2nd bond vote possible here

Merkel ISD board members following the defeat of MISDs could sit here and kind of force the

bond package last month. Board members also decided to hire two coaches at mid-term and then to hire an additional full time coach at the start of the next

In another coaching change, the board decided to replace Merkel Middle School principal Eddie Lang as track coach in the 1985-86 season. Lang told the board "I'll be honest with you, I'd like to keep the track team because next year's team will be will strong. I have coached track here for four vears and we were 3rd, 2nd and have won the district two years in a row. But, I can handle this." The board said they wanted Lang to devote full time to his post at Merkel Middle school.

Concerning the future of a bond issue here, board member Greg Henderson spoke up first. He said "I don't think we can afford to give up on a building program. We need to come back with another plan, maybe take a knife to the original plan and present that before the voters."

The board's consensus was that people here voted against the first bond issue because of the 33 per cent increase in taxes.

Board member Earl Laird said

In other actions, the board heard the annual audit report from Condley and Company and that report was very favorable to the accounting of MISD's funds. The accountants also said the board had reached its goal or having three months operating money in reserve. The report also indicates a problem with past due taxes. The report said MISD is cwed \$622,000 in delinquent taxes with \$430,000 of that figure being past due in the last two years alone.

The board payed \$165,973.14 in current bills and made a couple of adjustments to the annual budget.

The school enrollment continues to climb as 1,427 were reported enrolled as of Monday.

In another policy change, the board decided to end the forced tutorial session for students who make failing grades on six week report cards. Last six weeks, 80 per cent of the students that failed,

failed again after the tutoring and High School principal Larry Curry said he did not want to continue a program that was not working.

Thanksgiving comes to us at New WTU rates in effect here

Utility Commission of Texas.

The Commission earlier had approved a settlement agreement reached by WTU, the intervening cities and the PUC staff. The agreement gives WTU an annual base rate increase of about \$12.4 million and a fuel charge decrease of about \$13.3 million. This would result in a net decrease in revenue for WTU, to allow for an expected decline cost of boiler fuel during the coming year.

New WTU rates went into effect winter-summer differential, will Friday by order of the Public raise average residential rates by about 4.2 per cent. The rates will be slightly lower than current rates during the November-April period, but higher during the rest of the year.
