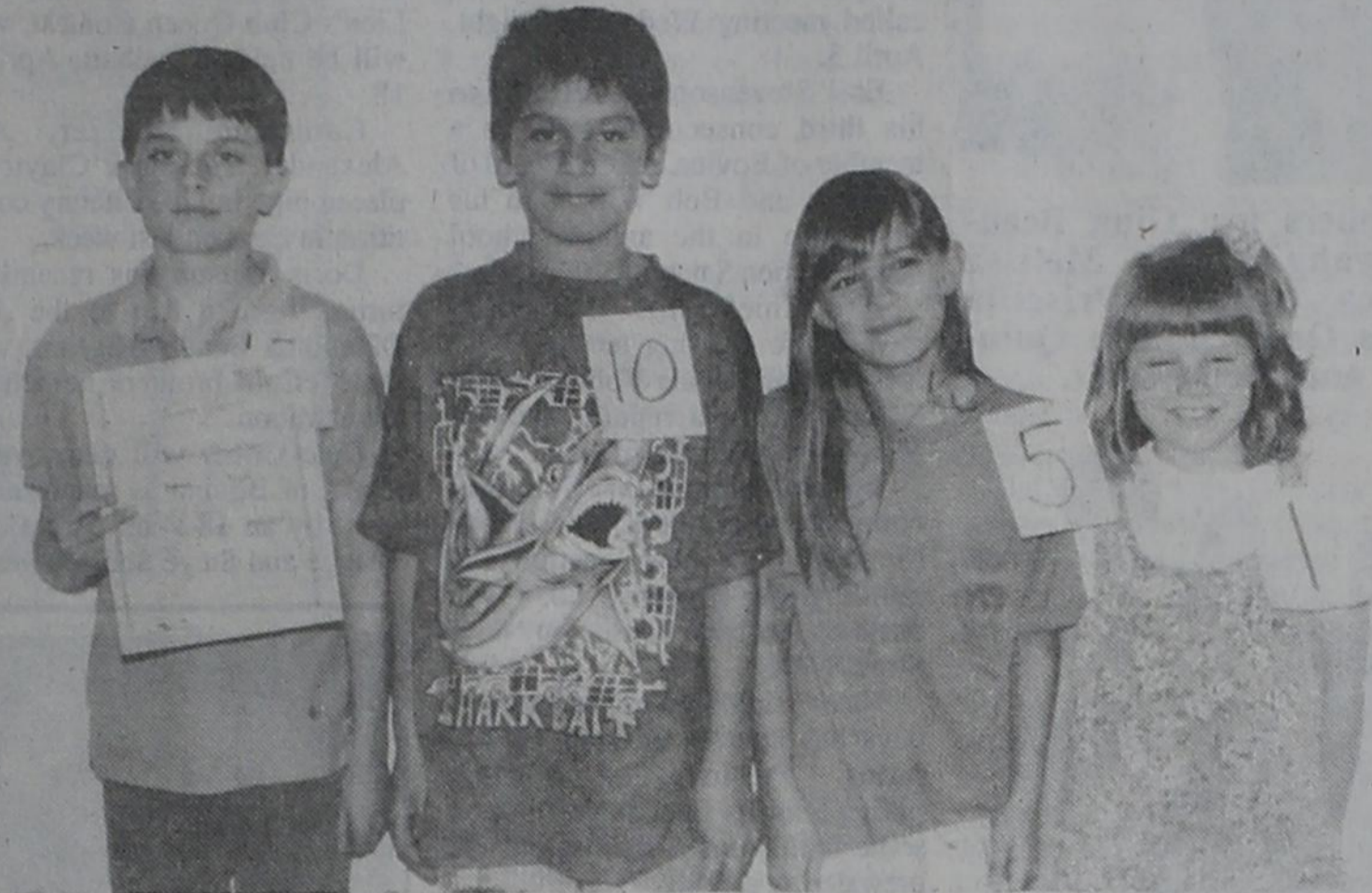

We can find out between now and November about his opinions on those specific issues which relate to each individual, and then if we don't agree with him, we sure don't have to vote for him. I have some of the petitions at my house. They have to be turned in by May 1 so he can meet the Texas May 15th filing deadline. Call me.

Mustangs Win Dist. Opener In Baseball

Bovina High School's Mustang baseball team, which had been serving as a punching bag for area class AAA and New Mexico class 4A and 5A teams in non-district play, finally got around to a district game Tuesday evening, and enjoyed playing someone their own size for a change.

The Mustangs walloped Paducah, 22-9, in their opening district game at Paducah, and the game could serve as a turning point in

BHS' first baseball season since 1974.

"This should be a good confidence booster for the kids, I felt all along, and had been telling them, that we'd be all right when we got into district play. They played a terrific game. We were fielding much better than we had been," said a happy Coach Rock Stanley following the win Tuesday night.

Bovina was also hitting the baseball. They rapped out 15 hits in scoring their 22 runs.

The Mustangs erupted for five runs in each of the first two innings, and added three more in the third, to take a 13-3 lead over the Dragons. They had a ten-run lead, 15-5, at the end of five innings. High school games are usually stopped after five runs if one team is ahead by ten runs, but this group of umpires thought otherwise.

The game was played a full seven innings--not finished until after dark, and after Bovina had driven the 170 miles to the Cottle County gamesite.

In the top of the first inning, Andy Stormes walked, Angel Porras and Andy Espinosa reached base on errors; Isabel Marrufo and Shane Branson each singled, and Mark Jansen walked, as Bovina jumped into a 5-0 lead.

After Paducah countered with a single run, the Mustangs batted around again in the second inning. Stormes led off with a home run. Porras smacked a single, Marrufo got a double, Guevara and Brian Stanley each singled, and Mark Jansen had a single that scored a pair of runs, and Bovina had hiked their lead to 10-1.

The Mustangs sent eight more men to the plate in the third inning, and increased their lead to 13-3.

Forced to continue playing despite the big lead, the Mustang bats continued to be hot. Marrufo, who also pitched the first five innings for Bovina, socked a three-run home run in the sixth inning to push Bovina's lead to 18-5, and it was all over but the shouting.

Marrufo got five strikeouts in his five innings. Andy Stormes went the last two innings, and had one strikeout.

Marrufo and Hector Guevara each had four hits. Marrufo had a pair of doubles in addition to his home run. Stormes and Guevara each had five stolen bases.

The Mustangs visit Plainview JV on Friday, then host Samnorwood in their second district outing on Tuesday.

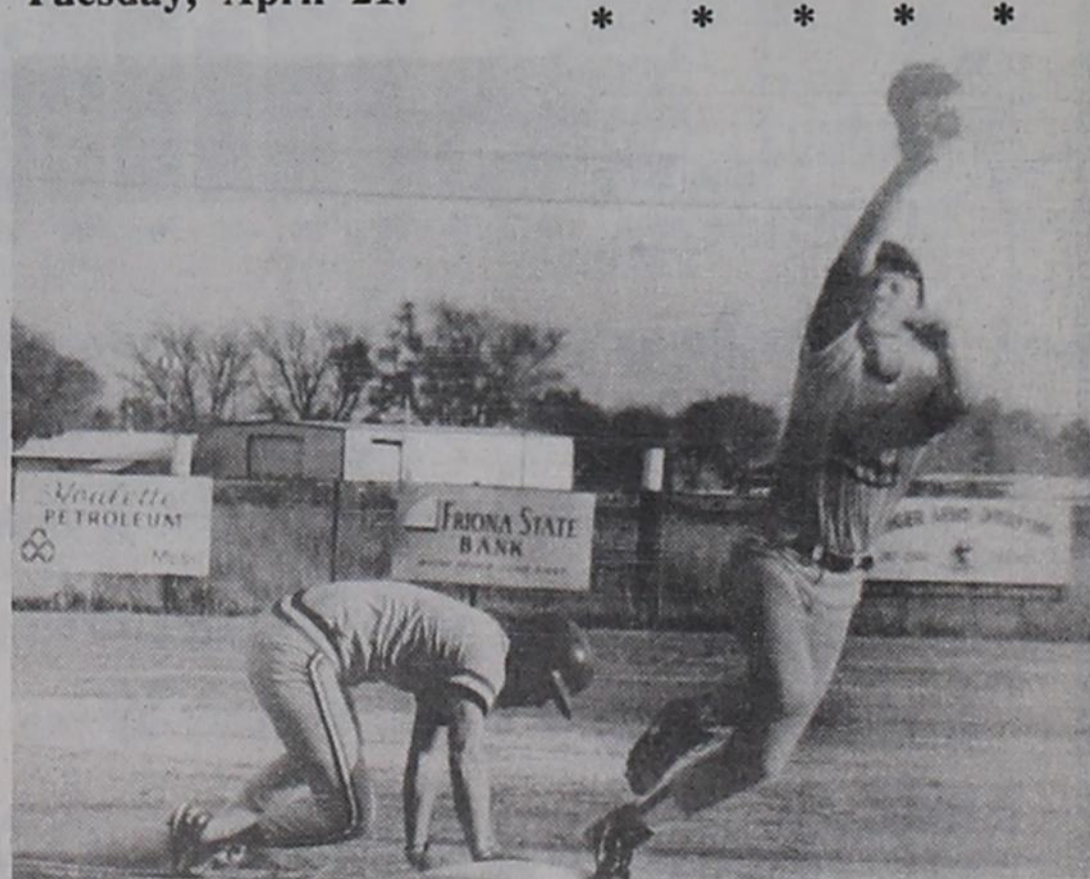
The "Invent America" competition challenges students to think creatively and productively--hopefully, many of these young inventors will be responsible for finding solutions to many of the problems our society will face in the future.

Funeral services were held this week for Marie Flores Madrigal, 76, and she had lived in Bovina since 1969.

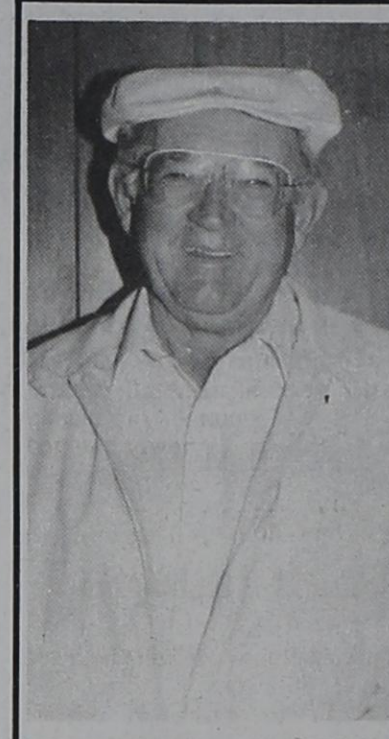
Charlie Gilbreath suffered a heart attack and was taken to the Friona Hospital and later transferred to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

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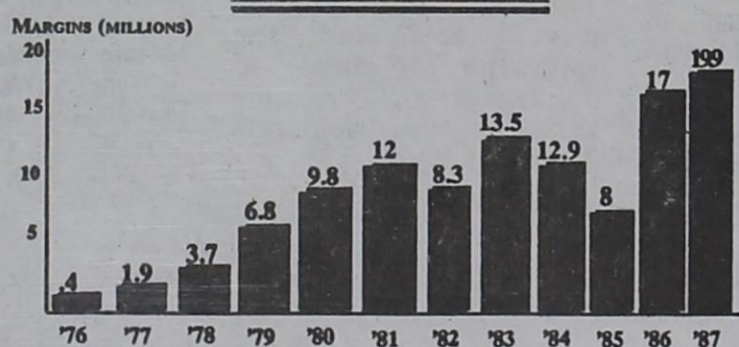

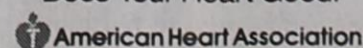

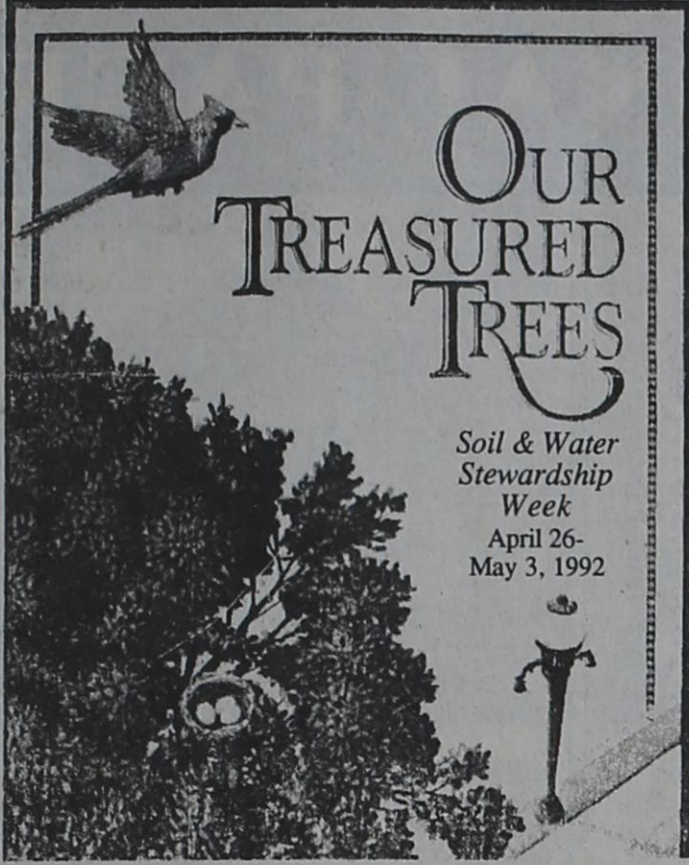

Stewardship Week Set April 26-May 3

Featuring the vital role that trees and forests play in conserving soil and water resources, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is encouraging local schools, camps, churches, organizations and individuals to join the nationwide observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 26-May 3.

The local Conservation District, which works throughout the year on soil and water conservation measures, is providing literature and educational materials that describe how people are dependent upon and interact with trees. The local district is one of nearly 3,000 conservation districts nationwide that work with the National Association of Conservation Districts to encourage the wise use of

natural resources through the annual week-long observance.

M.C. Osborn, chairman of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., said he hopes Stewardship Week will encourage individuals to think about their relationship with trees and establish and care for trees in urban and rural areas. "Every citizen has the opportunity to plant a tree, care for a newly planted seedling, look after mature trees or send financial support to someone who will do those tasks," said Osborn.

Cancer Screening Clinic Set May 2

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas

residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, May 20 from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

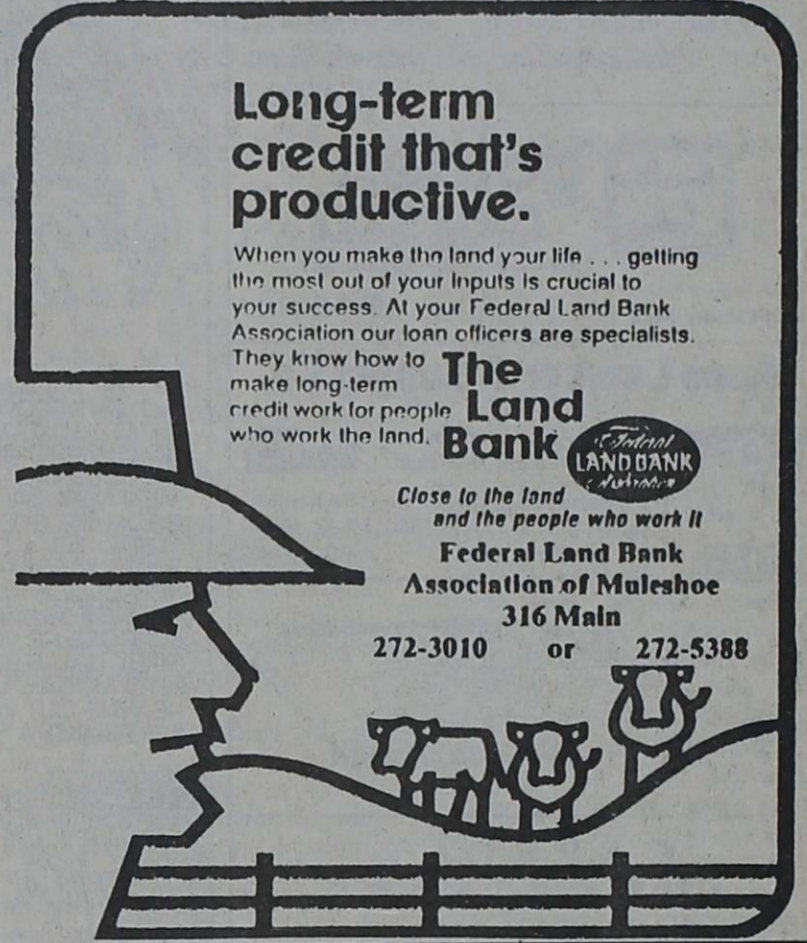

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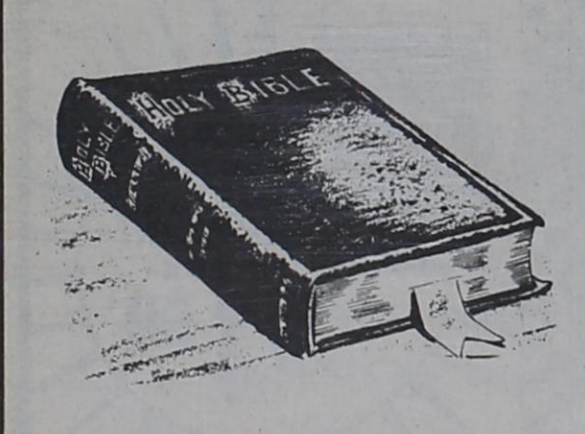

Yes, I have found prayer to be a marvelous thing. It changes me! It changes my attitudes, it changes my thinking, it changes my desires. Where would I be without prayer? It will change your life, too, as well as bless others. So remember, don't worry, pray! The greatest gift you can give to God and to another is prayer. You'll be surprised at the results. And most of all, prayer keeps you looking up!
