
## Style show held Sat. at **Trade Days**





#### Tax 'n Facts by Terri S. Cash, CPA

SHOULD YOU BORROW FROM YOUR 401 (K)?

When you need a loan, it's tempting to borrow from yourself--that is, from your balance in your 401 (k) plan, if the plan allows it. The rate is usually comparable to bank interest and you're paying it to yourself. But it may not by the wisest course.

There are a number of dangers. If you do not pay back the loan within five years--or 10 to 20 years if it's to finance a home purchase--the IRS may consider the loan a withdrawal. Result: you owe taxes on the entire amount, plus a 10 percent penalty if you're under 59 1/2.

What if you quit your job? Unless you can get a loan quickly to pay back your balance, the employer could reasonably keep the amount that you still owe and let you roll over the balance in your account into an IRA or a new 401 (k) with your next employer. Trouble is, you would owe taxes on the amount of the loan balance--missing from your 401 (k) balance on the books-plus the 10 percent penalty if you're under age, unless you can come up with the missing money within 60 days.

I might have been offended by this cartoon, but I remembered a book by Mark Twain, "Captain Stormfield's Visit to Heaven." In one chapter, Captain Stormfiseld, after traveling through space, was talking to an angel. "I'm from Earth," the Captain said to the angel.

"Earth?" replied the angel. "What planet is that?" Captain Stormfield thought for a moment an then proudly announced,

"It's the planet for whom Christ died." But that description did not pinpoint Earth for the angel. "The planets for

whom Christ has died," the angel smiled, "are without number." Does the idea of Christ dying for other planets offend you? Read the little book "Your God Is Too Small," by J.B. Phillips, and see what you


