Courthouse annex vote loses support

Support for the proposed courthouse annex is all but dead following action by the Garza County Commissioners Court Monday morning. During a specially called meeting Monday, October 18, the commissioners court attempted to remove the bond issue that would be used to fund the \$1.2 million project from the November 2 election.

In fact, the court did approve a motion to remove the item from the election, but after checking with state officials, including the Texas Secretary of State, the court learned it did not have the authority to remove the question from the ballot. The court made the inquiries at the state level after Garza County Democratic Chairman Lewis Earl

questioned whether the court had the authority to remove the item from the ballot.

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby had called for the removal of the bond issue from the upcoming election.

"It would be my recommendation that we pull this down and not even put it on the ballot. Things being the way they are, we have some other pressing things that will be demanding our attention the next few months," said Judge Dalby referring to the tax rollback effort currently underway in the county.

The bond issue will still be on the November ballot, but the commissioners court fully expects the question to be soundly defeated.

The collapse of the bond's support

leaves the county still searching for a way to bring the 70 year old courthouse into compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA), the federal law that spurred the court to even look at placing the bond issue before the voters.

"The law is the law, it's not going to change," said Judge Dalby. "The county is still going to have to look at doing something to the courthouse to bring it into compliance."

Failure to bring the courthouse into compliance with ADA leaves the county open to possible lawsuits and heavy federal fines.

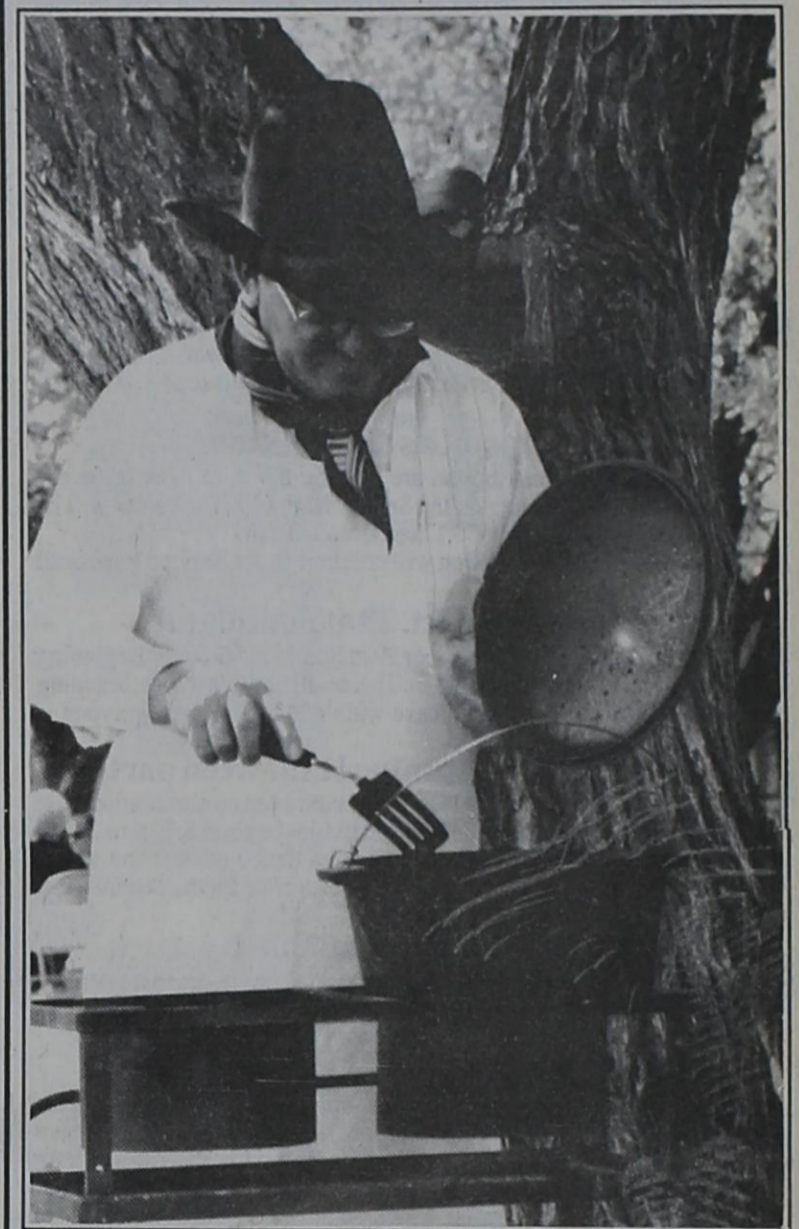
"Just because we have the threat of a rollback is no excuse to not do anything," said Commissioner Herb

Walls.

The court indicated it will wait until the results of the rollback effort are known before moving ahead and making alternative plans. Judge Dalby made it clear though, any decision the court makes would be subject to voter scrutiny.

"We could have some more public hearings," said the Judge. "I would hope though that we would have more people come out," to the hearings.

One thing the bond election will do for the commissioners court though, if voters go ahead and reject the issue like the commissioners think they will do, it removes the commissioners from personal liability should the county be sued.

Commissioners prepare for rollback election

Garza Co. Commissioners Court expects petitions to be turned in at any time

The Garza County Commissioners Court is preparing for the very real possibility of a property tax rollback election in the county. The commissioners are expecting petitions calling for the election to be turned in during their next regular meeting on Monday, October 25.

Once the petitions are turned in, the county will have 20 days to verify the signatures on the petitions and then another 90 days to call the election. If the rollback election is successful, the county will see a \$157,000 decrease in revenues. If this is the case, the commissioners will have to trim the recently adopted budget by the expected loss of income.

According to Garza County Judge Giles Dalby, if and when the petitions

are turned in, the court will hold a number of budget workshops to develop a plan of action should the rollback prove successful. The Judge said he would like any possible cuts decided on before the election so voters will know exactly what will be effected.

"We will let the people know that if we cut back, here's what to expect and if they go ahead and vote for it, fine," said Dalby. "They (the voters) need to know both sides of the story and if they don't care and say go ahead, okay."

The court is also asking all entities it is in partnership with (primarily the city of Post) to ask them to be "very frugal in their spending until we know the outcome of this election," said Judge Dalby.

Judge Dalby is also taking the courts message to various groups in the county, asking that they look closely at the possible cuts before they vote.

He said much of the feedback he is receiving from the county is one of frustration with higher taxes, on the local, state and national level.

"The tax payer is frustrated," said the Judge. "They feel they can't do anything about federal income taxes and state fees, but on the other hand here we sit and they have a vehicle (the rollback election) to come in and vent their frustrations."

Sheriff tackles assault rumors circulating in county

Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke is moving to quell rumors of numerous sexual assaults in the county.

"Somebody's having a good time misleading these folks," said Ratke over the recent deluge of rumors. "People are spreading false rumors and blowing the number of incidents out of proportion."

Ratke said the rumors were creating

an atmosphere of fear for some Post citizens. The sheriff said that yes, there have been two reported cases of sexual assault in the county, but the two incidents were several months apart.

"The one several months ago was a legitimate attempt," said Ratke. "We think it may be linked to a suspect in California."

Ratke said the most recent report of a sexual assault approximately two

weeks ago was harder to confirm. He said his officers were checking out what information they had in the case.

The sheriff said in light of the recent outbreak of rumors, his office was stepping up certain preventative measures "just to go that extra mile and make sure all of the bases are covered," said Ratke.

Among the steps the sheriff's office has taken includes a heightened awareness of possible situations by

sheriff's officers and some foot patrols.

Ratke says he has also contacted the Texas Rangers who have sent a ranger out of the Lubbock office to assist in any way possible.

The sheriff's office is also looking at conducting a number of public safety classes that would provide information on dealing with attackers. The course subject matter would also include detailed safety instructions when dealing with firearms.

According to Chief Deputy Maurice Herridge, if there is enough public interest, he will also bring in an individual from Lubbock who will provide instruction with a chemical deterrent which is reported to be stronger than mace.

"I'd rather have people use this than have them out their wielding guns," said Herridge.

Persons interested in any form of a home safety and crime prevention

program are asked to call the sheriff's office. Herridge said based on the amount of response, the sheriff's office may offer a number of these classes, allowing people to pick and choose convenient times to attend.

Ratke said, that while it is rumors causing the fear among town's people, a little precaution is still a good idea.

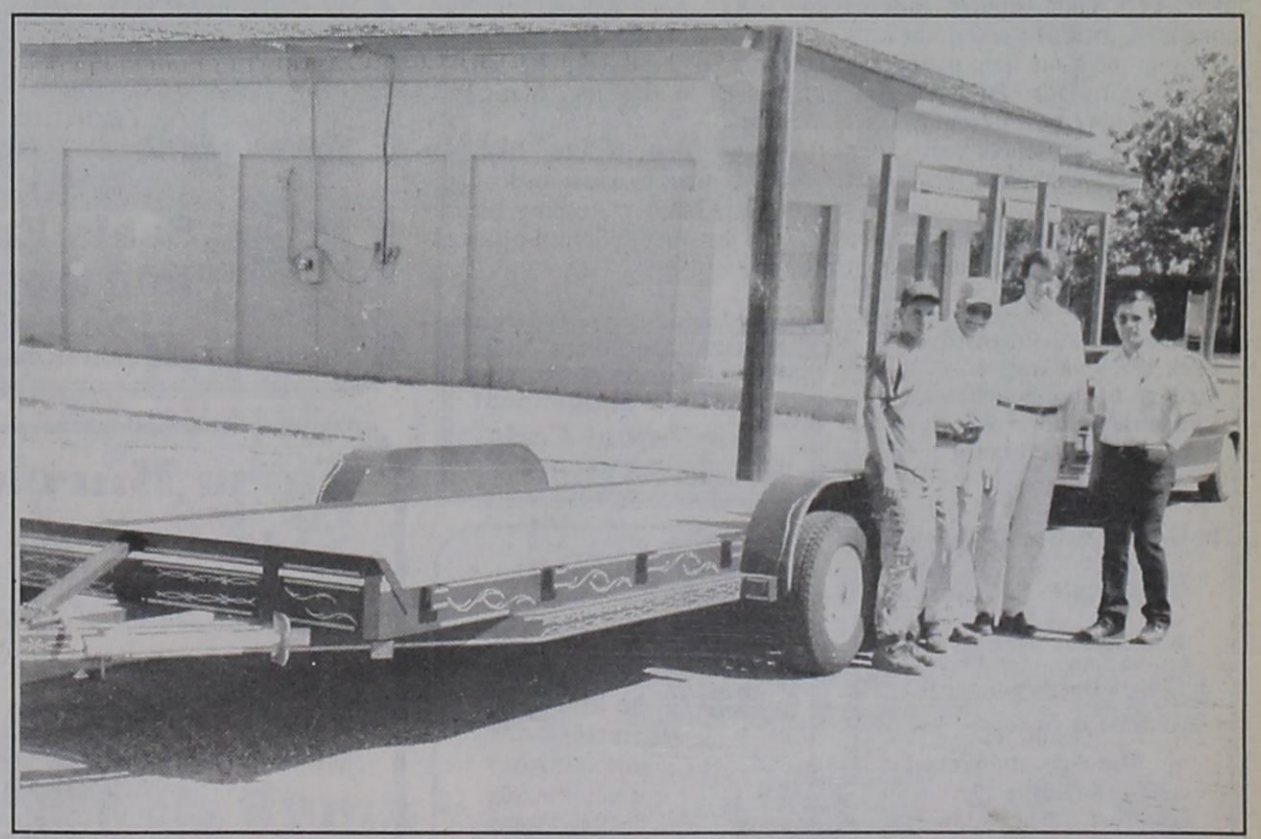
"I do believe that we live in a day and age where we need to be more careful and use a reasonable amount of caution," said Ratke.

'Lopes stop Roughnecks 20-7 for homecoming win

Post's 20 to 7 win over the Sundown Roughnecks was like a dull knife cutting fresh bread, the process wasn't pretty, but at least the job got done. The 'Lopes struggled for offensive continuity all night against the visiting Roughnecks last Friday in the

Antelopes homecoming game. "There were a lot of outside factors," said Bold Gold head coach Dewayne Osborne. "Homecoming is a hard game to win." The coach also said the 'Lopes may have been looking past the Roughnecks who came into the game with but a

single win on the season. "We just didn't prepare mentally like we normally do," said Osborne. "I'm not overly upset at not playing our best. We've been on the other side of the ball where we played well and didn't win. I'm glad we could not play up to our capabilities and still win."

Despite the "off night" by the offense, the 'Lopes still rang up 295 yards on offense including 275 yards on the ground. Senior tailback Tim Bell led the Bold Gold ground assault with 125 yards on 17 carries. Adrian Castillo added another 75 yards on nine carries. Brad Lawson and Noe Gomez each carried the ball five times with Lawson picking up 32 yards and Gomez adding 21. Alvin Reed added 28 more yards on two carries including a touchdown run of four yards.

Antelope quarterback Jim Riley Simpson added another 20 yards to the Bold Gold attack, connecting on three of 12 attempts with one interception. Osborne said the numbers weren't indicative of Simpson's play. He said a number of balls were dropped by receivers.

"These numbers aren't a reflection on Jim," said Osborne. "He's thrown the ball pretty good most of the season." Osborne said the 'Lopes kept their attack simple, relying on basic plays against the overmatched Roughnecks.

"We didn't try to put anything special on, we knew we could come in and play a sound game and still win," said Osborne.

Sundown also had a little say in the 'Lopes offensive struggles. The Roughnecks used a gambling, blitzing defense to try and compensate for Post edge in talent. Some plays the gamble worked and others it didn't. It was enough though to help throw the 'Lopes offense off stride.

Defensively, the Bold Gold turned in solid performance, holding the Roughnecks to under 200 yards total offense. Sundown rushed the ball for 157 yards and threw for an additional 20 against the 'Lope defenders. Along

with the usual monster hits by linebackers Lemuel McDonald and Russ Bird, the 'Lopes received a boost from cornerback Oscar Acevedo who intercepted two passes, returning one for a touchdown.

Acevedo's touchdown in the waning seconds of the first quarter broke a scoreless tie. Up to that point, the 'Lopes had had the ball three times, punting once and turning the ball over on downs the other two times. His pick came three plays after the 'Lopes failed to convert a fourth down play from inside the Roughneck 35 yard line.

Sundown quarterback Kyle Motheral lofted a pass out to the right flat where Acevedo camped under the ball at the 42 and raced into the left corner of the endzone untouched for the 'Lopes first score. Phil Leininger added the extra point and the 'Lopes led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

The 'Lopes didn't get their first offensive touchdown until just under four minutes were left in the half when Reed capped off a 10 play 58 yard drive with a four yard plunge. Leininger's second PAT gave Post a 14-0 lead.

Reed played a big part in the drive, exploding for a 20 yard gain from the Roughneck 37 down to the 17 on a fourth and almost five play.

Sundown threatened late in the first half. After taking the kick following the 'Lopes second score, the Roughnecks drove down to the Post three yard line only to be denied by Post. The 70 plus yard drive began at the Sundown 25. It included long runs by Bryan McCormack and Keith Willard. Willard gave the Roughnecks at first and goal at the 'Lope six following a 38 yard romp from the Post 44.

The 'Lopes put it all together on their first drive of the second half. Taking over at their own 26 following a Sundown punt, the 'Lopes steamrolled the Roughnecks on a six play, 74 yard drive that was capped off by a three yard run by Castillo. The drive, all on the ground, featured long gainers by Bell and Gomez. Leininger's point after attempt went wide right leaving the score at Post 20, Sundown 0. This was Leininger's first miss in two games

Seventh grade edged by Sundown

The Bold Gold seventh grade 'Lopes defense limited the visiting Sundown 11 to one scoring drive last Thursday in Post. Unfortunately, the one drive was enough as a successful two point conversion was all the Roughnecks needed as they edged the Antelopes 8-6 in football action.

Roughnecks controlled the ball almost the entire quarter as they methodically drove down field and scored from the five on a fourth and goal. Post broke on top in the contest when Javier Ramos took a simple off-tackle play and turned it into a 70 yard touchdown scamper in the games first play. The Antelope back finished with

109 yards on nine carries. "We played good defense most of the game," said Bold Gold coach Chili Black. "Colt McCook had two interceptions and Albert Armendariz had two fumble recoveries." The 'Lopes edged Sundown statistically, out gaining the Roughnecks 146 yards to 135.

Eighth grade Antelopes make quick work of Sundown Roughnecks

Cody Nelson and the rest of the Bold Gold eighth grade 'Lopes ran roughshod over the visiting Sundown Roughnecks last Thursday in Post. Nelson scored on runs of 8, 51 and 46 yards as the 'Lopes built a 20-0 lead after their first three drives of the game. Post only needed seven plays to put up the 20 points.

Nelson's eight yard run came after a four play, 32 yard drive on the 'Lopes first offensive crack at the Roughnecks. The next time Post had the ball, the 'Lopes only needed two plays. Nelson showed some speed as he raced through a gaping hole in the Sundown defense opened by his blockers and galloped 51 yards for the score.

The 'Lopes all but put the game away the next time they touched the ball. Nelson, running through another huge hole opened by the Bold Gold offensive linemen, carried the ball in from 46 yards out. The 'Lopes converted on their two point try when Antelope quarterback Jamie Hernandez tossed the ball to wide-out Slade Beavers who made a nice two handed grab. Post held this 20-0 lead up until the closing moments of the half when Sundown was able to push across its only score of the game.

The two teams battled through a scoreless third quarter. Post put up the game's final points in the fourth quarter when Homer Gomez scored from 13 yards out. Gomez's score capped a seven play, 75 yard drive by the 'Lopes. Gomez also had a big play preceding

Sundown dumps J.V.

Post's junior varsity Antelopes put their 5-1 record on the line last Thursday in a showdown with the undefeated Sundown Roughnecks in a clash with district title implications. The home standing Roughnecks kept their record unblemished as they ran off 25 unanswered points in a 25-8 setback for the 'Lopes. "We were defeated by a very good team," said Bold Gold coach Mitch Rasberry. "They were the best team we have played. We need to buckle down and learn from this." Rasberry said good teams meet adversity head on and improve from their experiences. "We need to do this," said Rasberry. The 'Lopes broke out on top in the first quarter when Bold Gold fullback Saul Martinez found his way to the endzone on a 50 yard romp and a sweep for the 'Lopes. Josh Grisham hooked up with Jerry Crawford on the two point conversion and Post led 8-0. That was as good as it got for the visiting 'Lopes. Sundown showed why they have yet to taste defeat this season as they shut down the high powered Antelope offense the rest of the way. The 'Lopes were limited to 32 offensive plays by the stingy Roughneck defense. The Antelope rushers picked up 116 yards on 28 carries while the passing attack generated 11 yards with two completions in four attempts. The junior 'Lopes are the only Post team in action this week as they host Denver City this coming Thursday, October 21 at Antelope field. Kickoff has been changed from 5 p.m. until 6 p.m.

A Season to Remember

'Lopes of a decade ago capture second straight district crown

November 12, 1983
For the first time in Post High school history, the Antelope football team has captured the undisputed bi-district championship in two consecutive years. The 1983 team brought home the bi-district trophy from Brownfield, following a convincing 25-0 shut-out of the Friendship Tigers. The Antelope defense not only didn't allow a score, but gave up only 63 yards total defense in the first half. Milton Williams led the team in rushing with 216 unofficially tallied yards and quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick connected on five of eight pass attempts for 87 yards, including a touchdown toss to Charles Johnson. Friendship coach Bobby Davis has commented earlier in the week on a Lubbock television station that he knew the Tigers had to stop Williams... "and the best way to do that is to keep the ball away from Post," Davis said. The stiff Antelope defense killed any ideas the Tigers had of keeping the football, as the District 4AAA second place team could only muster three first downs in the first half.

November 19, 1983
Muleshoe Mules lived up to their great defensive reputation, but when it came right down to the wire, it was the Post Antelope defense which made the difference in Levelland as the 'Lopes retained the Area Championship trophy in a 14-10 squeaker. Actually, you could say that the Antelope defense and offense did what had to be done when the chips were down. Racing a fourth down at the half yard line, with 37 seconds remaining in the game and trailing 14-10, the classic finish sent a wave of panic through the Antelope crowd as Mule quarterback Jeff Hamilton took the snap from center and tried to push his way into the end-zone. The officials carefully unplied the stack of players at the goal line... then spotted the ball at the half yard line, signaling Post is possession. Led by Giles Dalby in the middle and anchored by L.D. Harper and David Shults on the ends, the Post defensive squad played inspired football in the final seconds of the contest. "Lope quarterback Joel Kirkpatrick inched the ball out from the end-zone to the one yard line... then the Antelopes retreated to the end zone huddle and watched the clock tick down the seconds as they were declared the Area Champions. They will face the winner of Saturday night's match-up between Electra and

Crane.
The final Mule drive was highlighted by a fourth down pass from Hamilton to Trent Hysinger, setting up a first down at the nine yard line with less than a minute left in the game. Two plays later Felix Bustos cut off a sure Mule touchdown as he bulled his way through a would-be block at the Mules' left end, stopping Hysinger at the five. Jerry Gleason took a hand off over right tackle to the one and the Mules called time out with 43 seconds left. They came back with a quarter back sneak which was defended as well as any defense can do... snuffing out any hopes of an upset by the Mules. The Antelopes drew first blood, scoring with 3:25 left in the first quarter, as Bustos took a pitchout option to the left from Kirkpatrick and wouldn't be denied that end zone from five yards out as he tore away from a would-be tackler. Chuck Morris kicked the first of two successful extra points. The battle of the statistics was won by Muleshoe, which held the explosive Post offense to its lowest production this year. Milton Williams gained 77 yards on 34 carries as Muleshoe Mark Moton picked up 44 yards on 17 tries.

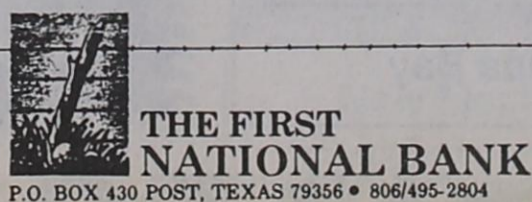

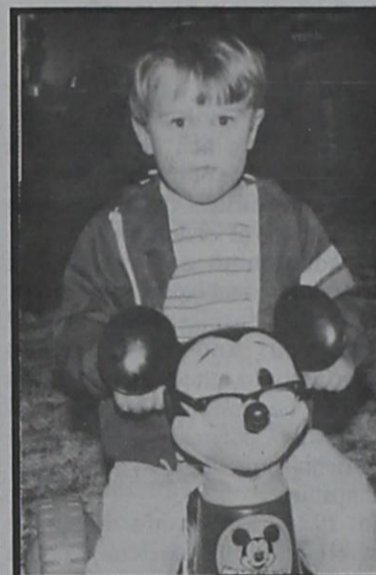

Tax 'n Facts

HELP FROM YOUR TAX PRO
Faced with new tax rules, smart folks are meeting with the experts to find how to get around them. Basic: to lower adjusted gross income, make the most of the tax-saving opportunities that come "off the top." Fully fund your IRA, Keogh or 401(k); utilize FSA plans at work.

Invest tax-free where you can. Even where this income is counted as part of "provisional income" when determining tax on Social Security, it helps; for the same effective yield, the tax-free total income is lower. Consider bunching retirement fund distributions in one year—in January and December, perhaps—and keeping income lower the next.

Taxes on long-term capital gains are still at 28 percent, so it pays to structure your portfolio to hold investments for at least a year to realize long-term capital gains instead of ordinary income.

Be aware, though, that the IRS will try to tighten any loopholes.

With the new rates, more people will be subject to the alternative minimum tax which has increased from 24% to 26% or 28%, depending on your taxable income. See an expert to run the numbers; if you are at risk, the AMT will totally change your year-end tax planning.
