## Lubbock man injured in fall southwest of Post

Post rescue squads responded to a 9-1-1 call Saturday afternoon after a motorcyclist ran off a cliff at the Macy Ranch 12 miles southwest of Post.

David Cadd, 30, of Lubbock was injured at about noon Saturday, February 27 after falling off the motorcycle he was riding and tumbling approximately 55 feet off a ledge. The motorcycle also fell over the ledge, coming to rest on top of Cadd.

According to Post Volunteer fire chief Delbert Rudd, the accident occurred when Cadd and other members of his group were riding the motorcycles on the Macy Ranch. Apparently Cadd was following another rider whose bike had stalled just over a hill out of Cadd's vision. When Cadd crested the hill, he swerved to avoid the other bike, lost control and tumbled down the embankment.

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## Grass fire burns for nine hours near Southland

Fire scorched approximately 2,000 acres of CRP grass and pasture along the caprock as Post volunteer fire fighters spent the better part of nine hours last Thursday fighting a wind driven fire two miles east of Southland. They were called to the fire at 12:20 in the afternoon and fought the flames until well past dark before extinguishing the blaze.

Swirling and changing winds hampered fire fighters efforts to control the fire. According to fire chief Delbert Rudd, the wind changed directions several times before the fire was put out at almost 9 in the evening.

"About every time we got it headed off the wind swapped directions," said

## "Opal's Million Dollar Duck" the genuine thing

As Opal Kronkie would say, "Opal's Million Dollar Duck" is a "genuine treasure". Starring Jane Prince Jones in the lead role, the Garza Theatre's second production of the year opened Friday, February 26.

With a cast of four, the players weave an intricate tale of intrigue, trust and deceit to the performance's surprising end.

## PHS students look to the future during Career Day

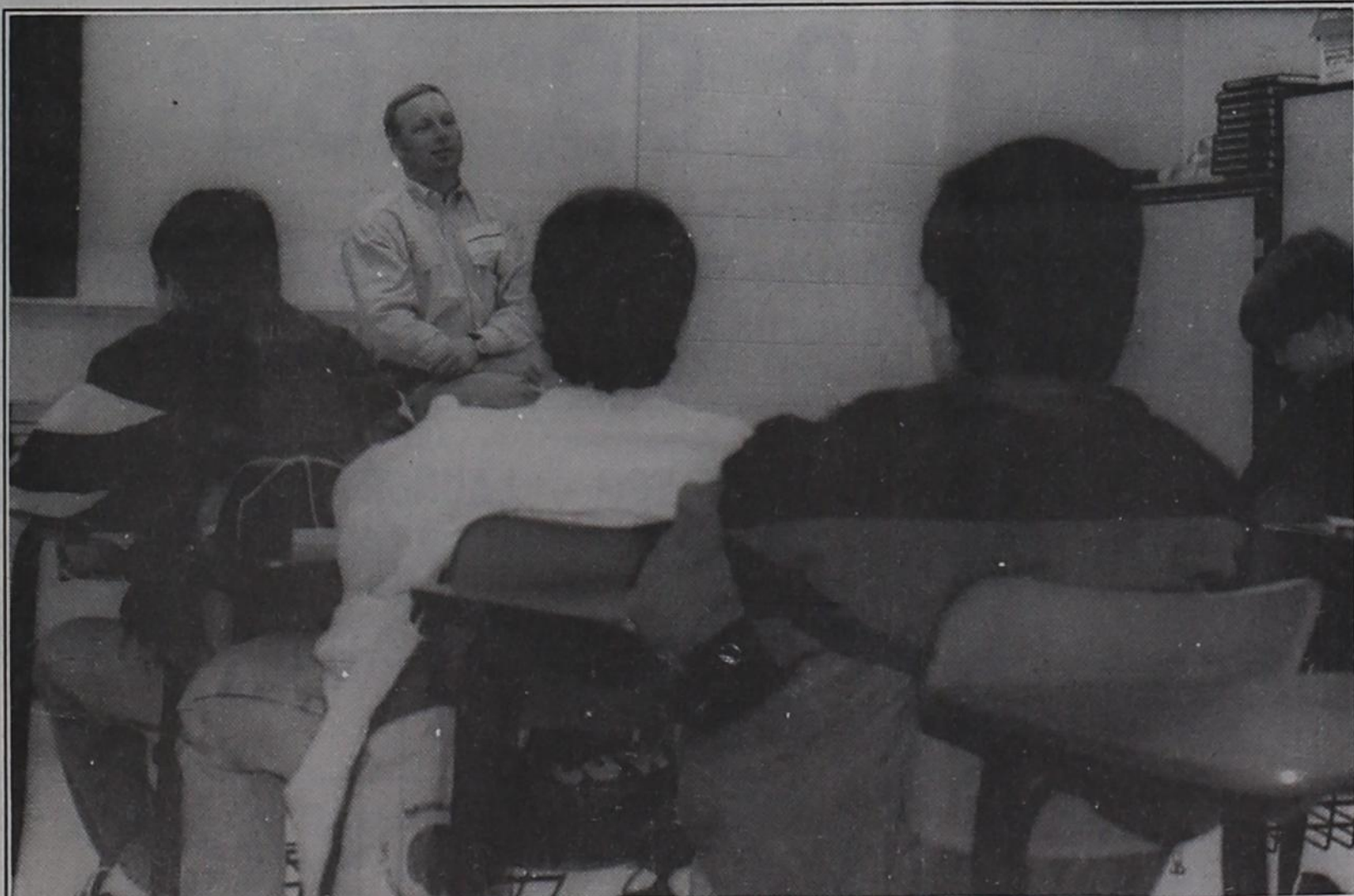

A 20-6 win over Floydada in their season opener February 23 on the Whirlwinds field has Post head baseball coach Fred Postell pleased with the 'Lopes start. The Bold Gold used a 16 run fourth inning to snuff out the Winds. "Fourteen of those runs came with two outs," said Postell. "They just couldn't get the third out." Catcher Jim Riley Simpson led the Post hit parade going two for three with the two hits being doubles. Phil Leininger pitched five strong innings to pick up his first win of the season. Along the way the lanky junior recorded five strikeouts while giving up only one walk. In this, the Antelopes second season of ball, Postell is hoping to improve on a 4-7 record. He feels he has the tools

to do this in the underclassmen dominated squad. Only two seniors make up the 1993 'Lopes. They are Anthony Cruse and Jonathan Ayala. "We learned a lot last year," said Postell. "If we can come through with a little defense we could be pretty good." Joining Leininger on the mound will be Pete Torrez and possibly freshman Bodie Simpson. Both Leininger and Torrez throw about the same speed with Leininger getting the edge in control. Of the three, Postell said Simpson is the hardest thrower and once he gets some experience under his belt he could be an effective hurler. Some of the big bats for the 'Lopes will be Leininger, Stewart Childress and Manuel Zubia. Defensively Postell says there are some possible changes in the wind. In

setting up the lineup for Floydada, he tried to put as much speed in the outfield as possible. In doing so, he also put some of the better gloves out there as well. He is considering juggling this lineup a bit to move some of the better fielders to the infield where their defense would be more effective. Postell is looking for the 13 returning players back from last year's squad to provide leadership along with their talents. All told there are 22 players out for the 'Lopes. The 'Lopes took on New Deal Tuesday, March 2 in Post (results were unavailable at press time). They play a return engagement with New Deal March 5 in New Deal. As for the rest of the schedule, Postell says there are still some question marks until the 'Lopes open district play April 27 in Post against Ralls.

The Post Bold Gold junior varsity boys basketball team closed out their season with three narrow losses to district foes. The junior 'Lopes lost 66-58 Feb. 12 in Ralls to the Jackrabbits. They followed this up with a 66-63 loss Feb. 16 in Tahoka to the Bulldogs before closing out Feb. 19 with a 48-46 loss to Idalou in Post. Clint Melton was the top Antelope scorer for the three games, knocking down 14 against Ralls, 11 against Tahoka and 8 against Idalou. Radley Nichols was the next high scorer in the three games, averaging a little over nine points a contest.

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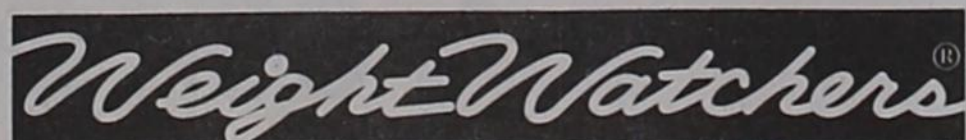
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

**10 Years Ago February 27, 1983**  
Emmett A. (Andy) Stelzer, State Senior Vice Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States in Texas received a special National Veterans of Foreign War Citation at the Mid-Winter Round-Up in Austin.

## This ANN That

March is National Nutrition Month and I'll be presenting information on the Eat Right America program this month in an effort to encourage each of you to make efforts to change your eating habits to improve your health by improving your nutritional status.

In 1992, the United States Department of Agriculture released a new representation of the healthy American diet. The Food Guide Pyramid is an outline of what foods to eat each day. But it goes further in that it visually represents what amounts of different foods should comprise the diet. It also emphasizes the fact that, while fats, oils and sweets may be included in the diet, they should be used sparingly.

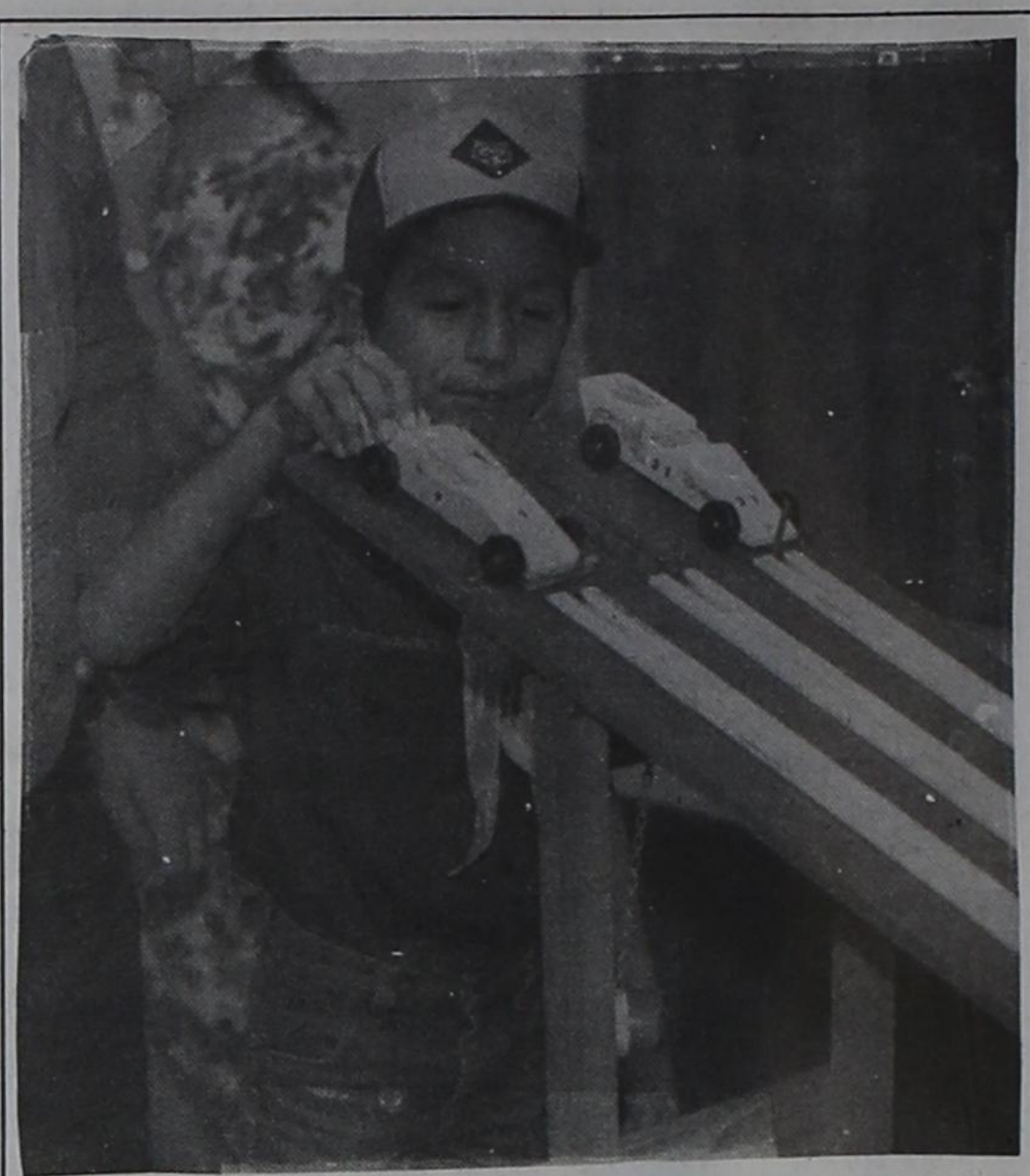
The Pyramid tells us that grain products such as breads, cereals, rice and pasta, represented at the base of the Pyramid should make up the bulk of the diet. The next level of the Pyramid shows plant foods, vegetables and fruits. As the Pyramid narrows, dairy products and meat, poultry, fish and other protein foods are represented. At the tip of the Pyramid and in the smallest section are the fats, oils and sweets.

But how can the Pyramid be interpreted in making everyday food choices? The Pyramid is different from previous food group recommendations in that it shows a range of servings for each food group: 6 to 11 servings for grains; three to five servings for vegetables; two to four servings for fruit; two to three servings for meats and two to three servings for milk products. At first this may seem confusing, but the range takes into consideration that different

individuals need different amounts of food and calories depending on various factors such as age, sex, physical size and activity levels. Almost everyone should have the lowest number of servings in each range. The minimum number of servings will provide 1600 calories when low to moderate fat foods are selected and the level of added fats in the diet is low. This number of calories is about right for many sedentary women and some older adults. Eating the highest numbers of servings in each group will provide about 2800 calories, too many for most individuals except teenage boys and very active men or athletes.

Another crucial concept to understand when using the Pyramid recommendations is serving or portion size. A serving is not the number of times a food is eaten per day, but rather a specific amount of a food. For example: one serving of grains is one-half cup of pasta or one slice of bread; a vegetable serving is one-half cup cooked vegetable or 1 cup raw greens; a fruit serving is one small piece of fruit or three-fourths cup juice; a milk serving is one cup (8 ounces) of milk; a meat serving is only three ounces (a piece about the size of a deck of cards).

Each of the food groups provides some but not all the nutrients needed. That's why it's important to eat foods from each of the groups. The Pyramid goes beyond the food groups to help put the Dietary Guidelines into action. If you would like to receive more information or a copy of the Food Guide Pyramid, call me at 495-2050.

## GED exam March 10-11

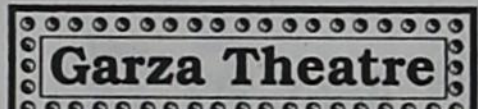
The GED exam, for people who do not have a high school diploma, will be given March 10-11 at South Plains College.

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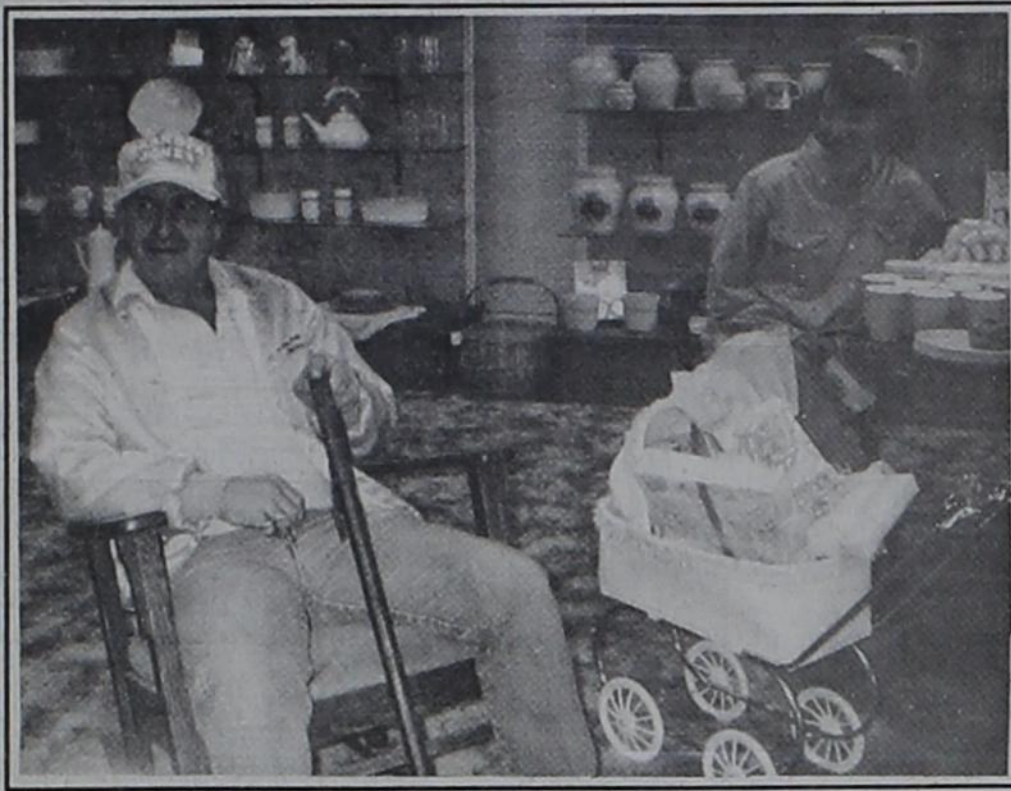
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## Jimmy Jones honored with "grandpa" shower

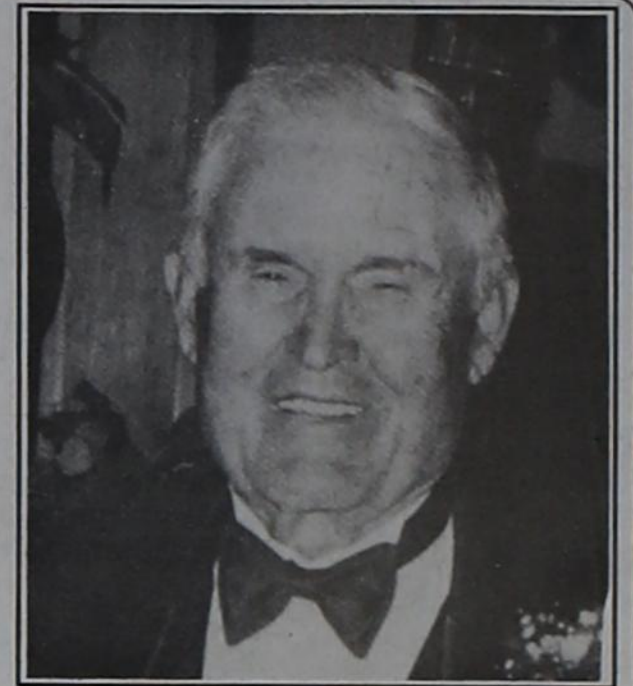
