# Founders' Day will bring food and fun for the whole family

The annual Founders' Day celebration is just two weeks off and Post is buzzing with anticipation. Main Street will be blocked off from the rail road tracks to Broadway. The street will be filled with food booths, craft booths and exhibits of every imaginable kind. Saturday, October 15 has a full day of scheduled events though many things will be happening long before then.

Saturday, October 1 there will be a Founders' Day Style Show from 11:00-12:00 at the Old Mill Trade Days, Rainmaker Stage. Tickets for the event will be on sale at the Old Mill Trade Days from September 30-October 1. T-shirts for the Founders' Day festivities will also be on sale at that time.

Keeping with tradition, the Double U Bull Sale will be held Wednesday, October 12 at the west end of 13th street under a huge tent beginning at 11:30 a. m. Representatives of the C. W. Post- Montgomery families are scheduled to be there along with cowboys of the Double U Ranch. The Double U Ranch promotes the registered Hereford bull sale to bring potential buyers to Post, though everyone is invited to attend.

One of the long considered highlights of Founders' Day is the Black Tie & Boots celebration. The dance celebration kicks off Friday, October 14. It will begin with a preview party from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. Hors d'oeuvres and cocktails will be

served. Rendezvous of the Arts Western Art Show Artists will have many selected pieces on display. Many of the artists who participated will be there to visit with you.

A dance and all-you-can eat buffet begins at 7:00 and continues until midnight. Riata, a 6-member band from the Dallas area will provide their "Country with attitude" music. Riata has a background in a wide variety of music such as country, gospel, rhythm & blues, classic rock, to bluegrass.

A wide variety of food will be available including beef or chicken fajitas with all the trimmings, enchiladas, rice,

beans, guacamole, chips and dip along with desert. Two cash bars will be there to give people the opportunity to purchase beverages during the entire evening.

The Founders' Day commemorative painting by Duward Campbell, along with various other Western art and items will be auctioned at the dance. Souvenir pictures will be available and raffle tickets for a Remington 870 Express Pump Shotgun can be purchased for \$5.00 or six for \$25.00.

## Commissioners set new budget extension office will remain

### Tax rate set at 36 ¢ No more 3% discount.

Garza County Commissioners Court met in special session Monday, September 19 to adopt their annual budget and set the tax rate. The general fund ad valorem (L, according to the value) tax rate was set at 36 cents. The total estimated revenue is \$1,593,662.91. The estimated carry-over is \$45,021, with available funds of \$1,638,684.12. The total expenses are \$1,542,859.24 with an estimated carry-over at the end of this fiscal year of \$95,824.88.

## City Council adopts new budget, tax rate set for 1994-95 year

City council met to adopt their budget and set the tax rate Tuesday, September 20. The adopted tax rate was set at 42 cents and the budget is set at \$1,437,000 for the 94-95 year. The differences between the county commissioners and the city council have been resolved. The county will have control of the park while the city will retain control of the swimming pool. "We have all the licenses and permits that are required for the pool," said Rick Hanna, city manager. The cost of operating the pool is estimated at \$8,000. The county will maintain the park with community service labor. The city will be paying half of the expenses back to the county. With the county using community service labor at the park, expenses will be cut by as much as \$20,000.

the inspector has been averaging around 7-9 inspections of septic systems in the county per year. The cost to have TNRCC do the inspections is \$500 per inspection, "a substantial savings," according to the commissioners.

The joint venture difficulties have been resolved between the county and the city. The county will remain equal partners with the city in all joint ventures except the library. The county commissioners said the \$33,016 budget set by the city for the library was too high. The city council maintains it is necessary for the library budget to remain at this amount or lose privileges and funding they now receive from the West Texas Library Association. It was agreed the county would pay 25% of the library and the city pay 75%.

The county commissioners also said the \$44,000 budget set by the city council for the park could be reduced if the commissioners were to take control of the park. It was agreed the county take charge of the park and the city reimburse them for expenses. The commissioners feel by using community service labor on park maintenance they will be able to cut park expenses by as much as \$20,000.

The commissioners also voted to discontinue the annual refund on early tax payments. In the past a 3% discount for a three month early tax payment, 2% for two months and 1% for one month was paid to taxpayers. By discontinuing the early payment

discount the county expects to save approximately \$29,000. "We will lose the use of capital paid to the county in early taxes," said Judge Giles Dalby. "If we get into a bind, we should have enough money to run the county for about two months in our reserves."

The commissioners also voted to put 1 cent of the tax increase toward meeting the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards. These mandated standards, according to law, should be met by the end of December of 1994. The 1 cent would equal \$34,000, an amount far below estimates needed for renovation to meet ADA standards.

In an effort to reduce the budget, the commissioners had considered eliminating the county extension agent - home economics presently held by Deanna Lee. Lee has turned in her resignation effective September 30th. The commissioners were considering not hiring another agent to replace her. "If you do not replace her, the 4-H and the recycle programs will suffer. I don't have the time to do both jobs the way they need to be done," said John Senter, Garza County Extension Agent-Agriculture.

After a public meeting was held last week, the commissioners found an overwhelming objection to eliminating the office. In the commissioners meeting Monday a vote was taken and unanimously passed to retain the office and to replace Lee after her resignation.

to the council that figure was too high for this year's budget.

The Sheriff's Department budget has increased from \$165,000 to \$182,000. This increase according to the council is due primarily to the sheriff's department hiring of a new part-time employee. There is an increase of approximately \$79,000 in the sanitation department. "Our trash truck is old and needs replacing. We plan on taking the container off one of our old trucks and the cab off another and making a good back up, then we will use the other as a trade in," said Hanna.

Landfill costs have dropped from \$215,094 to \$120,820. "The drop in this is due primarily to the maintenance and labor costs of last year," said Hanna.

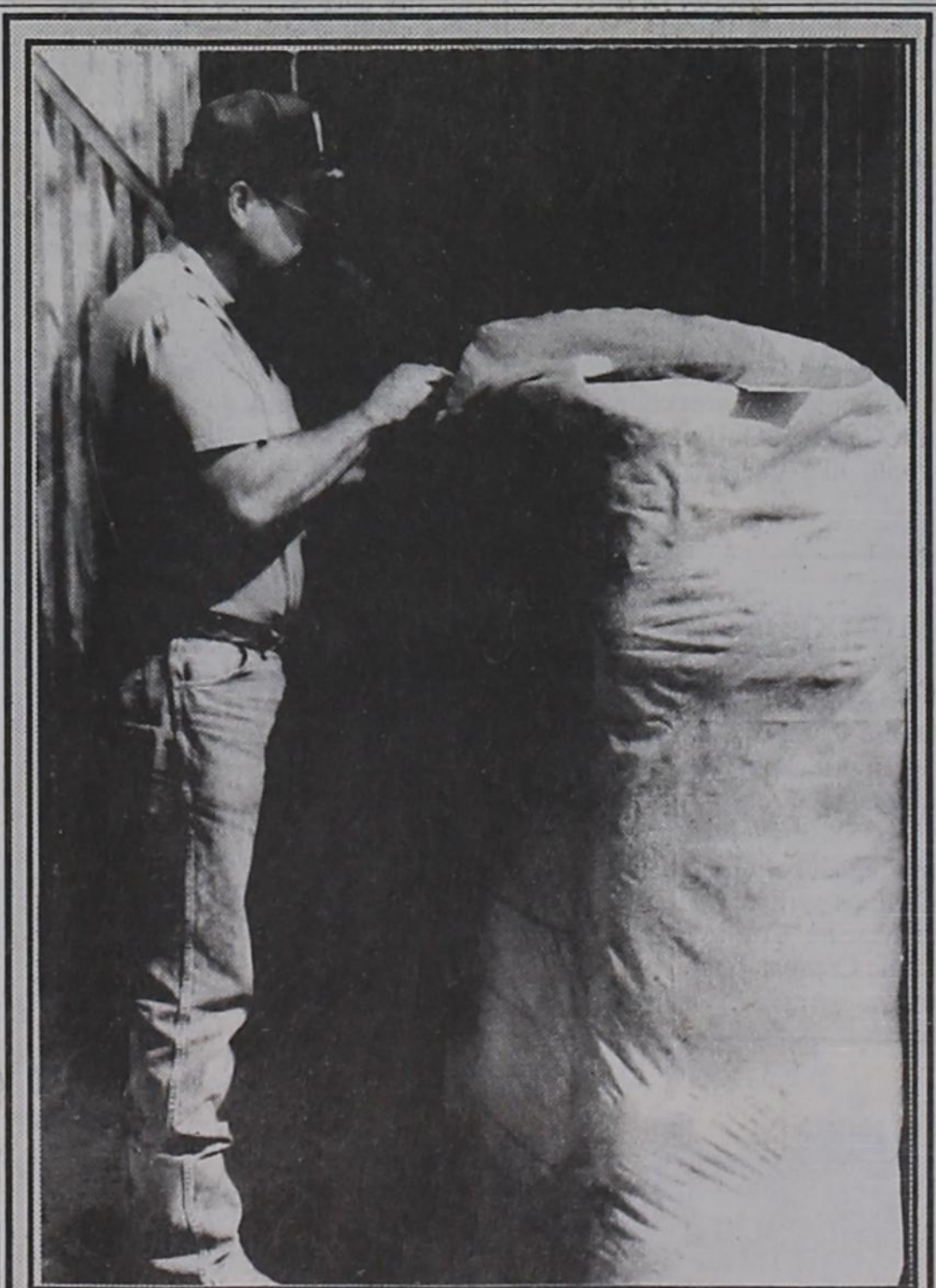
The Bold Gold Antelopes will be playing Tahoka starting at 7:30 in the Bold Gold Stadium.

## Graham Co-Op gins six bales

"Last year at this time we had 100 bales ginned," said Keith Bell.

The Graham Co-Op Gin put out its first bale of Garza County cotton Tuesday the 20th. Jerry Thuet stripped enough of his dry land cotton to gin six bales. "Last year at this time we had 100 bales ginned," said Keith Bell, gin manager. "This is going to be a no-win proposition for gins and growers both, we expect it to be the worst year since 1986."

The total bales he expects to gin for the entire season is around 3,500 bales. In an average year the gin bales about 8,000 bales. The best year was 1973 with a total of 13,162 bales and the worst year was 1945 when they ginned 154 bales.

With the dry season putting the cotton into stress, most dry land crops will barely produce enough cotton to pay for the ginning. "I expect an overall county average for dry land cotton to be around 50-75 pounds of lint cotton to the acre," Keith said. "That's not enough for the growers to break even, much less make a profit."

The Graham Gin was first established in 1919 by the Thomas brothers as a private gin. They operated it until the Co-Op purchased it in 1933. Since that time it has been a Co-Op and owned by all members of the Co-Op. Bell has been there over three years. Bobby Josey, who keeps the books, has been there since she graduated from high school in 1947. "This is the only full time job I've ever had," Josey said.

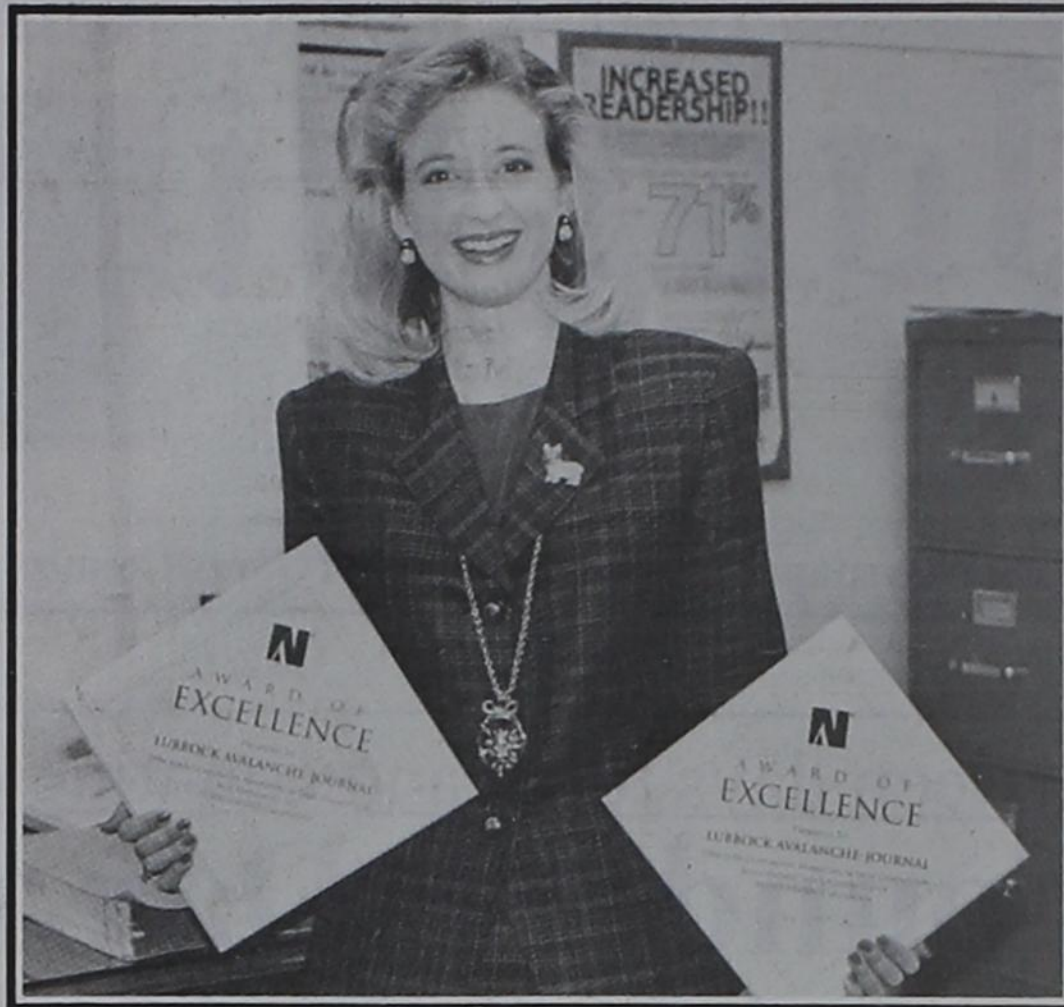

### Tax 'n Facts

ESTIMATING ERRATIC INCOME

According to the rules, estimated taxes are to be paid in equal installments through the year. Penalties may result if you try to "backload" your payments, paying a little up front and more later. Easy if your income comes in equal installments, but what if it doesn't?

The tax rules have considered that, too. If your income is seasonal, or you get a big pot of money late in the year, you can pay your estimated taxes using the annualized income method. For each quarter, you project your annual total for the year on the basis of the income you have earned to date. This enables you to match your tax payments to cash flow, paying less when you make less, more when you make more.

If your adjusted gross income (AGI) was \$150,000 or less on your '93 return, you're covered if your estimated tax meets last year's total tax due. If you made more, prepay 110 percent of the 1993 tax. If you are self-employed, remember that estimated tax payments must include provision for the self-employment tax, too.

Make sure you're doing it right. Go over the numbers with the tax people at MASON, WARNER & COMPANY, P.C.

## Deadline nears for SBA loans

Businesses in some Texas counties have until October 3, 1994, to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from drought and high winds which occurred March 1 through November 23, 1993. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

Businesses located in the following counties have until October 3, 1994, to file an application:

Borden, Dickens, Kent, Lynn, Crosby, Garza, Lubbock and Scurry.

Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the drought and high winds reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the weather are not eligible for this program.

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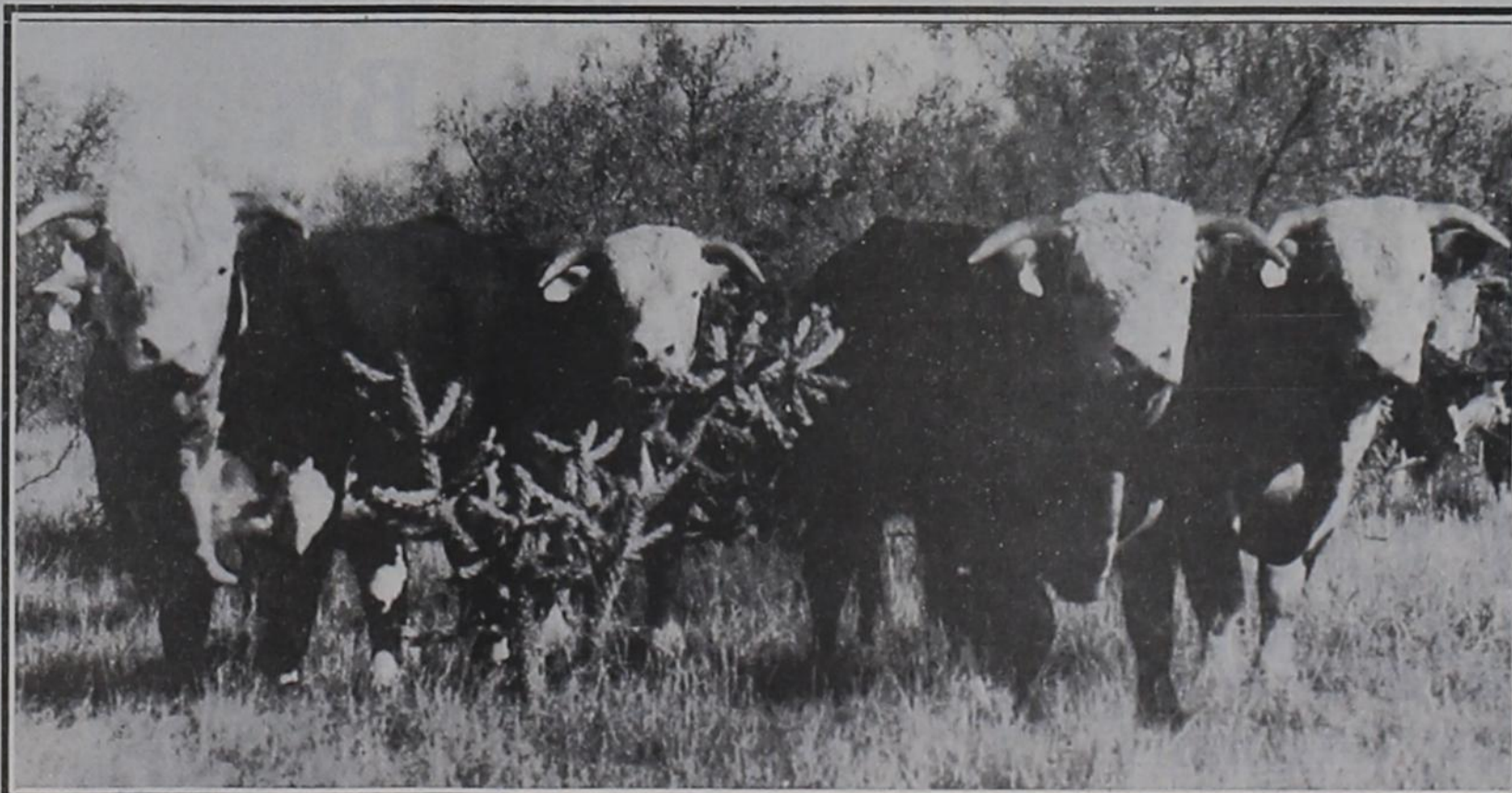

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## Gardening in Garza

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**CHRYSANTHEMUMS:** Now that your mums are in full bloom, take a little extra care to ensure the staying power of the flowers and increase your enjoyment of them right up until frost.

First, keep the plants well watered during dry weather. An erratic supply of moisture now will cause many buds to fall to open and flowers to lose their brilliant color. When you notice your plants wilting, water them immediately. Potted mums are especially prone to wilting. Mulch your plants to conserve moisture and protect roots from damage due to near-freezing temperatures.

Keep a close watch for insect and disease problems. Dust plants weekly with Sevin if insects appear; apply a fungicide, such as Captan, to control mildew and other diseases.

After all flowers have faded, cut the plants back to about six inches tall. Divide the transplant chrysanthemums next spring.

**WILDFLOWERS:** September through December is the most favorable time to plant wildflowers here. The National Wildflower Research Center has a list of all Texas sources for native plants and seeds as well as information on using and establishing native flowers and plants in your landscapes. Write the National Wildflower Research Center, 2600 FM 973 North, Austin, TX 78725-4201 or call (512) 929-3600 to ask for this information.

Many wildflower and native plant nurseries have toll-free numbers to discuss their customers' expectations, and to assist in selection of seeds which will be more successful for you. 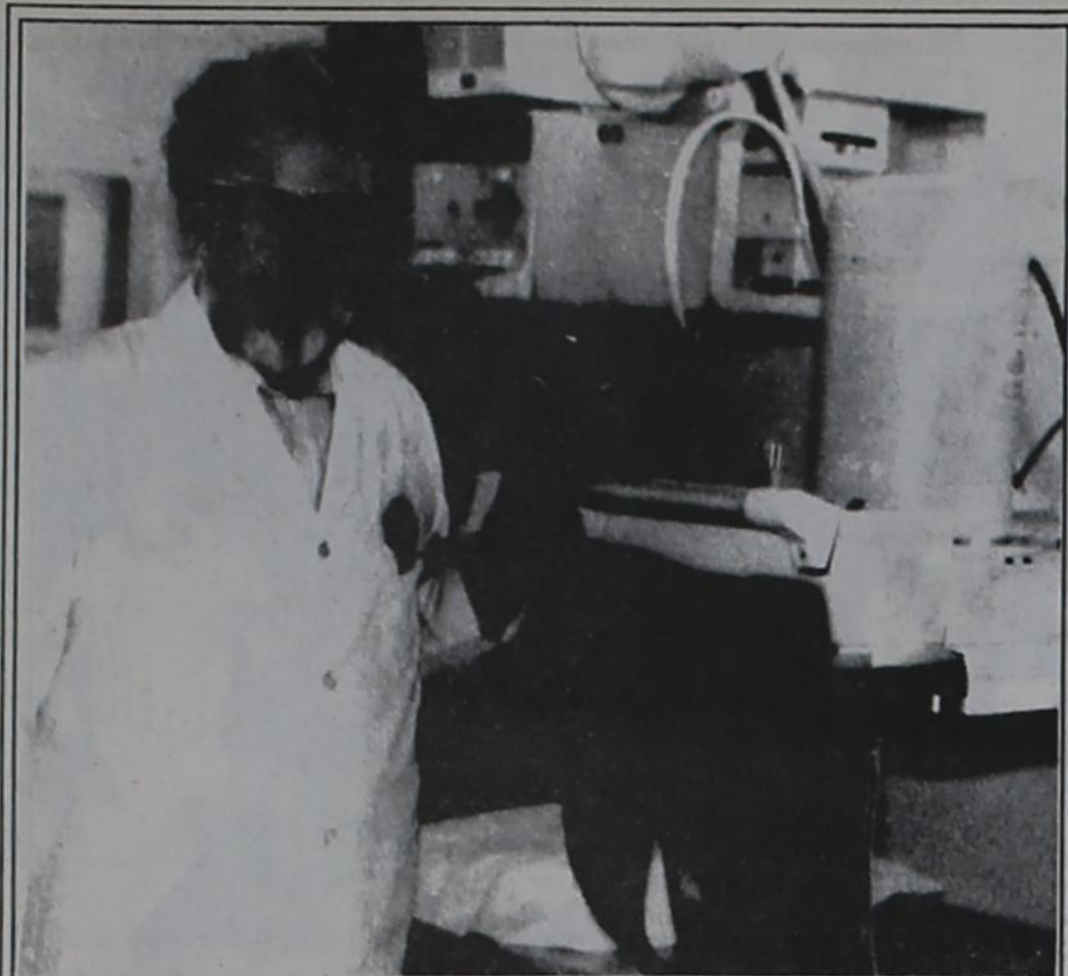

## Hospital gets Fluoroscopy

Thanks to a new Fluoroscopy machine recently installed at the Garza Memorial Hospital, a patient was spared the expense and distress of a trip to Lubbock. Local Plummer, C. B. Bilberry was the first person to benefit from the advanced technology offered by the Fluoroscopy.

Bilberry was replacing a handle on a metal chisel. Having a difficult time making the chisel fit into the handle, Bilberry hit the chisel with a hammer. After striking the metal part of the chisel with the hammer a small piece of metal flew from the end of the chisel and lodged in Bilberry's chest.

Bilberry immediately went to Dr. Leininger's office to have the projectile removed. After examination and several failed attempts at probing to find and remove the metal object, Bilberry was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital. "It was like looking for a needle in a haystack," said Leininger. The miniature piece of metal was lodged between the ribs in the intercostal muscles a short distance from the lung.

The Fluoroscopy is a type of live x-ray which allows the physician to look into a monitor. By looking into a monitor the physician is able to see where a foreign object is located and maneuver their instruments to the object much easier. With the conventional x-ray, pictures would have been taken and the patient removed from the x-ray department. The patient would have then been taken to a place where the physician would have to probe for the object by looking at the picture.

If the object was not located after probing, another x-ray would have been necessary. The patient would have been removed from the x-ray department again and the procedure repeated until the object could be found and extracted. "With the Fluoroscopy I was able to locate the object on a monitor. I watched the monitor to see where my instruments were and went right to the object and removed it. It's not even necessary to remove the patient from the x-ray department," said Leininger.

**From the Pulpit**  
**Mixed up values**

A few weeks ago, a Mr. Frank Balun, of Hillside, N.J., was given two summonses by the Associated Humane Societies, each carrying a penalty of up to six months in jail and \$1,250 in fines. His crime? He had trapped a rat that had been eating his tomato plants and then killed the rat as it tried to escape. Lee Bernstein, the association's executive director, stood by his decision to issue the summonses. "It was not the fact that the animal was killed," Bernstein said. "It was a matter of how a trapped animal that could not escape was mutilated and died a horrible death. No one has the right to take the law into his own hands."

Make a mental note of the reason given for issuing the summonses and we will get back to it in our conclusion.

In the January 1994 issue of the American Family Association Journal, we read that for quite some time, a procedure has been used called dilation and evacuation (D&E) in which the doctor reaches into the womb and breaks or pulls off the baby's limbs in order to extract it. In Dallas, at the National Abortion Federation Risk Management Seminar in September of 1992, Dr. Martin Haskel of Cincinnati presented a new technique he developed called "dilation and extraction" (D&X), which he said he had used in over 700 procedures on patients 20-26 weeks in pregnancy. A Dr. James McMahon of California, has used the method up to 32 weeks or more. That is almost full term. The fetus is turned around and brought through the birth canal feet first. When the body has been extracted, except for the head, the doctor jams scissors in the back of the baby's skull to kill it. The murdered baby is then fully evacuated.

Some would say that the unborn is not a child. It is simply a fetus. Allow me to use GOD'S WORD for authority in this case. "Before Mary and Joseph came together, she was found to be with CHILD." Matthew 1:18. In Isaiah 7:14, we read, "Behold, the virgin shall be with CHILD, and shall bring forth a son." God says the unborn is a CHILD. We refer to the unborn as a CHILD. But, we are being programmed to refer to the unborn as a fetus. That keeps folks from feeling guilty about abortion.

In conclusion, we refer back to the first of the article.
