Rains, winds bring smiles, frowns...

Storms damage local property, rain helps farmers, ranchers

Last week's storms brought worries to some, and good news for others, as Garza County shared in the welcome moisture and worries over high winds.

Terry and Ofelia Hoover, along with their neighbors Pete and Delfina Castillo, are cleaning up and repairing their homes and property following a high wind which struck Tuesday afternoon, May 23.

Sheriff Kenny Ratke described the storm as a "gustnado or tornado," but the National Weather Service did not report the incident. There had been a severe thunderstorm warning issued earlier in the afternoon, but no one here expected the cloud, which brought high wind gusts, to do much damage.

The most extensive damage reported was in the area of Two Draw Lake and a portion of the Ralls Hwy approximately two miles north of Post. Terry and Ofelia Hoover reported extensive damage to their roof, carport and fence. Power lines were also snapped in the area.

Pete and Delfina Castillo lost part of their roof and a play house on stilts as well as a fence and several broken trees.

At Two Draw Lake Carol and Frank Tobias reported roof and vehicle damage and Sheriff Ratke said that outside children's playground equipment was scattered.

There were no injuries in the incident.

The good news for area farmers and ranchers came during a three day stretch beginning Friday. Steady and heavy rains, general across the entire county, were reported through Monday.

Lewis and Jane Mason, who farm approximately six miles southwest of Post, reported that in the four day span their rain gauge measured four inches. "Four inches, exactly," Jane emphasized.

Rain totals in the county were from 1/2 inch to two and three inches.

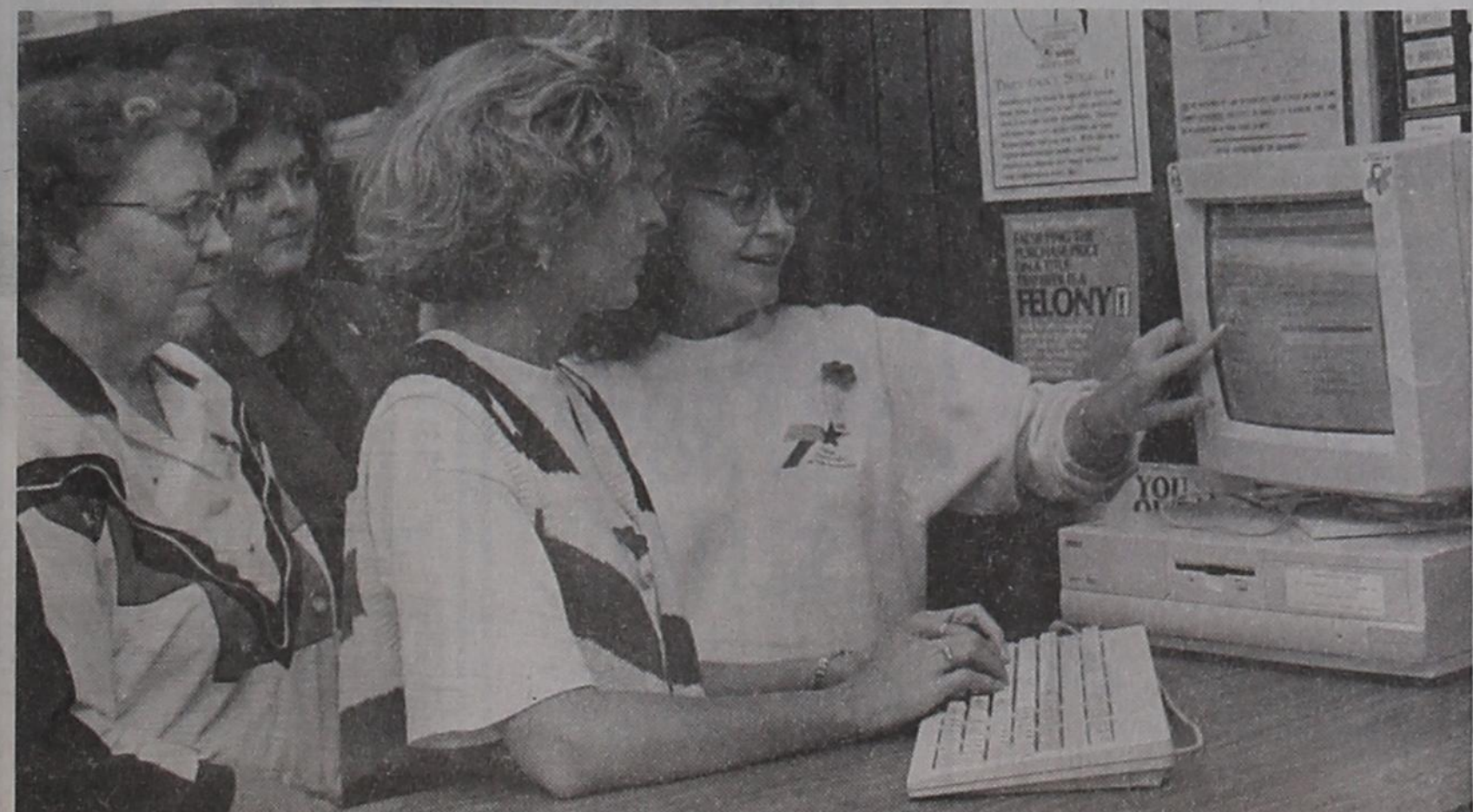
Dry land cotton planting, which looked extremely bleak a week ago, is now appearing to be in good shape.

Alert DPS trooper sends three Lubbock men to county jail

What started out to be a normal Saturday in Garza County turned out to be a wild evening for DPS Trooper Kyle Edwards.

Edwards was instrumental in what is known as the largest money seizure in Garza County.

Upon a routine traffic stop on Saturday, May 27, approximately five miles north on Highway 84 Edwards stopped a vehicle for speeding, 70 mph in a posted 55 mph zone.

There were three subjects in the vehicle. The driver was issued a citation for speeding. After the citation was given Trooper Edwards asked for a written consent to search the vehicle, which the driver gave to the officer. Edwards stated that he had asked for the search because of the strong smell of marijuana coming from the vehicle.

At that time Edwards called for backup. Garza County Deputies Herridge and Ortiz along with Coco, the canine unit, were sent to assist Edwards.

After backup arrived all the subjects were asked to exit the vehicle. At that time the subjects were being searched for weapons and one subject took off running into a field. Deputy Ortiz and Coco took off after the subject and caught him later in the field. While the subject was running he tossed drugs into the field hoping to avoid being caught with them. Coco found the drugs in the field. While Ortiz and Coco were chasing the subject the other two were handcuffed and placed on the ground by Edwards and Herridge.

The vehicle was towed to the sheriff's office and was searched. During the search the officer found what is to be known as the largest money seizure in Garza County - that is to the tune of \$37,835.00 was found in the trunk of the vehicle.

Craig Collins, Don Earl Penson and Kevin La-Don McKenzie are still being held in the Garza County jail.

The sheriff's office responded to a total of 91 calls last week. The Memorial Day weekend was extremely quiet. There was only one accident reported. DPS Trooper Kyle Edwards responded to a one-car rollover Friday night. The accident was 11 miles south of Post on US 84. No one was injured in the accident.

On May 23 a 21 year old female was arrested on warranted for no liability insurance and failure to appear. She laid out her fines and court cost. On May 26 a 23 year old male was arrested for DWLS and released on a \$2500.00 bond. Also a 33 year old female was arrested for DWLS and also was released on a \$2500.00 bond. On May 28 a 34 year old female was arrested for DOC and was released after paying \$230.00 in fines and court cost.

I don't know about you but I'm glad we have C.W. Post and not some insect or varmint in Post, Texas. I really don't believe a mosquito or a killer bee would add a lot of class to a town.

Now, speaking of statues made me think of the bronze that Ben Miller is going to do for Founders Day this year. It will, of course, be auctioned off at the Black Tie and Boots Ball this year.

The bronze stands 27 1/2 inches tall and is a cowboy on horseback looking over the edge of the Caprock. The base will display industry of this area as well as well known ranch brands.

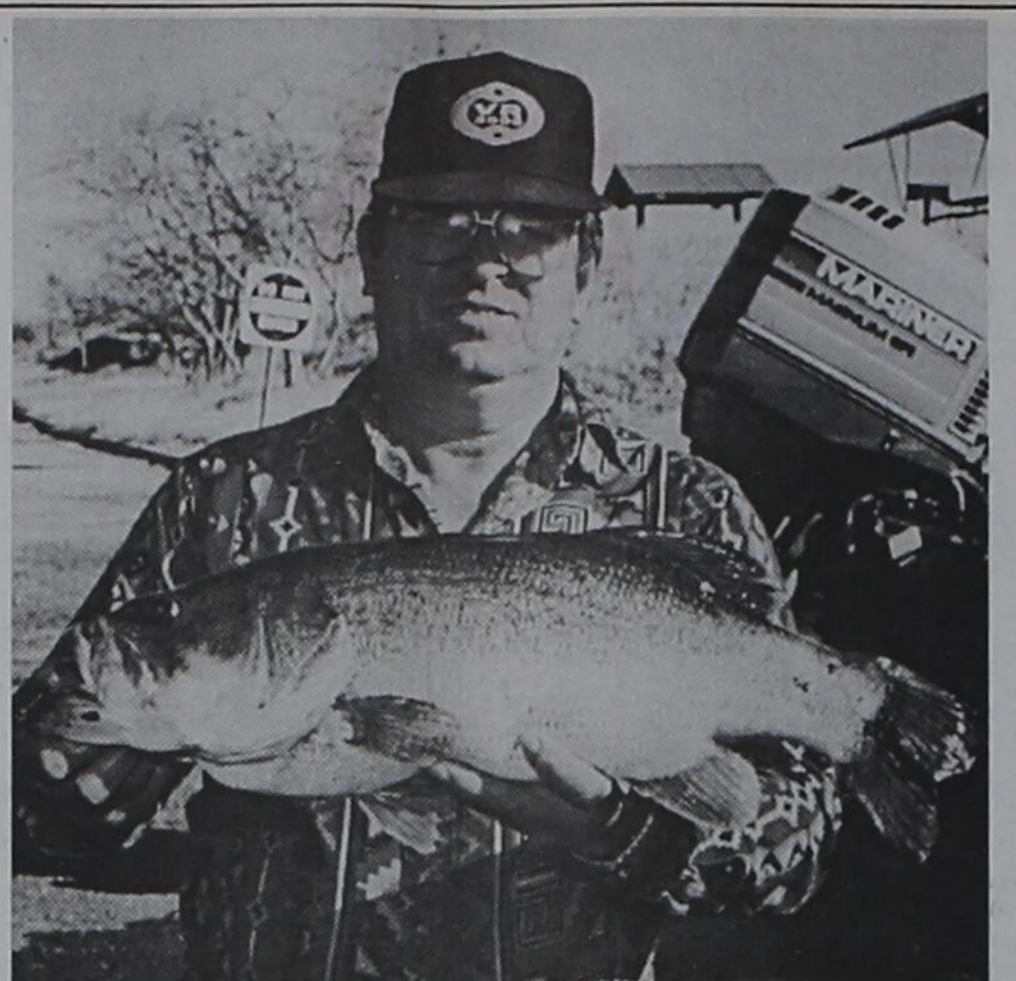
Editorial page nothing more than propaganda

NRA Responds to President Clinton

"The same president who counseled against 'reckless' speech should stop speaking recklessly," said Mrs. Tanya K. Metaksa, Executive Director, NRA Institute for Legislative Action (NRA-ILA) in response to President Clinton's comments last week at the 14th Annual Peace Officers Memorial. "The president has ignored two years of legitimate calls for action to curb civil rights abuses by Federal agencies by NRA, the ACLU and a host of groups concerned about civil rights. Instead of 'reckless' speaking, the president should engage in responsible listening."

Mrs. Metaksa cited NRA's long history of support of and respect for law enforcement, including criminal

justice reform and victims rights efforts in four states and the U.S. Congress the first four months of 1995 alone. In addition, NRA on an annual basis helps train and qualify thousands of peace officers, awards scholarships and salutes a top officer in its annual awards.

"In law enforcement agencies across the country, there are responsible leaders who reward good conduct and arrest misconduct down through their chains of command," said Mrs. Metaksa. "We maintain that's not the case with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. Victims have a right to be heard, and that includes victims of federal abuse. Our goal is calling for full open hearings by a Congressional Committee will ensure that a chain of command rewards good conduct for 99% of officers who do a great job and weeds out the 1% who tarnish the badge."

"When NRA called for a national commission in 1993, where were you, Mr. President? When NRA and a host of other organizations wrote you in 1994, why didn't you answer, Mr. President? When NRA and others visited the Justice Department in 1995, why didn't you listen, Mr. President?"

Mrs. Metaksa dismissed the president's comments on the effectiveness of his 1994 gun ban as "ludicrous and indefensible. The president is making an abysmal record of failing to prosecute federal weapons violations—down a staggering 23% in his first two years in office. That's the only way in which his gun ban is effective: it camouflages lack of performance."

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Tax 'n Facts

Tapping Your 401 (K) Money
If your retirement plan allows it -- and many do -- you can borrow from your own 401(k) account. The plus side is that you don't have to pay taxes on the loan and you don't pay a penalty. The down side is that you may have to repay the loan in full when you leave your job (except if you leave to retire) -- or pay taxes and penalty.

You can take a short-term loan, up to five years, for any reason. A longer-term loan is allowed only for the purchase of a primary home. Interest rates are relatively low, but you cannot deduct this interest secured by pre-tax deferrals, even for a home. Loans are usually limited to \$50,000 or 50 percent of your account balance, whichever is less.

Certain hardship distributions are allowed but they trigger both taxes on the money and a 10 percent penalty if you're under 59 1/2.

Some proposed changes in IRA rules someday may permit penalty-free, and possibly tax-free withdrawals to pay for college, a first home or catastrophic medical bills -- but not yet.

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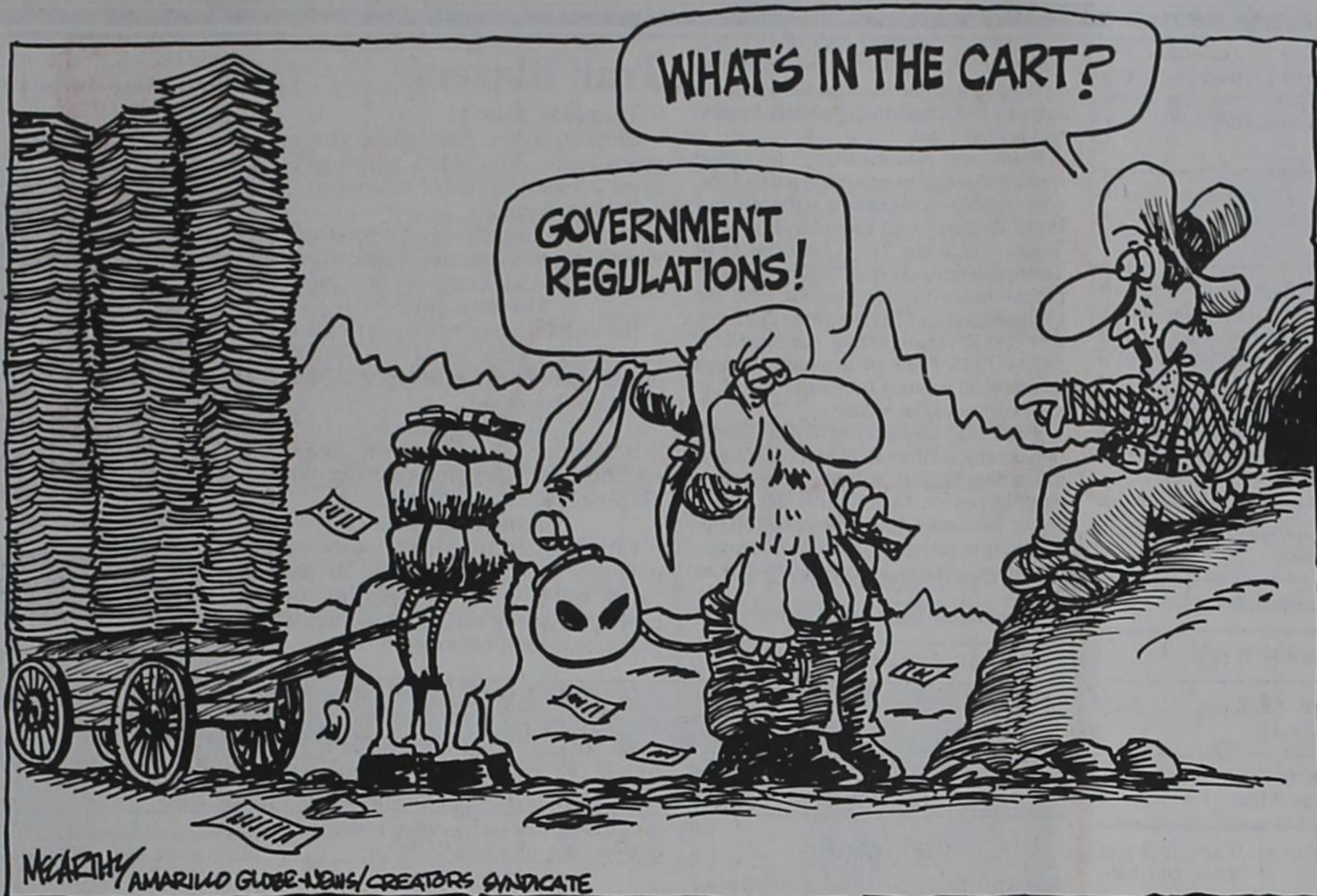
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Social Security: not so hopeless after all

—has a parallel in Social Security. If the system's flaws aren't fixed soon, they won't be fixable later.

Trouble is, lightening the future tax load requires trimming benefits in one way or another. And that would mean giving future retirees an even worse deal than they're going to get anyway. Correcting one problem makes the other worse.

But there is a way out of the box. Sens. Bob Kerrey, a Nebraska Democrat who chaired the entitlement commission, and Alan Simpson, a Wyoming Republican, have introduced a bill that would improve the prospects of future retirees without punishing today's workers. As Kerrey said, it's a "tax cut with the purpose of endowing our future."

The central idea is this: It would allow workers to take up to 2 percentage points of their Social Security taxes and put them into a private retirement account. In exchange, they'd have to accept lower Social Security benefits when they retire. But the higher return they could expect on the money they invest themselves would make it a winning trade.

Like any plan to assure the solvency of the trust fund, this one demands an increase in the retirement age, as well as some tinkering with cost-of-living adjustments. The more important part, though, is encouraging workers to do what Social Security only pretends to do: invest money in real assets to pay for retirement.

That would have several benefits. It would give today's workers more money when they grow old: Funds put into a broad portfolio of stocks, for example, have consistently yielded a return of nearly 7 percent over the long run — while contributions to Social Security provide a return of less than 2 percent. It would also boost our declining savings rate.

Eventually, it might allow us to move toward an entirely private pension system, with workers required to put a portion of their earnings into retirement accounts instead of paying Social Security taxes. Chile did just that in 1981, generating an exceptionally high savings rate and giving workers an average real return of 14 percent per year.

Under the Kerrey-Simpson plan, or under full privatization, workers would be better off in their working years and better off in their retirement years. That's an improvement on the status quo, which overburdens Americans when they work and shortchanges them when they stop.

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Young people these days are a gullible lot, judging from a recent poll. Among Americans aged 18 to 34, 46 percent believe that UFOs are real. But there are some fairly tales even they can't swallow: Only 28 percent expect Social Security to be around when they retire. So I guess any Generation X-er who meets up with space aliens will open the conversation by asking, "How's your retirement plan?"

It's bound to be better than what young people can look forward to on this patch of the Earth. Social Security, like most pyramid schemes, proved to be a windfall for the people who got in early and a swindle for those who came late.

In 1980, the average retiree could expect to get back all the money she had paid in over her working life, with interest, in just three years. By 1993, the payback period was 10 years. By the time today's young workers are ready to punch out for the last time, they will have to survive another 18 years just to recoup their "investment."

Social Security has two major problems, neither of which politicians want to acknowledge. The first is that it's too stingy. Future retirees will get a much worse deal than their predecessors and a much worse deal than they could get from private investments.

The second, however, is that it's too generous. The benefits the system will have to pay in the next century will require a huge increase in taxes.

Given current trends, a bipartisan commission reported last year, entitlement programs (of which Social Security is the largest), combined with interest on the national debt, will consume every nickel the federal government collects in taxes — leaving nothing for defense, education, law enforcement, national parks or anything else. Because the number of people collecting retirement benefits is going to rise much faster than the number of people working, the system will go broke by 2030 unless taxes rise dramatically.

Taking excessive amounts of money from workers and converting them into mealy benefits for retirees — it's the sort of trick that only the government could manage.

Republicans in Congress, like the administration, have refused to address the issue, because they fear the wrath of Grandma. But young people have realized that the sign in the dentist's office — "Ignore your teeth and they'll go away"

What makes a man like Shula so successful?

—all he could do was stand still and pass. Still, the unbelievable happened. In front of a zillion fans, the Jets won 16 to 7. Humiliation.

How can this be Shula's most important game? He says it taught him that success isn't forever and failure isn't fatal. No matter how good you are, sometimes you lose anyhow. And what you do after you lose — and lose big — determines what kind of winner you can be.

Before my encounter with Don Shula was over, I learned that he's a practicing Catholic who goes to mass every day. Getting on his knees before God keeps his humanity in perspective. He says that football is only a game. The real matter is life and how one lives it off the field.

Shula talked about his choosing players for character, integrity and intelligence — these are as important as athletic ability. Shula believes that people who sleep well at night play and work better during the day.

There are no big secrets to unveil here. Nothing about his philosophy of life and sport is new or fancy. It's old-fashioned and plain. But Shula doesn't just talk it — he lives it. No scandal has ever been attached to his name. Nobody has ever accused him of cheating or cutting corners or unfair play.

His secret is no secret at all — it's a combination of integrity and character and commitment to principle.

As I say, I'm not a football fan. And I'm pretty cynical about the hype and phoniness and ugliness of professional sport. But I'm pleased to tell you that the winningest man at the top of the heap — the man most respected and admired — is a man you'd like to live next door to, a man you'd like to have influence your kids and a guy you could count on in a crisis. Watch the Miami Dolphins sometime — no matter how the game ends, the coach is a winner.

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WASHINGTON — This is a sports column. I'm surprised to be writing it since I'm not much of a sports fan. And it begins with an unexpected image — me sitting in the waiting room of a television studio holding a man's hand in mine while I study his ring. By some odd twist of fate, we are both guests on the same TV talk show.

The man is Don Shula. The only coach in National Football League history to have an unbeaten year. And the ring he wears is the one awarded for coaching the Miami Dolphins to that record season in 1972, including the Super Bowl. — The ring is about the size and weight of a lug-nut off the wheel of a dump truck, set with a diamond bigger than an m&m. Wow!

Shula is the winningest coach in professional football history, and he's coached his way into a record six Super Bowl appearances.

Now, I don't watch professional football. But I'm fascinated to be in the presence of anyone who is the best there is at anything. And there are some things I want to know — I may not have this close a look again at someone who's won it all.

I wonder: What does someone this successful have going for him? What's it like to be No. 1? What's his secret? And how does he handle his fame?

You wouldn't get much of an answer just by looking at him. Neatly but not nattily dressed in a conservative, dark-gray suit, with a quiet tie and white shirt, his appearance does not say jock or football. With his dignified demeanor, you'd guess college professor or physician. Firm handclasp, pleasant greeting, cordial response to my request to see his ring. Nothing about him says "LOOK AT ME, I'M THE KING OF FOOTBALL."

So I ask him. What's the most important game you ever played? He smiles. Looks far away as if reviewing game films in his mind. And tells me it's a game in January of 1969. He was with the Baltimore Colts then. The quarterback for the Jets was a mouthy young guy named Joe Namath. Broadway Joe said he was going to whip the Colts. The Colts knew what to expect: Namath couldn't run

the initial entrants into management positions are minorities and/or females."

That's the management quota. Turning to pilots, the court ordered, "For the first 1,200 pilots hired by United when pilot hiring resumes, United will maintain a goal of hiring minority and female pilots at a rate of two times the percentage of minority and female pilot applicants, respectively, who meet the basic qualifications."

Let's look at qualifications. According to a USA Today article (9/26/89), the Federal Aviation Administration required 250 hours of flight time to get a commercial pilot's license and 1,500 hours to be a captain. Major airlines usually require much more experience. In 1989, new hires for major airlines had flying time that ranged from 650 hours to 17,500 hours with an average of 3,910 hours. USA Today reported that a woman with only 500 hours flying was hired and was training to be second officer on a Boeing 747. The woman said, "Even though I might not have as much experience as people in my class, I have confidence I'll be just as good."

There's no way for us to know whether female pilots are hired and assigned on merit or hired and assigned as a result of EEOC decrees. To doubt the credentials of an authentic female pilot is unfair to that pilot, but given our quota agenda, how do we know? If airlines are caving into EEOC pressure, fairness to passengers might require a departure announcement like "Affirmative Action Flight 99 to Los Angeles; all optimists aboard." That way, passengers can decide whether they are for or against affirmative action.

The non-discriminatory vision of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is what America is all about. The system of racial and sexual quotas is offensive. Calling them goals and timetables don't make them less offensive. Quotas have heard their death knell. That's good for America and the alleged beneficiaries.

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Let's review the legislative debate surrounding the Civil Rights Act of 1964. In shepherding the act through Congress, Sen. Hubert Humphrey said, "... contrary to the allegations of some opponents of this title, there is nothing in it that will give any power to the commission or to the court to require hiring firing or promotion of employees, in order to meet a racial quota or to achieve a certain racial balance," adding later, "in fact, the title would prohibit preferential treatment for any particular group."

Rep. Emanuel Celler pronounced, "Even ... the court could not order that any preference be given to any particular race, religion, color or other group." Sens. Clark and Case decreed, "... any deliberate attempt to maintain a racial balance, whatever such a balance may be, would involve a violation of Title VII."

With assurances like these coupled with support of the nation, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 passed. People who saw the Civil Rights Act as a "bait and switch" tactic for quotas later on were portrayed as either racists or obstructionists.

The gross betrayal of both the spirit and letter of the Civil Rights Act is now obvious to the nation. Nonetheless, affirmative action defenders protest they're not for quotas but for "level playing fields." They lie through their teeth, and when they're confronted with something indefensible, they say, "That was just an aberration."

Let's look at another one of their "aberrations." In 1976, a consent decree was reached between the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) and United Airlines. The U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois ordered: "United will be considered to be in compliance with the interim incumbency goals for management positions if on an annual basis 5 percent of

Rediscovery of the Constitution

The Eleventh Commandment was stated in positive terms. "Love thy neighbor" but it might be better understood by contemporaries if it were restated using the previous format: "Thou shalt not demonize or dehumanize others." The beginning of hatred is putting a label on someone. Even a seemingly innocent label intended only to speed up communication can have the effect of lumping very different people together dismissing their concerns and relegating their grievances to the ashcan.

One has to wonder what James Madison or Thomas Jefferson would say if they could come back today and hear people who are devoted to government compliance with the Constitution being dismissed as extremists.

Well, it would seem that at least five members of the Supreme Court have tentatively joined the ranks of those radicals that federal agents like to describe as people who "take the Constitution literally." In the recent decision U.S. vs. Lopez, Justices Rehnquist, Kennedy, O'Connor, Scalia and Thomas joined to overturn a federal criminal statute based on the interstate commerce clause for the first time since 1936, on the grounds that carrying a gun on or near a school did not "affect" interstate commerce.

A little background here. After the Supreme Court ruled correctly against several of President Franklin Roosevelt's legislation intended to deal with the Great Depression, Roosevelt threatened to "pack" the Supreme Court, increasing its number by statute from nine to fifteen and adding additional members chosen to vote for the constitutionality of his legislation. There are also unconfirmed reports that the justices may have been threatened in other ways. In any case, seeing that they could not withstand the determined efforts of the President and Congress to adopt unconstitutional legislation, they surrendered and proceeded to violate their oath to uphold the Constitution. The Supreme Court has been doing that ever since, allowing more and more federal power to be assumed, most of it based on that interstate commerce clause.

When the subject of federal legislation couldn't be described as "interstate commerce," Congress began to expand federal jurisdiction to include not only "interstate commerce" itself, but anything that had ever moved as interstate commerce, then everything that might some day move as interstate commerce, then anything that might be "part of an aggregate" of things, some of which move as interstate commerce.

Then they decided that it should include all the operations of any enterprise that engages in interstate commerce. And, finally, that it should include anything that "affects" interstate commerce.

But that was not enough. Although the original meaning of "to regulate" was to "train or discipline," and was intended to cover the kind of thing done at loading docks and traffic intersections, the meaning was extended to include "prohibition" and the power to impose criminal sanctions on violators, that is, the deprivation of life or liberty, rather than such civil sanctions as the deprivation of property or privileges.

This led to a host of federal criminal legislation, much of which might be arguably constitutional if applied only to federal territory not the part of any state, over which the Constitution grants "general legislative" powers, but not over offenses committed on state territory.

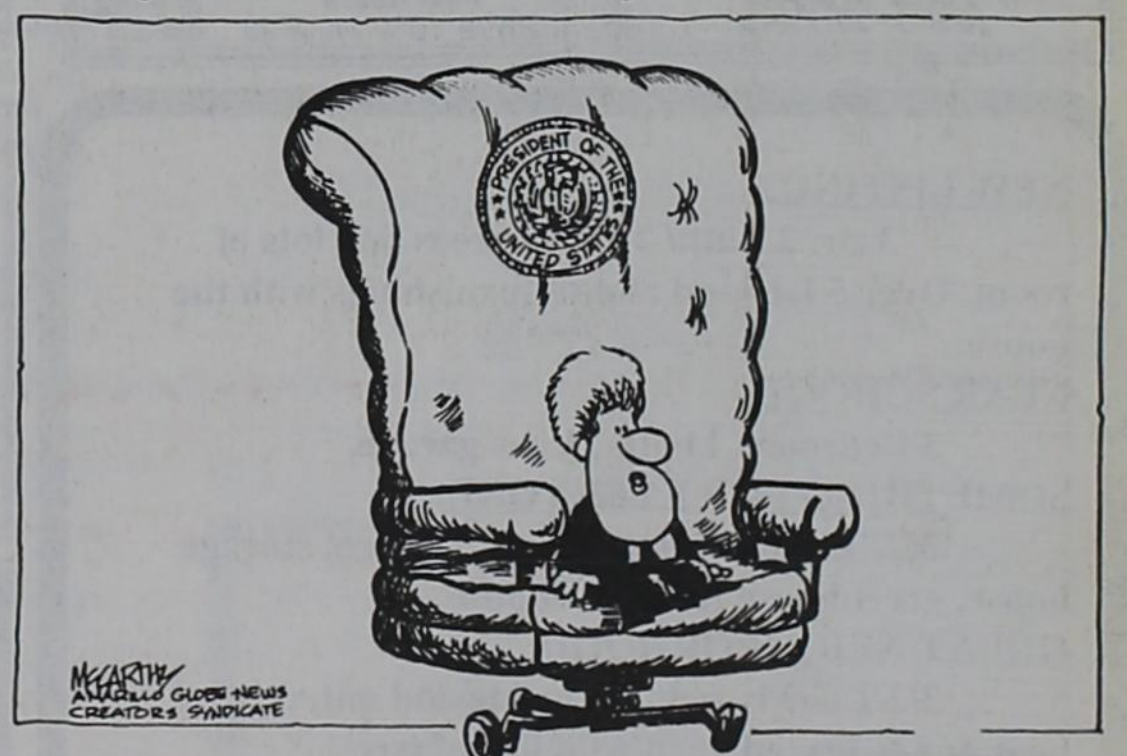
If federal courts begin to pick up on this important Supreme Court decision, and to unravel the last 60 years of unconstitutional federal legislation, we could see a contraction of government that will bring significant changes to the lives of everyone.

The thing that most irritates constitutionalists and civil libertarians is the assertion of jurisdiction by federal courts over offenses committed on state territory over which the central government does not have jurisdiction. The only crimes committed on state territory over which the federal courts have jurisdiction are treason, counterfeiting, piracy and felonies on the high seas, and offenses against the laws of nations.

In addition, the federal government may, arguably, have the power, under the fourteenth amendment, to prosecute for the crime of an official at any level violating the civil rights of a person.

However, when was the last time anyone heard of a high-level federal official being prosecuted for violating the civil rights of anyone? Not that such violations don't happen, of course. It's just that no one is held accountable. And this reveals a basic flaw in the structure of the Executive Branch of the federal government. Agencies are left to police themselves.

What is needed is to restructure the Executive Branch so that every agency and department has at least two other agencies and departments to watchdog it, the watchdogs competing with one another to uncover misconduct. And the watchdogs should have their own watchdogs.

Lord Jesus, fill us with your loving spirit that we may touch others in your name. Amen.



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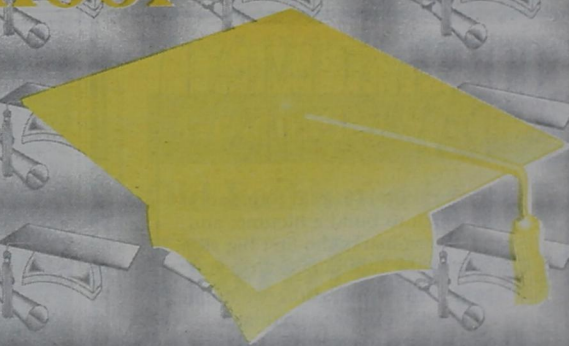
