J. J. Finch who challenged Bovina's defense for a couple of years.

Last Friday night, Keith Finch hoped to follow in his older brother's footsteps at Mustang Field when the Hart Longhorns came to Bovina's homecoming. Finch had gained 268 yards and scored 5 touchdowns the previous week.

But when the stadium lights were finally turned out, Finch and the Longhorns had suffered a 34-6 drubbing by the still improving Mustangs.

Finch scored the game's first touchdown on a 20-yard run in the first quarter to put Hart ahead 6-0. Bovina managed a score in the second quarter on Lucas Ramos' 5-yard run and Juan Saucedo's kick. The Mustangs led at halftime 7-6.

Bovina exploded for 27 points in the second half while holding Finch and company scoreless as Coach Charles. Scroggins and staff made several offensive adjustments at halftime.

With four minutes left in the third quarter, Lucas Ramos broke several Longhorn tackles and scored on a 38-yard ramble, Saucedo kicked the extra point and the Mustangs led by 14-6.

yard touchdown. Saucedo's kick failed but the Mustangs led 20-6 and Keith Finch was still going nowhere.

With Ramos and Quintana battling fatigue and cramps, junior reserve running back Carlos Rivera came off the bench to spell Ramos.


In his supporting role, Rivera scored two touchdowns in the last nine minutes of the game, one on a 5-yard run and the other on a fourth down play from the 12-yard line. The backup running back ended the night with 6 carries for 31 yards and 12 points.

Standout Lucas Ramos had 156 yards on 17 carries. Quintana added 89 yards on 18 rushes. The Mustangs outgained the Longhorns 310-141 and held young Finch to 87 yards on 17 carries.

Bovina also had 60 yards passing to end the night with 370 yards of offense, as quarterback Tyson Kerby completed 2 of 4 passes, the longest 48 yards to Cameron


Through 3 games, Bovina has accumulated 686 yards rushing and 195 passing for a total of 881 yards of offense.

The defense has held opponents to 463 yards rushing and 167 passing for a total of 630 yards. The Mustangs defense has forced 10 fumbles and recovered 7 of Josh Quintana stepped in them and given up only 50 games.




CARLOS RIVERA

The junior running back came off the bench to score two touchdowns in the final 9 minutes of the Hart game to give Bovina a 34-6 victory.







New Seat Belt Law **Is Being Enforced**

which took effect September 1, which includes:

•Large trucks (including 18 wheelers), assorted vehicles pulling trailers and school activity buses will now be able to drive the same speed limit as cars on interstates imit as cars on interstates and highways numbered by the federal and state govern-ment--a maximum speed limit of 70 mph day/65 mph night on those roadways. The truck speed limit will remain the same (maximum 60 mph the same (maximum 60 mph day/55 mph night) on farm-to-market (FM) roads and ranch-to-market (RM) roads.

 School buses without commercial vehicle inspection stickers will now have a maximum speed limit of 50 mph. The prior law allowed school buses to travel 55 mph on interstates. School buses with commercial vehicle inspection stickers will now be allowed to travel 60 mph on interstates and state numbered highways.

•The speed limit on beaches has been lowered to 15 mph.

•Although legislation to raise the driving age had been introduced during the session, nothing passed. The standard legal driving age in Texas remains 16.

•The current seat belt law has been broadened to cover all children in a vehicle, no matter where they are seated. That means that all children under 15 must be properly restrained--period. The new law also now and a requires seat belt usage for drugs children under 15 years of have.

•The DWI threshold will drop from 0.10 to 0.08 blood alcohol content. This change in the law also will affect the Administrative License Revocation program, which allows for the civil suspension of driver licenses for those who register a .08 or above, as well as those who refuse a breath test.

•Vehicle inspection fees will increase on September 1, 1999, as follows: safety only inspection--\$12.50; motorcyles--\$12.50; motorcyles--\$12.50; mopeds--\$5.75; new car initial inspection--\$21.75; emission only inspection--\$13.00; safety and emissions inspection--\$25.50.

•Starting January 1, 2000, all gas caps will be pressure-tested during vehicle inspections to make sure caps are not leaking gas fumes into the atmosphere.

•Beginning September 1, new driver licenses, identification cars and renewals will have a writeable surface on the back, so license holders will have the option to fill in a contact number to call in an emergency if law enforcement agencies need to contact next-of-kin. License and I.D. holders already are able to write in where an emergency directive to physician is filed and any allergic reactions to drugs the license holder may







County Line Subdivision Line


