As the gala affair begins to unwind, head out to the red barns and colorful tent at the west end of 13th street and let the fun begin. Meet C. W. Post's great-grand daughters of Adelaide Riggs. Both Mrs. Merrill and Mrs. Riggs, are the daughters of Marjorie Merriweather Post, daughter of the founder. Also on hand will be several trustees of the Post estate. Local Double U Ranch cowboys, along with their foreman, Kenneth Maris, will be busy, yet visible.

brighter future. The Blue Knights Poker Run for the U Can Share Food Drive will be winding their way out of Post through these fields and back with their poker hands. Starting the staggered departures from the United supermarket parking lot starting at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

Those wonderful old brick streets will be filled with excitement and fun all day Saturday. CASH totalling more than \$1,300 was seized in a raid against illegal gambling in Garza County

## Gambling operation raided in Post

Garza County sheriff's officers, along with officers from DPS Intelligence, seized a large amount of cash and six suspected illegal gambling machines in a late Friday night, October 8 raid of George's Restaurant at 202 South Broadway here in Post. Seized in the raid was \$1,369.34 in cash and checks and the six video type gaming machines.

According to Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke, the case is pending further investigation by a grand jury or a warrant being issued by District Court.

The initial warrant that led to the seizure of the cash and machines came after two undercover deputies allegedly

received an illegal payoff after playing a number of the suspected machines that were located at George's. According to Ratke, the two officers received the actual payoff from George's owner George Kiouis shortly before the raid was held.

The undercover officers used by the Garza County Sheriff's office were two reserve deputies, Jim Foster and Patrick Herridge.

"They draw no salaries," said Ratke. "Basically they come down here and work for free. They are the two who actually went in and made the case."

The case the two made involved a little luck and a lot of preparation and hard work.

Using their own money, Herridge

and Foster went to George's at approximately 8:30 Friday evening and began playing the machines. The luck part came in when the two were down to their last three credits on their final machine. They took one last chance and came up winners.

"They played with \$30 and knew when to quit when they had money on the machine," said Ratke. "This was the only way we could put the case together."

The sheriff said the two officers then requested their winnings, were paid off by Kiouis and left.

"Basically he knew he was paying off cops," said Ratke. "He was arrogant"

## New city/county landfill opened

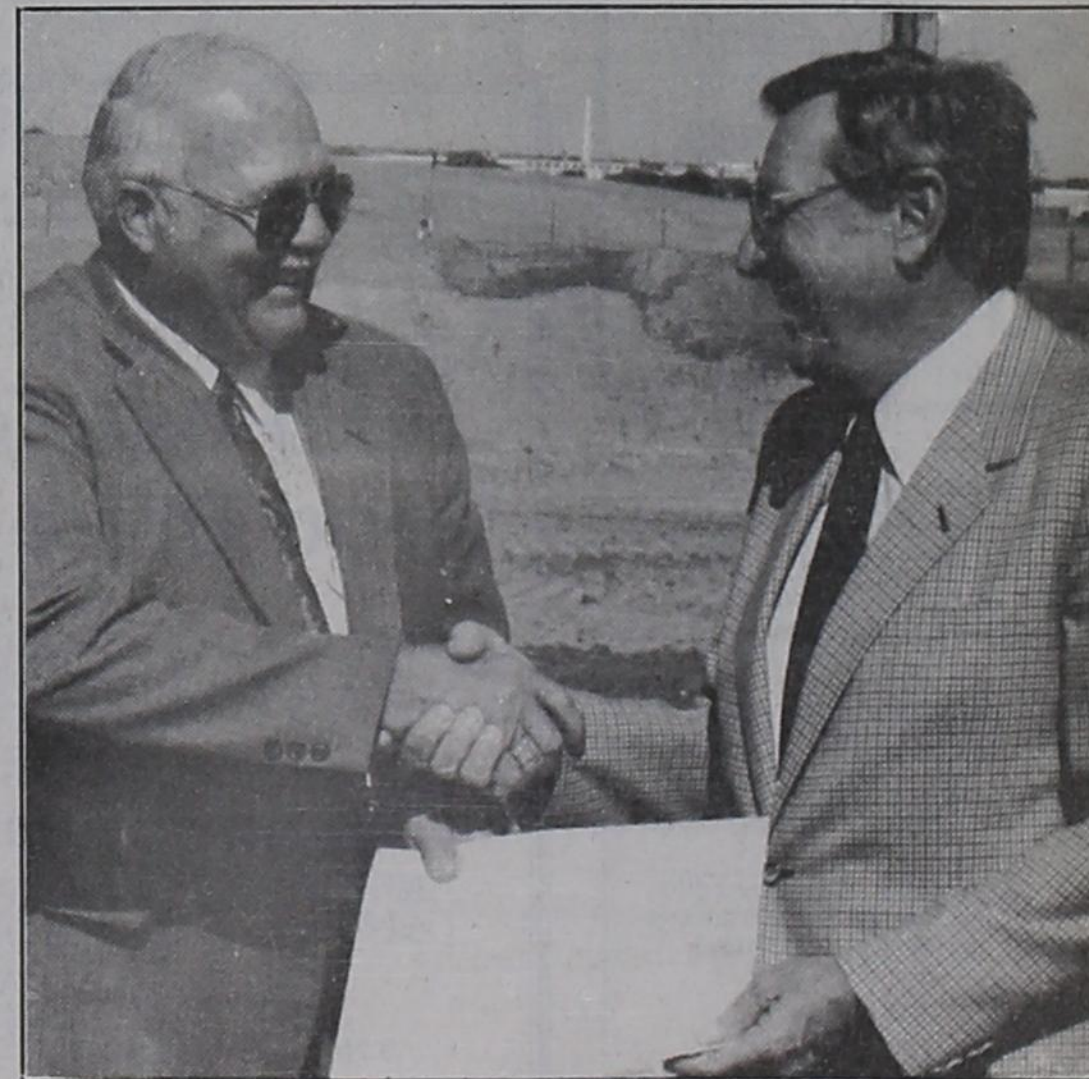

With ribbon cutting ceremonies last Friday, October 8 at the new Post/Garza County landfill, the local community entered the record books. The landfill permit granted by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC, formerly the Texas Water Commission) was the first permit granted by the state with the Arid Exemption.

A number of dignitaries and city officials were on hand for the opening of the new landfill.

"We have come to a long-awaited task, into which many hours of labor and money have gone. So many people are responsible for this great occasion - the ribbon cutting of our new landfill," said Post Mayor Jim Jackson. "I believe a new era of responsibility has come upon us in recycling, not only in trash, but also in oil, filters, paper, lumber, metal, tires and appliances."

Prior to the official opening, the landfill had to pass one more inspection by officials from Austin. Mike Graeber and Philip Spry from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission took one last look at the landfill before giving the project their stamp of approval. The opening of the landfill also brings to conclusion the long and sometimes difficult task of permitting a landfill. While the actual permit process was only six months long (this in itself a record according state officials), the actual work on the permit stretches back years and involves a

number of agreements between the city of Post and Garza County, something alluded to by Garza County Judge Giles Dalby as he addressed the gathering.

"The main thing on my mind is that we're through with this thing," said

Judge Dalby.

The landfill was not only time consuming, it was also a costly measure. The scope of the project will be the subject of a future article in the Post Dispatch.

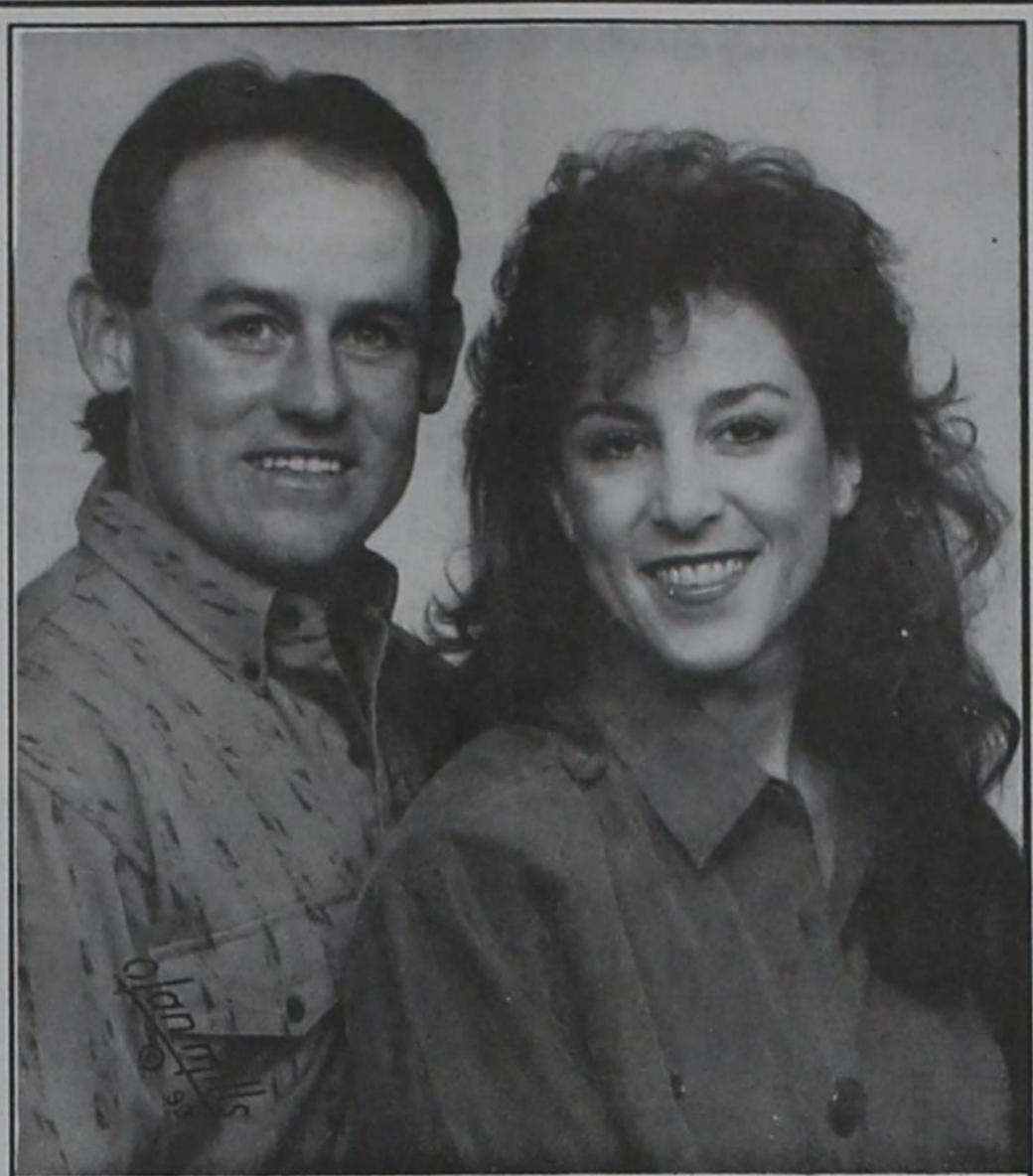

and he slipped up and got caught."

After the payoff, things happened quickly. The proper authorities were contacted including County Judge Giles Dalby who issued the warrant, DPS Intelligence officers and the District Attorney. When all of the pieces were together, Garza County Sheriff's officers, along with those from DPS Intelligence, conducted the raid.

While the cash and machines were seized in the raid, Kiouisis is still being sought for questioning. Apparently he had left the restaurant between the time of the alleged payoff and the raid.

"He has been unavailable for questioning," said Ratke. "Had he been on the scene he would be under arrest."

Law enforcement officials have suspected possible illegal gambling activities at the restaurant for a considerable period of time. The actual investigation into the suspected illegal gambling activities at George's that led to last Friday's raid began approximately six months ago. At that time, Ratke instructed his chief deputy Maurice Herridge to compile evidence.

"I requested 'Mo' (Herridge) make the case after receiving a lot of pressure. I asked the man to initiate a more intensive investigation into the illegal gambling operations at the restaurant," said Ratke.

Herridge took it from there. He contacted the two reserve officers, the district attorney and the DPS Intelligence office.

Herridge was eager to make a case

against Kiouisis.

"I tried to set something up with the previous administration and was told no," said Herridge.

Current sheriff Ratke agreed. "The past administration did not see this as a problem."

The break Herridge and Ratke need in building a case against Kiouisis came when an unnamed informant came forward and told Herridge he had received a payoff for allegedly gambling at the restaurant.

What happens next is up to the courts. Ratke said that the disposition of the money and machines will be determined by the courts as well. Law does provide for the agencies involved to receive any valuable seized that are associated with illegal activities.

"If he (Kiouisis) gets them back it's not going to be without a fight," said Ratke.

The sheriff had high praise for his officers involvement with making the case against Kiouisis.

"The guys need credit," said the sheriff. "They got out there and identified the problem, did their homework, got a legal opinion and made a good case. I'm proud of them."

Herridge also had a special word for the two reserve officers who went in undercover.

"You would never have known this was the first case these two guys (Herridge and Foster) had worked. They did a good job," said Mo Herridge.

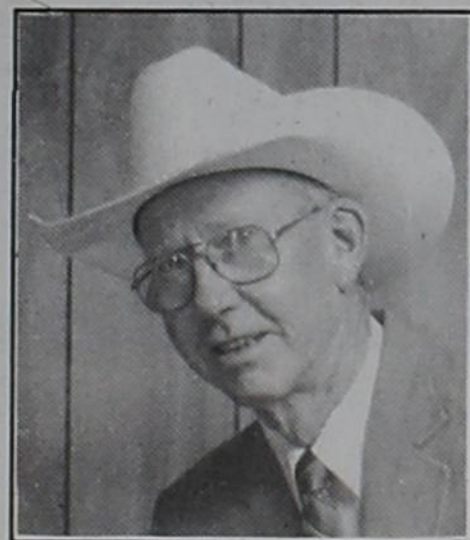

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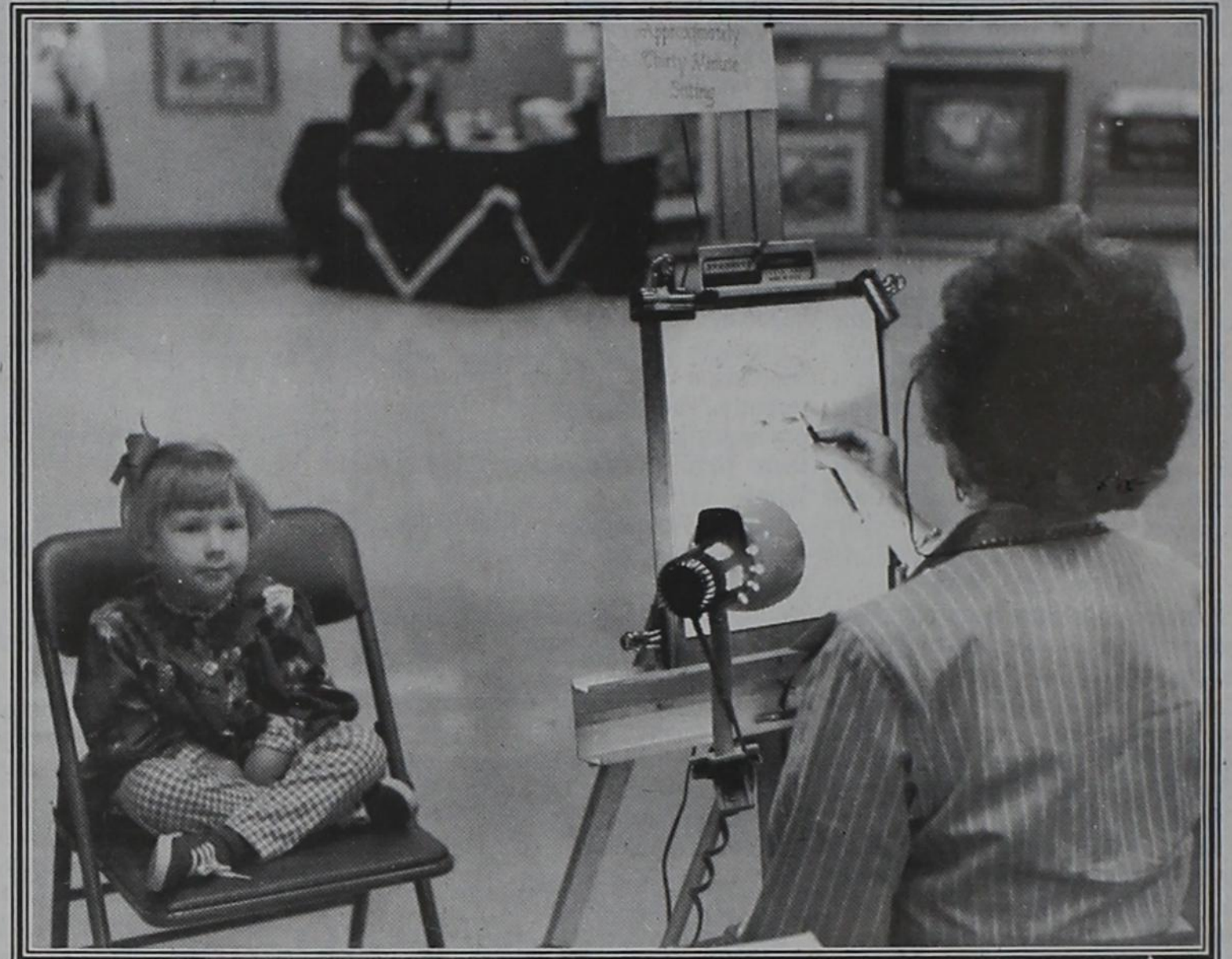
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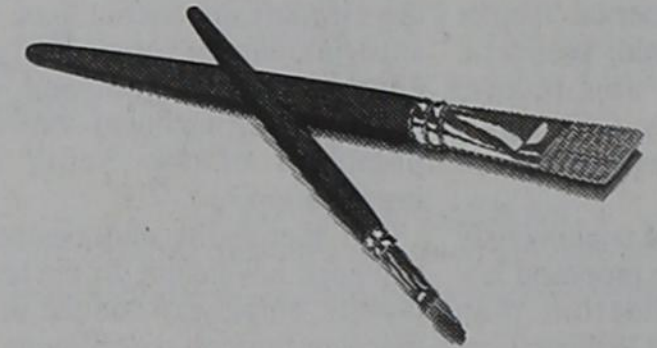

Rendezvous full of excitement of "Old West"

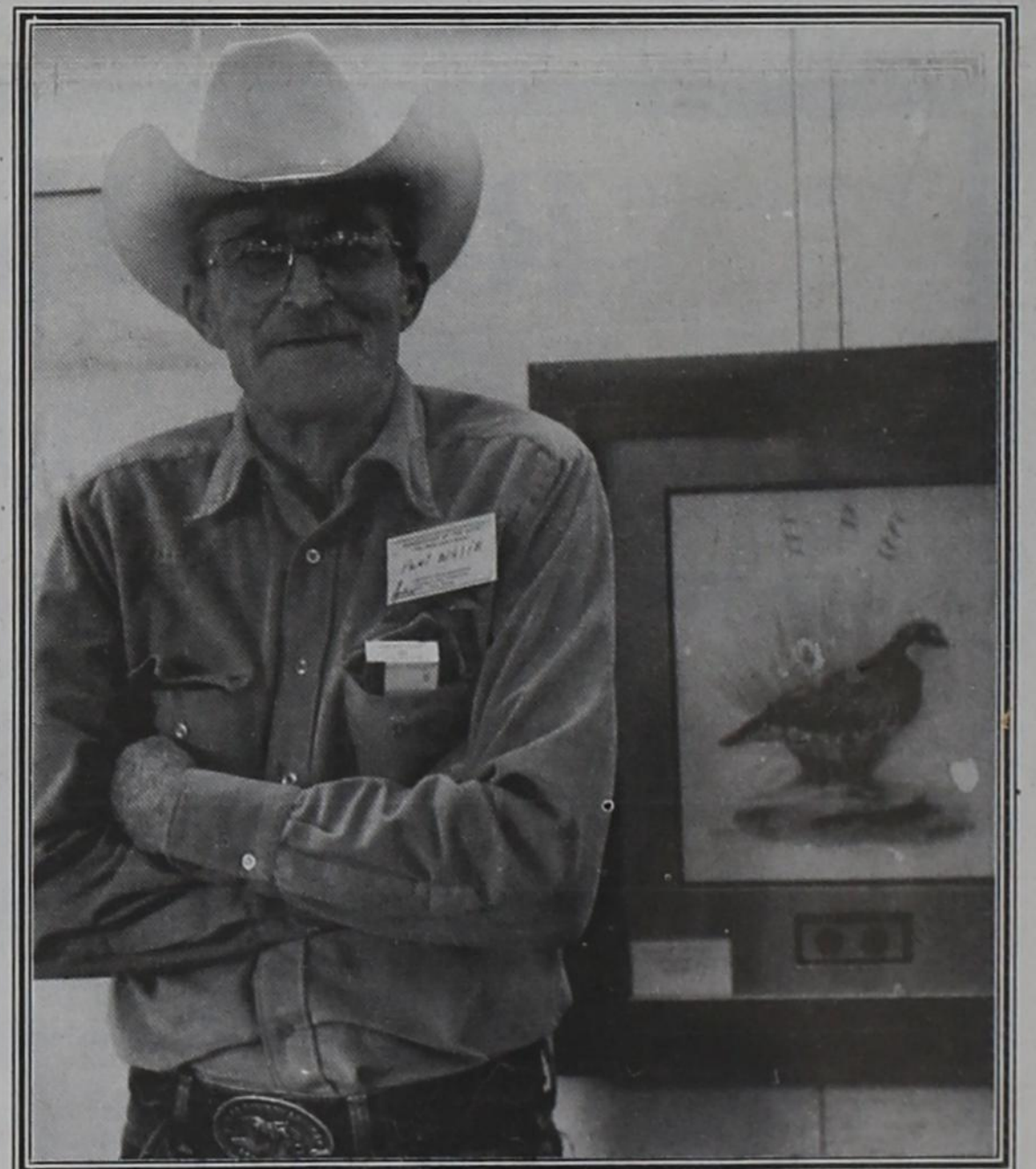

## 'Lopes forget underdog lable against Wildcats

As underdogs go, the 'Lopes have a lot to learn. Underdogs aren't supposed to go into a hostile environment (Idalou) and beat up on the pre-game favorite (the Wildcats). Post accomplished both as the Bold Gold Antelopes established themselves among the district elite with a 28-9 thumping of the previously undefeated Idalou Wildcats last Friday in Idalou.

Calling the 'Lopes and underdog against Idalou is reaching a bit. They achieved this dubious distinction only because of Idalou's unbeaten record heading into the game and the Wildcats pre-season choice as the team to beat in district 42A.

Before their encounter with the high powered 'Lopes, the Idalou defense was best in the area for 2A schools, holding opponents to near 150 yards a game total offense. The previously unbeaten Wildcats also were ranked in the top 10 in offense with a potent running attack featuring super sophomore Conrad Garcia and quarterback Tatum Lynn.

Post's offense almost doubled the average yards allowed by the Wildcats, chalking up 291 yards. Rushing yardage accounted for 228 of those yards. The ground game of Adrian Castillo (nine rushes for 67 yards), Tim Bell, 14-57; Bodie Simpson, 7-36 and Jim Riley Simpson 3-36 was bolstered by the return to form of Jim Riley Simpson and the Bold Gold air attack that added another 63 yards. After an off game last week, Jim Riley completed four of six attempts for 63 yards.

"I had good protection," said Simpson.

The protection and blocking that paved the way for the 'Lopes big night was provided by the likes of Kelly Line, Mark Espitia, Clint Melton, Ray Perez and Stewart Childers.

Bell, coming out of the backfield was the top receiver for the 'Lopes, catching two for 32 yards. Anthony Martin and Phil Leininger each had one reception good for 17 and 14 yards respectively.

Leininger also played a big part in the Bold Gold kicking game. Taking over for Lemuel McDonald as the place kicker, Leininger was perfect on the night, converting all four of his extra point attempts.

McDonald still handled the kickoff duties for the 'Lopes. The senior linebacker/kicker showed his leg strength, putting two of his five kicks in the game into the Idalou endzone. This alone in a high school game is impressive, what's more impressive is that both kicks hit the endzone on the fly, traveling better than 60 yards in the air each time.

"We've tried both all year," said Bold Gold head coach Dewayne Osborne. "It wasn't a case of McDonald losing the job, we just wanted to change things up. Lemuel's got a stronger leg (ie, the two kicks into the endzone) and we haven't given up on him."

Osborne said that with McDonald's leg strength, if the 'Lopes needed to take a long range kick, McDonald would be the coaches choice. The coach also said the success in the kicking game was because of the improved blocking during the kick. He said that early season breakdowns may have caused McDonald to rush his kicks a little.

"When you have two or three kicks blocked, you can tend to get a little nervous back there," said Osborne.

Defensively, the 'Lopes overcame a rather passive first series of downs that saw the Wildcats score an easy touchdown. The 'Lopes bounced back and throttled the Cats, holding them out of the endzone the remainder of the game. Idalou finished with 258 yards total offense, 164 rushing and 94 passing. Along the way, the 'Lopes dropped the Cats for negative yards on 11 plays.

'Lope defenders, displaying their typical aggressiveness, not only hit the Wildcats, they punished them. Doubters need to just ask Tatum Lynn about his introduction to (They call him Mr.) Russ Bird two thirds of the way through the third quarter. Lynn was knocked unconscious by Bird and

lay on the field for several minutes before being helped to the sideline.

After the first two series, the Bold Gold looked every bit the underdog. Offensively they went a meek three and out. The best play the 'Lopes had in their first four was Bodie Simpson's punt of 31 yards down to the Wildcat 19. Idalou took the ball and proceeded to stuff it down the 'Lopes defensive throats on a 13 play, 81 yard drive capped off by Lynn's 15 yard run. Lynn and Garcia did the most damage, Garcia on the ground and Lynn running and passing the ball. Idalou's score came with 4:51 left in the first quarter.

Down 6-0, the 'Lopes were a different team the next time they had the ball. Where on their first possession they were completely overmatched by the Wildcat defense, the second time they had the ball, it was the Cats turn to be overmatched. The 'Lopes went 58 yards on eight plays to pull even at 6-6 with 1:00 left in the opening period. Leininger's first PAT gave the 'Lopes the lead for good. On the drive, Bell ran the ball four times (including a one yard touchdown plunge) and caught one pass.

Osborne was unable to explain the 'Lopes dramatic turnaround. "I really don't know what happened," said the coach. "What ever happened, it was our kids who did it. I left it up to them, there was nothing spectacular about the coaching, it was the kids all the way."

Osborne didn't say it, but maybe the 'Lopes were waiting for the rest of the Post crowd to arrive at the game and didn't want any of the home folks to miss any of the highlights. Whatever the reason, the 'Lopes were a different team after the Idalou score.

Post would score on its next possession, a four play gem that covered 52 yards. Fullback Castillo did most of the damage on the first play of the drive rambling up the middle from the Post 48 down to the Idalou 14. Three plays later Bell again plunged over from one yard out. Leininger's second kick gave the 'Lopes a 14-6 lead.

The 'Lopes didn't score again until the fourth quarter. The only scoring done in the third period was done by the Wildcats on a 37 yard field goal by Eddie Martinez that cut the 'Lopes lead to 14-9.

Even this was a victory of sorts for the 'Lope defenders. Idalou had taken over the ball on the Post 35 after a Bodie Simpson punt out of his own endzone. Two plays into the drive, Bird knocked Lynn out of the game for a while with a crunching hit in the middle of the line. From there, the Wildcats were a one dimensional team, Garcia right, Garcia left and Garcia up the middle. Post held and Idalou settled for three points.

In a game of football, it is hard to pick out one play that stands out above all the rest since so many variables are involved. But on the 'Lopes next possession, Jim Riley Simpson's 17 yard run on a third and eight from his own 25 stands out. The 'Lopes looked to be going nowhere until Simpson, attempting to pass, was flushed from

the pocket on a planned roll to the left, cut back right and sprinted for the crucial first down.

"Things kind of solidified when Jim broke that run and kept the drive alive," said Osborne. "Otherwise things were fixing to get a little tight."

Bell scored his third touchdown of the night as he capped off the 14 play, 67 yard drive with a six yard scamper for the score. With the kick, Post was up 21-6 with 8:02 left in the game.

Two passes, one a bootleg to Bell and the other a flair to Martin keyed the 'Lopes final touchdown drive of the night. Big Alvin Reed plunged through a gaping hole at the five to score standing up.

The win puts the Bold Gold back in the running for district honors and post-season play. The 'Lopes raised their district record to 2-1 and their overall record to 4-2. They also showed a lot of desire in bouncing back from last weeks 10-0 loss to Seagraves.

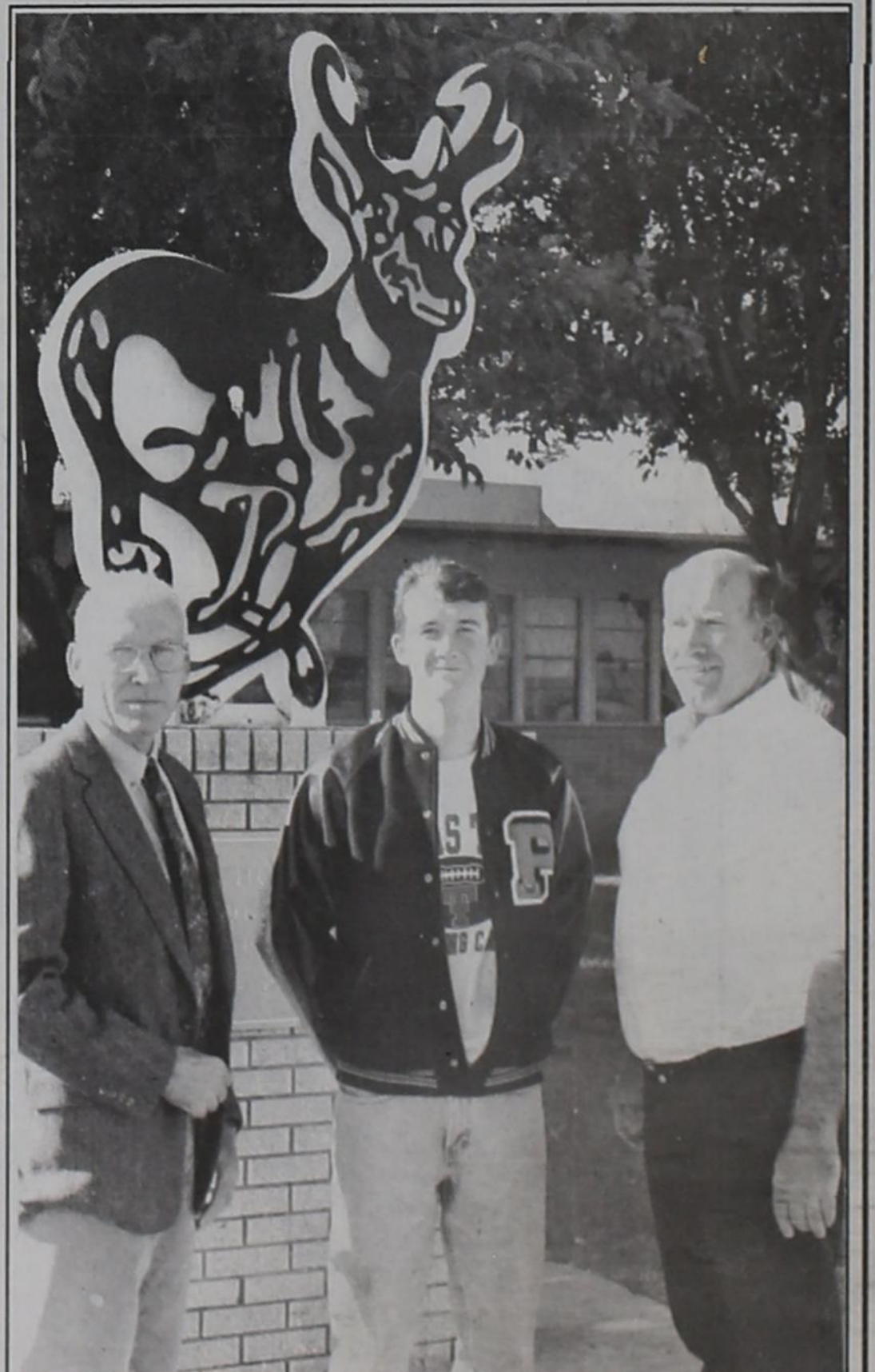
Simpson's principal, Joe Giddens, says, "Jim is an outstanding gentleman --- respected by students and faculty."

### NFIB/Texas weighs in on side of Proposition 2

That's not the kind of investment local bankers or outside investors are looking to make."

Proposition 2 won't help small firms round up purchasing capital. "But at least they wouldn't get slapped with annual tax bills, on top of purchase payments, for equipment they're being forced to buy," Howden said.

Proposition 2 would not take effect until January 1, 1994, so no property now being taxed would be removed from local tax rolls. "It would not undercut property tax revenues one whit," Howden said. "All it would do is ease pressure to raise consumer prices in shops seeking to recoup their environmental protection costs."

NFIB/Texas is the latest, the largest, business group to join the Clean Texas Coalition, a broad-based organization that includes organized labor, environmental groups and state and local officials.

"It's not often that business, labor and environmentalists agree on how to solve a problem," Howden said, "but no one here wants to sacrifice jobs needlessly in the names of environmental protection."

Election day is Tuesday, November 2. Early voting begins on Wednesday, October 13 and runs through Friday, October 29.

The state's largest small-business advocacy group today announced its support for Proposition 2, the proposal to exempt pollution control equipment from local property taxes.

"Of the 16 constitutional amendments on the November ballot, only Proposition 2 will help preserve jobs and clean up the environment," said Robert Howden, director of the 37,600 member state chapter of the National Federation of Independent Business.

"The soaring cost of complying with federal and state environmental regulations threatens to bring tens of thousands of small Texas businesses to their financial knees," Howden said. "Prop 2 is our best hope for reducing these costs in the long run and helping these people stay in business."

New federal clean air standards alone will affect more than 60,000 small firms in the state, according to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Compliance is expected to cost them more than \$1 billion in capital investments, increased operating costs and administrative expenses.

Dry cleaners, service stations, auto garages and bakeries will be hit especially hard by the new standards, Howden said. "Their only options are to buy expensive pollution control equipment or to shut down."

A consortium of five West Texas telephone and electric cooperatives recently announced their plans to provide a new competitive cable television service to residents of Lubbock and the West Texas area.

Utilizing the latest digital technology involving satellite programming, the new venture will offer choices of up to 150 channels to all urban and rural South Plains viewers and will compete directly with present cable television businesses across the region.

"Digital Satellite Television," as the new business will be known, will offer its exceptionally clear cable-like services under the marketing name of "DirecTV" to all residents of a 22 county area surrounding Lubbock. The cooperatives purchased the exclusive franchise through Hughes Communications, a division of General Motors' Hughes Electronics, who built and will launch the satellite in December.

Beginning in April 1994, subscribers will receive their universal digital communications service via a small fixed satellite dish attached to their homes instead of over cable lines and wiring. Programming will be broadcast directly to each home from two satellites orbiting above the continental United States. Unlike cable television systems, can immediately serve all cities, towns, communities, urban and rural residences and businesses in the twenty two county area which includes: Garza, Bailey, Borden,

Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hall, Hockley, Howard, Kent, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Motley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

Digital Satellite Television is being managed by Poka-Lambro Telecommunications, Inc. and will have a Lubbock retail location as well as locations through agents in almost every town in the area. System owners are Poka-Lambro, South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Lubbock, South Plains Telephone Cooperative, Inc. of Lubbock, Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Tahoka and Lamb County Electric Cooperative, Inc. of Littlefield.

Future satellite services, including services other than existing cable TV-type services, will be offered as they are developed and marketed. "Clearly, this is a tremendously beneficial technology for all of West Texas, according to Mickey L. Sims, General Manager of CEO of Digital Satellite Television and Poka-Lambro Telecommunications, Inc. "This is the next generation of digital, laser-sharp cable television without the cable. The wireless services being deployed throughout our society will enhance our lives and allow the customer to have choices." Subscribers will be able to watch 24-hour news, sports, music videos, movies--everything you would find on cable or other satellite programming.

Vandeventer is a member of the North East Texas Art Guild in Greenville and is treasurer of the South Central Region Art Guild. This is an organization of Alexander certified instructors that covers a five-state area.

## Oct. 10-16 proclaimed as Highway-Rail Grade Crossing Safety Week

Governor Ann Richards recently proclaimed October 10 through October 16 as Highway-Rail Grade Crossing Safety Week for the state of Texas.

Texas consistently leads the nation in vehicle/train crashes. One reason for this is that Texas has the most extensive rail system in the U.S. with the most track miles and approximately 19,449 highway-rail grade crossings.

In 1992, there were 59 fatalities and 196 injuries as a result of 486 highway-rail grade crossing crashes in Texas. The majority of these crashes occurred in clear weather, during daylight hours, at signalized crossings and with unobstructed driver views. These facts underscore the need for greater awareness of the dangers at highway-rail grade crossings.

"The prevention of highway-rail grade crossing crashes is a responsibility shared by motorists, the railroads, government and the

private sector," states Governor Ann Richards. She adds, "the reduction of these crashes must surely be a common goal of all Texans."

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## Experts encourage those at risk to get flu shots early

Influenza, usually known as the flu, is a viral infection of the respiratory system that spreads from one person to another in the spray from coughs and sneezes. It is an epidemic disease which affects many people within a community.

The flu virus can be serious and even life-threatening. Each year flu causes about 20,000 deaths in the United States. The majority of people who die are 65 or older.

Lowell Johnson, M.D., a family practitioner on Methodist Hospital's medical staff, advises people to get a flu shot between mid-October and mid-November. "A vaccination at this time means your immunity peaks during flu season, runs from late December to early March," said Dr. Johnson.

Those at increased risk for flu and its complications include persons 65 and older, residents of nursing homes and other chronic-care facilities, adults and children with chronic heart or lung disorders or immune problems. Other high-risk individuals are children between 6 months and 18 years old who regularly take aspirin for another condition and who are therefore at risk of developing Reyes Syndrome after a bout with the flu.

Flu shots contain egg-grown non-infectious (inactivated) flu viruses that activate the immune system but don't cause infection. Those who are allergic to eggs should not receive a flu shot. Anyone who has had hives, swelling of the tongue or difficulty breathing after eating eggs falls into this category.

Despite some rumors, medical experts agree that flu shots are safe. Because the vaccine contains only non-infectious viruses, it cannot cause influenza. The most common side effect is soreness at the site of injection. Fever, malaise and muscle aches may also occur in some people for a few days after a flu shot.

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A low-fat diet including plenty of fresh vegetables, fruits, and whole grain foods may help lower your family's risk of cancer.

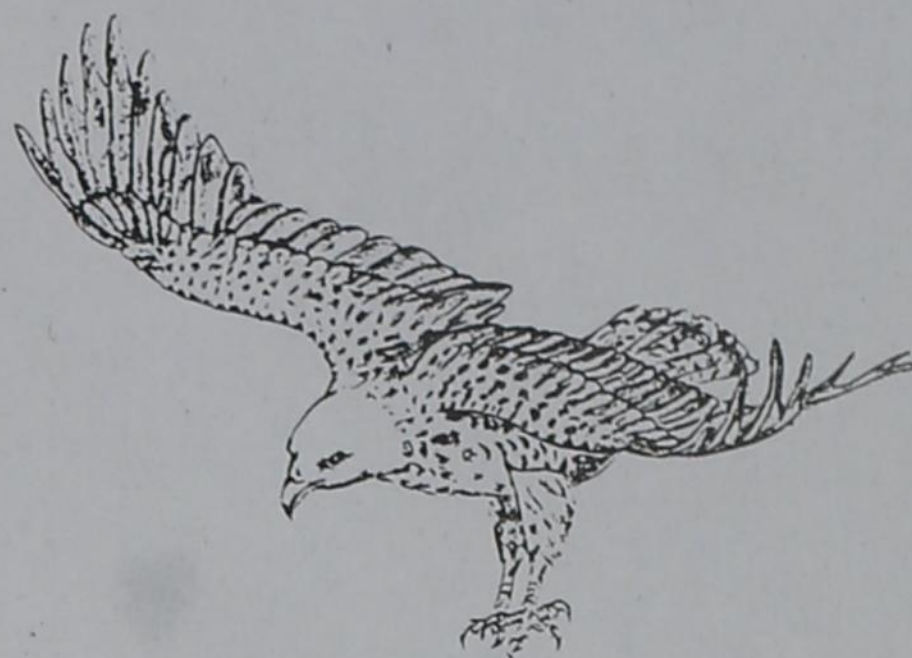

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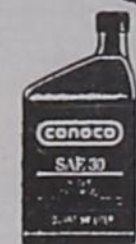

## Tips to make brown bag lunches fun and healthy

Remember to avoid fatty and salty luncheon meats. Your best bet is freshly sliced meats from the deli. Another idea is to try the PB without the J. Consider replacing the jelly with fresh fruit slices like apples, pears and bananas.

## Tax 'n Facts

Hardship withdrawals from your 401(K)

New regulations from the Internal Revenue Service will make it a little easier to tap your 401(K) if you need money.

Most plans are written with a provision permitting hardship withdrawals from individual accounts, generally in case of medical expenses, tuition costs or buying a new house. The IRS requires that the employer warn the employee who needs the money that 20 percent of the withdrawal will be withheld for taxes (since it isn't being transferred directly to another retirement account).

Until recently, employers were supposed to wait at least 30 days before handing over the money, enough time, according to the IRS, for the employer to warn about the taxes and for the employee to change his mind and transfer the money to an IRA. The newest IRS rules are more realistic. Since someone requesting a hardship withdrawal from a retirement account obviously needs immediate cash for an emergency, the employer is now empowered to turn it over right away.

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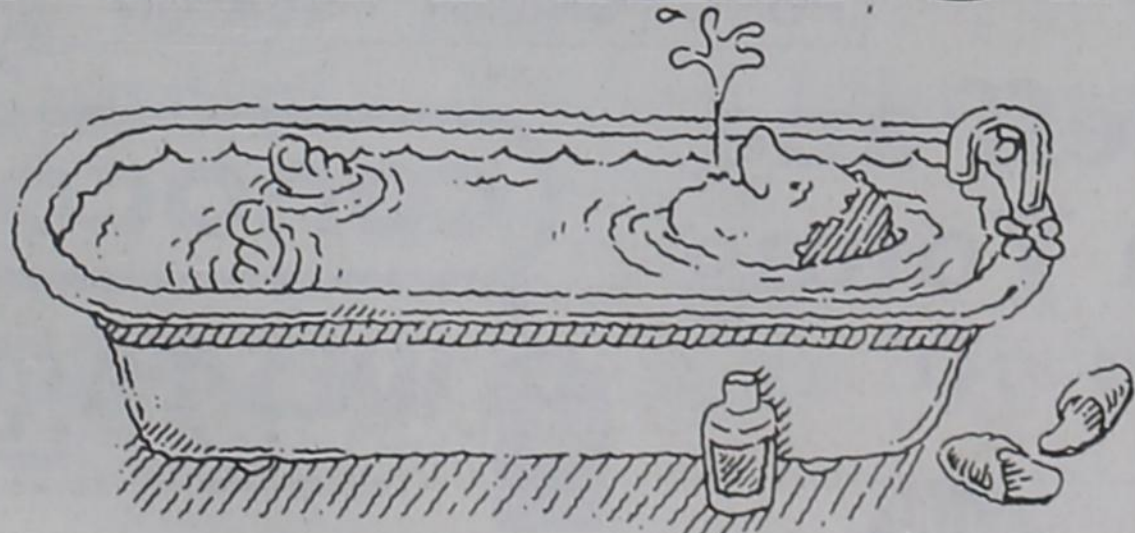

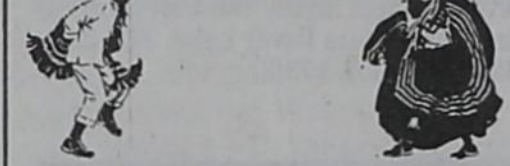

## From the Pulpit

## A Proper Founding

Founders' Day is upon us once again. It is the day in which our community looks back in admiration and respect for the pioneer spirit that established our town. A proper founding or foundation is essential for any living organization in order that it may stand.

Our homes need a sure foundation as well. We need to build our homes and structure our families upon a sure foundation that has been proven to stand. In Matt. 7:24-27. Jesus compares two men, a foolish and a wise man. One man "built this house upon the rock" and the other "built his upon the sand." Each man faced the same calamities. However, each man had very different results based upon their choices of foundations.

First lets look at what these two men had in common. Jesus says about the wise man that "the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and burst against the house". (Matt. 7:25) The Lord also says about the foolish man that "the rains descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and burst against the house." (Matt 7:27) Each man had to endure the storms of life. Every family or household experiences difficult sailing at one time or another. Jesus taught that the proper foundation was the word of God. He said "therefore everyone who hears these words of mine, and acts upon them, may be compared to a wise man, who built his house upon the rock. And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the wind blew, and burst against that house; and yet it did not fall, for it had been founded upon the rock." (7:24-25). Jesus Christ is the rock upon whom we can build a home that will indeed stand against all the storms of life. Our families can weather the difficulties of life without falling if we build upon the solid rock.

In conclusion let me encourage you to build your homes centered around Jesus Christ and his Word. If you have not you can always relocate and rebuild. Remember our founder, C.W. Post who first founded our community up on the cap. He found that the sand blew the tents to rags and that the railroad was going to pass them by. He had the insight and courage to relocate and rebuild. If you feel as if your living in "Rag Town" and have missed the train, pull up your stakes and rebuild upon the solid rock. It is never too late for a person who will build upon a proper foundation.

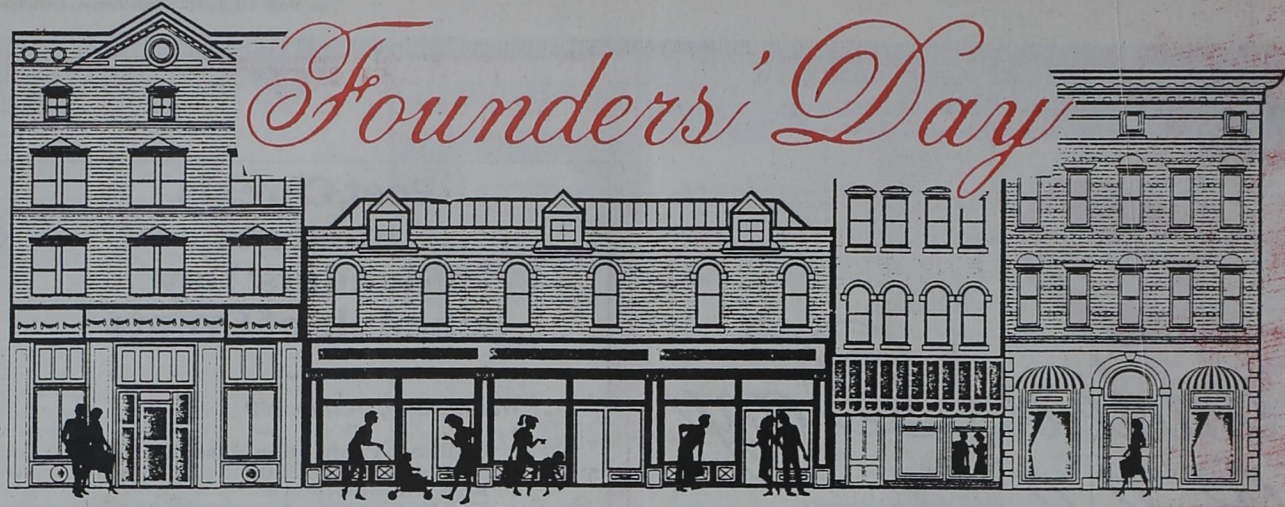

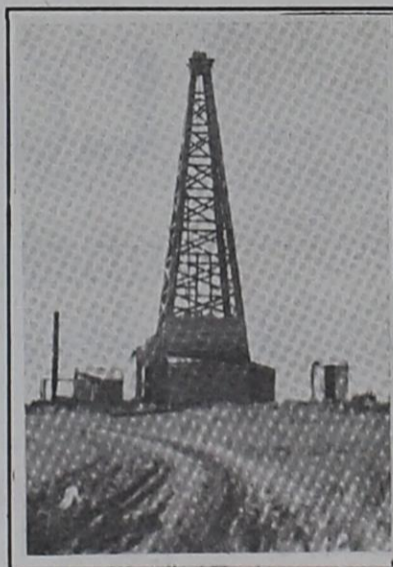

the Post City Oil Development company is capitalized at \$98,000. It was organized in March, 1919, by local citizens, who acquired some 14,000 acres of leases, and a derrick was erected in September, 1919; the derrick burned down December 27th, 1919. Drilling was resumed in February, 1920.

Small gas pockets were found in the neighborhood of 1200 feet. Gas pockets were continuously encountered to 2,900 feet, where gas in greater volume appeared, and the prospectors reported some oil indications.

Drilling was resumed after trouble with water, and operations have been progressing towards a 3,500 foot depth, with the encouragement of geologists and experts that there is a prospect for finding oil.

At present the oil well has cost in the neighborhood of \$1000,000, and it is the purpose of the owners to proceed further, looking toward a full determination, if possible, as to the likelihood of finding oil in paying

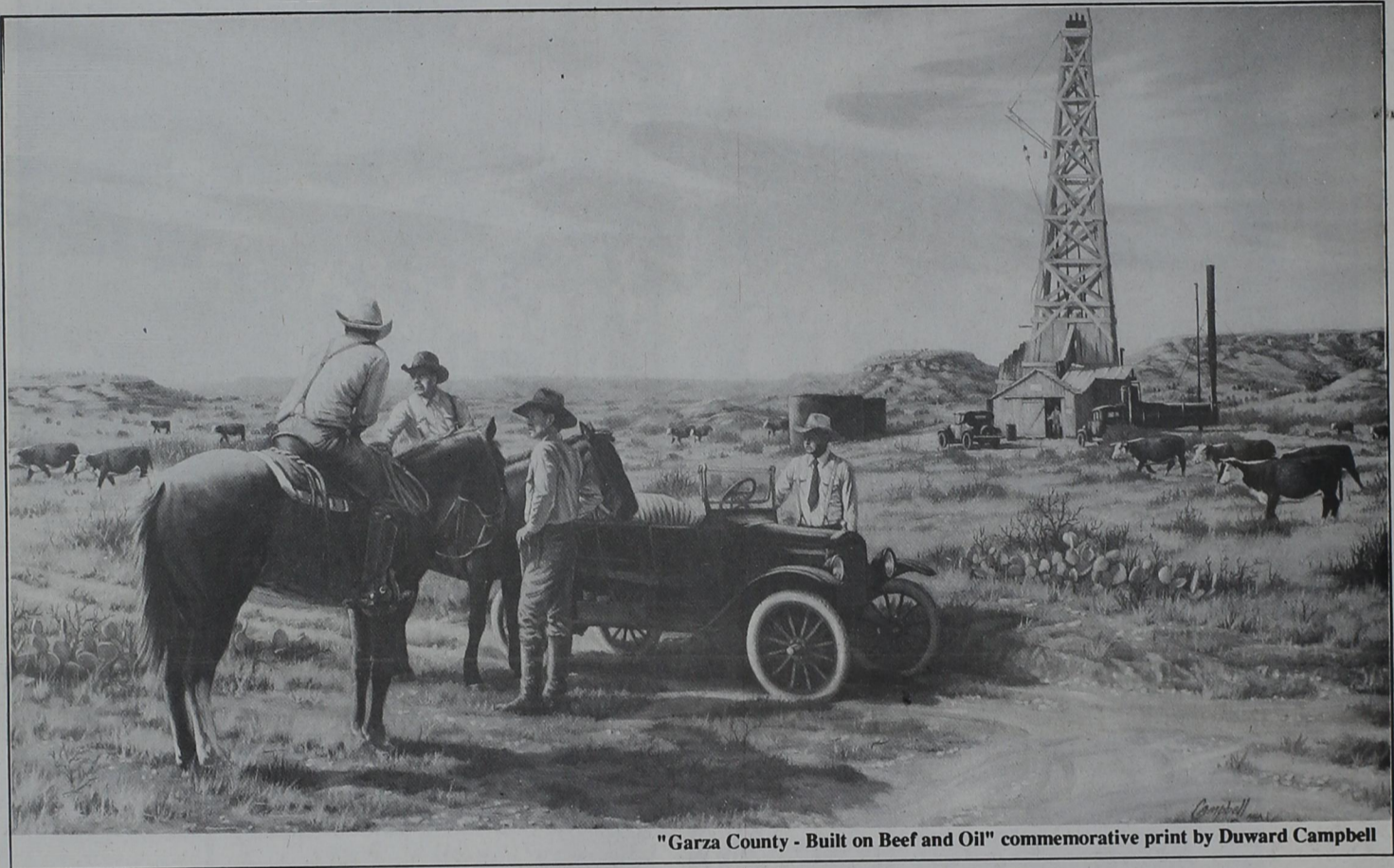
