

# Commissioners issue formal proposal to purchase city-owned land for JDC

The proposed juvenile detention center to be built in Post moved one step closer to reality Monday when the Garza County Commissioners' Court approved a resolution formally proposing to purchase a 43.5 acre tract of land from the City of Post.

Judge Giles Dalby informed the court that, although the appraised value of the land at \$48,500 "is a little high," the purchase by the county would be the most efficient method to transfer ownership for the facility. Dalby explained that Corplan Inc. has agreed to pay a lump sum lease payment of \$48,500 to the county for the purchase. The resolution calls for the city to provide necessary sewer and water line connections, as well as to clean up the site. The city council is expected to take up the issue at its next regular meeting, November

In other action, commissioners approved the purchase of two road graders from John Deere at a cost of \$98,799, which included a guarantee buy back of \$75,000 within five years. West Texas Equipment also bid for the graders with Caterpillar equipment. Commissioners Royse Josey and John Valdez consulted on the bids and chose John Deere because the equipment was closer to their requirements. The graders are for Precincts 3 and 4.

Commissioners reviewed expected health insurance premium increases of as much as 21 percent beginning in November. No decision was made, but county treasurer Ruth Ann Young was requested by the court to study the options and present recommendations at the next meeting. An insurance representative, John Claborn, suggested increasing the deductible amounts and to possibly join a hospital network to lower premiums.

Judge Dalby was named the county's representative to the Central Appraisal District, serving with Mark Kirkpatrick (Post ISD), Valton Wheeler (Southland ISD), Jack Alexander (City of Post) and Royce

Chief of the 106th Judicial District Court community services division, Wilbur Ray, presented a report on the division's activities, and answered questions from Judge Dalby concerning the purchase of a vehicle for the Garza County unit. Ray explained that Garza County's budget was within \$10,000 of the total for the entire district, and he felt funds for vehicle purchases should come from

# Trustees approve new science lab for Middle School





set forth by the State Comptrollers office. The program is a few months away

from being off and running but here are a few things I can tell you now. The Texas Tomorrow Fund, which was approved by the Legislature earlier this year, will offer prepaid tuition plans for

colleges and universities in The idea is to allow Texas families to lock in the cost of their childrens college education so they don't have to worry about

rising tuition and fees in future

Before any contracts are issued by the Comptroller's Office, a governing board has to be appointed and the members must start deciding matters such as rules and regulations, contract terms and a marketing plan. There probably will be several different contracts and payment options.

According to the legislation, the purchaser or beneficiary must be a Texas resident at the time the contract is purchased; however, at that point neither party has to designate which college the child will attend.

Moving out of Texas will not affect the validity of the contract as long as all payments and requirements are met. The contracts are transferable but only within the immediate family of the beneficiary—to a sibling, a half-sibling, or stepsibling under age 18.

# Tax 'n Facts

Money That Doesn't Get Taxed

Most of our income is taxed. Indeed, a chunk is withheld before we see it. Still, there is some money that doesn't get taxed:

 Municipal bond income is free of federal tax and of state tax if the bond is issued in that state. However, this income is counted when figuring how much of Social Security benefits will be taxed, and some bond income may impact on minimum-tax calculations.

· Gifts and inheritances are taxfree to the recipient.

· Return of capital is tax-free; a 1099-DIV will indicate this.

 Scholarships and fellowships are tax-free insofar as they cover tuition, fees, books and supplies, but money that is to cover room and board is taxed.

· Life-insurance lump sum proceeds are not taxed, but anything over that lump sum will be.

· Disaster proceeds to compensate for loss are not taxed but must be substracted from the tax deduction for casualty loss.

Another intern, Caleb Sawyer, a pre-engineering/ore-medicine major from Granbury, has also found a place for family ministry in his plans



# Colin Powell and the American national spirit

Americans are famous for their irrepressible faith in the future, but the current crop of presidential candidates does not exactly fit the national creed of optimism. Bob Dole wouldn't need a costume to go trick-or-treating as the Grim Reaper; Phil Gramm has been likened to a root canal without Novocain; Pat Buchanan thinks nothing has gone right since the Middle Ages; and Bill Clinton is too busy feeling our pain to make us feel better.

Then there is Colin Powell. He has been endlessly compared to Dwight personality, there is no president he resembles more than Ronald Reagan, mobility. And he knows the power of that story.

sunny self-assurance of Richard Nixon. Clinton is so desperate to please that you want to slap him. Gramm, Buchanan, Pete Wilson and Ross Perot specialize in jeremiads about looming disaster, not visions of a shining city uniform. As Llewellyn says, Powell knows how to make white Americans feel on a nill. Lamar Alexander, with his flannel shirts and populist themes, does nearly as convincing an impersonation of the common man as Ralph Lauren. It is an axiom of American politics that the candidate who wins the presidency is invariably the one who is best at projecting optimism. Michael Barone, co-author of "The Almanac of American Politics," notes that candidates who sound dour and preachy — think of George McGovern, Walter Mondale and Michael Dukakis — have a habit of losing.

Powell doesn't suffer that flaw. In contrast to most of our leaders, because

Powell doesn't suffer that flaw. In contrast to most of our leaders, he seems and 'God Bless America." downright happy. It's a rare quality in a president — not one you'd associate with George Bush, Jimmy Carter, Richard Nixon, Lyndon Johnson or even John Kennedy. Most of the people who reach the White House seem to be driven incessantly by some deep need for approval or power that they can

never quite satisfy.

The chief exceptions that come to mind are Reagan and Franklin Roosevelt, who retained their natural buoyancy even through all the burdens of the

presidency. Jimmy Carter and Herbert Hoover, whom they succeeded, were nearly crushed by the responsibilities of the job. Reagan and FDR made

them look as light as a feather. Powell's air of optimism comes as a refreshing change from the sour doomsaying that has dominated our politics in recent years. He's the only candidate you can imagine telling Reagan's old joke about the little boy who is presented with a roomful of manure and starts digging excitedly. "There's got to be a pony in here somewhere," the boy explains.

# EPA grants two-year extension on regulations for small landfills

READY,

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX-13) announced today that the Environmental Protection Agency has granted a two-year extension for small municipal solid waste landfills to comply with expensive design and groundwater monitoring requirements. The Congressman had asked the EPA for such an extension in a March 22, 1995, letter to EPA Administrator Carol Browner.

"The EPA's design and control of the congressman introduce accepting public comment on site-specific alternatives until November accepting public comment on site-specific alternatives until November 7, 1995 and expects to decide by October 1996.

"I would urge the EPA to move rapidly to assure landfill owners and operators that they will not be required to invest in groundwater monitoring equipment that is clearly not needed in a region where runoff is not a problem," Thornberry said.

Editor's note: How about insisting that our Congressman introduce

# Promise to challenge welfare being fulfilled

Welfare, as the American people have experienced it over the last

25 years, is a thing of the past.

Both the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives have passed legislation to redesign America's welfare programs. When the dust settles—that is, when a conference committee has hammered out a final bill that both houses of Congress finally approve—we will have fulfilled one of our primary 1994 campaign promises: to recreate the country's welfare system into one that is better both for beneficiaries and for the taxpayers who provide it.

Already, we have a pretty good idea of what the new system is going

States will receive block grants to provide welfare services with relatively few strings attached; 95 federal programs are being folded into three new block grants that include:

\*The Temporary Family Assistance Grant (replacing Aid to Families with Dependent Children and related programs)

\* The Child Care Block Grant \* The Workforce Development Block Grant (which consolidates 85

different federal job training and education programs).

A key part of the Senate bill is the Hutchison funding formula I devised to accommodate the needs of states with growing populations, such as Texas. But more important, it moves us toward the primary goal of cutting overall welfare spending and putting people back to

Our new system of public assistance, if signed into law by the President, will end welfare as a way of life. People no longer will qualify automatically for a welfare check-and the decisions beneficiaries make will have consequences.

The Temporary Family Assistance Block Grant incorporates rigorous work requirements. States will be required to put welfare recipients to work within two years, and impose a five-year, lifetime limit on receiving welfare benefits. Half of all adult welfare recipients in oneparent households must be working by the year 20()0. And we are imposing even stiffer work participation rates—90 percent beginning The general's life story helps account for his air of perpetual good cheer.
Having risen from a working-class black neighborhood to the nation's achieve these participation rates will be penalized as much as 5

> Welfare recipients whose cash assistance is reduced for failing to work no longer will get an offsetting increase in food stamp benefits or housing assistance—no more playing Uncle Sam for a sucker.

> The welfare situation didn't get to this point overnight, nor will it be quickly remedied. But you walk a mile one step at a time. We have started this walk toward making welfare a hand up, not a hand out. The battle is not over—it won't be over until our welfare rolls are

> back to the level they were in 1965 (when the Great Society social experiment began), and until self-reliance is again a predominant

> Editor's Note: No matter how you slice this so-called reform, you can not cover up the simple and profound fact that federal or state welfare programs are purely socialistic. They have no foundation of support by the taxpayers of this country, those who have to work and struggle to provide a living for their own families... and who are now seeing that government theft of their income is no different than a thief breaking into the bank and taking all their money. So-called conservative politicians, such as Senator Hutchison, should take a close look at Karl Marx' religion of socialism... and then explain how this polluted system could ever fit in a free society. Americans are generous, and those in real need will always be supported by Godloving people, but the giving will be out of love for others, not from coercion of some ill-conceived and unconstitutional government theft. ### Clinton Administration threatens pension plans, study says

Senior Clinton administration officials are trying to channel the \$4.8 trillion invested in private pension funds into risky "socially responsible" investments that will provide smaller returns for participants, according to

In "Whose Money is it Anyway? Economically Targeted Investments and the Pension Funds" (Policy Analysis no. 236), Cassandra Chrones Moore says that Secretary of Labor Robert Reich is twisting pension fund management law to encourage fund trustees to invest in politically favored

projects.
Moore says the Clinton administration has long been interested in

channeling pension fund money toward political projects.

During his election bid, candidate Clinton promised to create a \$20 billion "Rebuild America Fund," leveraged with private and public pension funds,

for federal investment in infrastructure.

In June 1994, the Department of Labor issured an interpretive bulletin that declared that federal pension law permitted fund trustees to consider factors other than the financial benefit of plan participants when investing, making a significant change from established presedent.

Because Reich's interpretive bulletin contrasted sharply with fund management custom and legal precedent, the department backdated the bulletin to January 1975, the effective date of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) the federal pension law passed specifically to

Income Security Act (ERISA), the federal pension law passed specifically to

avoid such political maneuvering.

In defense of the interpretive bulletin Reich proclaimed the change "a new ethic of stewardship" that would encourage fund managers to invest pension money in economically targeted inventments (ETIs)—which should be called politically targeted investments.

Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Henry Cisneros announced in August 1994 an initiative to attract pension money to federally subsidized housing projects, despite significant documented risks in such investment.

Moore says attempts to direct funds toward politically chosen projects create a number of ethical and practical problems.

Linder the common law destring fiduciery responsibility and ERICA.

Under the common-law doctrine fiduciary responsibility and ERISA, pension managers are expected to invest "solely in the interest of the participants and beneficiaries" - not in some purported interest of the larger society or any politically favored segment of it.

Economic studies show that investments made for purposes other than maximum return for investors produce lower returns.

A significant number of both private and public pension plans are already underfunded, and they are hardly in a position to take on additional


ETIs selected by government officials constitute industrial policy. In the 19 states that have passed laws directing pension fund managers to invest in programs that foster economic development, the record of such investments is dismil.

When given a chance to vote, 82 percent of participants in one pension fund, the College Retirement Equity Fund, voted against divesting its holdings in cigarette manufacturers -a measure of how beneficiaries weigh

"social responsibility" against their own retirement security.

Moore says that given the financial problems facing Social Security and the low retirement savings accumulated by many Americans, diverting pension funds into investments selected on a political rather than an economic basis could severely jeopardize the retirement security of millions of pension fund participants.

The Pension Protection Act of 1995, introduced by Rep. Jim Saxton (R-N.J.), would ban ETIs. Moore says that, if passed, the act would reinforce the custom and legal precedent that pension fund investments must be made in the exclusive interest of the plan participants.

AUSTIN — James A. "Andy" Collins, executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, is scheduled to appear before the Senate Criminal Justice Committee on Oct. 19 to answer questions about his Sept. 14 resignation and private business plans.

Collins is continuing in office until a successor is named by the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, the body that oversees the administration of the prison system.

Sens. Mike Moncrief, D-Fort Worth, John Whitmire, D-Houston, and James E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson, questioned why the board only accepted applications for Collins' successor for about 10 days, and expressed concern that may not have been enough time for qualified individuals to apply.

Board chairman Allan Polunsky, who maintained that the selection process has been done by the book, said Collins' successor may be named as early as Oct. 24, when the board meets in San Antonio.

Moncrief told the Houston Chronicle he was concerned that Collins' new Louisiana-based company, Professional Care of America Inc., will compete with prison management companies in Texas.

TDCJ spokesman Glen Castlebury said Collins will be happy to







### God is author of order

In I Cor. 12–14, the apostle Paul, in dealing with spiritual gifts in the church, was giving directions for the brethren to follow, lest confusion cause problems. In the 14:33, he wrote that God is not the author of confusion. Things must be done in an orderly manner. That is a principle that has been in effect throughout time. God does things in an orderly manner, whether or not man understands or accepts

We will look at three areas where our refusing to heed the commands of God gets us into trouble that we all recognize should not be. First, look at government. In Rom. 13, Paul writes that "every person is to be in subjection to governing authorities...that he who resists authority has opposed the ordinance of God..."
When Paul wrote the Roman letter, the government was not noted for its righteousness. But it was government. Paul did not say to obey authority when it was what you wanted and resist it when you disagree. The attitude of obeying only when you agree with decisions points back to the Old Testament time of the Judges, when "every man did what was right in his own eyes."

The second area deals with the home. In Ephesians 6, Paul says for children to obey their parents in all things. Paul knew that parents were not always right and that at times they would be terrible examples. Kids would not always agree with their rules. Children love their parents and gladly obey them. But, have you noticed the reaction when parents tell the children "no"? Pouting, shouting, ranting, temper tantrums and storming off to get out of sight of the terrible parents. Let them do what they want and they will love you. The point is, God put parents in control. Children are not given the freedom to obey when they want,

and to rebel when they choose. Thirdly, we take a look at the church. In Acts 20:17-ff, Paul said that elders or overseers were to shepherd the church. I Tim. 5:17 says for "elders who rule well" to be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who work hard at preaching and teaching." Heb. 13:17 reads, "Obey your leaders, and submit to them; for they keep watch over your souls, as those who will give an account..." Space does not allow us to go into more detail on pastors, bishops, overseers, elders, shepherds, which all refer to the same group of men, but refer to different responsibilities. We see what happens when church members do what is right in their own eyes. You have division, rebellion, factions. When God placed elders always a plurality) over the church, He knew that they would not al He knew that they would be terrible examples on occasions. But, God is the same in this area as in others. He placed someone or a group to be in charge. Otherwise, confusion results.

What happens when government is not functioning? Anarchy! What happens when children disobey parents? Anarchy! What happens when church members refuse to obey their leaders? Anarchy and division!

We choose spiritual leaders to lead us. We love and respect them, and obey them, as long as they do what we want. When they tell us NO, we pout, gossip, quit attending services, etc. Leaders are not always right, but when all the facts are in, they are right most of the time. Prayer helps make good leaders.

We need to see if selfishness is the cause of our not obeying those in authority. May each of us look at these areas, and be submissive to government, parents and our spiritual leaders. God will bless us, and we will continue to see peace, love and






