Council allocates absentee ballots

The Merkel City Council allotted absentee voting ballots for the upcoming school-city elections and heard a police report at their regular meeting held at the Merkel Emergency Medical Service building Monday night.

They also met the new city patrolman, Steve McNally, who replaced patrolman Al Turner on the Merkel Police Department.

Council also heard that the

Central Appraisal District will be collecting past due taxes for the city and city manager J. A. Sadler already has an idea on where to spend some of that money—street repairs.

The city has about \$13,000 in delinquent taxes from the 1983 tax year and the CAO will collect taxes for a 20 per cent fee. The city could recover that 20 per cent

by adding the collection fee to the delinquent bill.

The council also heard the police report from Chief Ray Pack. Pack said his department worked 104 total cases in February.

Council also said local citizens could help with the much-discussed problem of stray dogs in town. The city does offer a \$4 bounty on adult dogs if they are taken to the Merkel Veterinary Clinic.

Some 'freebies' aren't free

Whether or not you have your eye-brow trimmed may be more important than you think. Until about three years ago I refused to have my eye-brows trimmed. After each haircut my friendly barber, Mr. Vincent Barnett, would make a move to trim my eye-brows and I would shake my head. No. About two years ago I made a major decision and decided to have the brows trimmed since it was free.

For as long as I can remember I have been treating some place on my face for skin cancer. About two years ago I went back to my Doctor in Abilene for a checkup on a small recent surgery and treatment. He pronounced that area healed but looked again at a brown spot in my right eye-brow. I told him not to worry about it that it had been there for years and that he had examined it and told me not to worry about it. He insisted that it looked different and made an appointment for me to see a Specialist down the street. I was certain there had been no change but I went with my Doctor's advice.

After a few minutes in the Specialist's surroundings I became suspicious. One nurse gave me a full page questionnaire and then another nurse took me to this small room. In a few minutes another nurse came in and told me to wait where I was until the Specialist came in. Three nurses for one little brown spot was a little over production. The Specialist was very nice and informed me that I had a very interesting brown spot. He said he would like to take a picture of it if I had no objection. I had never thought my brown spot would become a celebrity, but I gave my permission.

The Specialist went through the process of recording the exact measurements of the brown spot and also taking a little piece of me to have it analyzed. The cost for the three nurses-the picture taking, and the sample to be analyzed cost me forty dollars. It was the second and last visit where I got my education. The measurement of the brown spot was the same so it was not growing. The sample they tested proved negative and another twenty dollars. The Specialist set up another appointment so I could tell him whether or not I wanted to have the brown spot removed surgically. He said it wasn't necessary but it would make me look better. When he told me how much it would cost I told me how much it would cost I told him I thought I looked well enough.

It was on the way home that I came to several conclusions. First, I decided I was paying for the education of the Specialist as he studied brown spots. Second, I

realized all of a sudden what had caused the problem with the brown spot in the first place. When my barber trimmed my eye-brow that made the brown spot more conspicuous and caused the Doctor's alarm. I didn't go back to the

Specialist again because that eye-brow trim had already cost me seventy five dollars.

A lot of things you may think are free may cost you more than you realize.

Tax rebates way down for January

Sluggish retail sales here in January were reflected in the latest check for sales tax rebates here.

Merkel's check of \$3,783.97 was \$1,450 less than the rebate check for the same period last year. So far, Merkel's rebates are still

running ahead, barely, of last year's pace.

So far this year, retail sales here have been responsible for \$16,329 in rebates.

Trent's rebates are off 43 percent this year and Tye is running 2.28 per cent behind last year's

pace. The state four per cent sales tax is collected along with a one per cent local option sales tax and the one per cent is rebated by the State Comptroller's office to the city where it was collected.

8th Grade Boys

Calmness in emergencies stressed

In a quiet neighborhood, a small child slips into the bottom of a wading pool in a back yard.

Smoke is coming from the house next door, a small child is heard crying.

The car in front of you fails to stop and is hit by another car, the driver has hit the windshield and is unconscious.

A transport truck overturns in front of your home and fuel is spilled on your street.

Your neighbor is bitten by a wasp and his face is swelling rapidly.

In each of the emergencies above, what you do in the first few seconds could be the difference between life or death. Serious injury could be prevented in each of these emergencies, you are the one who must do something and do it quickly.

What do you do?
In many cases of injury or illness, prompt and correct action on the part of the first person to see the victim can be life saving.

But, prompt action goes beyond just calling for a doctor or ambulance or fire department.

The child at the bottom of the pool must breathe within 4 to 6 minutes. **What should you do?**

The driver of the car may not be breathing and could be bleeding severely. **What should you do?**

The child heard crying in the smoke filled house could die without some help. **What should you do?**

The fuel from the overturned truck may ignite if fumes go into your house or someone elses home. **What should you do?**

The neighbor could be unconscious and not breathing in a short period of time. **What should you do? The most important thing you can do is stay calm.**

Don't scream, don't run, don't faint, don't panic, just be calm!

Being calm is not easy, but it will help you do what must be done in an emergency. A way to achieve being calm is to take a couple of deep breaths and think. Think... what should I do, call for help and then go to the

emergency. Tell someone else to call for help and you go to the emergency. Tell someone else to go to the patient and you call.

Being calm will give your common sense a chance to react. Common sense is necessary in an emergency. Common sense will guide you to do what is important for the victim and yourself.

If you hear a cry for help, take a couple of deep breaths and get involved in helping care for the victims in an emergency.

The best ambulance, fire department, police department, doctor or emergency department function best when they use common sense and are calm. They use the common sense and their training in whatever area to assist the victim. They practice being calm everyday. You should practice being calm everyday.

To practice being calm, all you do is if something goes wrong at home, at work, at play, just be calm and take a couple of deep breaths and think about what you should do. You will be surprised at what a difference it will make.
