Hart said the city is owed about \$54,000 in bad debts to the water-sewer-sanitation fund. That does not include almost \$10,000 that was written off this

Council also passed a parking ordinance covering trailers and semi-trucks on city streets.

The new ordinance makes it illegal to park a truck or trailer in the city limits that would cause a safety hazard or emit too much noise or odors. Failure to comply with the ordinance could cost up to \$200 in fines.

Council also learned that the city is in the running for \$179,143 in statewide funds for housing rehabilitation. City manager J. A. Sadler will hand deliver the city's ammended application in Austin today. The program is similar to a program funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, that funded rehabilitation on more that 50 homes here. Under the HUD program, only houses within a "target area" were eligible for the rehabilitation. In the state program, any home within the city limits would be eligible, providing the owner could meet income guidelines. The city had applied for more than \$200,000 for the program but received preliminary funding at the \$179,143 level. That would pay for the rehabilitation of 26 local homes. The final decision on the appropriations will be made Thursday in Austin.

Tye also received preliminary funding for improvements to their water-sewer system.

Sadler told council that the rehabilitation program would probably have different guidelines on eligibility but said the requirements would be made known

Merkel Ambulance Association president Vernon Wade asked for and received permission to lower rates charged by the Merkel Emergency Medical Service.

Wade also asked that the city stop accepting assignments on Medi-Care insurance.

The ambulance service has always had problems collecting its charges on ambulance runs made by the volunteer service. The old base rate for a trip to Abilene was \$180 plus supplies used during the trip. The new rate will be \$100. Also, the ambulance group will start paying for its own gas, oil, supplies and vehicle maintenance. The city had previously paid for those items with federal revenue sharings funds and funds provided by the county. Wade estimated the association would be spending an additional \$500 to \$600 per month for the increased costs. Wade also said the association was going to start a savings account to purchase a new ambulance. The major income for the association

are Bingo games. Wade said the association could probably increase collections by no longer accepting assignments on Medi-Care. The way Medi-Care pays is based on averages in certain regions for services. If the city accepts assignment on a ambulance bill, it must accept whatever amount Medi-Care decides to pay on that bill, regardless of the charge. Wade told council "What we are saying is people will now be responsible for their bills and we think we will increase our chances of getting that bill paid."



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

what parent-child relationships exist between the child and any other persons, and that all such parent-child relationships be terminated. This petition is filed before the birth of the child the subject of this suit and after the first trimester of the mothers

pregnancy.

The Court has authority in this suit to enter any judgment or decree in the child's interest which will be binding upon you, including the termination of the parent-child relationship and the appointment of a conservator with authority to consent to the child's adoption.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this writ shall promptly serve the same according to requirements of law, and the mandates hereof, and make due return as the law dir-

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

There was a time, back when men were men, and women were slaves, that ladies could hang out the laundry, then walk over to the fence to visit with the woman on the other side.

The electric dryer and sexual equality ended that. Peek over a neighbor's fence today, the police will show up at your front door within minutes.

Men used to borrow tools from each other and spend time visiting in the garage. Then tools got expensive. Now garages are locked tight with signs pasted on the window warning of burglar alarm

There are still a few coffee shops around. But Burger Kings and the like are taking over. All you do is tell a speaker what you want, then drive up to the window.

"Here's your change, sir," isn't the cure all for America's loneliness, though.

Today some people can go for months without breathing fresh air. Sliding windows are still installed as a matter of tradition, but nobody uses them. Refrigerated air is expensive, and nobody wants to air-condition a neighborhood of strang-




