Cooper crowned 1994 PHS Sweetheart

The 16 contestants each went through a private interview with the three judges before being introduced to the audience. All 16 then participated in the talent portion of the contest before the five finalists were chosen. The five finalists were then each asked a question which helped determine the winner. Judges for this year's event were Tonya Kirkpatrick who is a flight attendant with American Airlines, Meredith McAllister and Greg McAllister, both from KAMC-TV Channel 28 in Lubbock. 1993 FHA Sweetheart Tonya Harp served as Mistress of Ceremonies. Also, prior to the presentation of the finalists, Harp and Radley Nichols provided entertainment, singing a duet.

Two local races to be decided Primary vote March 8

Garza County voters will decide the outcome of two local races in next week's primary elections. The offices of County Commissioner in two precincts are up for grabs with only one incumbent, Albert Stone in precinct two, vying for re-election.

Stone, who is completing his first term as commissioner faces construction business worker and service station owner Cecil Foster Jr.

The three candidates in precinct four are trying to replace long-time commissioner Herbert Walls who has announced his retirement. They include: Royce Josey, Lupe Quintana and Willie Moreno. All three candidates are long-time Garza County residents. With no prior experience in handling county finances, the three men are relying on their experience and reputation in the private sector.

"They know me and they like me," said Lupe Quintana when asked why voters should elect him. Quintana has been a resident of Garza County for more than 20 years and runs his own business, Post Auto Service.

Willie Moreno, a 39 year resident of the county cites his 40 years experience in farming and ranching as proof of financial responsibility.

"I oppose any increase in taxes to pay for un-needed services. I believe that Garza County can live within the budget," he said.

Royce Josey considers himself as "semi-retired" from working in the oil business including much experience in consulting.

"I'm more qualified than any of my opponents in business and working with a budget," Josey said. The candidate was born and raised in Garza County.

Each precinct supervises approximately 1/4 of the county and commissioners serve a four year term, responsible mainly for construction and maintenance of roads and bridges in their precinct.

"This job entails overseeing the finance of the county through the budget process," said Lee Norman, county commissioner of precinct one. "In providing funds to county departments, I'd like to see a business man's approach."

Norman is responsible for over 130 miles of roads in his precinct and is currently serving in his second year.

"Whoever is elected, however, I'll work with them," he said.

The deadline for voting in the election is 7:00pm on election day, Tuesday, March 8. Walk-in voting is available now until Friday.

County backs grant request

Based on state figures, Garza County ranks near the top when it comes to the need for a county-wide drug and alcohol abuse prevention education program. State figures presented by City/County Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program director Colleen Tyler, Garza County ranks 45th in need from the 250 counties reported in the survey. Armed with these facts, Tyler and Joanne Waterhouse from the local drug and alcohol program here in Post asked the Garza County Commissioners for their blessing as they pursue a SPAG grant to fund a pre-K through 12 alcohol and drug prevention program in Post and Southland schools.

"We have a greater need than Lubbock!" said Tyler speaking to the commissioners court during its February 28 meeting.

She said Post and Garza County ranked higher in need in substance abuse death, drug use and child poverty.

The grant would be used to fund the "Choices" program. Waterhouse would handle the bulk of the in-school

presentation of the material and educational programs associated with the Choices program.

"We need to let young people know one of their biggest powers is the ability to make choices," said Waterhouse. She said the Choices program teaches life skills, giving young people tools they can use even as adults.

Tyler said they are requesting a \$53,000 grant to help fund the program. But based on comments received so far, Tyler said the local program will receive less than the amount requested, if it receives any grant money at all.

"We were told the chances of getting a grant were small," said Tyler. "But if there is even a small chance for the grant, we're going through with it."

Tyler and Waterhouse needed the commissioners to pass a resolution supporting their pursuit of the grant because if it proves successful, the county will be asked to help fund the program next year to the tune of 20 percent. The grant, if approved this

Living on the Edge of the Caprock

Garden checklist for late winter

This time of year has a way of bringing to mind that gardening time is just around the corner. It would seem appropriate to have a few things in mind to help give you a boost as we head into spring.

Hopefully, these ten items will in some way allow you to be better prepared for the upcoming garden growing season.

• Now, while they are dormant, is an excellent time to transplant mature or established trees and shrubs.

• Be sure to prune back the top of established trees and shrubs before moving them. Remove no more than 1/3 to 1/2 of the top to compensate for roots lost to digging.

• Make your flower and vegetable garden plans now before the rush of spring planting and buying. Time spent in armchair gardens can pay off in improved plant selection.

• Sow seeds in flats or containers in protected structures to get plant growth before hot weather arrives. Petunias, Begonias and slow-growing transplants should be sown in early February. Warm temperature plants such as tomatoes, peppers, marigolds and periwinkles should be sown later this month.

• Put a light application of fertilizer on established pansy plantings. Use 1/2 pound of ammonium sulfate per 100 square feet of bed area. Repeat every 4-6 weeks depending on rainfall.

• Prepare beds and garden area for spring planting.

• Select and order gladiolus corms for February and March planting. Allow two weeks planting intervals to prolong flowering periods.

• Check juniper and other narrow leaf evergreens for bagworm pouches. The insect eggs overwinter in the pouch and start the cycle again by emerging in the spring and feeding on foliage. Removing the pouches by hand and

burning them is an excellent means of reducing the potential damage.

• The life of flowering pot plant received as a Christmas gift can be prolonged with proper care. Keep the soil moist but make sure to provide drainage so excess moisture can flow away from the pot. Keep the plant out of range of heating ducts and away from heating units. Keep in a cool room at night, preferably 60-65 degrees.

• Prune roses during March and April. Remember that climbing roses and other once-blooming roses are best pruned after the print flowers have faded.

Capital Credits are returned to the Cooperative's member owners by the general nature of the Cooperative system and the way they are operated. Each dollar of payment by a member in excess of the cost of providing electric service is an investment in the cooperative by the

Which judge used his common sense? **Mike McCormick.**

A defendant offered to sell an undercover officer what the defendant called "twenty-cent rock." The defendant actually delivered a substance that was not cocaine. Under a law prohibiting the delivery of a simulated controlled substance, the jury convicted the defendant, finding that the defendant's words were commonly understood to mean a \$20 piece of cocaine. The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the conviction. *Boykin v. State*, 818 S. W. 2d 782 (Tex. Crim. App. 1991).

<p>Presiding Judge McCormick voted to affirm the conviction.</p> <p>McCormick said it was absurd to require a drug dealer to use the scientific name of a controlled substance (cocaine) to be guilty of offering to deliver a simulated controlled substance. Everyone understood the slang term used by the defendant.</p>	<p>Judge Baird voted to reverse the conviction.</p> <p>Baird, by his vote, agreed that the drug dealer in this case had to state expressly the scientific name of a controlled substance to be convicted. As part of the majority, thought it did not make any difference that everyone understood what the drug dealer was offering.</p>

The competition comes from the 24 athletes vying for playing time on the

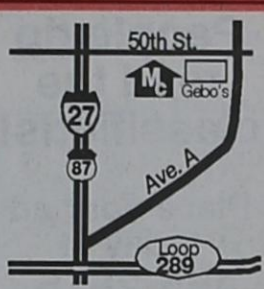
1994 Antelope baseball squad. Postell is excited and encouraged by the turnout in only the program's third year since being resurrected.

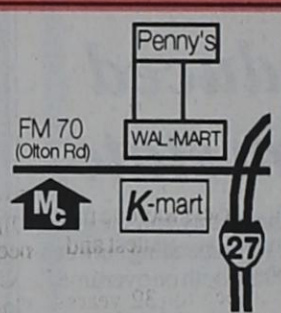

Counselor's Corner

The day your child stays home alone is a momentous one. A commonly accepted age at which a majority of parents feel that a child can be expected to be able to successfully stay home alone is 10 years of age. This of course cannot be considered a hard, fast rule. The child's maturity and abilities are crucial.

When you and your child agree that he is ready it is best to start with short periods of time. For example 30 or 40 minutes while you go to the store. Use these early trials as learning periods checking with your child to be sure that everything is running as smoothly and safely as you both want it, too.

Preparation for this step toward greater responsibility and independence requires a lot of ground work to ensure it's success. Your child needs to have the necessary knowledge, be physically able and emotionally mature enough to follow your security rules. It is always more effective to write these rules down and include emergency phone numbers, addresses and numbers where you can be reached at all times. Keep the rules in an accessible consistent place. Near the telephone is a good one.

Important rules you will want to list are:
• Never let anyone in the house when you are alone unless the parent has made special, specific, exceptions. This rule includes children.
• The child never says that he is alone in the house.
• If someone tries to force his way into the house the child should go out another door and run to a prearranged neighbor's home. The child should call you and then the police.

• Never go with anyone except someone you have specifically said they can go with even if the person says things such as, "Your mother has been in an accident and sent me to get you..."

If your child is going to let himself in the house after school the house key can be worn around the neck, but concealed by his clothing. A visible key and chain

around a child's neck advertises to everyone the fact that he will be home alone.

If the house looks like it has been entered during the day tell your child not to go in, but instead to go to a prearranged neighbor's home and call you immediately. If your child feels like he is being followed he should never go on home; instead stay in well populated areas. Any public place, such as stores, offices, libraries can provide good protection from bullying kids as well as a menacing looking adult. The grownups in these places can help your child. If the first adult fails to listen instruct your child to keep asking until someone does listen. Your child should then explain the situation to them and ask for their help.

Remind your child not to talk to strangers and to stand well away from any car that stops and the people in it try to question or otherwise engage them in conversation. Many of these points children may be aware of already, but they can be over again.

The goal is to keep your child safe. Don't just tell your child safety rules, but also role-play different "what if" situations with them. Practicing these "what if" situations helps your child to be better prepared to handle various situations and to pick the best options. Practice with you helps him not only learn how to keep himself safe; but it also increases his confidence and self esteem. Personal competence is valued by young and old.

Making arrangements with other parents in your area to help one another's child if the need arises can provide safety for your child and peace of mind for you. Check in with your child by phone regularly. This can deter some problems from developing because the lines of communication are always open. It also helps your child to feel less isolated and possibly fearful. Sometimes children are reluctant to say they are afraid lest they lose your respect. Whether this is going to happen or not children often think it will and they are eager to be seen as strong and capable.

Staying home alone is an important milestone as parents we want to foster competence, independence and confidence in our children.

There are many excellent books on the market parents may want to refer to for added information on preparing their child to stay home alone. Included in this number are *Teaching Your Child to Be Home Alone* by Earl Grollman and Gerri Sweder and *Safe and Sound* by Trudy K. Dana.

County accepts reduced grant funding from state

A funding shortfall by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission has left the county facing a \$11,160 reduction in its Solid Waste Enforcement grant allocation. Despite this shortfall, the county has opted to take state money that is available and make the best of it.

The original grant application was for \$24,000, the same amount the county received last year. It was used by the Garza County Sheriff's office to provide a solid waste enforcement officer. This officer was also incorporated into the general staff of the sheriff's department, giving sheriff Kenny Ratke an extra man on the streets for patrol.

Even with the reduced award of \$12,840, sheriff Ratke and the commissioners court feel they can work with the program.

"I looked back over the last two

years (before the county had the grant money) and we were spending between \$800 and \$1,300 a month on overtime," said Ratke.

He added that with the grant, overtime expenses were virtually non-existent. "I would just as soon keep this (the reduced grant) than pay overtime," said commissioner Herb Walls.

The activity of the Solid Waste Enforcement officer is well documented, as the county's larger percentage of the grant it did receive attests too. Garza County received over 50 percent of their request while the program state-wide only received less than one third of its funding.

Tax 'n Facts

REAL ESTATE AND THE NEW TAX LAW
Under the new tax law, residential real estate looks even better as a tax shelter. The higher tax rates go, the more valuable the deductions for mortgage interest costs and for real estate taxes become. Indeed, this may be a really good time to invest in a vacation home: prices are still depressed, and there are almost identical tax benefits.
Couples who earn less than \$100,000 have kept the right to offset losses from rental income against ordinary income, and a new wrinkle relaxes passive-loss rules for those earning more than \$150,000--if one spouse works in real estate at least 15 hours a week.
But rules have been tightened on the transfer of homes to a trust by the elderly who are about to go into a nursing home. This "Medicaid trust" was commonly used to protect the equity in the home from nursing home debt. Now, the trust must be set up 36 months (up from 30 months) before seeking Medicaid, and the granting of lifetime occupancy rights may invalidate the trust for Medicaid purposes.

From the Pulpit Llamando La Antencion De Dios

"Y se oyó que estaba en casa. Y luego se juntaron a él muchos, que ya no cabían ni aun a la puerta; y le predicaba la palabra. Entonces vinieron a él unos trayendo un paralítico, que era traído por cuatro (Marcos 2:1-12).
