Leaf rust attacking Texas wheat crop

took a big bite out of the 1985 Texas wheat crop, appears all set to strike again.

Spores which lead to the disease infection have been found in increasing numbers in central areas of the state in recent weeks, say officials with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service who are monitoring the situation.

"This winter's mild weather plus the fact that the disease was severe last year increases the potential for another major outbreak this year," points out Dr. Wendell Horne, Extension Service plant pathologist.

Horne says that the warmer weather has wheat progressing rapidly and that the crop is reaching the critical stage for control measures in some areas of

the state. "Since the cost of a fungicide application to control leaf rust is quite expensive, a farmer must be sure to treat his crop at the right time," Horne emphasizes. "Past experience has shown that a fungicide is most effective when applied just as the flag leaf is ture.

Leaf rust, a fungal disease that starting to emerge. This is the last leaf formed before the grain head is exerted.'

Horne also emphasizes that only fields with a good yield potential should be treated to be costeffective. "The greatest benefit is likely to result when the yield potential is 40 bushels or more per acre," he points out. "If two applications are anticipated, the yield potential should be in the range of 60 bushels per acre. Second applications should follow the first by 10 to 14 days.'

The plant pathologist advises farmers to use 3 to 5 gallons of water per acre to insure good coverage when applying the fungicide by air.

County Extension agents can help farmers monitor the situation to determine if control measures should be taken against leaf rust disease, notes Horne. If the disease is present, then a farmer needs to take a close look at his situation to determine if there are any factors that might limit the crop's' potential, such as stand, fertility level and available mois-





Texas blacklands from Buffalo Bayou to the Red River, where it met up with the Missouri, Kansas, and Texas Railroad linking the Lone Star state with the Midwest in 1873. The next year St. Louis made a rail connection with Texarkana, and then, via the Texas and Pacific, with Dallas. In the following decade railroad companies built over 6,000 miles of track in Texas. The lines now stretched from the Sabine River to El Paso and from the Panhandle to the Rio Grande.

Initially, the postwar railroad development resulted in a large overland movement of the crop to Eastern markets. Ellis explains, diverting the trade from Galveston and other Gulf ports. But by 1900, most of the Texas cotton crop left from Galveston, the largest cotton shipping point in the world at the time. The building of the six-mile twin jetties from the island out into the Gulf provided the port of Galveston with deep water, enabling the harbor to accommodate the largest steamers. The Texas crop that year, valued at more than \$177 million, represented one quarter of the total American cotton production.



Tips on dealing with financial crunch

Rising unemployment rates mean more Texas families are facing a financial crisis.

'This can be a frustrating and stressful situation, but improved money management skills can help families survive these rough times," says home economist Mary Clayton Nance.

She points out that families must give high priority to paying fixed expenses such as rent or mortgage payments, insurance premiums, car payments and installment debt from the income they have available.

That leaves food, utilities, clothing, household operations and othr flexible expenses to be cut.

Nance, a resource management University Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), says the following can produce the greatest savings of flexible family expens-

Reduce food costs by carefully planning meals and snacks for each day for a week ahead. Plan low cost protein foods such as dry beans, eggs, peanut butter, turkey and chicken, hamburger or liver. Stretch meat in casseroles and other combination dishes

Reduce utility bills by raising These are especially good options entertainment costs. Make use of lower cooling costs. If you have a portable fan, use it in place of air conditioning when possible or along with the air conditioner to make the higher temperatures feel more comfortable.

Consider selling a second car or recreational vehicle. This will save money on gas, insurance and upkeep. However, think carefully about your future transportation needs before selling, since you may need a second car for transportation to a new job.

Reduce child care costs by arranging the family's schedule so that an unemployed parent can take care of the children while the specialist with the Texas A&M other parent works. If both parents are unemployed, alternate child care duties so each will have an opportunity to look for a job or have some personal time. An unemployed single parent may try to share child care with a relative, neighbor or friend.

Repair or remodel clothing you already have and swap items of clothing with other family members or friends. Investigate local resale shops and garage sales to find good buys on used clothing.
