Medic Alert members also carry a wallet identification card that contains additional personal medical information. This card is reissued annually



Acute mycardial Instarction (Heart Attack) is the leading cause of death in the United States today, accounting for more than half a million deaths per year; of these deaths, more than half occur before medical help arrives. During the first 2 or 3 hours after the onset of symptoms. Ninety per cent of the deaths from a heart attack are due to electricity disruption of the heart. That can be prevented or treated. Most deaths from heart attacks are preventable. The ambulance must be called and called early if we are to help. The following are signs or guidelines to use when deciding to call for an ambulance on a possible heart attack:
