GHCD voters want term limits

Saturday's voter referendum in the Garza County Health Care District indicates the majority of local taxpayers would like to see a two-term limit for district board members.

In the referendum on board member term limits, a total of 89 voters approved the need for limits, while 57 voters said no, according to figures supplied by the health care district.

Currently, there is no limit on the number of terms a director can serve, and all terms are for two years.

Of the "yes" votes, 66 voted for a limit of two two-year terms (or four years total); 14 favored three terms (a total of six years of service); five supported a four-term limit (or eight years); and two voted in favor of a five-term (10year) limit.

A total of 156 ballots were cast in the election, which saw no contested races for directors' seats.

Incumbent Michael Travis netted 107 votes to retain his atlarge position on the district board, while newcomer Ray Bagby earned 46 votes.

No one filed as a candidate for the Precinct 1 position. That post is expected to be filled by board appointment in coming weeks. Votes from the weekend election were to be canvassed tonight, May 9, by board members.

Post ISD voters choose incumbents

Post Independent School District voters returned two incumbents to their trustee positions in Saturday's election.

Mark Kirkpatrick and Barbara Hardin, both members of the Post ISD board since 1990, were the top two vote getters in the atlarge election. Kirkpatrick earned 215 votes, while Hardin had 185 votes.

Challengers Susan (Suzi) Clary and Vera Wartes received 76 and 52 votes respectively.

A total of 271 voters cast ballots in the election, according to district officials.



Amish face attacks from welfare state

An Amish farm has come under attack from the paternalistic welfare state in Pennsylvania. According to a story in the New York Times, many Amish families are offering hungry tourists a home-cooked meal in return for a donation.

This has put both the State Bureau of Food Safety as well as the Pennsylvania Restaurant Association in an uproar. Why? Well, not because the food's no good: On the contrary, tourists rave about the "oven-fresh bread, ham loaf, noodles, and shoofly pie."

And, no, not because eating conditions are unsanitary: Dee Dee Meyer, a restaurant chef in Pennsylvania, noted, "I'd eat off the floor in an Amish house." So, what's the problem? The Amish, who historically have believed that life, liberty, and property are inherent and fundamental rights that preexist government (as the Founding Fathers In other words, there should be a market for buying and selling of our country believed) refuse to ask the state for a license to operate

As Don Ranck, a farmer who isn't Amish, put it, "They basically want able to write a contract to sell my organs, say, to Body Parts, Inc., for to be left alone." Well, then who's complaining? Surprise, surprise: Not competition, and the state, which has the power to shut down nonlicensed eating establishments.

Attempting to justify its "get a license or shut down" order, the state pointed to an e-coli infection suffered by people who had dined at an Amish farm run by Elam and Barbara Fisher a few days earlier—even though, according to The Times, "no fault was firmly tracked to the

Faced with the state's ultimatum, the Fishers have decided to shut down. John Stoltzfus, a neighbor, commented, "Elam's health is not good and this was a way for him to make a little money and survive." Just chalk it up as another success story for the paternalistic welfare state and its modern-day tyranny in America.

Property rights under assault in Arizona

An Arizona judge ruled April 29 that the city of Mesa can seize Randy Bailey's profitable brake repair shop and transfer the property to his larger and more powerful neighbor — an Ace Hardware store looking to expand.

The Washington-based Institute for Justice, the public interest law firm which is handling the case for Bailey, immediate appealed the ruling, which is now stayed pending appeal.

The reason this case matters far beyond the Phoenix suburb, where the Bailey family has operated its profitable little business for 31 years, is that cities all across the country "are using the power of eminent domain to take homes and businesses from one set of owners to transfer to more politically powerful ones," explains attorney Clint Bolick, who's handling the case for the IJ. "It's corporate welfare at its most brazen."

In the mid-1990s, Mesa leveled an entire neighborhood — 63 homes — for a resort and water park that never materialized, Bolick reports. "Today the homes are gone, the taxpayers are out \$6 million, and the land remains vacant."

That's because local governments — once responsible for (start ital)protecting(end ital) property rights — are instead now "playing real estate developer," Bolick charges.

It's important to note that Mesa wants to take the property "not to build a road, a school, or a hospital, but to sell to an Ace Hardware Store," Bolick explains. "Bailey's Brake Service has been family owned at this location for 31 years; it's very profitable. But even if he gets full market value for his property he may be forced to go out of

business because of the high cost of relocating." Environmental regulations which have piled up since the shop originally opened would make it prohibitively expensive for Bailey to relocate, even if he were paid "fair market value" for his property,

Bolick explains. The excuse Mesa is using is that they're allowed to seize property for redevelopment if it's "blighted."

Mesa redevelopment director Greg Marek testified the brake shop is surrounded by vacant land, empty buildings and an abandoned gas station, and constitutes a "legal non-conforming use."

"If you didn't use (the power of eminent domain in this way), you would have downtowns in a mess," argues Tom Verploegen, executive director of the Mesa Town Center Corp., who supports the forced property transfer.

But "There's been no formal finding of blight," Bolick explains. And even if blight had been proven, "The city's policies call for rehabilitation and structural renovation wherever feasible. But it turns out the city doesn't have a rehabilitation or structural renovation program, so they just skip all that and go right to eminent-domain seizure."

Perversely, such indiscriminate tarring with the brush of alleged "blight" can become a self-fulfilling prophecy. In the early 1990s, the neighboring city of Scottsdale "declared the Fifth Avenue area north of Old Scottsdale a redevelopment zone and waited for a developer to propose a replacement for the thriving small shops and art galleries," Bolick wrote in a March 4 commentary for the daily Arizona Republic. "Under the cloud of eminent domain, the area has had difficulty attracting long-term tenants or new investment."

Heavy-handed government "improvement" schemes don't eliminate blight. Rather, by interrupting the natural cycle of freemarket investment -private speculators waiting for land prices in a given area to drop before buying up and consolidating parcels they (start ital)cause(end ital) blight.

practices," Bolick adds. But while Arizona Superior Court Judge Robert Myers doesn't seem to have grasped the corrosive effect of such cynical land-grabs, some public officials do appear to "get it."

"How secure do you feel in your property rights?" asks Arizona

State Treasurer Carol Springer in a posting at her official web site. "If you've been following the story of Bailey's Brake Service, you might be a little frightened by an emerging trend. ... Should the City of Mesa succeed in acquiring Bailey's property through the use of eminent domain, it will set a precedent for a whole new wave of government taking. ...

"The developer asked the City of Mesa to condemn the brake shop under eminent domain and enable him to acquire the property. ... This is a far cry from the original intent of eminent domain laws. ...

"Property rights are one of the cornerstones of this country. When the founding fathers came here from Europe it was largely to enjoy the benefits of private property ownership," Ms. Springer points out. "John Adams said that, 'The moment the idea is admitted into society that property is not as sacred as the Laws of God, and that there is not a force of law and public justice to protect it, anarchy and tyranny commence. Property must be sacred or liberty cannot exist.'

Not only are our private property rights guaranteed by the Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments to the U.S. Constitution, Arizona's own state constitution stipulates that "Private property shall not be taken for private use," Ms. Springer reveals.

"Property rights are not a partisan issue, they are an American issue," she concludes. "Those that have the most to lose are the homeowners, the people who work an entire lifetime to procure the American dream of home ownership. The power of America is in its citizens' right to secure their future through property ownership. This is bedrock on which the wealth of this country is built."

A Republican state lawmaker who plans to introduce legislation

in Phoenix to curb such uses of eminent domain agrees. "This should frighten everybody in the state," Eddie Farnsworth, R-Gilbert, told Arizona's East Valley Tribune. "One of the fundamental rights we have, and what separates us from socialism, is private property rights. To me, freedom and property ownership are

inseparable. If you lose one, you lose the other." Amen to that.

HHS Secretary Tommy G. Thompson today called on families to include a walk or other activity as part of their Mother's Day celebrations to promote better health and prevent osteoporosis.

"This Sunday, after brunch, go for a walk with your mother, grandmother and the rest of your family," Secretary Thompson said. "And then together pledge to walk and stay active throughout the year. Families literally can walk down the path to better health.'

To highlight the health benefits of physical activity, especially for older Americans. Secretary Thompson will lead senior citizens on a half-hour walk around the National Mall in Washington. Assistant Secretary for Aging Josefina G. Carbonell and representatives of national aging organizations will also participate in the walk, which is part of HHS' May activities for Older Americans Month, National Osteoporosis Prevention Month and National Physical Fitness and Sports Month.

Researchers have found that people of all ages can benefit from being active and that staying physically active can help prevent certain diseases and disabilities as people age. Nationally, lack of physical activity contributes to an estimated 300,000 preventable deaths each year from diseases such as heart disease, stroke and diabetes.

Osteoporosis is a disease characterized by loss of bone density and quality. leading to increased risk of fracture. About half of all women and one in eight men will suffer a fracture due to osteoporosis during their lifetime.

Walking, jogging and other weight-bearing exercise helps keep bones strong and also improves balance and muscle strength, which are important in avoiding falls and fractures.

"It is never too late to start exercising and eating properly," Assistant Secretary Carbonell said. "We all need to incorporate regular exercise and physical activity into our daily schedules so that we can live long, healthy and productive lives."

As part of the event, HHS will also distribute a free guide on exercise for older Americans developed by the National Institute on Aging at HHS' National Institutes of Health. The guide includes tips for older Americans on appropriate activities that can help prevent disease and disability and improve their health. 





Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your
- · the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll · any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal · the taxable status of your property the local governments which should be taxing your
- the ownership of property
- · the change of use of land receiving special appraisal any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the 806-495-3518. You can also get a pamphlet describing hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphoid

their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy You may call (806) 495-3518 to discuss your of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review. board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was

The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

A Bluebonnet Legend

The bluebonnet is known by other names such as buffalo clover, wolf flower and el conejo (the rabbit). Its most familiar name probably began when settlers moved to Texas.

The blue flower they saw growing wild were thought to resemble the bonnets worn by women to shield them from the Texas sun. Margaret Looper of Huntsville has studied bluebonnets and Indian legends that go along with the popular wildflower. Margaret supplied Tomie dePaola material for the book, Legend of the Bluebonnet. "Great

spirits, the land is dying. Your people are dying, too," the long line of dancers sang. "Tell us what we have done to anger you. End this drought, Save your people. Tell us what we must do so you will send the rain that will bring back life." For three days,

the dancers danced to the sound of the drums and for three days the people called Comanches watched and waited.

Drought and famine are hardest on the very young and the very old. Among the few children left was a small girl named She-Who-Is-Alone. She sat by herself watching the dancers. In her lap was a doll made from buckskin, a warrior doll. The eyes, nose and mouth were painted on with the juice of berries. It wore beaded leggings and a belt of polished bone.

On its head were brilliant flue feathers from the bird who cries "Jay-jayjay." She loved her doll very much. The shaman went to the top of the hill to listen for words from the Great Spirits who would tell him what to do so the rains would come and the earth would be green and alive.

While the shaman was gone to the hill, She-Who-Is-Alone thought of the mother who made the doll, of the father who brought the blue feathers and her grandparents who had all died in the famine. The warrior doll was the only thing she had left from those distant days.

The shaman returned and spoke: "I have heard from the Great Spirits who said the people have become selfish. They have taken from the earth without giving anything back. The Great Spirits say the people must make a burnt offering of the most valued possession among us.

The ashes of this offering shall be scattered to the 4 points of the earth. When this sacrifice is made, drought and famine will cease and life will be restored to the earth. That night, She-Who-Is-Alone held her doll tightly to her heart. "You," she said, looking at the doll, "are my most valued possession. It is you the Great Spirits want."

After everyone was asleep, the small girl took a glowing stick from the tipi fire and crept out into the night. She ran to the place where the shaman had heard from the Great Spirits. She spoke. "Here is my warrior doll. It is the only thing I have from my family who died in this famine. It is my most valued possession. Please accept it."

She then gathered twigs and started a fire with the glowing firestick and thrust her doll into the fire. In the morning, the ground was covered with flowers, beautiful flowers the color of the blue feathers on her doll.

Gill pointed out that the City of Post had inquired about purchasing water from Lake Alan Henry, only to discover that the pipeline cost would be approximately \$30 million. "Looks to me like our best option is the one with Slaton," Gill said.

Engineer Rich Oller explained that the project includes two storage tanks, one in Slaton and one in Post, with the larger one here. "By keeping those tanks full," Oller said, "we can have constant pressure in the line and have more than enough storage for emergencies."

The 27 mile pipeline, mostly along U.S. Hwy 84 (on the west or south right of way) will run to a two million gallon storage tank just below the caprock near the existing storage






