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

## Hardin, Kirkpatrick win re-election to board **Trustees remain unchanged**

by John Cordsen Incumbents had little trouble retaining their seats on the Post ISD school board following last Saturday's election. Barbara Hardin and Mark Kirkpatrick turned back challenges from Alice Cruse and Dwainna Wulfjen to remain trustees on the school board. Hardin defeated challenger Alice Cruse 496 to 109 to retain her seat in place 6 while Kirkpatrick out polled Wulfjen, 464 to 135 to remain trustee from place 7.

The two were sworn into office during a special school board meeting held Monday evening, May 3 at the high school library. Following the swearing in ceremonies, the board selected new officers for the coming year. And like the election of board members, the makeup of the officers on the school board remained unchanged with Hardin being selected as board president and Kirkpatrick vice president. Rafe Foreman will continue as board secretary.

EVEN THE STONES in the historic Post Museum have stories behind them. This according to John Strubhart, president of the Garza County Museum Association. The museum needs volunteer help to help it re-open.

## Volunteers needed to man museum

by John Cordsen Much of Post and Garza County's rich history is housed in the museum located on Avenue N a half a block west of Main Street. The two story building is full of pre-historic bones, Indian artifacts, furniture from the turn of the century and memorabilia from the founders of Post.

The building is a treasure chest in danger of disappearing. Apathy is threatening the museum and the treasures it contains. The museum's doors have basically been locked tight for almost 18 months because the Garza County Museum Association can't round up enough volunteers to keep the building open.

According to Garza County Museum Association president John Strubhart, getting volunteers to help out in the museum is difficult.

"A lot of the group that used to work there have gotten older now and they can't do the work anymore," said

Owned by the county, the museum building itself is listed as a historical site, having been built in the early 1900's as a sanitarium and at one time by chance or hard work have contacted it was one of the finest hospitals

between Ft. Worth and San Fransisco. According to Strubhart, the county pays the utilities and insurance, leaving the operation of the building up to the museum association.

"The county owns the building, the museum is there as a courtesy," said Strubhart.

With its doors locked and few people John Strubhart entering, the building is showing signs of decay. Adding to the natural deterioration of non-use, bats have moved in and made the building their home. At dusk they can be seen swarming from the eves as they leave the building. Dead bats litter the floors and windows and a few even hang from the ceiling where the plaster has fallen out.

"It will take a community effort to fix it up and keep it up said Dr. Bobby Bain, Post ISD Superintendent and proponent of keeping the museum.

May 10 date for hearing on courthouse construction

Experts and county officials will be on hand next Monday, May 10 at the Post Community Center to answer questions over proposed construction of a courthouse annex for Garza County.

The public hearing that begins at 7 p.m. is the first of two such hearings scheduled to allow county citizens the opportunity to review plans and offer input for the three story annex to be built on the south side of the existing courthouse.

The hearing also fulfills a request by the Texas Historical Commission that the county get feedback from the community before proceeding with construction. The Historical Commission has been notified of the meeting and as of Monday, May 3 it was not known whether an official from this agency would be in attendance at the public hearing.

Among those scheduled to be on hand includes Rich Oller from Oller Engineering. He is the engineer working on the design of the project. Also scheduled to be on hand is Jay Shinn, the architect involved with the preliminary design of the project.

Along with schematic drawings of the proposed addition, a scale model of the annex is supposed to be available for viewing.

Officials also expect to have a cost estimate of the project to present to the public.

State-wide, the three school funding constitutional amendments went down to defeat. Amendment 1, the so-called Robin Hood Amendment was overwhelmingly rejected by state voters, 63 to 37 percent. In the county, voters defeated the proposal by an amendment.

A special highlight of the day came in the afternoon when Chief Frank Runkles, in full Indian dress, talked to the students. The Chief told the students of the Lacota Sioux and Comanche tribes. He explained the manner of the tribe's dress and the tribes cultures. Chief Runkles also led the kids in song and story telling in sign language. At the close of his program, Chief Runkles surprised Kids 'N'Art director Linda Puckett with a naming ceremony. Puckett was given the Cherokee name of "Un Ah Wa' hi", which when translated means Friendly Eagle. Chief Runkles presented Puckett with an ancient Indian necklace from the 1400's made of trade beads.

Following the naming ceremony, Chief Antelope (John Corey of Lubbock) captivated the crowd with the mystic beat of the drum and songs.

CHIEF FRANK RUNKLES was an important part of the Kids 'N' Art "First Americans" program held April 24 in Post. The Chief spoke on the Lacota Sioux and Comanche tribes.

Chief Antelope also told an old Indian legend of and Indian youth and a rattlesnake.

According to legend, the snake convinced the youth that he would not bite him if he would take him down from the mountain because he was cold and hungry. At last the boy placed the snake in his shirt and carried him down to the valley where he gently laid him on the grass. The snake suddenly coiled, rattled and bit the vouth on the leg.

"But you promised," cried the youth. "You knew what I was when you picked me up," answered the snake as it slithered away.

Puckett said this special message still holds true today for young people who might be tempted by drugs. First Americans was the first of what





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

### 'Lopes hammer out a win against **Tahoka Bulldogs in diamond action**

Post bats erupted for 14 hits as the Bold Gold 'Lopes hammered the Tahoka Bulldogs 11-5 in baseball action last Friday in Tahoka.

Phil Leininger and Bodie Simpson led the hit parade with three hits each. Oscar Acevedo added two hits of his own as the Lopes sent a total of 39 batters to the plate against two Tahoka pitchers. An even half dozen other Lopes each collected one hit each to round out the potent Antelope attack.

'We slaughtered the ball," said 'Lope head coach Fred Postell of his team's 14 hit barrage.

As a team, the Antelopes batted .359 against the Bulldogs.

The hit parade helped the 'Lopes score thre runs in the first, four in the second, one in the third and three more in the seventh.

Leininger went the distance on the mound for the 'Lopes, striking out eight and walking six while giving up five hits.

Defensively, the Lopes played their second almost error free game, committing only one miscue. Tahoka was not so fortunate, as they were guilty of 10 errors.

The win against the Bulldogs raised the Lopes to within one game of .500 at 4-5. All the Lopes losses have come against top notch teams.

Post mounted a two run rally that fell just short in a 4-3 loss against the highly rated Ralls Jackrabbits Tuesday, April 27 in Post. Trailing 4-1 going into the sixth inning, Post scored two runs with two men out to pull to within 4-3 only to see the possible fourth run stranded 90 feet away on third base as

the inning ended. The Lopes collected six hits against Ralls hurler Rudy Salazar. Leininger again went the distance for the 'Lopes, giving up seven hits while striking out

10 and only walking two.

Post jumped to a 1-0 lead with a run in the bottom of the third inning only to see Ralls come back with one in the top of the fourth and three more in the fifth.

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

## Living on the Edge of the Caprock

### Gearupearly for lawn and garden pests

Summer season is just around the corner and with it comes the need for early preparation against insects that are sure to be around.

Chemicals left over from year should be inspected to determine if they are still good. If properly stored, products should have at least a two year shelf life after they are first used. Dusts sometimes have the tendency to absorb moisture if the bag is not tightly sealed after each use. Upon inspection, if you find the contents of a bag to be hardened or lumpy, they should not be used.

To properly store these types of products, place them in a clear polyethylene bag and seal it with a rubber band. This will help keep out moisture. If dusts are two years old or older, and there is any doubt about their storage, dispose of them according to the label directions and replace them with a new product.

Liquid materials are not likely to absorb moisture, but storage is still important. Caps should be re-sealed tightly on the product after each use. Do not use liquids which have turned cloudy or milky in color or which have label on a container and determine its' sediments in the bottom of the container.

allow them to be stored in front of a window. Especially if the window gets strong afternoon sun. Avoid storing liquids in an area subjected to extreme temperatures fluctuations. Extremes from both summer heat and winter cold may not hurt the active ingredients in an insecticide, but it may damage the ability of the product to mix properly in water. If liquids are at least two years old and have not been

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properly stored, monitor vegetables closely after spraying to determine if the pesticides are controlling insects. Perhaps one of the most overlooked aspects of chemical use is care of handtype pump sprayers. Often these sprayers are not stored to allow them to drain. Other times, chemical residues are left in the sprayer as the result of poor or improper rinsing after use.

each sprayer use to thoroughly rinse your sprayer and don't forget the hose and wand attachment.

Application of weed killers, followed by an application of an insecticide is a sure way to decrease your vegetable production if you fail to completely rinse and drain your sprayer.

Always make certain of the chemical you intend to use. Improper or extended storage has a detrimental effect on container labels. If you cannot read the exact content and usage recommendations, it is better to replace With any type of chemicals, don't the product for a new version. Know exactly what is being sprayed on plants and the amount recommended. Don't jeopardize plants by spraying first and then checking for possible damage. Plan ahead. If you had problems with a particular insect or weed last year,
