Aggie Journalism Is On Death Row!

This week's column is about journalism.

Freedom of the press is basic in America. It is granted in the constitution. Without freedom of the press, whether you like the press or not, you might as well be living in Iraq or North Korea.

Or any other country that prohibits and restricts freedom of its citizens. Journalists write stories and report news. Sometimes good news, often bad news. Either way, Americans can be as informed as they want to be, a freedom denied to many around the world.

How important is a journalism department at a college? Not nearly as important as the football program. Or the medical department. Or engineering.

Journalists, i.e. newspaper people, provide a historical record for future generations. They keep public "journals" of current events. A weekly newspaper like ours is a journal of local events and history of people and places in the area.

Often, former residents or relatives come in and search through past issues of the paper. As people get older, their history gets more important to them. You will feel the same way someday.

We are making some changes here to report more local events to more county residents. Weekly and daily newspapers should change as the world changes. It is not difficult. It just takes dedication.

I bring this up because a major Texas educational institution, Texas A&M, has proposed doing away with its journalism department. Some enterprising pundits might be able to make up a few jokes about Aggie journalists.

A recent editorial in the Bryan-College Station Eagle addressed A&M's intentions to drop journalism from the university program. I'll

Eagle's points.

Charles Johnson, dean of the College of Liberal Arts, of which the A&M journalism department is a part, wants to kill the department after the students currently enrolled graduate. The decision still has to be ratified by the A&M Board of Regents, where the fight to keep journalism alive at A&M will be difficult.

The Eagle says that the journalism department for many years has suffered from institutional neglect. Insufficient funding from the university made it difficult to attract an outstanding department head.

Infighting among the few faculty who remain has not helped the situation. Nor has the university's efforts to enroll students in the program who have no business being there and have no real interest in journalism helped.

The Eagle editorial concludes: It is a shame that a school that is rightly proud of the government and business leaders it trains isn't equally proud of the journalists it trains to report on the doings of those leaders. Rather than kill the department of journalism, A&M should reinvest in the program, doing as much to recruit a qualified department head as it does to find a football coach or basketball coach or the heads of other departments and then giving that person the resources needed to turn department around.

I don't know if A&M needs the journalism department. Aspiring journalism students could probably find another university with a good journalism program.

Naming a ship is serious business. The name the ship carries will be recorded in the annals of our proud naval history. Names like the Constellation, Abraham Lincoln, Kitty Hawk or Enterprise ring with the valor of their crews who defend our freedom wherever it is threatened. 
I am honored to sponsor the ship that bears the proud name of San Antonio. Taller than the Tower of the Americas and able to carry up to 800 troops, the ship is the first of a projected 12 new amphibious assault ships in this new class. The succeeding 11 ships will be named for other cities, but they will all be known as part of the "San Antonio class." Its war fighting capabilities include a state-of-the-art command and control suite, substantially increased vehicle lift capacity, and a large flight deck.

The primary task of the USS San Antonio, which will be commissioned in 2005, is to ferry troops and weapons on short notice. It can carry five V-22 Ospreys on the upper deck and Landing Craft Air Cushion vessels carrying tanks and armored trucks on the lower deck.

Navy officials bill the San Antonio as a pioneer in force protection. Its cutting-edge Shipboard Wide Area Network, SWAN, identifies and analyzes threats, then orders a weapons system on the ship — or another U.S. vessel to fire on the target. It is also the Navy's first stealth ship, using fewer angles from protruding pieces of steel and high-tech twin masts to reduce its radar signature.

The christening culminated when I shattered a bottle of Cap*Rock sparkling Texas wine across the new ship's bow, a time-honored Naval tradition. Whatever adventures lie ahead for the USS San Antonio and its crews, we know they will serve with the same distinction that their forbearers did in the city for which the ship is forever named. With the spirit of the Alamo and the name of a great Texas city, the USS San Antonio will be prepared to sail into harms way when it sets course to defend our freedoms.

PUBLIC NOTICE August 7, 2003

Crosstex Energy Services operates approximately 3.5 miles of natural gas pipeline near

Friona, Texas. The pipeline safety program includes:

1. Daily surveillance by experienced operator in the field; 2. Cathodic protection against corrosion;

3. Periodic ground patrols for detailed inspection of the pipeline environment;

4. Continuous monitoring of the gas flowing through the pipeline.

This notice was prepared so that you can identify our pipeline and know how to recognize and respond to a pipeline emergency.

HOW DO YOU KNOW WHERE A PIPELINE IS LOCATED?

Since pipelines are buried underground, line markers are used to show their approximate location at numerous points along their routes. These markers list the commodity transported, the name of the operator, and a telephone number where the operator's representative can be reached.

Although helpful, markers are limited in the information which they provide. They are placed near the pipeline, but not necessarily on top of them, and a pipeline may not follow a straight route between two markers. Also, markers provide no information about the depth of the pipeline. Therefore, it is very important that you place a phone call to the number on the marker before digging in the area of the pipeline.

If you are planning to dig near our pipeline, please notify us in advance by calling toll free at (866)394-9839 or by calling collect at (361)299-4000. A company representative will meet with you and provide detailed marking to show the pipeline location, route and depth. You should also provide advance notice of any planned digging to the Texas Excavation Safety System at (800)344-8377 which will notify all pipeline operators in the area who have registered their pipelines with the service.

HOW CAN YOU RECOGNIZE A PIPELINE LEAK?

Signs of a leak include:

1. A hissing or roaring sound;

2. Any strange or unusual odor in the area of the pipeline;

3. A dense white cloud or fog;

4. Frost or ice on the ground;

5. A spot of dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green area;

6. Flames occurring if the leak has ignited.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO IF YOU SUSPECT A LEAK?

If you know or suspect that a pipeline is leaking or damaged, leave the area immediately. Your personal safety should be your first concern. Also:

1. Avoid driving into vapor clouds;

2. Avoid creating sparks or sources of heat which might ignite the escaping gas;

3. Immediately notify the pipeline operator giving your name and a description of the leak and its location. If the pipeline operator is not known, call your local fire or police department. Advise them of the location and nature of the emergency.

Technical factors drove the cotton market lower on the New York Cotton Exchange this week in volatile trading. Most market attention was focused on funds and other speculators as USDA's weekly export sales report and mill use data released by the U.S. Census Bureau failed to provide any surprises.

As expected, a tremendous amount of shipments were concluded in the week ended July 24 as mills rushed to take advantage of the high Step 2 payment rate before the current marketing year ends. According to Cotton Outlook, the total of 338,500 bales of U.S. upland cotton shipped during the week was the fifth largest of the 2002-03 season and marked an unprecedented seventh time that weekly exports of upland cotton have exceeded 300,000 bales in a single marketing year. More importantly, however, the week's turnover pushed total shipments beyond USDA's forecast for the season with one more week remaining.

Sales for the week were termed "mediocre" by the trade as only 58,700 bales were sold, 61 percent below the previous week and a 42 percent drop from the four-week average. Net sales of 104,600 bales were made for delivery in the 2003-04 marketing year that begins Aug. 1

Cotton PCG

U.S. cotton could slow as the acceleration in shipping cotton abroad due to the high Step 2 payment may lead to a short-term glut of U.S. cotton overseas. In addition, observers noted that foreign buyers still have to get used to the transition to the new and higher

cotton prices. Activity improved on the spot cotton scene as online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers increased in the five trading days ending July 31. A healthy 8,297 bales were sold compared to the previous week when 1,520 bales changed hands. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 48.37 to 54.06 cents per pound versus the previous week's 48.28 to 52.48 cents per pound range.

In other news, the National Cotton Council annualized U.S. textile mill cotton use at 6.56 million bales based on data gathered by the U.S. Census Bureau for the month of June. The figure was down sharply from the 7.94 million bales reported in June 2002 and lower than the 6.76 million bale estimate for May of this year. Although not friendly, the figures were not as bad as most analysts feared.

"The report simply confirms that U.S. mill use is weak and probably will get weaker," an analyst commented. "All One trader said that sales of new crop interest has to be focused on exports for

the consumption of the U.S. crop."

That export interest remains largely focused on China. The All-China Fedcration of Supply and Market Cooperation, on behalf of the government, said that China's cotton inventories are expected to shrink to 7.9 million bales in September, the lowest level in five years, because of declining output and increasing domestic demand. Therefore, China's cotton imports are expected to be much higher this year because of the anticipated rise in demand.

Meanwhile, The National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) reported the condition of the U.S. cotton crop was unchanged on balance during the week ended July 27 compared to one week earlier. NASS rated 55 percent of the crop "good to excellent" which also was equal to the rating one year ago. The Far West made a good advance, but with the exception of Tennessee, the Memphis Territory deteriorated. Texas also suffered a modest downturn.

Additionally, squaring rates reached 89 percent across the Cotton Belt, compared with 93 percent one year earlier and the five-year average of 94 percent. Boll setting was reported on 54 percent of the crop versus 70 percent a year ago and the five-year average of 72 percent.

Texas A&M Agriculture Field Day August 26

Texas A&M University System Agriculture Program will present a Sorghum/Sudan Grazing and Forage & Sorghum Silage Field Day on Tuesday, August 26, 2003 from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The field day will be held

at Bush Farm which is part the Texas A&M Agriculture Research Field Laboratory, near Bushland, located 1.5 miles north of Bushland, (turn east on Jim Line Rd. and go 0.5 miles).

Speakers will include Dr. Wayne Greene, Professor of Beef Cattle Nutrition, Texas Agriculture Experiment Station; Dr. Ted McCollum, Professor of Beef Cattle Nutrition, Texas Cooperative Extension; and Dr. Brent Bean, Professor of Agronomy, Texas Cooperative Extension and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Since 1999 research has been conducted on grazing various types of sorghumsudangrass hybrids including new brown midrib and photoperiod sensitive hybrids. Stocker cattle gains have consistently been above 2.25 lb/day. Some of the topics discussed at the field day will include: stocking rate; number of head days per acre; gain per acre; brown midrib vs. conventional hybrids; rotational paddock grazing; mineral supplements; and avoiding nitrate and prussic acid.

Forage sorghum silage trials have been conducted since 2000. This year's trial includes over 90 hybrids. Most of these hybrids can be used for hay or silage. Many are high grain producers while others produce little grain. Field day participants will have the opportunity to view all of the hybrids. A few of the topics discussed will include: hybrids to grow for tonnage; hybrids to grow for quality; comparisons to corn; water use efficiency based on yield and quality; and managing for hay and silage.





Briefings were held with staff members from the offices of Senators Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn. The group also met with Senate and House Agriculture Committee staff members and sat down with 17th District Representative Charles Stenholm of Stamford and newly elected 19th District

Representative Randy Neugebauer of Lubbock.

Policy areas discussed by the group included the latest developments on trade, agriculture, and energy.

Verett noted that the Chamber trip proved to be a timely one and provided a perfect opportunity to discuss a number of important issues pertaining to agriculture that are expected to be taken up after the Congress returns from the August recess.

Verett reported that during the trip he had been able to discuss issues such as the need for a 2003 crop disaster program; the devastating effects recent U.S. trade pacts have had on cotton, especially the severe impact it has had on the U.S. textile industry; Agricultural Appropriations legislation and the importance of defending the mechanisms of the 2002 Farm Bill and allowing them to function as designed; and, implementation issues for conservation programs.

01/02 Crop Disaster Sign-up Moving Ahead

LUBBOCK, August 1, 2003 By Shawn Wade Signing up for the 2001-2002 Crop Disaster Program has been a challenging process for many growers, but not for the reasons many might expect.

Yes, the program is complicated, but most information is already in the computer and accessible to the folks at the Farm

In fact, one of the more challenging aspects of the process has just been getting into the office to complete the application. Fortunately, the overlapping priorities have been juggled quite nicely by FSA employees and the process continues to move

forward. One aspect of the program that producers do not need to worry about right now is whether or not they will run out of time to sign-up for the program before they can get down to the FSA office. Officially, the 2001-2002 CDP sign-up window ends August 25, 2003 and leaves plenty of time for setting appointments and getting to the FSA office. Due to the number of applications that some counties must handle, some offices are already scheduling CDP appointments for after the August 25

It is important to note that the regulations governing the program DO provide for an extension of the sign-up period. The rules allow the FSA Deputy Administrator the discretion to set a later date as necessary.

It also provides growers who did not qualify for benefits for the crop loss portion of the program, time to study whether

they can qualify for assistance based on reduced crop quality.

The 2001-2002 Quality Loss program will be figured on a bale-by-bale basis comparing the average quality of each bale to an average quality for the county. A 20 percent decrease in the average loan value of a bale compared to the county average will trigger a payment under this section.

Texas Cooperative Extension Risk Management Specialist

Jay Yates has prepared a short summary of the Quality loss program to help producers make this determination. It is important to note that producers who only suffered quality losses will have to contact FSA in order to determine

Here are answers to questions you may have about applying:

1. Who can get free or reduced-price meals? Children in households receiving Food Stamps or TANF can get free meals regardless of household income. Also, if your household income is within the limits on the Federal Income Chart, your children can receive free or reduced-price meals.

2. Will my information be checked? Yes. We may ask you to send written proof of the information you give.

3. What if I stop receiving Food Stamps or TANF? If your children qualify because you listed a Food Stamp or TANF case number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive Food Stamps or TANF.

4. What if my household size or income changes? If your children qualify for free or reduced-price meals based on your income, you must tell us if your household size goes down or if your income goes up by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year). Call us at 250-3353. You do not have to fill out another application.

5. If I don't qualify now, may I apply again later? Yes. You may apply at any time during the school year if your household size goes up, income goes down, or if you start receiving Food Stamps or TANF. If you lose your job, your children may be able to receive free or reduced-price meals during the time you are unemployed.

6. What if I disagree with the school's decision about my application? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: JIM PARKER, SUPERINTENDENT, FRIONA ISD, 250-2747.



Hispanics Seek Free Enterprise Opportunity BY THE HONORABLE HECTOR V. BARRETO

A few weeks ago, the Census Bureau announced that Hispanics are now the largest minority group in America, totaling 13 percent of the population, 38.8 million strong.

A recent survey of Latinos in the U.S. by the Pew Hispanic Center of the Kaiser Family Foundation sought to help answer some of the difficult questions that have been on the minds of many been on the minds of many Americans since the new Census numbers were released: Do Hispanics want to be part of the melting pot? Are they willing to learn English and assimilate to American culture? Or are they and their children happier to stay separate from the American mainstream, divided by culture, customs, and language?

The survey found that the answer is: "Both, to some

As the son of Mexican immigrants, this finding rings very true for me.
To Hispanics, assimilation

versus preservation of traditions and culture is not an either or proposition. The Pew survey, for example, found that while most Hispanics speak Spanish or are bilingual, they feel very strongly that they must learn English in order to be successful in the United

The Pew survey also found that while Hispanics see the United States as offering more education and employment opportunities for their children than their family's native countries, they are also worried about the moral values and the strength of family ties here in this country. For people with a strong faith and love of family this is the less positive side of the U.S., but Hispanics are confident that they can maintain and pass on their cultural values even as they assimilate to this country.

This dual-desire to assimilate while also maintaining cultural identity, priorities and pride is not dissimilar from other groups who came here as immigrants. From the Scottish family whose 5thgeneration-American men wear a kilt on their wedding day, to the Chinese-American family who celebrates Chinese New Year, maintaining cultural traditions while assimilating is what has made this country such an incredible, diverse place.

And like virtually all of the other groups who have come here, Hispanics come to the U.S.A. primarily seeking the opportunity that only comes with the kind of freedom, the kind of free market that we have here in this country.

The growth of Hispanicowned small businesses is strong evidence of this thirst for opportunity, and an entrepreneurial spirit that has helped so many precious generations of immigrants to become major contributors to

the U.S. economy. Over 1.2 million of America's small businesses are owned by Hispanics...and the number of Hispanic-owned firms is growing at a rate of about 30 percent. That's twice the rate of all other firms. In an economy where small businesses create threequarters of the net new jobs, this rate of increase is extremely significant.

Calvary Baptist Church You have heard it said, usually in a derogative descriptive way, "Oh, she lives in her own little world." But the truth is we all live in our own inner world.

The inner world is the abiding place of our thoughts, feelings and beliefs. These are what shape us and makes us what we are. They determine our behavior.

The good news is that we can change our thoughts, feelings and beliefs, and if we choose to change them we can change our lives. The purpose of religion is to help us choose and incorporate the best thoughts, feelings and beliefs about God, ourselves, others, the world and life. To fill one's inner world with ruling thoughts, feelings, and beliefs of positive, creative, upbuilding value is to help make a better world for us to live in and create a better grasp or coping ability upon reality and life for ourselves.

John 1:12 teaches that all who receive Christ are given the power to become children of God. 2 Corinthians 5:17 states that to be in Christ is to be made a new creation. But how does this work? What is the practical method by which these spiritual claims come to pass?

In this way only. Receiving Christ is receiving his way of living and lovingly serving our fellow man. Doing this involves choosing Christ's type of thoughts, feelings and beliefs to rule our inner world. These give us a new viewpoint on life, our acceptance by the Eternal, others and ourselves. Living and working in this new point of view is the new creation. It opens up a new world for us.

Perhaps you have always thought of the outer world as the "real world" and that happiness depends upon changing things in the outer world. To be sure, there is an outer, physical world but one's inner world is the more potentially powerful world.

"Happiness is an inside job," said John Marks Templeton. A strong inner world helps us cope with and shape our outer world into a place of greater peace and happiness for us. Without inner strength the circumstances of the outer world shall tend to inhibit or destroy us instead of us creatively interacting with it.

No one can develop the positive strength of their inner world in a social, historical, intellectual vacuum. There must be causes and stimulators. Even Jesus had a role model that he looked at to shape his behavior and attitude in fulfilling his mission. He had to grow in wisdom (Luke 2:52) and he had to decide what kind of anointed servant of God he would be (Matthew 4:1-11).

He looked to the unknown

prophet of the second portion of Isaiah (chapters 40-66) as his model of mission and service (Luke 4:17-18). He focused on the message and concepts of Second Isaiah and became our Servant Leader and Savior.

But what if he had built his internal reality by focusing on his Jewish culture's narrow, nationalistic, prejudiced, militant, political image of the Messiah? There would be no positive impact of Christianity.

But he built his inner world around the Suffering Servant image (Isaiah 53) of God's servant and his inner world created a new world that is still a borning.

In smaller ways we too can create new worlds for ourselves and those we love by building and improving our own inner world with a better viewpoint to live by.

Amendment election set

The election to determine whether 22 proposed Constitutional Amendments become law in Texas is scheduled for September 13. Among the proposed amendments is a provision that would allow Texas homeowners to utilize Home Equity Lines of Credit (HELOC).

A HELOC is essentially a credit account based on a homeowner's equity. The Comptroller's Office estimates that homeowners could save as much as \$741 million annually on interest charges and federal income tax deductions if HELOCs are authorized by Texas


