H'coming Game Is Friday

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Steers Blank Mustangs In Intra-County Battle

Bovina High School's Mustangs fell to the Farwell Steers, 19-0, in a district game played at Farwell last Friday.

Weather was a big factor in the game. The first half was played in a steady rain, and the field was soft and slippery most of the night.

"I felt like their size was an advantage in a game like that," said Bovina Coach Bill Talley.

Farwell had two starters in the 250-pound range.

In spite of the bad conditions, Farwell had only a 7-0 lead going into the fourth quarter, and it still was anybody's ball game at that point.

"Farwell had one scoring opportunity up to that point, and they scored. We had an opportunity, and couldn't score,"

said Coach Talley.

The Mustangs recovered a Steer fumble on the Farwell 12-yard-line in the first half, but couldn't move the ball.

"If we could have taken advantage of that opportunity, it might have made a big bearing on the game. But it was a tough night. The ball was changing hands like mad," Talley said.

Bovina had another good chance to score, but once again the playing conditions entered in. Runningback Homer Renteria broke into the secondary, and tried to cut back, but as he did, he stumbled on the wet turf, and the defense was able to catch him and bring him down.

The Mustangs managed only 45 yards rushing for the game, and -1 yard passing. They tried four passes, had one intercepted, and the quarterback was sacked on a couple of other occasions. So, it was not a good night for passing.

Jason Schilling scored Farwell's first quarter touchdown, and Roy Perales kicked the point.

In the fourth quarter, David Woods scored on a four-yard run. Later on, Jaime Mendoza intercepted a Mustang pass and ran it back 65 yards to the end zone. Both fourth-quarter PAT kicks failed for the Steers.

It was the kind of night when you didn't know whether or not to field a punt. "Sometimes you'd be about as well off just to let the punt bounce and take your chance," Talley said.

"We played fairly well. We wanted to win, but fortune just didn't smile on us," the Mustang coach concluded.

Flanker and kicker Bud Venable suffered a bruised shoulder in the game, but was able to practice on Monday.

DON'T LOOK NOW, but all of a sudden the Panhandle area is getting help from Houston and Dallas in its efforts to fight the U.S. Department of Energy's plan to dump the nation's high-level nuclear waste in Texas.

In his weekly news release, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower gives quotes from his testimony at a public hearing last week in Houston.

Hightower's comments were at a Texas Department of Agriculture and the House Subcommittee on Hazardous Materials Transportation co-sponsored public hearing on the federal government's proposal to ship nuclear waste through the Port of Houston.

This proposal to ship the high-level wastes through Houston was what got the attention of Houston leaders.

Under the federal proposal, the nuclear waste would then be transported by rail or truck from the Port, through the city of Houston, up through Central Texas and on to the nuclear waste dump proposed for near Hereford.

"DOE figures that few Texans would really be active in opposition, because the dump site is way out in our backyard--out in the Texas Panhandle. Never mind that we grow a big percentage of our food out in that backyard. DOE hoped the urban centers of Texas wouldn't notice, or care," Hightower said.

"Now we learn, however, that we're all tied to this dump more directly than we first realized. DOE is suggesting that the nuclear trash will be delivered to our backyard by bringing it in through our front door--the Port of Houston. And who knows what's going to fall out of this delivery between the Port and the Panhandle? We are all in this together--dock workers and dirt farmers, Houston and Hereford, and six million Texans in between," Hightower said.

"TDA has opposed the Panhandle dump proposal because it's insane to risk an area of Texas that produces 51 per cent of our wheat, 58 per cent of our corn, and supplies much of the world's planting seed. Over 3.5 million head of livestock are also raised in the Panhandle.

"Frito-Lay, Holly Sugar and Arrowhead Mills, the largest suppliers for much of the world's naturally-grown grains and other organic food items, also depend upon Panhandle farmers to supply them with fresh, quality products," Hightower said.

The Ag Commissioner said it was almost as if DOE took a map and pencil and tried to route the waste by as many other Texans as possible. One of the possible routes would have the trains and/or trucks passing through counties in which over six million Texans reside--every day.

Also testifying at the hearing was Houston's state representative Al Luna. "We just can't afford to let them contaminate two of our most important economic sectors at once: transportation in Houston and agriculture in the Panhandle," Luna said.

Others testifying at the hearing were corn, wheat and sugar beet farmers from the Panhandle, as well as officials from two of the major anti-dump organizations (STAND and POWER) in the Panhandle. Testifying from the Houston area were witnesses for the Sierra Club, Concerned Citizens for Rate Relief, the Municipal Organization, the Nuclear Safety League, as well as representatives from the Port of Houston, concerned unions, railroads, fire departments, emergency response teams and other public officials. Officials from DOE declined an invitation to testify at the hearing.
